Hix alerts public of altering scheme

Steve Hix of Omaha, formerly of Wayne and presently a United States postal inspector, is working to stop people from losing large dollar amounts to false postal money order

His was in Wayne recently to alert the post office and the media about the postal money orders which are being altered for greater cash

Normally, customers can purchase from \$1 on up to \$700 in postal money orders from post offices, with a fee charged for providing the money order. They can utilize the money order as a way to guarantee payments to creditors, businesses or individuals.

Hix said that during April, three in dividuals in Nebraska (from Har-tington, Crofton and Fairbury) were victimized by altered postal money.

And it appears, he said, that most of the altering is being done in state prisons in Mississippi and Indiana. Hix said the scheme usually follows a similar pattern

THE PRISONER first finds so meone (the victim) willing to corres pond with him or her after placing o reading the advertisements in various publications.

various publications.
Afterwards, the prisoner somehow receives a postal money order, usually of low denomination, and afters the amount. Hix showed a reporter a \$1 postal money order that had been altered to read \$700.

The money order is then made payable to the victim (his pen pal) and the pen pal is asked to cash the amount at a local bank and return the noney to the prisoner

"THEY TELL them that they need the money for appealing their case, or that they promise to marry thum, or that it will be a 'get out of prison gift'," said Hix.

Once the money order has been cashed and the number of the money order reveals the actual amount, the bank "takes a loss." And the victim often is left to pay

for the loss. 'There have been instances where the bank has taken action against the pen pals [or victims] to recover the loss," said Hix.

Most common victims, he said, are older single females, he said. "The normal victim loses between \$6,000 to \$8,000. The three victims in Nebraska had lost an estimated \$20,000 of their life savings," Hix mentioned.

"They seem to be hitting more of the rural areas. They have dried up their contacts in the metro areas. There have been 10 people victimized in Nebraska and southwest Iowa over the past 112 years," he said.

"We thought the operations were shut down a couple of years ago. Now its starting to have a rebirth." he ad-

A majority of the scheming Parchman Mississippi State Prison

PROSECUTION of the prisoners in the prison has been difficult. Those that have the power to prosecute feel "that the state prison system must clean up its own house, to begin with," said Hix.

"And they feel that the postal service should come up with money orders that would be difficult to alter," he said.

There are several ways to diagnose altered money orders — on checking the pre-printed order number for darkness or lightness in comparison to other numbers that were produced through carbon paper. Another way is to check the date purchased and the zip ode on the money order, also im

Hix said people corresponding in situations as mentioned in this story should be leary of getting money orders. "Suspicious Individuals car fice where it was purchased or by me (his phone number in Omaha is 402/221-38871," he said.

Hix will be visiting post offices in the northeast Nebraska area during the next few days in hopes of warning individuals about losing from the altering postal money orders

Timpte announces intentions to sell

Timpte Inc. owners have announced their intention to seek bidders for its refrigerated trailer business in Wayne.
The owners have set a time frame of 90 days to try and consummate

James S. Remick, president of Timpte, Inc., called an afternooh press conference at the manufacturing facility on Thursday to make the an-nouncement. We want to emphasize that the Wayne refrigerated trailer operation

Is not closing," he told. The Wayne Herald.
"The officers of Timpte are committed to business as usual," he said.

ONE REASON for making the announcement, he said, was to ward off rumor, gossip or inaccurate information possibly going through the com

Remick said one of two things can happen; one, the business is sold and it will continue to operate in Wayne under its present structure, or the other is that it will not be sold and it will continue to operate in Wayne under the present structure. Timple will continue to operate its businesses located in Commerce Ci

ty, Colorado, the grain trailer business located in David City, Nebraska; and its sales and service branches including those in Council Bluffs. "The four independent owners who own the business have decided they would like to see if they could sell it." said Remick. "I look at very insignificant, if any, change of impact on the work force or the employees

Timple in Wayne. Remick also stressed, in an interview, that "this is not a hardship

It is not a sale under duress. It is not a sale of a company that is not making money," he said. "He said that the obvious best time to sell something is when it is ex-

THE FOUR OWNERS, he said, have made the decision to seek bidders

for the Timpte plant "strictly for personal reasons."

"We respect that decision." he said.

The time frame [90 days] established by the owners to try and consummate the sale was also discussed at the press conference.

"That's a fairly short time that we appreciate. Clearly, if there is an interested buyer they will surface within 90 days," Remick remarked.

The asking price for the Wayne Timpte operation has not been established. "Obviously, they are going to want to recover the price of the plant, machinery, equipment, the inventory and other assets. But there has been no price set," Remick said.

The four owners are James Lakin, Tom Gamel, Daye Bento and

The four owners are James Lakin, Tom Gamei, Dave Benbo and Doug Walliser, all of Denver, Colorado.

Other members present at the press conference were Jim Hofstetter, vice president of engineering. Ken Allred, chief financial officer of the corporation: Terry Hanson, human resource manager; and Ken Mendel, vice president of manufacturing.

Timpte. We are continuing to build trailers, we are continuing to sell trailers and we are continuing to buy materials." Remick stated.

REMICK SAID the company had recently announced a new labor package of wages and benefit changes for all employees.

"So Timple, as far as the refrigerated trailer manufacturing facility, is here in Wayne to stay." said Remick.

"The name may change, but the faces will probably be the same." he

The company will continue the testing of products, the testing of next ear's models and will continue to work towards value analysis and cost

resuction.

Timpte, Inc. is also continuing to upgrade the software system in the office in terms of inventory control, production control and meautactur-

ing schedules.

"All of these are signs of a very healthy company. You are sitting in a board room of a very healthy company." said Remick.

Prior to the press conference, the intentions to sail Timpte were announced to employees at the manufacturing facility and to community

One has to wonder where pe place their priorities these d April 8, 1988 was a "Red Letter" place their priorities triese days. April.§, 1988 was a "Red Letter" day in Nebraska for the proponents of legislation labeled 940, "an act relating to schools." This legislation was passed and approved by the Governor with very little fanfare from the media locally or state-wide. In all probability this legislation with the lives of more Nebraskans than any other piece of legislation which has been in the hopper in recent years.

LB940 amends seven sections of the present laws nelated to the provision for, and management of, the schools of our State. All has not been perfect in the past, however, people have been permitted to make their own decision regarding the education of their children. Don't look now, but those privileges just became obsolete.

solete.
LB940 definitely states that within a two-year span the "Real property and all elementary and secondary students shall be in the school systems providing education for Kindergarten through grade twelve." Class 1 (rural) K-8 and Class VI (rural high schools) must become part of K-12 districts.
"Forced reorganization" is here and we have already been informed by the State Department of Education to get our plans in motion to bring our

the State Department of Education to get our plans in motion to bring our County Reorganization Committee to 9 or 12 members, selected by the school boards of the county, but selected on a population base making K-12 people well in the majority in making decisions regarding such reorganization factors.

LB940 also stops the non-resident high school tuition program which has been quite a money maker for some of the Class III - K-12 schools. It is interesting to note the numbers of people who still talk about "Free" high school tuition for the students from the rural areas who are outside

high school fulfion for the students from the rural areas who are outside the Class III districts. In Wayne County our "Free" high school fulfion amounted to nearly \$800,000.00. This amount was raised by taxation of the Class 1 (rural) districts over and above the monies to operate their own schools.

own schools.

During the 1987-88 school year the amount paid for the fultion per student in Nebraska was \$9,086.69. Actual costs per student state-wide, as reported to the State Department was \$4,388.78. This leaves a difference of \$4,659.90 "in overpayment" billed to and paid by the Class 1. Districts the Class 1 Districts.

the Class I Districts.

Wayne County non-resident students attend high school in Wakefield, Pender, Wisner, Norfolk, Winside, Wayne, Pierce, Randolph and Laurel. These schools defermine their per pupil costs, add 25% and 6ill Wayne County for that amount.

There are many problems with the implementation of LB940. Do we possibly see a great need for additional class-room facilities as the 200 elementary students of our county have to move into the Class III schools? Do we see additional busses schools? Do we see additional busses to transport these students into the to transport these students into the Class III schools? From which state funds do we expect to provide the \$800,000.00 non-resident fuition which has been provided by the Class 1 districts??

There are petitions being circulated, which, if successful, would cause LB940 to be placed on the general election ballot to be approved or disapproved by the voters of Nebraska. Until this happens, we will be following the law as expressed in be following the law as expressed in



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

Veteran recalls visit to Arlington

Disabled American Veterans
My first trip to 'Arlington National Cemetery. My immediate impression was sorrow. Lines of stark white tombstones stretched across acres of rolling green hills. All too reminiscent of soldiers in formation. Viewing literally thousands of neatly arranged graves, I cried.

I cried for the brave young men and women who rested there. Soldiers who paid the ultimate price for my cherished freedom. And I cried as I remembered eight very special friends. Friends with whom I shared a unique closeness in Vietnam. Friends with whom I'dl never share again. I remembered and paid tribute to them, the men who didn't return with me from the jungles of Southeast Asia.

me from the jungles of Southeast Asia.

So many names etched in stone: They began to blur as I slowly rolled my wheelchair through the cemetery. But, as I moved, my sorrow began to ease. In its place, a kind of serenity and a deep feeling of pride settled

on me.

I'm proud of each and every one of the more than one million men and women who gave their lives in defense of this great country in our many wars. Proud not only of those who died during time of war, but especially proud of those who died in recent undeclared hostilities.

Over 300 have died since the end of the Vietnam War. They died in Belrut, Grenada, the Persian Guif, Central America. Nor do I forget the support the men and tempen who have died recently a victime of the

mumerous men and women who have died recently as victims of ter-rorist's bombs and bullets.

rorist's bombs and bullets.

My freedom — my wife's and my daughter's freedom — was bought with their blood. This is a debt I can never repay.

I am humbled by their sacrifices. I lost the use of my legs in Vietnam, but I came home. For 14 hours I lay bleeding on the jungle floor. For 14 hours I was sure I was going to die. But I was very fortunate and very blessed. God allowed me Jo live. On this Memorial Day. I ask all Americans to take a moment and reflect on those who did not come home. A moment to honor the true heroes of our country.





FmHA lists new rules

Proposed rules, which could assist hundreds of farmers who are behind on their Farmers Home Administration loans, were issued, according to FmHA Nebraska State Director, K. Kirk Jamison.

The new regulations will carry out protions of the Agricultural Credit

portions of the Agricultural Credit Act passed by Congress last December. "There will be a 30 day comment period and additional time

comment period and additional time for any appropriate changes before the regulations become effective,"

Jamison said.

One of the changes would allow femhal to reduce the delinquent debt of certain borrowers to help them stay in business. This rule could benefit many Nebraska FmHA borrowers, and benefit an estimated rowers, and benefit an estimated 16,000 nationwide

In recent actions, the agency also issued proposed regulations to:

their families to lease or buy back homesteads that have been lost through foreclosure or conveyance;

* Set up a program to help members of minority and socially disadvantaged groups to purchase farmland and develop an outreach program to carry it out;

* Establish a new administrative appeals unit distinct from the rest of agency to handle borrowe vances:

* Certify and participate in state mediation programs.




