Judges rated by lawyers

Most area judges were rated satisfactory to good and got high recommendations for them to be retained in office, according to the results of a recent judicial poll.

The Nebraska State Bar Association released, on Tuesday, July 12, performance evaluations of 119 Nebraska judges. More than 1,100 lawyers, or 42.1 percent of the Nebraska lawyers, participated in this year's evaluation.

The purpose, according to the news release from the Nebraska State Bar Association, is to provide judges with an on-going assessment of their strengths and weaknesses and to provide the public with information on the judiciary prior to retention elections.

The evaluations were first conducted in 1984 and have been continued on a biennial basis. All Nebraska judges were evaluated, except for ten who have been on the bench for less than one year.

Lawyers were allowed to evaluate

any or all of six Supreme Court judges, six Workers' Compensation Court judges, four Juvenile Court judges, three Federal District Court judges, two Federal magistrates and one U.S. Bankruptcy judge.

In addition, they could select up to 20 (of 47) District Court judges and up to 20 (of 50) County Court judges to evaluate. Each evaluation form contained a list of characteristics on which the judges were to be rated, using a scale of 5 (excellent) to 1 (very poor).

ASSESSMENTS were made in such areas as knowledge of the law, absence of bias or prejudice and judicial temperament.

Area District Court judges included in the survey are Robert Otte of Dakota City, Richard Garden of Norfolk and Merritt Warren of Creighton.

Eighty-three lawyers evaluated Otte, while 100 had evaluated Garden and 98 rated Warren. All three scored

high marks. Ninety-five percent said Otte should be retained in office. Nearly 93 percent were in favor of Warren being retained in office, while almost 92 percent mentioned that Garden be retained in office.

All three were evaluated in 22 different areas and averaged above average marks.

Also evaluated were the County Court judges, including David Curtiss of Hartington, Steven Finn of Neligh, Phillip Riley of Creighton and James J. Duggan of Norfolk.

All three received mostly satisfactory marks from the lawyers who participated in the survey. Duggan received a considerably lower 'yes' percentage than the other judges when lawyers were asked if the health of the judges was such that they could effectively discharge the duties of judicial office and whether they should be retained in office.

Man says stay away

He travels the highways on a contraption resembling a combination of bicycles and a small trailer. Leg power is all he has to maneuver the equipment up and down the hills of the highways.

The traveler said people have been making financial gains off of him. He never gets to "see a dime of it."

ESU proposed budget reviewed

Educational Service Unit One board members have set Aug. 9 as the date for a workshop and public hearing on the ESU 1 budget for 1988-89.

The hearing will be conducted at 7:30 p.m., prior to the board's regular monthly meeting at 8 p.m. Administrator Rod Garwood presented a preliminary budget report during the board's regular monthly meeting last Tuesday night in Wakefield.

Counties served by ESU 1 include Cedar, Dakota, Dixon, Knox, Thurston and Wayne.

THE UNIT IS seeking a 9.8 percent increase in its budget for the coming year — from \$2,184,716.00 in 1987-88 to \$2,399,453.00 in 1988-89.

That amount does not include the board's cash reserve, which has been increased from \$300,000 in 1987-88 to \$450,000 in 1988-89.

One of the biggest areas of increase in the 1988-89 budget is in the coop purchase program — from last year's budgeted program of \$220,000 to approximately \$300,000 for 1988-89.

Garwood said increased participation in the coop purchase program (in which schools served by the unit purchase supplies in bulk quantity and reimburse ESU 1) indicates that schools are pleased with the service and supplies they are receiving.

A COMPLETE breakdown of 1988-89 ESU 1 budget expenditures includes \$1,375,351.00 in special education services; \$640,102.00 in general levy services; and \$384,000.00 in transfers, for total budget expenditures of \$2,399,453.00.

The budget also calls for \$450,000 in cash reserves, an increase of \$150,000 over last year, bringing the total to \$2,849,453.00.

Estimated revenues during 1988-89 include \$626,247.00 in estimated cash carry-over; \$1,345,351.00 in special education contracts; \$506,830.00 in total taxes (same as last year); \$27,025.00 in nursing contracts;

\$314,000.00 in transfers; and \$30,000.00 in interest, for a total of \$2,849,453.00.

IN OTHER BUSINESS Tuesday night, ESU 1 board members:

—Gave unanimous approval for two building leases — one with South Sioux City Public Schools for use of the Bryan School during the 1988-89 year, and the other with Region IV for the Wayne Children's Development Center program;

—Voted unanimously to proceed with various fix-up projects at ESU 1 headquarters in Wakefield, at an estimated cost of \$5,500;

—Voted five to three to offer \$17,500 to the owners of B & B Apartments in Wakefield to purchase the apartments which are located in back of the ESU 1 building. The apartments would be used for storage. Voting in favor of the motion were board members Ken Lahrs, Jan Rohan, Bev Novak, Marvin Borg and John Post. Casting no votes were Leo Kramper, Claire Hansen and Jim Martindale;

—Voted unanimously to purchase the AT & T Merlin Plus telephone system for ESU 1 headquarters. The present ESU 1 telephone system is leased;

—Gave unanimous approval on the first reading of proposed changes in ESU 1 board policy. A second reading of proposed changes is required and will take place at next month's board meeting. The changes, which include some minor revisions plus a couple of additions, involve a communicable diseases policy, services for non-member schools, services for member schools, availability of policies, assignments of unit personnel, and the advisory council;

—Voted unanimously to offer contracts to Pauline Miller, resource teacher at Newcastle, and Linda King, speech clinician in Cedar County.

THE BOARD went into executive session to discuss a personnel issue. No action was taken when the board reconvened.

Century farms cited

Several Wayne County farm families and a Laurel farm family are among Nebraska Pioneer Farm families who will be honored at local county fairs and as guests of Ak-Sar-Ben at the World Championship Rodeo during the 1988 Ak-Sar-Ben Livestock Exposition and Rodeo.

Three family farms in Wayne County receive this status: the Albert Damme family farm of Wayne; the Val Damme farm of Wayne; and the Paul and Arlene Henschke farm of Wayne.

Representing Cedar County as Pioneer Farm family is the Anita Vanderhelden (Eldon and Melvin) family farm near Laurel.

A total of 205 Nebraska families whose land has been owned by the same Nebraska family for 100 years or more will be recognized.

The Pioneer Farm Family Award program, now in its 33rd year, has honored 4,165 families in 91 Nebraska counties to date, and is sponsored by Ak-Sar-Ben.

The Nebraska Association of Fair Managers cooperates in the program, helping to identify eligible families, making the presentations to the honorees at the individual county fairs during the summer. Ak-Sar-Ben Ambassadors assist in making these presentations.

The honored families receive an engraved walnut plaque and an aluminum gatepost marker from Ak-Sar-Ben for each farm which has reached the century mark in the hands of the same family.

Laurel seeks more info

Laurel's City Council has unanimously agreed to contact U.S. Ecology for the purpose of expressing interest in hosting the Central Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Facility.

However, in a letter printed in Thursday's edition (July 14) of the Laurel Advocate, Laurel Mayor Jim Recob said the letter of interest to U.S. Ecology "does not commit the city of Laurel to hosting the facility."

Recob said that it was generally agreed by the city council that before a commitment could be made, a vote or poll of the Laurel citizens would be necessary.

Said Recob in his letter to Laurel area residents: "The letter of interest merely provides U.S. Ecology with the official notice of interest to proceed with the local screening efforts, as required by U.S. Ecology's siting process."

He listed, in his letter, advantages and disadvantages of hosting the site. "If Laurel is recommended as one of three 'finalist sites', up to \$25,000 will be made available to Laurel for independent review and participation in the final selection stage."

HE ALSO SAID that Laurel would receive up to \$100,000 for general fund purposes and that if Laurel is chosen as the host site, the city would

be entitled to \$300,000 per year until 1993. After that, the city is required by law to tax the wastes that will be handled at the disposal site.

"The disadvantages of Laurel hosting the disposal site need to be studied," Recob mentioned in the letter. "None of us want Laurel to host a low-level radioactive disposal facility if it proves to be a hazardous or potentially dangerous situation."

Recob said in his letter that arguments have been heard on both sides of the issue. "We owe it to the citizens of Laurel to research the advantages and disadvantages such a site would present to Laurel," he said.

He assured the Laurel area citizenry of the following:

— The advantages and disadvantages of a low-level radioactive waste disposal site in Laurel will be extensively studied before a commitment is made.

— Laurel area residents will have a say in what path is chosen on the issue.

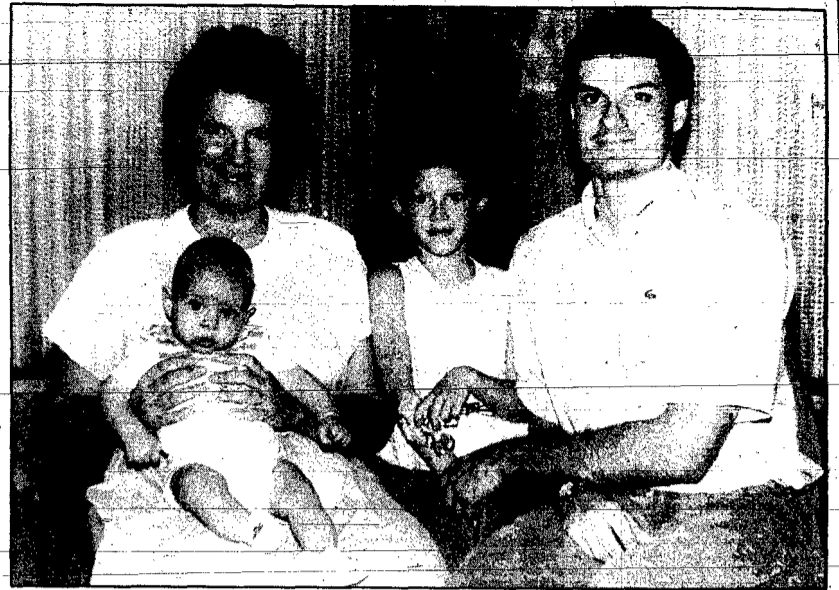
— And that Laurel residents will continue to be informed of further developments through the pages of the Laurel Advocate newspaper.

The three cities in Nebraska chosen as finalists for the low-level radioactive waste dump facility will be made in January of 1989.

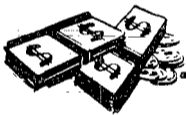
