# Wayne County Fair kicks off Thursday

Hog entries at the Wayne County Fair will be down, but look for large increases in the number of sheep and small animal projects slated for exhibition this year.

The Wayne County Fair starts this Thursday, Aug. 4 and runs to Sunday, Aug. 7.

Figures from the Wayne County Extension Office, as of Friday morning, show the number of horse and dairy entries slightly up, while goat numbers remain about the same.

Hog numbers are down from the 160 exhibited last year. As of Friday, there were 110 hogs listed for exhibition. Still, that amount was well above expectations.

Pseudorabies-free status is required before hogs can be exhibited at the county fair. This requires the testing of hogs for the disease, which can be an expensive procedure for 4-H members. Having a herd status is also required.

INDIVIDUAL market beef entries are down slightly from the previous year. However, the Pen of Three projects have been revived and boast of seven entries, while the feeder calf projects are also increased. A new event, bucket calf (geared for younger people) show, has also created an interest among young beef exhibitors.

The largest increase in exhibits or entries are in the areas of sheep and small animals. The sheep numbers grew from 27 last year to 51 this year.

Last year there were 20 poultry entrants. This year's number has grown to 55 entries. Rabbit entries totaled 54 last year. This year the rabbit entries, so far, have reached 68.

Darlene Topp, acting secretary of the Wayne County Fair, said volunteers have been busy the past week doing last minute work on

buildings at the fairgrounds.

Space for 60 new small animal cages have been installed in anticipation of the great increase in chicken and rabbit entries. Work goes on at the fairground in several other areas as well.

"They just finished the roofing of the Ag Hall and will be doing some work on the Education Building," said Topp.

"Harvey Brasch constructed nice benches in the Ag Hall for people to rest on," she said.

EARLIER, Boy Scouts applied a new coat of paint on the secretary's building in addition to the placement of a new sign.

Entertainment is expected to draw large crowds at this year's fair. The Ark Valley Boys will be the featured music entertainment Friday night, following the annual free barbecue. "I listened to them last year. They are a good music group, with comedy mixed in," said Topp.

The other featured band is Festival, the midwest's premier show band, slated to perform at 7:30 p.m. Thursday evening.

Prior to Friday night's musical entertainment, the Ak-Sar-Ben Pioneer Farm Family awards will be presented. Recognized will be the Albert Damme family farm, the Val Damme family farm and the Paul and Arlene Henschke family farm. Awarding the Pioneer Farm Family awards will be Grant Ellingson, Ak-Sar-Ben ambassador, along with a representative from Ak-Sar-Ben of Omaha.

AK-SAR-BEN officials will also speak to the audience about a key, upcoming legislative bill that involves simulcasting races.

Topp said that the diamond jubilee of extension work will take place at

# Slutz traces own roots to King Charlemagne

While many of us take a casual interest in our family ancestors and histories — sifting through letters packed away in the attic, yellowed with age, or sifting spell-bound on our grandparents' knees as they call to mind

stories from their childhood — few of us take time to write letters, research records and seek out old documents that tell us who we are and where we came from.

"We may know a lot about our grandparents, a little about our great great grandparents, and even less

about the generations that went before them.

But 78-year-old Kenny Slutz of Wayne has gone further back than that — much much further.

RECENTLY, KENNY learned that he is a direct descendant of King Pharamond, who died in 407 A.D. While not much is known about King Pharamond, Kenny was even more impressed to learn that he also is a descendant of King Charlemagne, born 11 generations later in the year 742 A.D.

Charlemagne, also known as Charles the Great, ruled as King of the Franks from 768 to 814 A.D., and as Charles I, Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire, from 800 to his death in 814 A.D.

ALTHOUGH KENNY has researched his family history for over 30 years, his relationship to King Charlemagne was actually discovered by a cousin, Ralph Slutz of Boulder, Colo., who also takes a keen interest in genealogy.

Both Kenny and Ralph, along with several other family members, correspond regularly and keep an elaborate file of relatives, referenced and cross-referenced.

Ralph's announcement of his recent discovery was made this past June during a Slutz family reunion at Ponca State Park. Forty-four relatives gathered for the event from seven states and several Nebraska communities.

"WE WERE JUST floored," says Kenny as he pulls his chair from the kitchen table, scattered with books and documents relating to his family history.

Prior to the reunion, Kenny said the Slutz family had been traced to 1658 and his grandfather seven generations back, Christopher Springer.

"We just seemed to run into a brick wall prior to 1658," says Kenny, adding that the big break came several years ago when a shoebox of records was found following the death of an aunt in Colorado.

"Things just sort of snowballed from then on," smiles Kenny, adding that his relationship to King Pharamond goes back 50 generations.

KENNY FINDS it interesting to note the nicknames that followed many of his early relatives. Charlemagne's father, Pepin, was known as "the

short." There also is Charles I (the Bald), Louis II (the Stammerer) and Charles III (the Simple).

Kenny also takes great pride in displaying a plaque with a replica of his family's coat of arms, originally worn by medieval knights over their armor to signify whether they were friend or foe.

"We know this is a very ancient coat of arms because it contains only four sections," points out Kenny. "They got more complicated as years went by."

KENNY SAYS HE doesn't exactly know why he became interested in genealogy. "I guess I just wanted to check up on my family."

For others thinking about "checking up on their families," Kenny advises them to be prepared to run into more brick walls than open doors.

"The hardest thing is to send off a letter requesting information and then wait for a reply. And when you finally do receive a reply, many times it's negative."

Although Kenny has run into his share of brick walls, he has also discovered some very interesting records and documents.

Among them is a land grant from Kenny's great great grandfather, Noah Slutz (note the change in spelling), signed by President John Tyler in 1843 for 160 acres of land in southern Ohio.

KENNY ALSO HAS run across many interesting items purely by accident.

During the 1988 Lenten season, Kenny picked up a church bulletin one Sunday which contained a picture of the Old Swedes (Holy Trinity) Church in Wilmington, Del.

The Old Swedes church was constructed in 1699 and is one of the oldest active churches in the United States still standing essentially as it was built.

Among those helping build the structure was Kenny's grandfather seven generations back, Christopher Springer.

"Christopher spent an entire summer helping construct the church," notes Kenny, "and he was buried in the church yard."

In later years, when the congregation decided to add onto the building, they found that Christopher Springer's grave was in the way of construction.

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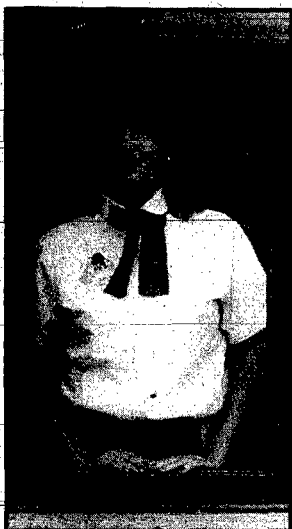

hamburgers and over 13,000 other sandwiches. How about those 4,500 fries orders that go out each week. Awesome!

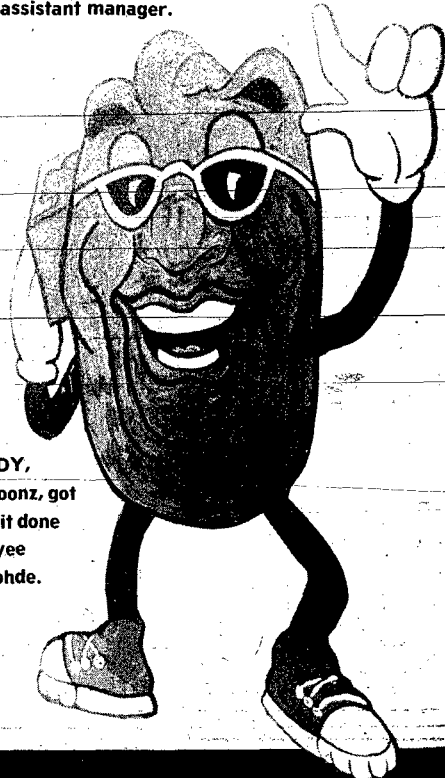
Might as well let Trumpy Tru-Note foot our horn for us, too. A group of raisins made the tour last year and were so popular that they sold out on every performance.

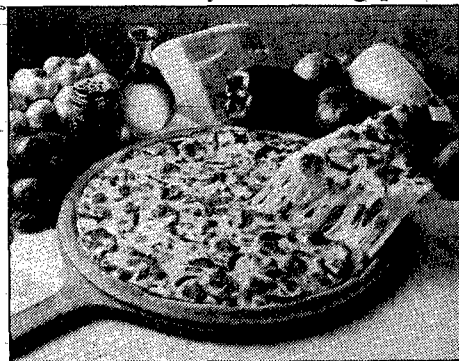

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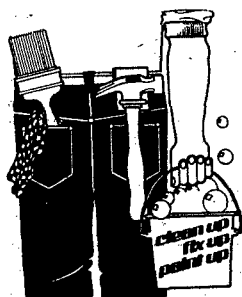
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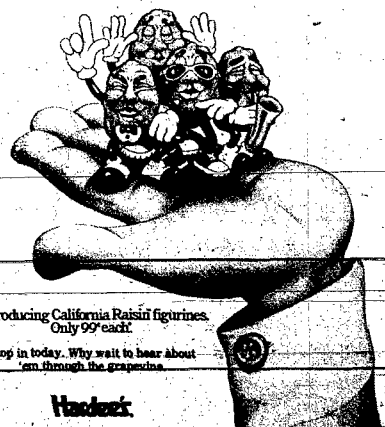


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# Archery season date set

August 20 is the opening day of the 1988 archery antelope season, which many bowmen consider to be Nebraska's most difficult hunting challenge.

Hunting antelope with bow and arrow is exciting and enjoyable, but far from easy. In fact, during the past 10 years the hunter success rate has never exceeded 17 percent. The best year during that period was 1985 when 27 of 162 permit holders took an antelope with archery equipment, for a success rate of 16.6 percent. Last year seven percent of the 229 archery permit holders took a total of 17 antelope.

The lowest hunter success total listed since 1964, when the Game and Parks Commission began keeping figures, was during the 1980 season when only six of 161 bowmen filled their permit, a success rate of 3.7 percent. The highest success figure ever recorded in Nebraska was 25.7 percent, when nine of 35 archery permit holders took their antelope during the 1965 season.

Nebraska Hunter Safety Coordinator Dick Turpin, who has a good deal of experience hunting antelope with bow and arrow, says contrary to what most people believe, getting in to effective bow range is not the biggest problem encountered when hunting antelope.

He says real problems are antelope are a smaller target than most people realize, and that they are extremely fast when they recognize danger.

"If you can spot an antelope before he sees you, you have a good chance of getting within shooting range without spooking him. You have to approach slowly and cautiously, but

if you know where he is and he doesn't know you're there, you can usually get into range," Turpin said.

"Another problem comes" when you're within range and you raise up to draw the bow and shoot. An antelope that is lying down doesn't jump up onto its feet and then begin to run. It starts running on its knees while it's still on the ground and if only takes a second for it to be running away from you at full speed.

It doesn't matter how good you are at sneaking up on them, when they see you move—like raising up to shoot—they start moving and they're a lot faster than you are. You can raise up, draw your arrow and shoot, and the antelope will be gone before the arrow gets there."

Turpin says "antelope hunting with a bow is a lot of fun—it's one of my favorite hunting activities. Antelope are easy to see, so you're always stalking one animal or another."

The 1988 archery antelope season will be Aug. 20-Sept. 23; Oct. 3-Nov. 11; and Nov. 21-Dec. 31.

If you think you are a good hunter and pretty handy with a bow, antelope hunting is your chance to find out just how good you really are and have a quality hunting experience in the process.

There are an unlimited number of archery antelope permits available for this year's season. Resident permits are \$20, nonresident permits are \$100. They may be purchased over-the-counter at Game and Parks Commission offices across the state.

Hunters may obtain no more than two antelope hunting permits each year. They may be two firearm permits; one firearm and one archery permit; or two archery permits.

Wayne will travel to Sioux City again this Monday to take on the Stingers in the last regular season game. Tournament pairings will be set early next week.

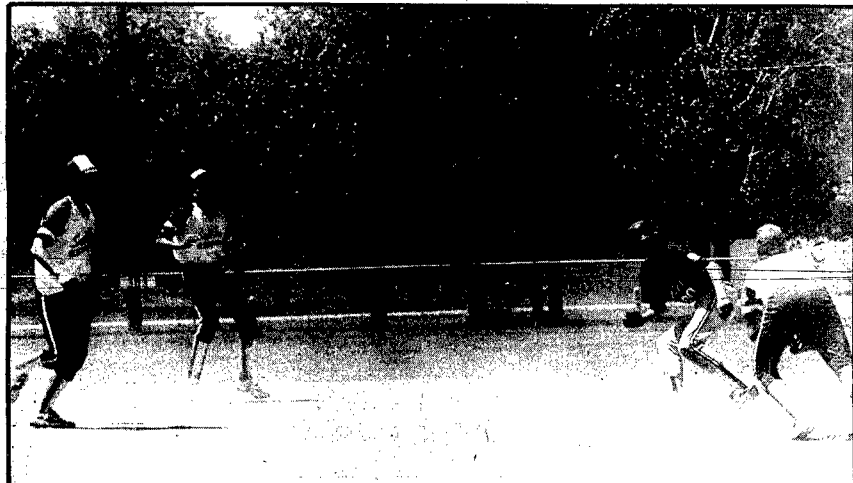
# Tennis deadline nearing

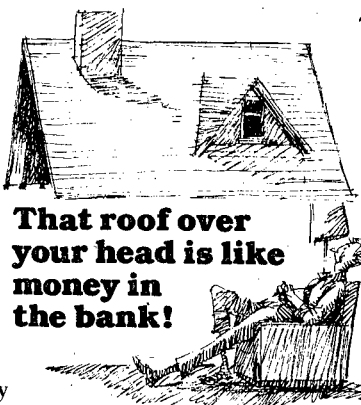
