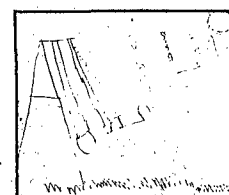
### Food pick up

The Wayne office, Nebraska Department of Social Services, will be distributing food commodities on the following dates and times: Carroll Fire Hall, June 2, 9:30 to 10:30 a.m.; Hoskins Fire Hall, 1 to 2 p.m.; Winside City Auditorium, June 2, 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.; Wayne Social Services Offices, June 3, starting at 9 a.m.

Given away will be two pounds butter, one jar honey and five pounds non-fat dry milk.

A Social Security card and proof of residence, such as a utility bill, are necessary for identification. Food items cannot be picked up for another household unless the social service office has a statement of income verification and written permission from the household. These statements can be picked up at the social service office prior to distribution.

Households must have income below the following limits to qualify: one, \$8,250 per year; \$688 per month; two, \$11,100, \$925; three, \$13,950, \$1,163; four, \$16,800, \$1,400; five, \$19,650, \$1,638; six, \$22,500, \$1,875; seven, \$25,350, \$2,113; eight, \$28,200, \$2,350.

## Hix alerts public of altering scheme

Steve Hix of Omaha, formerly of Wayne and presently a United States postal inspector, is working to stop people from losing large dollar amounts to false postal money order schemes.

His was in Wayne recently to alert the post office and the media about the postal money orders which are being altered for greater cash values.

Normally, customers can purchase from \$1 on up to \$700 in postal money orders from post offices, with a fee charged for providing the money order. They can utilize the money order as a way to guarantee payments to creditors, businesses or individuals.

Hix said that during April, three individuals in Nebraska (from Harrington, Crofton and Fairbury) were victimized by altered postal money orders.

And it appears, he said, that most of the altering is being done in state prisons in Mississippi and Indiana.

Hix said the scheme usually follows a similar pattern.

**THE PRISONER** first finds someone (the victim) willing to correspond with him or her after placing or reading the advertisements in various publications.

Afterwards, the prisoner somehow receives a postal money order, usually of low denomination, and alters the amount. Hix showed a reporter a \$1 postal money order that had been altered to read \$700.

The money order is then made payable to the victim (his pen pal) and the pen pal is asked to cash the amount at a local bank and return the money to the prisoner.

"**THEY TELL** them that they need the money for appealing their case, or that they promise to marry them, or that it will be a 'get out of prison gift,'" said Hix.

Once the money order has been cashed and the number of the money order reveals the actual amount, the bank "takes a loss."

And the victim often is left to pay for the loss.

"There have been instances where the bank has taken action against the pen pals (or victims) to recover the loss," said Hix.

Most common victims, he said, are older single females, he said. "The normal victim loses between \$6,000 to \$8,000. The three victims in Nebraska had lost an estimated \$20,000 of their life savings," Hix mentioned.

"They seem to be hitting more of the rural areas. They have dried up their contacts in the metro areas. There have been 10 people victimized in Nebraska and southwest Iowa over the past 1 1/2 years," he said.

"We thought the operations were shut down a couple of years ago. Now it's starting to have a rebirth," he added.

A majority of the scheming prisoner correspondence comes from Parchman Mississippi State Prison, he said.

**PROSECUTION** of the prisoners in the prison has been difficult. Those that have the power to prosecute feel "that the state prison system must clean up its own house, to begin with," said Hix.

"And they feel that the postal service should come up with money orders that would be difficult to alter," he said.

There are several ways to diagnose altered money orders — one is by checking the pre-printed money order number for darkness or lightness in comparison to other numbers that were produced through carbon paper. Another way is to check the date purchased and the zip code on the money order, also imprinted from carbon.

Hix said people corresponding in situations as mentioned in this story should be leery of getting money orders. "Suspicious individuals can easily verify their money order they received by inquiring at the post office where it was purchased or by me (his phone number in Omaha is 402/221-3887)," he said.

Hix will be visiting post offices in the northeast Nebraska area during the next few days in hopes of warning individuals about losing from the altering postal money orders scheme.

Assisting Korn with arrangements for the flower show are members of the Roving Gardeners Club of Wayne.

## City council considers request to burn

Wayne's city council met Tuesday evening and reviewed a request to repair or demolish the Wayne Livestock Auction old barn located at 111 Fairground Avenue.

The building is lacking foundation support in some areas, had sustained fire damage and also had a sagging roof.

Slan Baier of Wayne, part owner of

the old barn property, said he agreed that the facility needs to be demolished. "The fire happened around 25 years ago," he told the council.

Baier said he would like to take down the structure and remove it to the south on his property, then burn it on that site.

However, before that can be done, a burning permit from the fire chief

of the Wayne Fire Department had to be obtained. Baier appeared before the city council to see if there was any objection from the council members on the burning within the city limits.

"The fire chief also said I would have to get an agreement of all property owners nearby before he would allow a burning permit," said Baier.

**BAIER SAID HE** has contacted nine of 14 people near the proposed burning site who have said they have no objection to the open burning of the sale barn. He still must contact the remaining individuals.

The demolished building will be burned when the wind is out of the

## Timpte announces intentions to sell

Timpte, Inc. owners have announced their intention to seek bidders for its refrigerated trailer business in Wayne.

The owners have set a time frame of 90 days to try and consummate the sale.

James S. Remick, president of Timpte, Inc., called an afternoon press conference at the manufacturing facility on Thursday to make the announcement.

"We want to emphasize that the Wayne refrigerated trailer operation is not closing," he told The Wayne Herald.

"The officers of Timpte are committed to business as usual," he said. "We do not anticipate a great amount of interference regarding the attempted sale of this business."

**ONE REASON** for making the announcement, he said, was to ward off rumor, gossip or inaccurate information possibly going through the community.

Remick said one of two things can happen: one, the business is sold and it will continue to operate in Wayne under its present structure; or the other is that it will not be sold and it will continue to operate in Wayne under the present structure.

Timpte will continue to operate its businesses located in Commerce City, Colorado; the grain trailer business located in David City, Nebraska; and its sales and service branches including those in Council Bluffs, Iowa and Savage, Minnesota.

"The four independent owners who own the business have decided they would like to see if they could sell it," said Remick. "I look at very insignificant, if any, change of impact on the work force or the employees at Timpte in Wayne."

Remick also stressed, in an interview, that "this is not a hardship sale." "It is not a sale under duress. It is not a sale of a company that is not making money," he said.

He said that the obvious best time to sell something is when it is experiencing success.

"And we think we are a success," he said.

**THE FOUR OWNERS**, he said, have made the decision to seek bidders

for the Timpte plant "strictly for personal reasons."

"We respect that decision," he said.

The time frame [90 days] established by the owners to try and consummate the sale was also discussed at the press conference.

"That's a fairly short time that we appreciate. Clearly, if there is an interested buyer they will surface within 90 days," Remick remarked.

The asking price for the Wayne Timpte operation has not been established. "Obviously, they are going to want to recover the price of the plant, machinery, equipment, the inventory and other assets. But there has been no price set," Remick said.

The four owners are James Lakin, Tom Gamel, Dave Benbo and Doug Walliser, all of Denver, Colorado.

Other members present at the press conference were Jim Hofstetter, vice president of engineering; Ken Allred, chief financial officer of the corporation; Terry Hanson, human resource manager; and Ken Mendel, vice president of manufacturing.

"We would like to emphasize, once again, that it is business as usual at Timpte. We are continuing to build trailers, we are continuing to sell trailers and we are continuing to buy materials," Remick stated.

**REMIK SAID** the company had recently announced a new labor package of wages and benefit changes for all employees.

"So Timpte, as far as the refrigerated trailer manufacturing facility, is here in Wayne to stay," said Remick.

"The name may change, but the faces will probably be the same," he said.

The company will continue the testing of products, the testing of next year's models and will continue to work towards value analysis and cost reduction.

Timpte, Inc. is also continuing to upgrade the software system in the office in terms of inventory control, production control and manufacturing schedules.

"All of these are signs of a very healthy company. You are sitting in a board room of a very healthy company," said Remick.

Prior to the press conference, the intentions to sell Timpte were announced to employees at the manufacturing facility and to community leaders.

### Where are priorities?

One has to wonder where people place their priorities these days. April 8, 1988 was a "Red Letter" day in Nebraska for the proponents of legislation labeled 940, "an act relating to schools." This legislation was passed and approved by the Governor with very little fanfare from the media locally or state-wide. In all probability this legislation will affect the lives of more Nebraskans than any other piece of legislation which has been in the hopper in recent years.

LB940 amends seven sections of the present laws related to the provision for, and management of, the schools of our State. All has not been perfect in the past, however, people have been permitted to make their own decision regarding the education of their children. Don't look now, but those privileges just became obsolete.

LB940 definitely states that within a two-year span the "Real property and all elementary and secondary students shall be in the school systems providing education for Kindergarten through grade twelve." Class 1 (rural) K-8 and Class VI (rural high schools) must become part of K-12 districts.

"Forced reorganization" is here and we have already been informed by the State Department of Education to get our plans in motion to bring our County Reorganization Committee to 9 or 12 members, selected by the school boards of the county, but selected on a population base making K-12 people well in the majority in making decisions regarding such reorganization factors.

LB940 also stops the non-resident high school tuition program which has been quite a money maker for some of the Class III K-12 schools. It is interesting to note the numbers of people who still talk about "Free" high school tuition for the students from the rural areas who are outside the Class III districts. In Wayne County our "Free" high school tuition amounted to nearly \$800,000.00. This amount was raised by taxation of the Class 1 (rural) districts over and above the monies to operate their own schools.

During the 1987-88 school year the amount paid for the tuition per student in Nebraska was \$9,048.69. Actual costs per student state-wide, as reported to the State Department was \$4,388.78. This leaves a difference of \$4,659.90 "in overpayment" billed to and paid by the Class 1 Districts.

Wayne County non-resident students attend high school in Wakefield, Pender, Wisner, Norfolk, Winside, Wayne, Pierce, Randolph and Laurel. These schools determine their per pupil costs, add 25% and bill Wayne County for that amount.

There are many problems with the implementation of LB940. Do we possibly see a great need for additional class-room facilities as the 200 elementary students of our county have to move into the Class III schools? Do we see additional busses to transport these students into the Class III schools? From which state funds do we expect to provide the \$800,000.00 non-resident tuition which has been provided by the Class 1 districts??

There are petitions being circulated, which, if successful, would cause LB940 to be placed on the general election ballot to be approved or disapproved by the voters of Nebraska. Until this happens, we will be following the law as expressed in LB940.

north, he said. Councilman Darrel Heier was the lone council member who objected to the burning. He said the city had received complaints about the smoke from previous buildings being burned in the city limits. "I just don't think there is a need to burn in town," Heier said. The city council, by a 7-1 margin, voted to voice no objections to the burning. Heier voted against the motion.

However, it is Fire Chief Dale Preston's jurisdiction to issue the burning permit when he feels it is appropriate.

Baier said there are no plans for

the site where the old barn will be demolished.

**IN OTHER** action, the city council approved special designated liquor permits to the Windmill Restaurant (for a June 25 wedding at the National Guard Armory) and to Kenneth Jorgensen for a Friday, July 8 "Chicken Week" festive dance at the Armory.

They approved the plans and specifications, and set the bid letting date, for paving of Tomar Drive and 7th Avenue by the McCright's Subdivision on the east edge of Wayne.

The council also passed an ordinance to prohibit the use of lead pipes, solder and flux.

## WSC offers summer classes for those working with language learning disability students

Area teachers interested in improving their ability to work with language learning disabled students may take two classes this summer offered by Wayne State College.

A preparatory meeting is scheduled Saturday, June 4 and classes meet daily June 20 to July 1. Students may earn six hours of graduate credit for completing both courses which are designed to provide teachers with necessary skills to help learning disabled students in any classroom situation.

The first class, Advanced Language Structures, focuses on approaches that bring together instruction and principles from speech pathology, neurology and biophysics. The second course, Curriculum Adaption, offers teachers the opportunity to review textbooks they currently use. Then they will incorporate the instructional technologies they learned in the first course into their current curriculum.

Joan C. Stoner, director of teaching learning center at Union College, Lincoln, Neb., and C. Wilson Anderson, English teacher, from Minneapolis, Minn., will teach the classes.

Stoner has taught in elementary, middle and high schools and is the former secretary and president of the Nebraska Branch of the Orton Dyslexia Society. She currently serves as branch council chairman of the national Orton Dyslexia Society.

Anderson is president-elect of the national Orton Dyslexia Society and past treasurer and president of the Upper Midwest Branch of the Orton Dyslexia Society.

Bill Corbit of Wayne suffered severe second degree burns in an accident that took place at the Milton G. Waldbaum Co. of Wakefield last Tuesday morning.

Corbit, employed as a maintenance worker at the egg processing plant, was investigating a new design of a hard-boiled egg steam cooker at the Wakefield plant when it shot scalding hot water on him, according to Waldbaum company officials.

to St. Luke's Burn Unit in Sioux City. He will be at the hospital in Sioux City for at least four weeks, according to his family members and he will undergo some skin grafting.

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# Veteran recalls visit to Arlington

My first trip to Arlington National Cemetery. My immediate impression was sorrow. Lines of stark white tombstones stretched across acres of rolling green hills. All too reminiscent of soldiers in formation. Viewing literally thousands of neatly arranged graves, I cried.

I cried for the brave young men and women who rested there. Soldiers who paid the ultimate price for my cherished freedom. And I cried as I remembered eight very special friends. Friends with whom I shared a unique closeness in Vietnam. Friends with whom I'll never share again. I remembered and paid tribute to them, the men who didn't return with me from the jungles of Southeast Asia.

So many names etched in stone. They began to blur as I slowly rolled my wheelchair through the cemetery. But, as I moved, my sorrow began to ease. In its place, a kind of serenity and a deep feeling of pride settled on me.

I'm proud of each and every one of the more than one million men and women who gave their lives in defense of this great country in our many wars. Proud not only of those who died during time of war, but especially proud of those who died in recent undeclared hostilities.

Over 300 have died since the end of the Vietnam War. They died in Beirut, Grenada, the Persian Gulf, Central America. Nor do I forget the numerous men and women who have died recently as victims of terrorists' bombs and bullets.

My freedom — my wife's and my daughter's freedom — was bought with their blood. This is a debt I can never repay.

I am humbled by their sacrifices. I lost the use of my legs in Vietnam, but I came home. For 14 hours I lay bleeding on the jungle floor. For 14 hours I was sure I was going to die. But I was very fortunate and very blessed. God allowed me to live. On this Memorial Day, I ask all Americans to take a moment and reflect on those who did not come home. A moment to honor the true heroes of our country.

### Golfers capture fourth place

Touring the state of Nebraska is not what Terry Munson's Wayne-Carroll golf team had in mind, but that's what it amounted to in the annual State Golf Tournament.

Wayne golfers Jed Reeg, Rob Reeg, Elliot Salmon, Eric Runestad and Kevin Hausmann along with Munson traveled to Alliance just one week after being crowned district champions for the fourth straight year.

Wayne had gotten just seven holes of golf in before the rains came and the tournament was postponed to the following week in Holdrege Ne. At any rate, the golfers traveled back across the state to reach Wayne and played the waiting game until last Wednesday.

Finally the tournament was allowed to be played in full, but in the end Wayne had to settle for the familiar spot of number four. It was the second consecutive year they had finished in the number four position.

Fairbury took honors for the team championship carding a four man total of 320. Lincoln Plus X finished second with a 321 while Blair finished third with a 325. Wayne incidently, finished with a 329. Columbus Scotus rounded out the top five of the 15 teams who qualified with a 332.

Altogether the Wayne golfers traveled some 1250 miles to finish this year's state golf tournament.

"We were very close to the lead after seven holes of play at Alliance," Munson said. "At

Holdrege we just didn't play well on the first nine holes."

Wayne finished the first half of the 18-hole tournament with a 170, far below their average on the season. "We got on track on the back nine," Munson said. "We combined for a 159. If you put two of those 159's together, we win the meet with a 318."

Disappointment was present among all of the Wayne golfers because they knew they hadn't played up to their capability in the state tournament. "It was an unusual tournament for us in the fact that we didn't have one golfer under 80," Munson said. "I guess the positive thing about the meet was that three

teams from our district finished third, fourth and fifth respectively with Blair, Wayne and Columbus Scotus."

It was however, a successful season for Munson and his Blue Devil golfers. The varsity finished with a 5-1 dual record and won six Invationals and finished second in the seventh Invite.

The Blue Devils were conference champs and district champs. Munson also has the opportunity to smile about his team's chances next year, as all of the varsity golfers return for their senior season, and who knows, maybe the third consecutive state trip will be the most memorable.

Wayne State softball players Lisa Jacobsen and Ronda Peck were recently named as Academic All-Americans by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

Jacobsen, a business administration major with an emphasis in international finance, is a junior on the Wayne State softball team. She holds a 3.81 grade point average. She hit .333 this season for the Lady Wildcats as the team's regular right fielder and earned first team District 11 honors for the first time.

Jacobsen is president of the Delta Sigma Pi, is a member of W-Club and Alpha Lambda Delta, and is a Wayne State Ambassador. This fall she will travel to Denmark to participate in the Danish International Study Program. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Duaine Jacobsen of Wayne.

Peck, a language arts education major, is a junior pitcher on the Wayne State softball team. She holds a 3.95 grade point average. Peck finished the season with an 8-5 record and a team low .615 earned run average.

## FmHA lists new rules

Proposed rules, which could assist hundreds of farmers who are behind on their Farmers Home Administration loans, were issued, according to FmHA Nebraska State Director, K. Kirk Jamison.

The new regulations will carry out portions of the Agricultural Credit Act passed by Congress last December. "There will be a 30 day comment period and additional time for any appropriate changes before the regulations become effective," Jamison said.

One of the changes would allow FmHA to reduce the delinquent debt of certain borrowers to help them stay in business. This rule could benefit many Nebraska FmHA borrowers, and benefit an estimated 16,000 nationwide.

In recent actions, the agency also issued proposed regulations to:

- \* Make it easier for farmers or their families to lease or buy back homesteads that have been lost through foreclosure or conveyance;

- \* Set up a program to help members of minority and socially disadvantaged groups to purchase farmland and develop an outreach program to carry it out;

- \* Establish a new administrative appeals unit distinct from the rest of the agency to handle borrower grievances;

- \* Certify and participate in state mediation programs.

Anyone interested in submitting comments on the proposed regulations, which appeared in today's Federal Register, should address them to Chef Dailey, Department of Agriculture, Farmers Building, Washington, D.C. 20250.

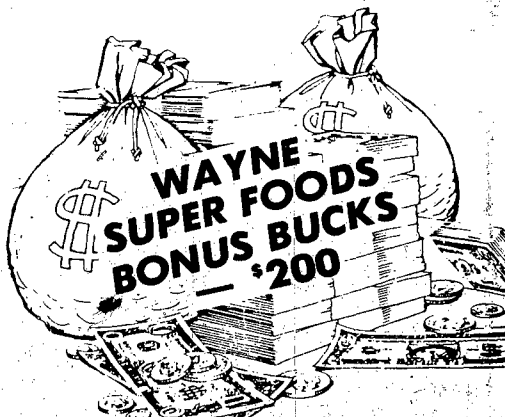
