US Ecology says no areas singled out

For now it appears that the city of Wayne is one of the areas that will not be a potential site for a low level

radioactive waste storage facility. The Wayne community was black-ed out as one of the sites considered excluded because it is a population center, as was indicated on a map used during a presentation at the US Ecology workshop in Norfolk's Villa Inn Monday evening. Wayne is considered a population center since its population exceeds 5,000.

However other areas surrounding Wayne (within the entire northeast Nebraska area or many locations throughout certain sections of the state) have not been ruled out as potential sites.

RICH PATON, vice president with US Ecology — a firm which has been selected to build the low level radioactive waste storage facility — said there have been several Nebraska communities who have expressed an interest in hosting the site. He did not mention the com-

critical habitat for threatened endangered species and urban areas. The 100 or more people attending the workshop were given oppor-tunities to ask Paton about the past performances and current op tions of US Ecology and the facility it proposes to build in Nebraska. Members of the audience were also permitted to comment on the feasibility of establishing a waste storage facility in northeast storage Nebraska.

MOST OF THE comments directed against locating the facility in northeast Nebraska. Deb Wragge of Creighton told Paton that the nor theast Nebraska area is highly susceptible to erosion by water and quoted the average rainfall to be 24 to 30 inches per year. Gravel channels and perched aquifers exist, she said. Wragge said that more than 10,000

names have been gathered on a peti tion requesting that the site not be located in the state.

Studies by scientists and geologists, she said, reveal that the low level radioactive waste should be disposed of in dry arid regions. She said almost all sites have been unsuccessful east of the Rocky Mountains.

would affect livestock production in northeast Nebraska, which is also an area where 825,000 crop acres is irrigated and where there remains nitrate problems in some locations. Paton said the waste site will not necessarily be located on what is considered as Nebraska wasteland.

"We'll need a good technical site that is well-drained and free from en-vironmental limitations," he said. The primary consideration in site location, he said, is groundwater. Other considerations are surface water, geology, urban growth poten-tial, dedicated land, overall natural resource conditions and cultural



Make input count

Monday night's workshop in Norfolk, sponsored by US Ecology and coordinated by the Nebraska League of Women Voters, offered a greater look at the proposed site selection process and what it will take to build a low level radioactive

waste facility in this state. Northeast Nebraska, in general, is Nebraska's largest livestock-producing area. Farm chemicals seeping into the groundwater is bad enough, affecting our health by what we eat and drink.

The risk of low level radioactive waste seepage or contamination would add to the concerns of northeast Nebraskans. Is it wrong to be overly cautious?

The facility would generate at least \$3 million annually which would boost the economic picture of any community significantly. But in the long term, will future industry or business earnestly seek to locate near a low level radioactive waste facility?

There is some sort of comfort to fears of radiation (if you want to call it that) which US Ecology got across to the 100

or so people attending the workshop. US Ecology says there is no reason to expect anyone living near a licensed facility would receive any radiation. There are strict release standards for all nuclear facilities set by the US Nuclear Segulatory Commission together with the National Academy of Science and the U.S Environmental Protection Agency

That standard limit is 25 millirems per year, based on the worst possible situation.

A three-pack a day smoker gains 3,000-8,000 per year of radiation exposure. Living in a concrete structure produces 150 millirems annually and residing in a brick house pro-duces 100 millirems annually.

The granite used to construct Grand Central Station, the Statue of Liberty and the U.N. Headquarters would give off 525 millirems annually (whole body dose).

So nature itself releases plenty of radiation that we are exposed to every day. And now, the Nebraska State Board of Health plans on

drafting a resolution supporting the department's neutrality on the issue and assuring Nebraskans there is no health risk. It will be brought to the full board this summer for action.

Nebraska's climate can break down low level waste disposal site barriers. Unfortunately, northeast Nebraska has highly erodible soil. Can an above ground facility actually be built tornado-proof?

These are legitimate concerns that need to be addressed before the state and US Ecology. By no means is this Norfolk meeting the final act before making a site selection. There will be more public hearings, where all concerns can be properly aired.

However, the low level radioactive can come in the form of dry trash (protective clothing), used equipment (valves or hand tools), wet waste (solidified before stored), and sealed sources such as me ment tools. Ninety percent of the volume is Class A dry active waste. The most heavily concentrated radiation must be protected for 500 years

"We would have to get a number of state and local permits before con struction, just as any other developers are asked to receive," said Paton

US ECOLOGY was the first com mercial low level radioactive waste disposal company and they currently operate two of the nation's three low level sites. He added that the com was also the operator of two aste sites that failed - shallow land burial facilities in Kentucky and I linois

The Environmental Imin pact Statement must be compi 1991-1992 and construction is set 1992, with operation of the low level radioactive waste storage facility planned for 1993.

The state has the sole siting, licens ing and regulatory authority over any low level waste disposal facility proposed for construction in Nebraska. The state also has the authority to suspend or revoke the facility license at any time, should the facility fail to meet all applicable regulatory requirements.

Alarming situation

How much is life worth?? Recently some residents of Wayne have been requesting that the siren tests and fire siren alarms be rescheduled or eliminated.

It should be noted that it only takes It should be noted that it only takes 5 minutes to lose a life. When a com-munity is protected by a volunteer fire department, approximately one minute is lost responding to the sta-tion when a call is received. Approx-imately 2-3 more minutes are lost traveling from the station to an acci-dent or fire scene within city limits, leaving only 1-2 minutes for search and/or rescue. The practice of using the fire sirens definitely plays a very important role in traffic control in important role in traffic control in that it does forewarn traffic of an

over the years some compromises have been made. One several years ago was to stop using the fire sirens

on the towers and the trucks between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 p.m. In the last year we had 46 calls and 14 of them were during those hours resulting in only 32 warnings in the 12 month period. The most current com-promise is to reduce the wall time from 3 metates on fire alarme to 106 promise is to reduce the wall time from 3 minutes on fire alarms to 1½ minutes. In addition to alerting the public to an emergency situation for the fire department, this also gives the system another chance to test it's effectiveness.

If we are to have an effective warning system, the Civil Defense warn ing system also needs to be tested, which most of you know is tested monthly. It hasn't been too many years ago that the residents of the Knolls addition requested they have a siren installed in their knois addition requested they have a siren installed in their neighborhood because of the lack of an audible warning system. The cur-rent tower and siren system now in use does a very good job of

US Ecology's facility design incor-porates multiple barriers and monitoring systems. After 30 years, when the facility no longer accepts waste, it will be visually inspected and monitored before enclosing the structure in multiple layers of concrete and natural materials

In general, women purchase more medicines (prescription and nonprescription) than do men. Some market researchers have explained this observation based on the belief that women are more interested in health matters than are men. They point to the fact that women make more visits to physicians than do men. Others believe the difference occurs because women seem to be better informed about health matters and may be more inclined to act on the information that they have acquired.

A recent study in the journal Medical Care indicates that much of the medication taking differences of men and women can be explained on the basis of women's pregnancy and child bearing roles. The two-year study of over 800 men and women showed that women consumed the greatest variety of medicines during the so called "child-bearing years." Researchers found that, when they eliminated female-specific diagnoses and drugs used to either prevent or treat female-related con-ditions, the difference in medicine use by men and women was virtually eliminated.

One of the reasons pharmacists see more women than men is because women, in addition to shopping for themselves, also tend to shop for family members.
