Paper work

Bond financing

During Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council, a review took place of the Phase II financing of the upcoming Wayne water project, presented by Philip A. Lorenzen of Kirkpatrick, Pettis, Smith, Polian, Inc. of Omaha.

After the presentation, the city council approved the issuance of a 1988 Series Bond at \$1,100,000, which extends to 2008. The designated paying agent and registrar will be FirstTier Bank of Lincoln.

Also during Tuesday's meeting, it was mentioned that city residents can obtain separate water meters for use in watering lawns (so that sewage is not tacked on to the heavy use).

The person requesting the separate meter (which the city will continue to own) must pay the installation cost.

Dry, dry, dry

Since May 23, only .64 of rain has fallen in the Wayne area.

The USDA has announced that counties found to be suffering from drought will be authorized emergency haying and grazing of acreage conservation reserve (ACR) and conservation use acreage. Haying and grazing provisions will not apply to conservation reserve program acreage.

The haying and grazing will be allowed for any consecutive five-month period between April 1 and Oct. 31.

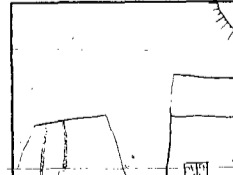
Eligible counties will be determined on a county-by-county basis.

Any hay or forage harvested on the acreages may not be sold. A producer may allow other producers to hay and graze his own acreage and may charge a reasonable harvesting fee for the privilege, but may not receive compensation for any value of the vegetative matter that is harvested or grazed. The producer may recover the cost of making the hay.

The Emergency Feed Program and the Emergency Feed Assistance Program is also available for eligible producers.

Emergency Feed Program provides that the CCC will share with livestock producers the cost of purchasing livestock feed, including hay.

The Emergency Feed Assistance Program allows eligible producers to purchase CCC-owned grain at 75 percent of the county loan rate to feed their foundation livestock.

Voorhies talks of prehistoric times

Bones tell the story of ages past

Sometimes early childhood hobbies can turn into a lifetime career.

Such is the case with Michael Voorhies. When growing up near his home in Orchard, Nebraska—in Antelope County, Voorhies satisfied his appetite of dinosaur interest by scouring over the area and collecting samples of petrified bones and teeth.

"All we know about dinosaurs is learned from digging the fossils out of the ground," Voorhies told a group of children during a presentation Tuesday afternoon at the Wayne Public Library.

Today Voorhies is a paleontologist. "That's a fancy word for a person that studies fossils," he told the group of children. He is curator of Vertebrate Paleontology at the

University of Nebraska State Museum in Lincoln.

Eight miles from Orchard was where Voorhies made a highly publicized find. In a bed of volcanic ash, Voorhies spotted a skull—a perfectly preserved baby rhinoceros skull. Further digging produced three more rhinos, including a full-grown adult.

Later found were three-toed horses, camels, tiny saber-toothed deer, birds and other inhabitants of the water hole.

It was speculated that the animals standing in a water hole at the Orchard site had died from suffocation as their lungs had filled with volcanic ash—brought forth from a far away explosion dwarfing the Mount St. Helen's eruption.

VOORHIES talked about the discovery and the soon-to-be Ashfall State Park near Orchard in a Tuesday evening program at the Wayne Public Library.

In his afternoon presentation, Voorhies provided samples of fossils that were recently uncovered near Orchard. He drew photographs and presented fossils of prehistoric camels, short-legged rhinoceros, plesiosaur, pterodactyl, Chinese Mamenchisaurus.

"There are 600 kinds of dinosaurs that have been named. We're finding new kinds all the time," Voorhies said.

Recent Nebraska fossil discoveries have been taken to the state museum in Nebraska. "When we put them together, we can see what they eat

and sometimes we see their last meal," he said.

Dinosaurs, he said, are rare finds in Nebraska. Two, he said, have been discovered in the state, the second by a 11-year-old boy who found a dinosaur tooth while looking at the ground just outside the lad's home.

The full bone structure of the dinosaur hasn't been found as of yet, said Voorhies.

Nebraska, he said, was under an ocean during the age of the dinosaur. Still, Voorhies said that there remains, world-wide, lots of dinosaurs to be discovered. "Not everything is in the books. The real thing is out there with nature, just waiting to be discovered," he said.

AND THEY ARE being collected in every shape and size. The smallest dinosaur discovery was only 8 inches in length and could be placed into a paper sack, said Voorhies.

Today's most closest appearance to that of dinosaurs, he said, are birds. "You have to be an expert to tell a big bird from a small dinosaur [fossil]," he said.

"Ostrich tracks are identical to meat-eating dinosaur tracks," he added.

How does one become familiar with fossil collecting?

"A good idea is to learn about the bones in your own body," he said. He said the skeletons of cats and dogs could also be studied. "It is fun to look at bones and learn the different shapes," Voorhies said.

Juvenile detention center being considered for Wayne

A proposal to use Wayne County's jail as strictly a holding place for juvenile law offenders has been given preliminary approval for further study by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

A juvenile detention center in Wayne is one alternative which Wayne County, and other counties in northeast Nebraska, are considering to meet the guidelines established through the 1974 Federal Juvenile Justice and Delinquent Prevention Act.

Beginning Dec. 8, 1988, county jails can no longer place juveniles (ages 18 and under) in the same jail facility that houses adult inmates, according to Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen.

During a May meeting of the Northeast Nebraska Sheriff's Association, law enforcement officials and county attorneys discussed the state mandate requiring compliance of the federal law.

One of the options they discussed was to contract for use of the newer, centrally located Wayne County jail as a juvenile detention center. Another option would be to have counties in the northeast Nebraska region each build or remodel their own separate facilities to hold juvenile law offenders.

WAYNE COUNTY has made application for a federal grant to finance the cost for administering the proposed juvenile detention center program. Janssen estimates the expenses to range from \$100,000 to \$150,000 annually.

As proposed, the adult prisoners in Wayne County would be transferred to different counties, Janssen mentioned.

Current average daily population

of the Wayne County jail is nearly 500. That amount would be increased to at least 15 juvenile prisoners daily and would require nearly three to four times what is presently budgeted for jail operation should the juvenile detention concept be accepted, said Janssen.

Under the proposal, six full-time and two part-time jailors would be required. Presently, Wayne County hires eight part-time jailors. "We would have to double the staff at certain points during the day," Janssen said.

"It all depends on the federal grant. If they decide to approve only half of the request, and the other counties decide not to kick in, then we have to look at another way," Janssen said.

One option, he said, would be to select a separate facility (besides the present jail) to hold juveniles from Wayne County only. He questioned the economic feasibility of this proposal. "Last year, Wayne County placed four juveniles in jail for a total of only seven to eight days," he said.

THE PROPOSED juvenile detention center concept in Wayne County is "something new," said Janssen. "This is the first program of this type in the state," he said.

To get the program operating by the Dec. 8 deadline will be "close to the wire," he said.

The Northeast Nebraska Sheriff's Association represents 18 counties. However, not all of the counties in the district would not be required to consent to the juvenile detention center concept. Some counties may opt to hold their own juvenile law offenders.

The most-populated counties in the Northeast Nebraska Sheriff's Association District include Platte County (Columbus); Madison County

(Norfolk); and Dodge County (Freemont).

Janssen said a study was conducted in northeast Nebraska concerning the length of stay for juvenile prisoners in surrounding county jails. "An average stay for a juvenile is one week," he said.

Janssen anticipated there would likely be up to five juveniles per week sent to Wayne from the highly populated areas.

THERE COULD BE times when the Wayne County jail would be filled to the maximum with juveniles and can no longer accept county transferes. "There will be certain times when we have to turn down the counties. It will be on a first come-first serve basis," Janssen said.

Juveniles held in the Wayne County jail would be separated from secure and non-secure retention. Non-secure, Janssen said, involves status offenders who, if they were adults, would not be charged with the crime (such as those charged with minor in possession or runaways).

Secure retention involves juveniles charged with shoplifting or other crimes which adults can be also be charged.

Juveniles who have been charged with felonies can still be placed in facilities which jail adult inmates.

Much of the previous funding from the state government, in relation to the federal mandate of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquent Prevention Act of 1974, had been directed to studies concerning the larger retention facilities in Nebraska and the programs designed to keep juveniles out of the courts and out of jail.

City hammers out economic agreement

A three-party agreement was approved by Wayne's City Council Tuesday evening, making it possible for Restful Knights to consolidate its manufacturing and business operations in one location.

The city council reviewed the updated economic development agreement between Restful Knights and the City of Wayne during a closed session. The third party involved in the discussion was Wayne Industries, Inc.

Restful Knights had been operating in two facilities within the community of Wayne for several months, said city administrator Phil Kloster.

Kloster told council members that Restful Knights, after undergoing an in-house economic evaluation, has an opportunity to consolidate the company's operations into one facility.

"They have taken an option on the National Fiberglass building on the east edge of Wayne," Kloster said.

THE AGREEMENT passed by the city council involves the city's usage of economic development funds in making the arrangements with Restful Knights.

Restful Knights will transfer ownership of the property on Logan Street to the city of Wayne. "The city will attempt to sell the property to another investing property owner," Kloster said.

Kloster said Restful Knights will give the city a portion of the real estate at 206 Logan Street. The remaining real estate along Logan Street will be sold for approximately \$52,000. The city, Kloster said, will be using approximately \$33,000 from its own economic development funds to purchase the additional property, leaving a balance of approximately \$18,000 to be picked up from general funds.

The city of Wayne has 24 months to regain its general funds through the sale of the property. Kloster said that if the property is not sold within that time, Wayne Industries guarantees to recoup the \$18,000, assuring that there will be no loss of city dollars in the transaction.

Councilman Darrel Heier requested more time to review the agreement.

RESTFUL KNIGHTS co-owner Virgil Kardell told the city council the option on the property runs out on July 1. A decision on the agreement Tuesday evening, he said, would influence the company's decision on whether or not they would buy the property east of Wayne because of the time constraints.

The city council, by a 7-1 margin, voted to go into closed session to discuss the real estate transaction. Freeman Decker voted against going into the closed session.

The council rendered a decision approving the agreement when the meeting was again open to the public.

Kardell said Wednesday morning that the consolidation move to Restful Knights' east site is planned for the week of July 4. He said the company plans to build an addition to the office building and to remodel the inside of the National Fiberglass building.

The east site, he said, will "allow us to continue to expand." "There are 8.6 acres that go with the property so we have lots of room for expanding," Kardell said.

School installs lifts for physically disabled students; board reviews curriculum, building and grounds goals

Wayne-Carroll Middle School and High School have completed a major portion of its project to make the buildings barrier-free to the physically disabled.

Lift installations on the buildings' stairways were inspected Tuesday evening by the Wayne-Carroll Board of Education.

The lifts have a cost of \$75,000. A grant was directed to the school district for \$27,500 for the installation of the lifts. Ninety percent of the total cost is reimbursable, leaving \$5,000 in expenses that must be picked up by the local school district, according to Superintendent Francis Haun.

The school district was required to install the lift at the Middle School for the 1988-89 school year and have another installed in the high school for the 1989-90 year.

However, Haun said the grant acceptance and other factors contributed to the installation of both lifts at the same time.

Other projects which the school district must complete in order to make buildings barrier-free include cutting curbs, lowering drinking fountains, remodeling restrooms and replacing door handles.

In other action Tuesday, the board of education:

— Reviewed the school district goals. Goals in the curriculum area for 1988-89 include teacher inservice, language arts study, applied technology review, gifted monitored, and implement penmanship for grades K-6. Building and grounds goals for the upcoming school year include repair of the music room floor and gym floor at the Middle School; tuck point brick and repair/paint eaves at Middle School; and complete removal of educational barriers.

GOALS FOR the 1989-90 school year include construction of a vehicle

storage facility; expand parking at the high school and to replace the carpet at Carroll.

— Studied a comparison of the 1988 school census with that of 1987 figures. Last year, the total number of 5-through-18 year olds numbered 902. This year, the amount is 949.

The number of those age five-increased from 67 to 92. The number of children who are under five years old decreased from 259 in 1987 to 241 in 1988.

— Approved a proposal to purchase a new van for the special education

students. Haun said 90 percent of the cost of the van will be reimbursed in three years.

— Accepted the resignation of Kathy Manske as Spanish instructor; approved the appointment of Nicki Tiedtke as half-time kindergarten instructor.

— Approved the freeholders petition requested by Jerry Dorcay for 80 acres of property.

— And went into executive session for negotiations on teachers' salaries.

Pharmacy & Your Health

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Ulcer Medicines

Ulcers are open sores that develop in the mucosal lining of the stomach and small intestine, with the duodenum (first portion of the small intestine) being the most common site. Gastric (stomach) and duodenal (small intestine) ulcers result from the corrosive action of hydrochloric acid and pepsinogen, digestive juices secreted from the lining of the stomach.

Nondrug approaches to ulcer treatment include discontinuation of smoking and alcohol ingestion, dietary changes, rest, and learning how to handle excessive levels of stress.

Popular antacid formulas contain aluminum hydroxide, calcium carbonate, and various forms of magnesium. Antacids have been used for decades to neutralize excessive acid.

Prescription medicines are also used to treat ulcers. Coating agents such as sucralfate appear to bind to gastrointestinal tissue and form a protective coating over ulcers. Special antihistamines (H2 receptor blockers) including cimetidine and ranitidine reduce the secretion of acid and pepsinogen into the stomach. Anticholinergics such as propantheline block the action of acetylcholine, thereby decreasing the stimulation of stomach acid production.

"This is a great opportunity for both young and old golfers and non-golfers to see a world class athlete up close and in person," Chairman Neil Kluber of Randolph said.

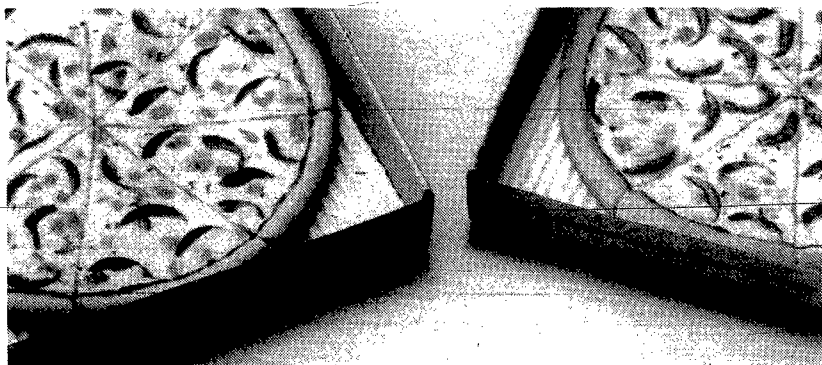
Calcavecchia was a Laurel native until the age of 13, when he moved to Palm Beach, Florida, where he continues to reside.

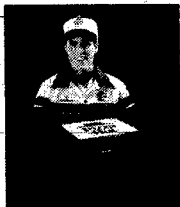

Wayne, feeling the ill effects of the top half of the final inning was unable to score enough runs to overcome Wakefield and succumbed by a final count of 19-14.

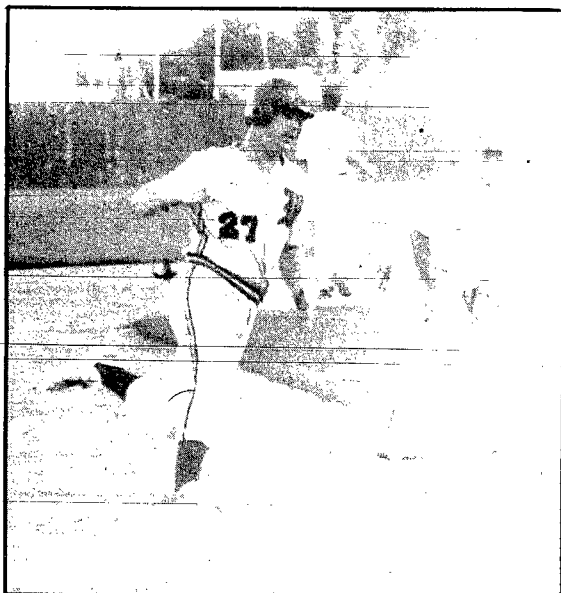
The locals rapped out 11 hits in the contest including Randy Lau's three for three performance. Lau smashed a home run in his final at bat in the ninth inning.

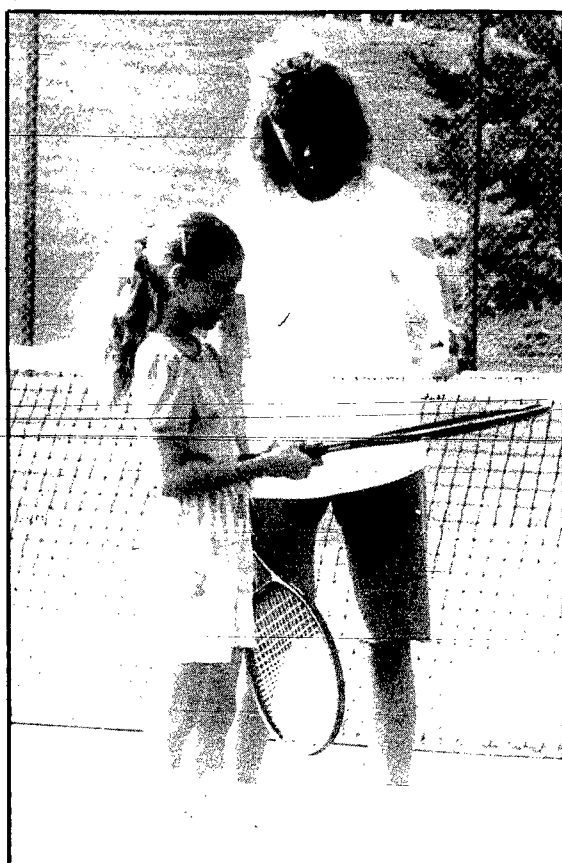


THIS JUNIOR COWBOY gallops away with a trophy earned at Carroll's Horse Show.

Sponsored by extension service Area horse clinic takes place in Laurel

The atmosphere at Laurel's Air-dale Arena last Wednesday could have rivaled that of any sale barn. Horses were paraded past the intent onlookers and examined for physical imperfections as they affect performance. Individuals tried to visually inspect each part of the horse and commit it and its qualities to memory.

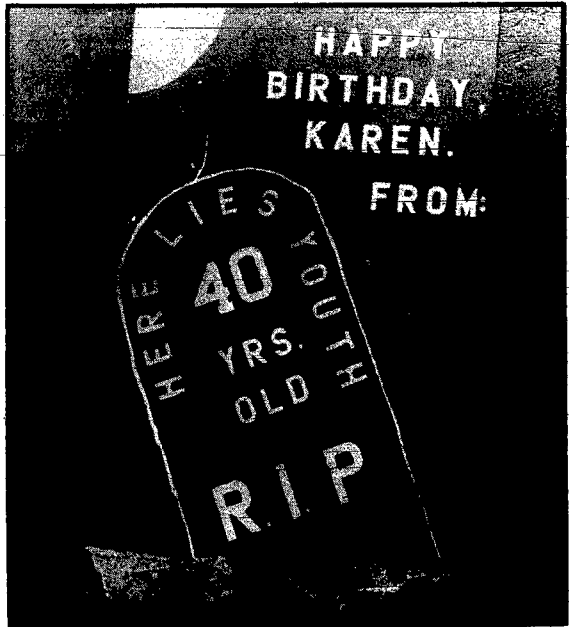
try their hand at judging two classes of horses at halter and a performance class.

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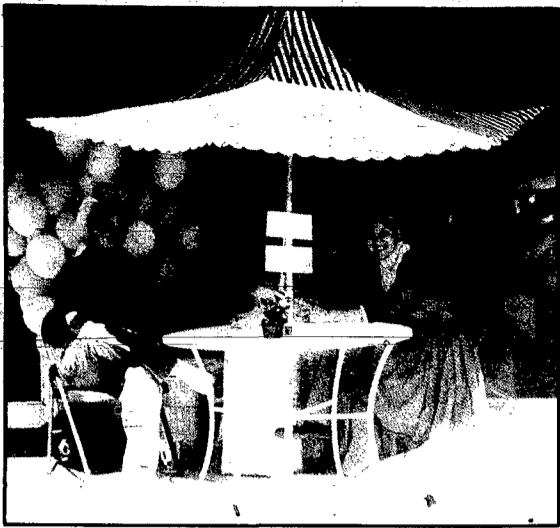
