The Siouland Blood Bank will be accepting donations at Providence Medical Center in Wayne on Thursday, June 9 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

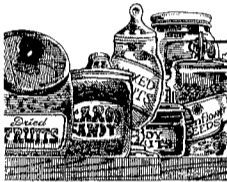
Benefit

Jeff Wilkerson, Steve's younger brother, was also present for the presentation.

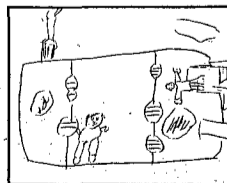
The \$500 gift was given by an anonymous donor.

After 17 years absence

Abdallah returns to Wayne

"I think now in the United States, I feel just like any other American boy. I enjoy what they are interested in and feel sad with them in their sadness. The life here is beautiful, the people are very nice, so I think it's really enjoyable to live with them. I will carry half of the United States with me when I go back to Jordan."

The above was written by Abdallah K. Khawaldeh 17 years ago, when he was a foreign exchange student at Wayne-Carroll High School. He was staying with the Herb and Joyce Niemann family six miles west and 1 1/4 miles north of Wayne.

Those inspired feelings still are very much a part of Abdallah, who returned to the United States on April 25 to spend some time with his "mother and father," American hosts and to tour places such as Disneyland and the Colorado Rockies.

But this time, Abdallah didn't arrive in the U.S. alone. The 34-year-old Amman, Jordan resident brought with him his bride of nearly seven years (Aisheh), and his two sons Raad (age five) and Faris (age four).

And they won't leave with the same number that arrived here back in April, because last Thursday, June 2, Aisheh gave birth to Riwa — the first girl in the family — at Providence Medical Center in Wayne.

Abdallah picked this time of year to visit the states, close to his wife's delivery date, because of the time restraints with his job.

AFTER COMPLETING his education in Jordan, Abdallah became employed with Jordan Airlines and worked in the area of marketing and promotion. He was employed there until 1975. He worked with marketing and promotion for an airlines in Saudi Arabia before joining the Germany-based Philipp Holzmann AG construction company, one of the largest construction firms in the world.

He handles the affairs of contract negotiations and contract signatures for work on primarily government projects. "Since I've joined the company, we've had over \$8 billion of work on projects in Saudi Arabia," Abdallah said.

Now he works for the company on a half-time basis, allowing him time to visit the United States. And those days off happened to fall on Aisheh's due date.

"I always wanted to come back to the states. But I never had the time. It just worked out that the time we took to visit America was when the baby was born here as well," he said.

Abdallah said he is happy that little Riwa was born at Providence Medical Center. He said the child has American citizenship. "I hope she will be able to use it. America is a great country. It is open for everybody," Abdallah said.

"When I was here as an exchange student, I enjoyed the people. They were always nice and kind and helpful to me. The people were pleasant to be with, just like the Niemann family," he said.

"After 17 years, things haven't changed," Abdallah said.

ON THE NIEMANN farm, things may be more busy and things might be done differently than 17 years ago. "But they still share your happiness and make you feel almost like your at home," Abdallah remarked.

Abdallah found most of his Wayne-Carroll classmates are no longer in Wayne. But Abdallah did manage to meet with some of the instructors and administrators who were working in the school system while he was attending classes in Wayne — such as Bob Porter, Mrs. Walt Moller and Superintendent Francis Haun.

It isn't very often that a foreign exchange student returns to the American school where most of them obtain their first impression of the United States.

"As I recall, Abdallah was a very serious young man with a lot of friends. He participated in events involving the arts and drama department," said Haun.

"He had a really good year in Wayne. He was a very personable man back then, as he is now. He was extremely proficient with human relation skills," Haun added.

Abdallah, in addition to spending time with his host family in Wayne these past weeks, visited the Niemann sons Scott and Monte who both reside in Longmont, Colorado.

Herb and Joyce visited Abdallah's homeland for 12 days in 1983. Through their stay in Jordan, they toured the Holy Land and visited other communities in the foreign land.

THE NIEMANNs got a taste of Jordan's traditional food while visiting the country. Their taste for Jordanian dishes were renewed as Aisheh did some of her home cooking in the Niemann kitchen.

Since the birth of Riwa, the Khawaldeh family has been presented many gifts and words of congratulations. "I would like to express our great thanks and appreciation," mentioned Abdallah.

"And it's a pleasure to be with my "mom and dad" again (Niemanns). They are very kind and polite and make us just feel at home," he said.

Abdallah and his family left on Tuesday for the 14 hour flight trip back to Jordan, carrying with them some fond memories of the United States.

Coming to America 17 years ago and learning the various languages, Abdallah said, helped him in attaining his goals.

"It was a plus for me, for my life and career," he said.

Vote on pork check-off coming

Beef check-off approved

Results from the beef check-off election, which took place the day of the Nebraska primary on May 10, were recently announced by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service performed the ballot counting.

In Wayne County, there were 112 who voted in the beef check-off election. There were 75 yes votes to continue the check-off program, while 33 votes registered against the program. Four votes were disqualified.

There were 47 total votes tabulated in Dixon County. Thirty-four approved continuing the program while 11 voted against it. Two votes were disqualified.

The check-off program gained approval across the state. Referendum results for Nebraska showed that of the 14,146 total votes — 8,629 yes votes and 5,517 no votes.

OF THE 256,505 valid ballots cast nationwide, 202,408 or 78.91 percent favored the program and 54,097, or 21.09 percent, opposed continuing it.

With approval of the referendum, the Cattlemen's Beef Board will continue to collect assessments of \$1 per head on all cattle sold in the United States and an equivalent amount on all imported cattle, beef and beef products.

Next up for livestock producers is the pork check-off promotion. A referendum among all pork producers is scheduled for Sept. 7 and 8.

America's pork producers invest approximately 31 cents per head, or \$22 million per year, toward the 100 percent check-off program. The self-investment program supports the national promotional campaign, Pork the Other White Meat, which has been a driving force used to increase pork demand.

Concerning reorganization bill

Petition circulating

A petition is being circulated in Wayne County which will call for an election to add five proposed amendments to the Nebraska constitution.

Glenn L. Wiseman, superintendent of schools in Wayne County, said the petitions being circulated will — if the 60,000 necessary signatures are obtained — eventually lead to placing LB940 on the general election ballot in November.

LB940, as passed, amends sections of the present laws related to the provision for, and management of, the schools in Nebraska, according to Wiseman.

Wiseman expressed concern about a statement in LB940 which says that "all real property and all elementary and secondary students should be within school systems which offer education in grades kindergarten through 12."

In addition, the LB940 law states that: For purposes of meeting this goal, Class I and Class VI school district combinations shall be considered as including all real property and all elementary and secondary students within a school district which offers education to kindergarten through grade 12.

The law also states that school districts offering education K-12 should be encouraged when possible to consider cooperative programs in order to enhance educational opportunities to students. County reorganization committees should make a renewed effort to consider

and plan for reorganization of schools at the local level.

THE FIVE constitutional amendments to the constitution, which those who sign the petition are requesting, include the following:

— Require that Nebraska's individual income tax be based upon the taxpayer's federal income tax liability (as it was prior to 1987).

— Provide for continued operation of schools unless the people reside in a school district "vote" that such school district shall be "dissolved, merged, consolidated, reorganized, or otherwise combined with another school district."

— Provide for the "formation of, and prevent" the Legislature from restricting or "prohibiting the formation" of new school districts organized to maintain instruction for grades 7-12 or 9-12 and provide for an election.

— Provide a high school education at a charge for each non-resident pupil attending a public high school based on the "operational budget of such high school plus a percentage of the cost per pupil as a fee for the use of facilities, buildings and contents."

— And require that all funds distributed to school districts of general state revenues (and other sources) be distributed "based upon the number of children residing in each school district."

"We're shooting for (by June 27) 1,000 signatures on the petition in Wayne County," said Wiseman.

Weather readings published

This Thursday's edition will kick off a feature discontinued several years ago, but again revived because of increasing interest.

Pat Gross of Wayne, who in past years has been taking precipitation readings and reporting them to the weather offices around the area, recently installed electronic equipment at his home which will now record the highs and lows of temperatures in the Wayne vicinity.

Gross began taking precipitation readings in 1965. The precipitation and temperature records are turned over to the weather service office in Omaha. If it rains more than 1/2 inch, then he also calls the Norfolk Weather Service office so that proper observation can be made on area creeks. He is also in contact with the Norfolk Weather Service when severe weather infiltrates the area.

"We've had a lot of people asking about the temperatures in the Wayne area and who kept the information," said Gross. "So I volunteered to do it. I enjoy doing it."

Gross has agreed to supply The Wayne Herald with temperature readings and precipitation amounts. The published list will extend from Wednesday readings to Tuesday readings of the following week. This Thursday's edition features

It will appear, along with the weather forecast, in the "At A Glance" column on the front page of each Thursday edition. The weather forecast will appear also in Monday's edition.

temperature and precipitation readings for May, Gross provided the following figures:

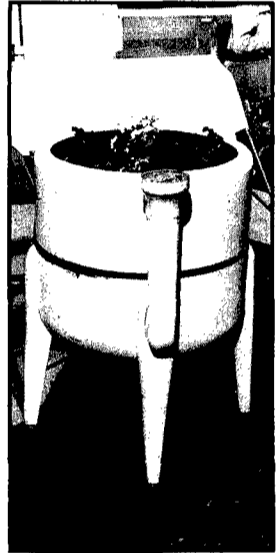
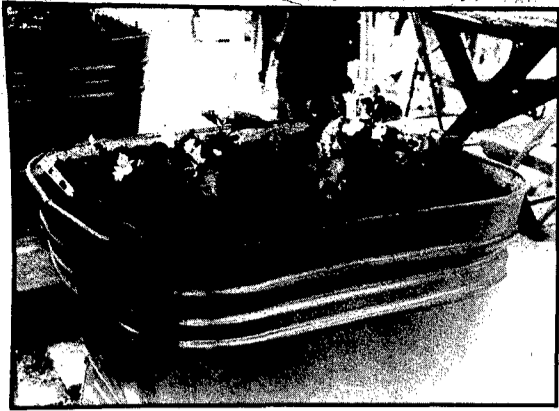

Lutheran Brotherhood project blossoms at care centre

Not a wash tub or wooden box stands empty at Wayne Care Centre following a Lutheran Brotherhood project which took place last Saturday morning.

About 20 members of Wayne County Lutheran Brotherhood Branch 8212, along with members Wayne's Roving Gardeners Club and Pleasant Valley 4-H Club, gathered in force at the care centre to begin a project of filling wash tubs, buckets and wooden boxes with plants and flowers.

While many residents of the centre watched on, others assisted the organizations in sowing oats and planting soybeans, potatoes, corn, cauliflower, broccoli, radishes, onions, lettuce and sunflowers.

Residents also will enjoy a herb garden, four hanging baskets and a large assortment of flowers which were planted in the centre's central park and south garden areas.

SATURDAY'S PROJECT was the brainchild of Lutheran Brotherhood member Roy Sommerfeld who had read in a garden magazine about a similar project which took place in Fairfield, Iowa.

Sommerfeld's idea was made a part of the local Lutheran Brotherhood's National Friends in Deed project to assist senior citizens.

"It gives them (care centre residents) something to do besides sit in their chairs," says Roy. "Now they can go out and pull weeds or water the plants."

In addition to organizing the planting project, Lutheran Brotherhood members also donated one picnic table, five small benches and two park benches for use in the care centre's central park area.

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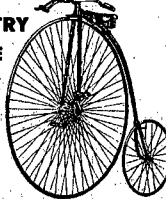

Field Day scheduled

The Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce AgriBusiness Council, in cooperation with the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension Service and Soil Conservation Service, will hold a Conservation Tillage Field Day from 1 p.m. - 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 9. A rain date has been set for June 16. There is no charge for the entire event. There will be actual field demonstrations which include: rain simulators which will demonstrate soil runoff with the effect of slope and residue; estimating residue cover will demonstrate percentage cover with different residues; conservation plans with a description of plan and the elements of the plan; planter demonstrations which will be conservation tillage demonstrations, planting in heavy residues and the different types of planters; sprayer calibration will have the accuracy of sprayer delivery, nozzle types and will demonstrate techniques for accurate spraying; demonstration of tillage practices to improve water storage will include subsoiler, implanted reservoir and basin tiller; fertility needs utilizing deep soil sampling which will demonstrate deep soil probe, soil test prior to planting, interpretation of deep soil test and protecting the water table; preplant herbicide treatment which will show the differences and also will show early preplant treatments, split application with 2/3 preplant and 1/3 at planting, will compare different treatments and demonstrate treatment with "Burn Down." Red Carr Implement, Logan Valley Implement and Midland Equipment will be on hand with different pieces of equipment to demonstrate. The demonstrations will take place on the farmland Northeast of Wayne. Directions are as follows: from the intersection of Highway 15 & 35 - 4 miles east on Highway 35, one mile north and 1/4 mile west. Right-of-way hay available

Once again the Nebraska Department of Roads is allowing the mowing and removal of hay on designated highway right-of-way, according to State Roads Director G.C. Strobel. Those wishing the extra hay should contact their area Department of Roads District Office for a permit. The area district office is located in Norfolk. "There are many acres of fine native grass available to those who can use it," Strobel said, "although harvesters must first purchase a permit at our district offices before mowing it." He cautioned that only certain sections of right-of-way would be mowed, with a limit of five miles per permit on one side of the highway. The permit to mow will be good for one cutting only. Mowing cannot begin before July 15 and will not be allowed after Sept. 10. The hay must be cut, baled and removed from the right-of-way no later than 20 days after it is cut. Both two-lane and four-lane highways, including I-80, are eligible for mowing. The hay mowing program is on a first-come, first-served basis, so landowners, ranchers and farmers interested in cutting some extra hay should not wait too long before requesting a permit.

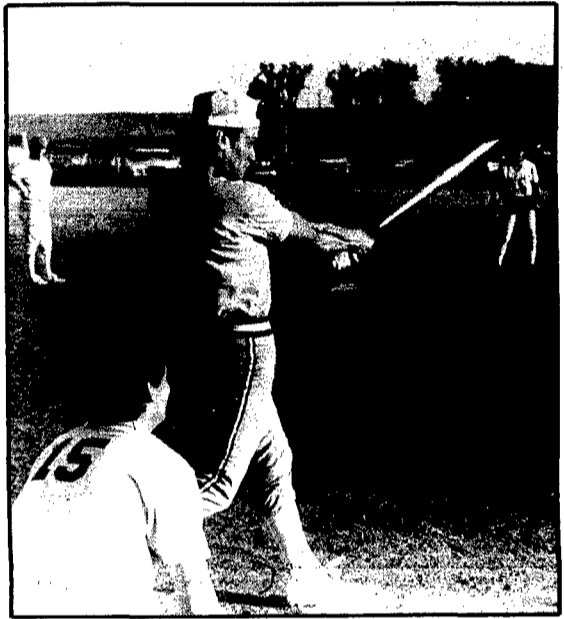

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
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Motion Sickness Medicines

Motion sickness occurs as the result of both "visual" and "balance" causes. Interestingly, motion sickness in children is related to age. Children age 2 to 12 years old are often affected, while infants may not be affected at all.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently indicated that four medicines, all classified as antihistamines, are safe and effective in treating the nausea, vomiting and dizziness associated with motion sickness. These four ingredients, cyclizine, hydrochloride, diphenhydramine, hydrochloride, dimenhydrinate hydrochloride, and meclizine hydrochloride, are commonly found in non-prescription motion sickness medicines. Because all four are antihistamines, products containing them usually carry warnings that they may cause drowsiness, that alcohol should be avoided, and that caution should be used when driving or operating machines while using motion sickness medicines.

Dimenhydrinate should not be given to children under two years of age. Diphenhydramine should not be used in children under age six. Read all product labels carefully before using.

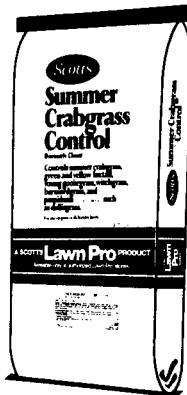

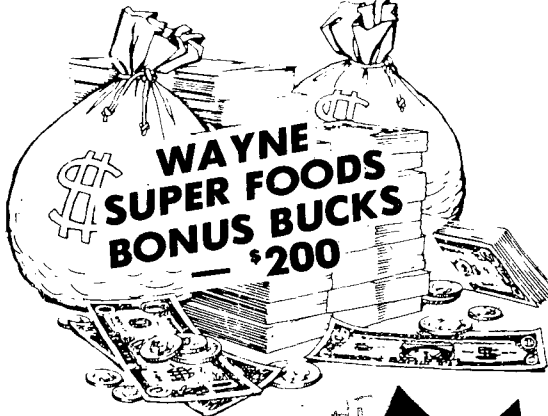

Wakefield Pool on July 9. Swimmers will be lapping the pool for the benefit of the American Heart Association.

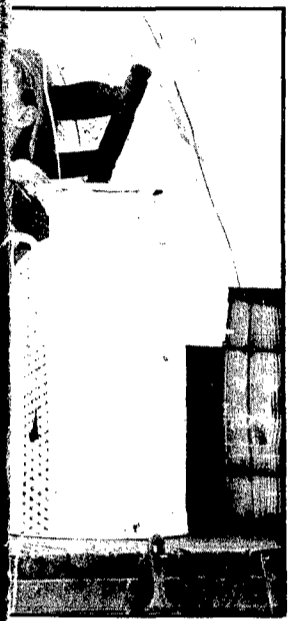

A household may be eligible if (1) the household's income and resources are within the program guidelines; (2) they are responsible for paying their cooling bills; and (3) a member of the household is 70 years of age or older or has a medical condition or illness that requires a cooling facility.

McMurry noted that automatic payments will be made to households where the head of household is 70 years of age or older and received heating assistance during this past winter. These payments should have been received by June 10.

For households who do not receive the automatic payment, apply by contacting the local Department of Social Services office. Applications must be made by Aug. 31.

Road hearing scheduled in Wayne

Nebraska Department of Roads personnel will conduct two hearings next week for northeast Nebraska on proposed standards for the state highway system.

The first will be at Wayne on Tuesday, June 22 at the Wayne City Auditorium, beginning at 7 p.m.

For the past several weeks, the Department has had a special task force of engineers reviewing current standards as part of a total reassessment of state highway needs ordered by the 1988 Legislature.

Director-State Engineer G.C. Strobel has stated that the task force has developed proposed standards

which "in our best judgment, will bring marked improvement to the state highway system."

For example, the Department is proposing that all state highways have driving lanes not less than 12 feet in width which national tests show is the safest for today's traffic.

Presently, there are 862 miles on the state highway system which have less than 12-foot wide driving lanes. Under current standards, when those highways need resurfacing, the new surface would be overlaid on existing widths. Under proposed changes, the surface would be widened to 12-foot

driving lanes when new pavement is required.

ANOTHER example is that current standards allow a two-foot shoulder on low volume roads. It is proposed that such roads have four-foot earth shoulders.

Also included in the Legislature's directive is to take a new look at the expressway system.

A discussion on these matters and proposals for increased bridge widths and sight distance considerations will be included at each of the 16 hearings the Department is holding throughout the state.

Prehistoric era to be topic at library

Yes there were prehistoric animals in Nebraska.

Dr. Michael Voorhies of the state museum and curator of Vertebrate Paleontology, will present a program at the Wayne Public Library entitled: The Pompeii of Prehistoric Animals in Nebraska.

The program is Monday, June 13, beginning at 7 p.m.

Ten million years ago, an immense cloud of volcanic ash settled in northeast Nebraska. This ashfall blanketed hundreds of square miles, destroying herds of rhinoceroses,

three-toed horses, camels and tiny saber-toothed deer.

Dr. Voorhies discovered evidence of this ancient burial ground while excavating a site in Antelope County. He will talk about this discovery and the soon-to-be Ashfall State Park.

Textile deterioration in the home

Textile in the home may fade and deteriorate. This may be brought on by exposure to bright sunlight and the heat that comes from that sunlight.

Fading is simple color change in the fabric. Deterioration is the breaking of yarns that have been destroyed by the sun. A fabric may look just fine, but yarns may break as soon as the fabric is touched or cleaned.

Ultraviolet light is a major problem in fading textiles, contributing about 40 percent of the damage. Other factors contribute to fading. The heat that accompanies sunlight along with the humidity and chemicals in the air hasten damage. The type of fiber affects amount and type of damage.

COLOR CHOICE CAN be important when selecting fabrics for sunlit spaces. Light colors reflect heat to the mass, and the less chance for the fibers and dyes to be damaged by heat. Light to medium colors do not show sun fading as quickly as bright vivid ones.

Consider a fabric's ability to resist color fading when purchasing textiles to be used in areas with sunlight. On some drapery fabrics, a one or two year guarantee against color fading is available. Some dyes are more resistant to sun fading than others.

In addition to fiber and dye, the construction of the fabric is important. Tight weaves will hold their own shape better than loose weaves, which allow more stretching and weakening of the fibers. If the yarns or weaves have a thick and thin pattern, the fabric can have weak points where fabric is thinner, and these areas will deteriorate before other areas.

INTENSE SUNLIGHT can cause fibers to deteriorate as well as fade. Cotton, silk, acetate, rayon and nylon, all used in home furnishings, are faded, weakened or damaged by exposure to sunlight. The acrylic and polyester fibers are more resistant to sun damage; fiberglass is very resistant.

High humidity can shorten a fabric's life. Fibers vary in their ability to absorb moisture. Cottons, linens and rayons absorb moisture readily; synthetics absorb more slowly. Materials that are highly absorbent tend to stretch as they soak up moisture, losing strength and resiliency.

Fabric window treatments have to withstand large temperature swings, condensation and light without losing their shape, while providing insulation at the window.

Acrylic, modacrylic, glass fiber and polyester are good fade, heat and moisture-resistant choices. Some drapery fabrics have special metallic (usually aluminum) coatings or acrylic backing to protect the fabric and provide some reflection of heat.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Wayne County Weed Control Authority has dedicated itself not only to noxious weed control, but also to the prevention of dissemination of noxious weed seed. The Director of Agriculture has determined that noxious weeds seed may be disseminated through the movement of machinery and equipment, grain and seed, hay, straw, nursery stock, fencing materials, sod, manure, and soil as well as articles of similar nature. Methods of treatment have also been prescribed by the Director and may be obtained from the Wayne County Weed Control Authority.

With the harvest season approaching very rapidly, please keep in mind the provisions of the law requiring owners of harvest equipment to clean prior to movement to another field. This machinery and equipment being used in the harvest of crops should be treated or cleaned as follows:

1. Removal of all material from the tops and sides of all parts of the machine by sweeping and the use of forced air and water.
2. Opening the lower end of all elevator returns, and measuring devices and removal of all noxious weed seeds and seedlings from shakers, sieves, and other places of lodgment.
3. Run the machine empty for a minimum of five minutes, alternately increasing and decreasing the speed.
4. Follow the manufacturer's detailed instructions for cleaning the machine.

These treatments should be performed while the article or the machine itself is still on the land in which it became infested if at all possible. This will not only prevent spreading noxious weed seed from one field to another, but also from one land owner to another.

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

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PUBLIC NOTIFICATION FOR LEAD IN DRINKING WATER

To the customers of the City of Wayne's Public Water System:
The Safe Drinking Water Act passed by Congress in 1986 requires all water systems to issue a public notice regarding the possible lead contamination of drinking water. The water provided by the City's Water Treatment System is below the current standards for lead contamination and is safe to drink. The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly. Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health affects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard. EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women. Levels in your drinking water are likely to be the highest:

- *If your home or water system has lead pipes, or
- *If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
- *If the home is less than five years old, or
- *If you have soft or acidized water, or
- *If water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Lead piping and lead solder are two of the most common sources of lead in domestic drinking water. Though the severity of the problem may depend on the age of your house, the only way to be sure about your water's lead content is to have the water tested. The Wayne Municipal Water Department has information about water testing and can tell you how to reduce the risk from lead contamination. For example, using water from the cold water tap and flushing your household system for a few minutes before each use can help lower exposure to lead. Flushing may take even less time if there has been recent heavy water use, such as bathing or doing laundry. Other helpful steps include refraining from use of hot water for cooking or drinking, replacing lead pipes and service connections, using certain types of water treatment and using bottled water. For additional information regarding lead contamination of drinking water, contact the Water Department at 375-5250.

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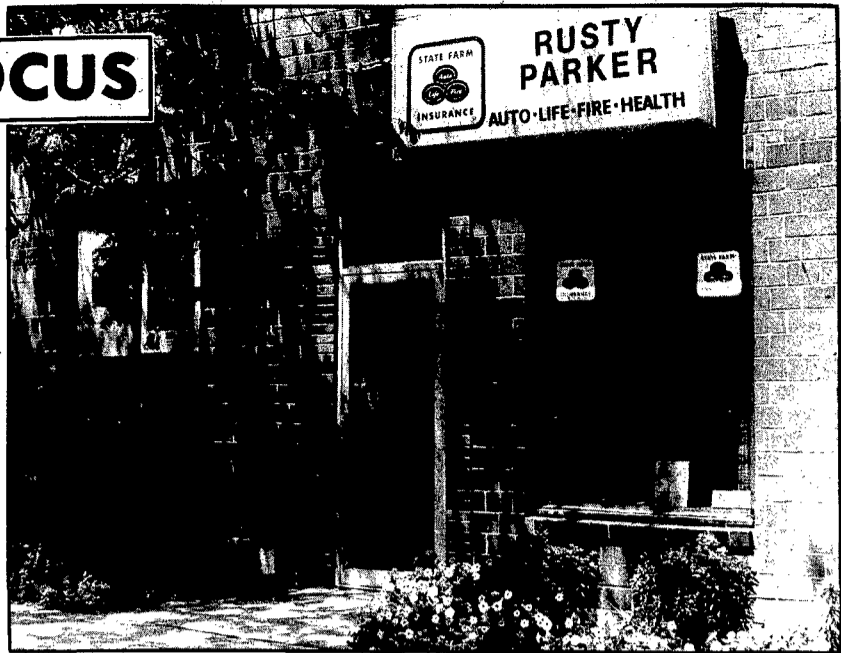
