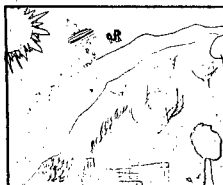
### Food pick up

The Wayne office, Nebraska Department of Social Services, will be distributing food commodities on the following dates and times: Carroll Fire Hall, June 2, 9:30 to 10:30 a.m.; Hoskins Fire Hall, 1 to 2 p.m.; Winside City Auditorium, June 2, 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.; Wayne Social Services Offices, June 3, starting at 9 a.m.

Given away will be two pounds butter, one jar honey and five pounds non-fat dry milk.

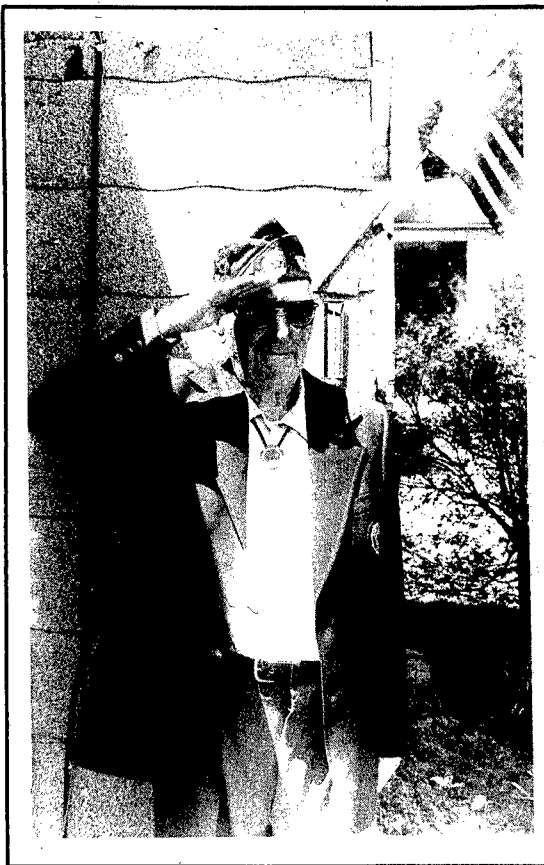
A Social Security card and proof of residence, such as a utility bill, are necessary for identification. Food items cannot be picked up for another household unless the social service office has a statement of income verification and written permission from the household. These statements can be picked up at the social service office prior to distribution.

Households must have income below the following limits to qualify: one, \$8,250 per year, \$688 per month; two, \$11,100, \$925; three, \$13,950, \$1,163; four, \$16,800, \$1,400; five, \$19,650, \$1,638; six, \$22,500, \$1,875; seven, \$25,350, \$2,113; eight, \$28,200, \$2,350.

## Gas rate comparison study criticized

A survey on rate comparisons between municipal ownership of natural gas, in comparison to private ownership of gas companies, recently fueled criticism from Peoples Natural Gas officials.

The rate comparison, released this week by the Nebraska Municipal Power Pool, had indicated that the consumer-owned and operated natural gas systems offer lower rates to users than rates charged by private suppliers.

However, Jim Markham of Peoples Natural Gas said the study by the Nebraska Municipal Power

Pool "illustrates the lack of relevance the study is likely to have for the people of Wayne, Nebraska and other gas customers in the Peoples Natural Gas service area."

Wayne was among nine Nebraska cities that have participated in a study on the pros and cons of owning and operating their local natural gas system. Earlier in the year, the city council approved the appropriation of \$5,240 (\$1 per capita) to conduct the study.

Other participating cities were Crete, Curtis, Gering, Kimball, Stuart, Wahoo, West Point and Wood River.

The study was conducted by HDR Engineering.

Averages were taken by computing costs on gas usage. Cities used in the averages for municipals were Alma, Central City, Fremont, Hastings, Lyons, Nebraska City, Omaha (MUD), Pender, Ponca, Stromsburg and Wisner.

Cities where investor owned natural gas company operate that were averaged include Wayne, North Platte, Lincoln, Scottsbluff, Chadron and Sioux City, Iowa.

Comparisons were made in industrial service, residential service and commercial service. Each city was rated on the usage rate for 7,500, 12,500 and 25,000 cubic feet per million BTU.

Wayne's residential service rates

at the three levels were \$36.19, \$56.68 and \$107.90 (with franchise fee included). Of the 11 municipal owned cities, Wisner, Lyons and Fremont were higher while the remaining eight were lower.

Wayne rates for commercial and industrial service were also higher than eight of the 11 municipal-owned gas operations (lower than Wisner, Lyons and Fremont).

Markham from Peoples said the rates contained in the data are not indicative of the situation in Wayne. He said the "pool-released" study compares cities served by different pipelines which have different gas costs.

"When gas costs is approximately

75 percent of the rate a city pays, differences in pipeline rates create major differences in local rates for each city," Markham said.

He also said Wayne's rates are lower than six systems in the Peoples Natural Gas service area which are municipally owned. As of May 1, he said, municipal system rates in Fremont are 25 percent higher, 20 percent higher in Stromsburg, higher in Lyons and 4.5 percent higher in Pender, all of which are served by the Northern Natural Gas Pipeline.

Fremont, used as a municipal system example in the study, has given customers two rate decreases

## Communities set Memorial Day events

Residents across the nation will pause on Monday, May 30 to honor veterans who have died in service to their country.

City, county, state and federal offices will be closed that day. Businesses in most towns also are planning to close their doors.

Wayne and several neighboring communities have scheduled parades, programs, graveside services and dinners as part of their Memorial Day observances.

### WAYNE

Sponsoring the Memorial Day program in Wayne will be the Veterans of Foreign Wars post and auxiliary, with the American Legion and Disabled American Veterans posts and auxiliaries also participating.

The Memorial Day parade, which begins at 10 a.m., will form at Third and Pearl Sts. and travel to Greenwood Cemetery where a one-half hour program begins at 10:30 a.m. at the new Veterans Memorial plot.

Participating in the program at the cemetery will be the color guard and firing squad, the Wayne-Carroll High School band, scout groups and Voice of Democracy winners Shawnette Janke of Winside and Marta Sandahl of Wayne.

The cemetery will once again be decorated with an Avenue of Flags. Persons who would like to assist in putting up poles are asked to meet at the cemetery at 6 p.m. on Sunday evening. Residents also are needed to assist in putting up flags on Monday at 6 a.m.

Wayne area boys and girls between the ages of six and 12 who would like to place flowers on the graves of deceased veterans are asked to contact Eveline Thompson, 375-3446, or Frances Doring, 375-4870.

Youngsters will meet at Wayne city auditorium at 9:30 a.m. on Monday. Children who have flowers are asked to bring them.

### ALLEN

Memorial Day services at Allen's Eastview Cemetery will begin at 10:15 a.m. on Monday and will include an Avenue of Flags.

Services also will be conducted at Trinity Cemetery in Malinsburg at 11:15 a.m.

The Rev. Gary Klatt of Trinity Lutheran Church, Malinsburg, will deliver the Memorial Day address.

Taps will be played by Jennifer Lee and Kelly Boswell, and special music will be provided by the Allen High School band under the direction of Sandy Kotalik.

The invocation will be by VFW Chaplain Richard Blohm, with the benediction by Pastor Klatt. A memorial prayer will be offered by American Legion Auxiliary Chaplain Marion Ellis.

Lisa Boyle, 1987 Girl's State delegate, will read the history of Memorial Day. A reading of the "Gettysburg Address" will be by 1987 Boy's State delegate Lanny Boswell.

Roll call of the dead will be given by Scott Morgan, and the firing squad will be under the direction of Sergeant at Arms Dean Chase. There will also be a floral tribute by Melvin Vavra.

Giving the welcome will be Richard Oleson, commander of the Allen American Legion Post 131. Co-sponsoring the services are the American Legion Auxiliary of Allen and the Martinsburg Veterans of Foreign Wars Post and Auxiliary.

In the event of rain, the program will be held in the Allen school auditorium.

## Legion a part of Koch's life

# Veteran recalls WWII

A yellowed boot box with the \$4.95 price tag still on it holds most of the memorabilia from World War II for Ollan Koch, a Winside American Legion veteran of 42 years.

Mementoes tucked away inside the box include a World War II issued sugar cube, a box of motion sickness tablets, a camel skin billfold from Morocco, numerous letters from family and friends, as well as several war medals, three battle stars and a Purple Heart from a shrapnel injury to the foot.

KOCH WAS DRAFTED in 1941 at the age of 34. He served three and a half years with the Second Battalion, Company F, of the U.S. Army 345th Engineers Platoon.

During the war, he was stationed in the countries of Africa, Italy and Greece.

"Our unit was close to the fighting, but never on the front lines," recalls Koch.

"I got my shrapnel injury when we were searching for mines in Italy. It would have taken my whole foot off if I hadn't been wearing this big thick army boot with the tongue flapped over and a real heavy sock.

"I still have a piece of shrapnel in my foot."

KOCH, WHO celebrated his 80th birthday last November, returned as a corporal and joined the Roy Reed American Legion Post 252 shortly after.

"I was the adjutant for the post about 25 or 26 years. I kept the meeting minutes, was membership

chairman, set up programs on Memorial and Veteran's Days, as well as placed small flags on graves each Memorial Day.

"My eyes and ears don't work so good any more and so I had to give up the adjutant job last year."

In addition to the Winside American Legion Post, Koch also is a member of the Norfolk Veterans of Foreign Wars and a life member of the Wayne Disabled American Veterans.

KOCH, BETTER known as "Muggs" to his friends, still attends monthly American Legion meetings and can be found at most Legion programs when his health permits.

"The Legion has been a real big part of Ollan's life," says fellow member Bob Jensen. "He's given us many good and reliable years."

Koch, who never married and lives in his own home, says there are two other Legionnaires who have been members of the Winside post longer than himself.

"Emil Koll who is a few years older than me, and Cecil Prince, who is younger, have both been members of the Roy Reed Post for 45 years. Cecil is still very active but Emil has retired."

A REUNION OF Company F of the Second Battalion is held every two years. This year, the reunion is scheduled at Fairmont, Minn. in September.

"I would love to go, but since I don't drive anymore I'm not sure if I'll make it," says Koch.

"There were 80 men in our unit, but now not many are left. Usually, bet-

ween eight and 12 make it to the reunion. I still correspond with a few of them at Christmas."

ALTHOUGH HE watches little television and says he doesn't keep up much anymore on politics or military affairs, Koch said he does try to read up on veteran's affairs through magazines and news articles sent out by the various veterans organizations.

"I try to read these, but I have to use a magnifying glass and my eyes get really tired after a short time."

OLLAN AND A twin brother Allen were born on a farm south of Winside in November 1907.

"I've always lived somewhere around Winside except while I was in the service."

The Winside veteran said that while serving in the army he received a lot of training in the kitchen. Following military duty, he worked at a local tavern serving food.

Later, he worked at a local produce station until 1972 when he retired following a heart attack.

RECENTLY, KOCH left for the Omaha Veterans Hospital for a checkup, but said he hopes to be back in Winside to attend the May 30th Memorial Day program at 10:30 a.m. in the village auditorium.

Ollan has a list of all 68 veterans buried in Winside's Pleasant View Cemetery.

"We'll be decorating those 68 graves on Memorial Day," he says, "as well as those in six other cemeteries for a total of 95 veterans."

Leading the way for Wakefield was sophomore phenomenon Theresa Stelling. Stelling captured all-class gold medals in the 1600 and 3200 meter runs with times of 5:14.4 and 11:20.04 respectively, and captured a third gold medal in the class C 3200 meter relay.

Stelling ran the anchor of a four-some consisting also of Julie Greve, Cathi Larson and Lauri Plendl which ran from the oval to the record books with their 9:41.14 effort. "We ran a great race in the relay," coach John Torczon said. "We still feel however, that we could have run even better. There were four teams coming into the meet with times between 10 minutes and 10:02, and we were atop the four. During the race our first two girls got boxed and couldn't get out," Torczon added.

Plendl was the one that got them out of the boxed situation and Wakefield went on to post a time which was 19 seconds faster than

they had run all season, and number nine on the all-time state chart. Incidentally, Wymore Southern, Crofton and Roseland all posted times under 9:53.0.

Greve and Larson ran the first two legs of the relay and posted a 4:58 mile time combined. Plendl and Stelling teamed up in the second half of the two mile race for a 4:40 combined time to bring the gold to the Trojans.

Stelling scored the Trojans other two points in the 800 meter run where she finished fifth with a 2:25.04 time. Karen Witt also competed for the Lady Trojans but failed to make the opening height of 4'10".

The Wakefield boys didn't score any points but the experience learned by sophomores Tony Krusemark and Mark Johnson will pay dividends in the next couple of years.

Krusemark finished fourth in his heat of the 110 meter high hurdles in a time of 16.4 seconds while Johnson finished his 1600 meter run time in 4:47.4.

"Mark was ahead after the 800-meter mark," Torczon said. "His half mile split was 2:16.5." He failed to place in the top six however.

Mike Tuller also qualified for the Trojans, but his triple jump of 39'2 3/4" failed to place in the top six also.

### Winside scores one point

Sophomore hurdler Tina Hartmann supplied the Winside Wildcats with their only point as she managed a sixth place finish in the finals of the 100 meter hurdles. Hartmann finished with a time of 17.34.

Teammate Lori Jensen failed to qualify for the finals as she recorded an 18.91 time in the event. Kathy Leighton ran both the 1600 and 3200 meter run but failed to place with her times of 6:05 and 13.13 respectively.

On the boys side the Wildcats were looking for junior Tim Jacobsen to put them on the scoring column, but Jacobsen finished seventh in the 100 meter dash with a time of 11.53. Jacobsen failed to make the finals of the 200 meter dash with a prelim time of 23.73 and a third place finish in his heat.

"Everything was electronically timed at the state meet," coach Jim Winch said. "Without a doubt times are going to be a little slower than with a hand time."

Chris Nau made opening height of 5'10" in the high jump for Winside, but failed to make 6'0". The third competitor Steve Heinemann ran a 5:07 time in the 1600. "We were hop-

ing that Steve ran a time like his 4:45 time at districts," Winch said. "This is his first year out for track and hopefully he'll be back."

Laurel representative Mike Freeman failed to place in the 800 meter dash with his performance of 2:08.48. Freeman had the lead coming down the stretch of the first lap, but the advantage was quickly swallowed by Harvard's Greg Keller who went on to post a 1:58.63 time for the top performance in the class.

Wayne Blue Devil seniors Nick Engelson and Seth Anderson were hoping their final track meet would be one of their finest hours, but it was not to be.

Engelson failed to make opening height in the high jump at 6'0" in his three attempts, while Anderson failed to make the finals in the 110 meter high hurdles and the 300 intermediate hurdles. Anderson ran a 16.29 and 43.3 time in the events respectively.

The winning high jump was 6'8" by Dave Broderson of conference foe O'Neill. The winning 110 meter high hurdle time was 15.58 by Lexington's Tony Wallace while the winning 300 intermediate time was also by Wallace at 40.98.

Sophomore Greg DeNaeyer ran the open 400 meters in a time of 53.61, but failed to make the finals where David Silzys of Fort Calhoun won with a 50.69 time.

## Coaches may attend class

High school basketball coaches from northeast Nebraska and western Iowa have the opportunity to expand their coaching philosophy and knowledge in Wayne State College's new graduate-level basketball theory course, June 20-30, held daily from 12:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

In addition to classroom and on court teaching, several guest speakers are scheduled. Among them is Eldon Miller, men's head basketball coach at the University of Northern Iowa, Angela Beck, head women's coach at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, is tentatively scheduled.

The class will cover such topics as drug testing for athletes, problems of the sport, new trends, the shot clock, and the effects of the three-point shot on the game, according to Steve Aggers, men's head basketball coach at Wayne State. The class is worth three credit hours.

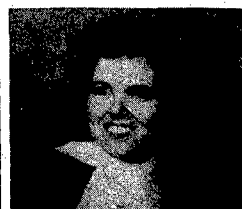

## Stelling proving to be one of a kind

Approximately one year ago, thousands of spectators in Omaha's Burke Stadium stood and applauded Wakefield freshman sensation Theresa Stelling as she stood on the podium to receive an all-class gold medal for her performance in the 1600 meter run, and in a record fashion for class C, 5:05.98.

The girlish and frail looking youngster had run right into the hearts of everyone at Burke with her relentless and untiring pace of the four lap race.

Now, a year later and carrying an extra four inches and 10 pounds, Stelling again walked into the familiar stadium, one that will remain in the back of her mind for the rest of time, with the echoes of yesterday forever imprinted in her memory.

There were many questions that were etched in the minds of avid track fans before the annual state track meet. Ones such as "Will Stelling be able to compete as strong as she did last year with the extra height and weight?"

Stelling did not leave lingering questions such as that too long. On Friday afternoon she ran the final leg of Wakefield's 3200 meter relay. Coming into the competition there were four teams in class C that were between the 10 minute mark and 10:02 mark, so the Trojan foursome of Julie Greve, Cathi Larson, Lauri Plendl and Stelling knew they had to kick it into high gear.

All the Trojans did was come .69 of a second from an all-class gold medal, and climbed to the number nine spot on the all time Nebraska girls track records with their 9:41.14 time.

Stelling's second event of the four she qualified for the state meet in was the 3200 meter run. Coming into the event, she was atop the state charts and she was not about to succumb to anyone.

Stelling darted out to the front of the pack by the end of the first 200 meters and never looked back. By

the end of the fourth lap she had surpassed her first runner that began the race with her.

The fans began to sense that Stelling was well on the pace to break the state record and by the time the fifth lap came around, the fans on both sides of the stadium applauded her on each ensuing lap.

Along with the good comes the bad, and Stelling like any other competitor has to fight the elements. The weather was as much a competitor as any athlete herself. Coming off the third turn of the fifth lap, a swirling violent wind came up and continued its blustery force through the remainder of the race.

Although Stelling was hindered by the wind and did not set any state record, she managed to capture the first of her two all-class gold medals with a 11:20.04 time.

On Saturday morning the first event was the open 800 meters and Stelling was set to begin her third event of the meet. She limped slightly to the starting line and it was the first that coach John Torczon saw of his star runner showing signs of a strained ankle she suffered right before districts.

Stelling, being the fierce competitor she is, managed a fifth place medal in the event with a 2:25.40 time.

The fourth event was the 1600, and Stelling had about a 4 1/2 hour lapse in between the 800 and 1600, so she had plenty of time to rest. This was the race in which she was the defending champion of the state and she didn't want to see the gold pilfered from the grasp of her own hands.

Again the elements played a major factor in Stelling's bid to break the five minute mile. The 25 girls running the race stepped up to the starting line in a torrential downpour, but meet officials insisted they run.

Stelling toughed out the cold wind and rain and finished the race six seconds ahead of friendly rival Fran tenBensel of Arapahoe, and captured the second of her all-class gold medals with a 5:14.4 time.

The state track meet is made up of the best athletes in Nebraska from all corners of the state. Every girl competing has a 1 in 75 chance of receiving an all-class gold medal. But to receive two all-class gold medals the odds dwindle to 1 in 550.

For Theresa Stelling the walk to the podium in the middle of the field to honor the state's best performer in a particular track event is quite an honor. However, the walk to the same podium for two events is a feeling only a handful of athletes will ever experience.

## Davis company withdraws bid

The D.A. Davis Company of South Sioux City miscalculated on its bid to the city of Wayne for water system improvements and has announced recently that it will be signing no contract on the proposed amount.

At a May 10 city council meeting, the construction company had asked the city council to rescind its bid proposal because of addition errors which would have increased the company's bid. At that time, the Wayne city attorney (Kem Swarts) advised the city council to accept the low bid of D.A. Davis Company and let the construction company decide if they wished to pursue a contract with the city.

By using the alternative ductile iron water pipe (instead of the plastic-like PVC), the Davis Com-

pany original bid would have been \$1,000,876. The next lowest bid came from Winter Construction Company of Pipestone, Minnesota, which was established at \$1,149,026 using the ductile iron alternative.

In a special meeting on Tuesday, Swarts said that the D.A. Davis Company, in their original bid, omitted several totals in compiling their final bid quote which resulted in an approximate \$156,000 mistake. "They would not have been the lower bidder," Swarts said.

HE SAID THE D.A. Davis Company sent a May 17 letter to the city of Wayne, which pointed out that the construction company would refuse to sign a contract to complete the water improvement project. They also requested a return of the contract and the 3 percent bid bond.

"The city has the choice of either rebidding the entire project or giving it to the second low bidder, which is

Winter Construction out of Pipestone," Swarts told the council members at the special meeting.

The city council passed a resolution rescinding the bid from D.A. Davis and accepting the second lowest bid from Winter Construction. They also passed a resolution to return the bid bond of 5 percent to D.A. Davis Company.

"It would not be economically prudent for the city of Wayne to hold the bid bond," he said.

Engineers of the project estimated the cost for the installation of the nearly 40,000 linear feet of water transmission pipe and construction of the well house to be \$1,185,315.

## Swimming pool opens

"In my opinion, it illustrates that Peoples operates more efficiently than municipal systems in our area," he said.

The 11 Nebraska cities operating their own natural gas system serve approximately a third of Nebraska citizens.

Other communities are served by private, investor-owned gas companies such as Kansas Nebraska Energy, Minnesgasco, Northwestern Public Service and Peoples Natural Gas.

At the teacher's request, Dairy Council provides two albino male rats that are specially-bred for experimental purposes and are disease free, as well as all of the teaching materials for a six-week study.

## Erodible land estimated by area ASCS officials

Nebraska has 6,632,200 acres of highly erodible cropland and 12,853,500 acres of highly erodible agricultural land with potential for conversion to cropland, according to Dean Owens, chairman of the County Committee of the Wayne County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"Farmers who bring into production a field which is predominantly highly erodible, or who convert wetland to production of an agricultural commodity will be ineligible for any farm program benefit or payment on their farm or farms," Owens said.

He said producers who have planted a crop on highly erodible acres which are not planted in one of the years 1981-1985 must certify that they are producing the agricultural commodity under an approved conservation system, except for alfalfa in a crop rotation. Producers who

plow up alfalfa, legumes or other grasses that are in a long term crop rotation have until June 1, 1988 to apply an acceptable conservation system.

Instead of planting crops on highly erodible land, farmers are encouraged to plant those acreages to grasses or trees, either on their own or in conjunction with the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). "We recommend the Conservation Reserve Program because it is specifically designed for highly erodible acreage." The ASCS official said land approved for this program will meet the conservation compliance provision of the Food Security Act of 1985.

Producers who think they may be farming highly erodible lands or who think they need a conservation plan for any reason, should immediately contact their local Soil Conservation Service.

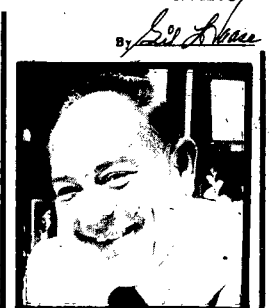

Now, though, the new hip joint has a fine, porous surface that allows bone to grow onto it, solidly bonding the joint before the cement wears out.

As the population of senior citizens increases, the specialty of geriatric dentistry is growing, too, says Dr. Sidney Epstein, a professor of dentistry at the University of California, San Francisco. 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Nonprescription medicines are available to help remove warts or minimize the pain associated with warts. Since these medicines have no antiviral activity, they do not kill the skin virus. Topical nonprescription medicines for wart removal often contain salicylic acid, with or without lactic acid, in a liquid, collodion base. Salicylic acid in concentrations of 10 to 40 percent softens hard skin. Collodion is used in wart medicines because it hardens into a rigid, clear film after application. Dead skin can be removed more easily when the film is peeled away.

Use nonprescription wart medicines carefully and see a physician if self-care is not effective. Diabetics should be especially cautious. Removal of warts in a physician's office (by freezing and other techniques) may be more effective in the long run.

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

— Minimize, reduce to smallest portion. "Never let weaknesses conquer you," Green said.

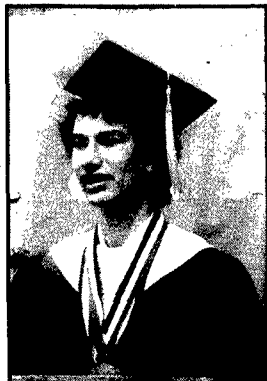
— Spiritualize. "Dream big, doubt little and depend much on God," he said.

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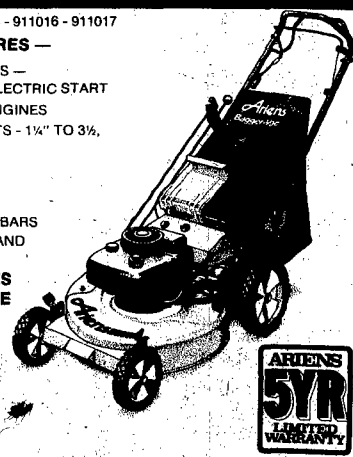
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# Business consulting services offered

Wayne small businesses have access to free consulting services offered by the Nebraska Business Development Center at Wayne State College.

"Wayne State can provide consulting services to businesses that have concerns about accounting, computers, finance, management and marketing," says Jerry Nelson, director of the NBDC.

"We believe that small businesses generally need help competing against big businesses and this is one way we can help.

"We are willing to meet personally with them to determine problems. Then we assign the case to a Wayne State faculty member who has expertise in the problem area. After reviewing the case, the faculty member makes recommendations for the business."

Nelson says his office has handled 180 cases during the past year — and many of them deal with computers.

"Through the use of computers, we believe small businesses can compete against larger businesses," he says. "They can do a better job with inventory control and many other aspects of their businesses."

The NBDC also tries to match Nebraska firms with other Nebraska firms to keep business in the state. And it helps businesses define new markets, including government procurement and exporting.

"We work with one-person businesses as well as firms that employ several hundred people," Nelson says. "We usually try to match businesses with Wayne State faculty who have expertise in the problem area."
