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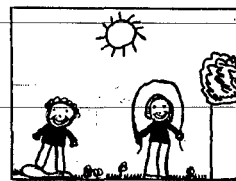
At A Glance

In drawing industry, business

Industries group looks to gain edge

An average of eight to 10 prospective industry or business inquiries each month, during the first six months of 1988, have been directed to the Wayne Industries, Inc. office.

There is a lot of interest out there. And plenty of competition from other communities to go along with it. Marketing is part of the day-to-day operations at the Wayne Industries office, which is also the location of the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce.

There's letters to mail. Telephone calls to make. Updating to consider.

Not all of the inquiries are from 200-plus employee industries or businesses. Inquiries could come from someone looking for rental property for his or her "one man operation" or service-type industry.

Judging by the increase in inquiry activity, it appears that the aggressiveness of the Wayne Industries board of directors and its many members — "to brainstorm and come up with different approaches and strategies" — is paying off.

"The consensus (among board members) was that it would be wiser for us to take a regional approach rather than going into advertising in some of the big national magazines," said John Vakoc, board president of Wayne Industries.

THE BOARD FEELS that it's entirely reasonable to think they can pull some business or industry from Omaha or that general area, Vakoc mentioned. But the focus of the search for new industry or business in Wayne doesn't end in the Omaha area. Inquiries have been received from beyond the targeted areas.

"Yes, we do have some on the line right now. Sometimes they don't tell you specializations, sometimes they do. We have some really good strong, active prospects, but we can't get specific on them at this time," said Vakoc.

WAYNE INDUSTRIES and its staff uses whatever angle possible in marketing the community. Sometimes the difference can be in how the community is presented to the prospective clients.

Gaining the edge is important. For instance, every two years Wayne Industries, in cooperation with Nebraska Public Power District, publishes an Industrial Facts booklet about Wayne. The city of Wayne designed its own cover for the booklet — beige with brown color.

"When NPPD mails out information to prospective companies, they cover the whole state. They may mail 40 booklets to a prospect. We just wanted ours to stand out," said Linda Brown, executive vice president of

Wayne Industries and the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce.

Another recruiting element used by Wayne industry or business recruiters is visible on television screens. "Our video has probably been across the United States. People who travel want to take the video with them along with packets of information," said Brown.

The 26-minute video, produced and

"We can't always meet their demands. If we're looking at an impossible situation, we don't lead them on," Vakoc mentioned.

Lots of inquiries will begin with the prospect asking about available buildings. "We need to be forthright with them in describing the facilities and provide accurate insights as to what the cost of the building would be," said Vakoc.

communities of similar size is building selections. "We go where an industry wants to go. If you have a building available and they are wanting something else, you'll work with them to put the facility where desired," mentioned Vakoc.

"We are quite unique in that we have some large available buildings. I think we received leads and inquiries purely on that basis. Here is a town that has a facility that they can step right into," said Vakoc.

The largest building which Wayne has available is 50,000 square feet. The recently vacated Restful Knights building ranges from 11,000 to 16,000 square feet. Restful Knights recently relocated their industry to the National Fiberglass facility on the east edge of Wayne.

Wayne, Vakoc said, shows very well. "We have excellent medical facilities here, with doctor numbers exceeding what most communities our size have," he said.

"An 18 hole golf course is practically unheard of in a town this size," said Vakoc.

ONE DISADVANTAGE could be that Wayne is situated between Norfolk and Sioux City. "But by the same token, we are reasonably well-connected on two major highways," Vakoc.

There has been discussion recently about establishment of a major north-south expressway through Nebraska. The Wayne Industries board of directors have not taken a position on that. "So many are trying to get the attention of the state for routing of the expressway. We thought it would be wise for us to sit back and choose whose plan we would tag onto," said Vakoc.

WHERE DO opportunities exist in business and industrial recruiting? Food processing has been talked about as an area of opportunity.

"We also talked about the possibility of targeting the insurance industry. Perhaps there would be a possibility of a claim center or we could attract a small company headquarters here," said Vakoc.

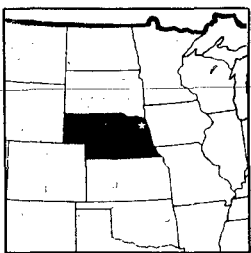
Nebraska is one of the most attractive environments in the nation for insurance headquarters because we have one of the lowest premium taxes here than any other state.

People remain as the best marketing tools which Wayne Industries can use in drawing new industry or business.

"We've become aware of that when we were keeping track of just where our leads were coming from," said Brown. "We find that our membership and people in the community, people in the area and our board members is where we were getting a lot of our leads."

viewed for the first time in September 1986, provides almost a "driving tour" of Wayne, according to Vakoc.

"It was definitely a wise investment. It is used as a follow-up for people who have already expressed an interest in the community. The value of the video is phenomenal," said Vakoc.

Brown said the video was used extensively during the "Return to the Nest" week in July — at the many reunions or the recent Vendor's Golf Tournament.

"You just never know who is going to see the video. The idea of "Return to the Nest" was to market the community. Every day of that week we were marketing the community to those people visiting," said Brown.

"It also lends us more credibility than a lot of other communities our size in so far as we've gone to the extent to have a professional videotape prepared," added Vakoc.

WHAT DOES Wayne have that adds to the package for new industry or business considering relocation? First and foremost, Wayne Industries places a high priority on presenting good accurate information.

"We have to make sure what we tell them is true. There is no room for inflating any representation," said Vakoc.

Wayne Industries tries to figure out what's important to the prospect

"We might feel that we have an excellent prospect if we can come up with the right facility at the right price," he said.

"Information has to be accurate and up to date. Sending out information that is not up to date shows a laxness," said Brown.

WAYNE INDUSTRIES has found that the number one feature for Wayne, in regards to industry or business recruitment, has been the presence of Wayne State College. The college, Vakoc said, creates an aura in Wayne that is not found in other communities of the same size.

"Without question, Wayne State College has spelled the difference in some of our past successes," said Vakoc.

A second strong feature is the available labor source. The Wayne area's last labor survey was completed in 1985.

"The labor availability is not so high that it is a terrible unemployment problem. Yet not so low that we don't have the available labor," said Brown.

Most industries are looking to locate where unemployment is not high. Currently, the Wayne area has a potential labor supply of 1,828 people.

"We also have a marketable labor, virtually untapped labor source, at Wayne State College in the way of students or spouses of the faculty," said Vakoc.

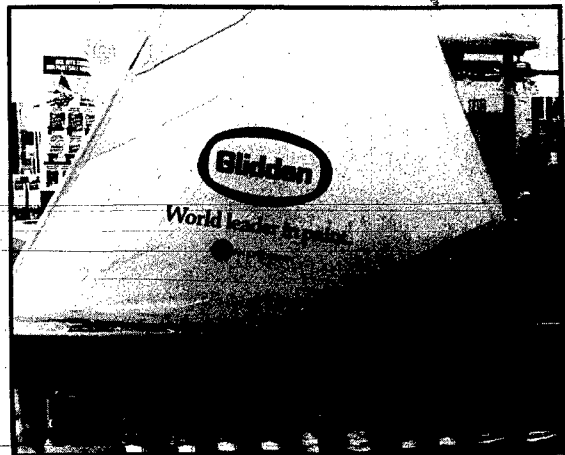

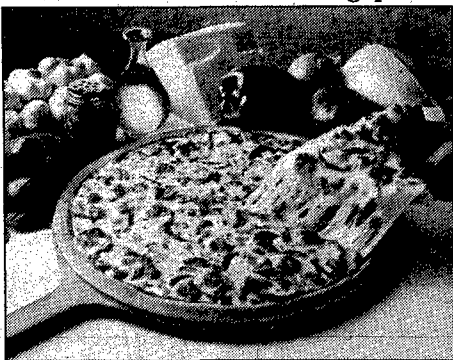

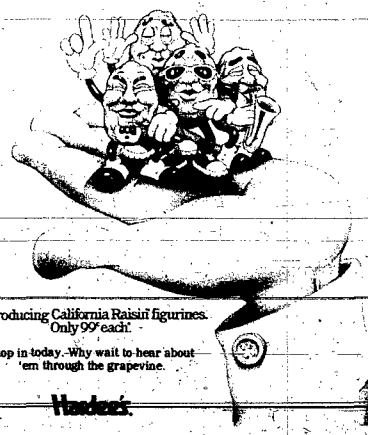

Cole scores winner

Seventh inning rally lifts Wayne

Ill-fate definitely took a strange twist for the Wayne Midgets Friday night at Overin Field as Wayne played Gretna in the first round of the 1988 State Tournament.

The game, played at 8 p.m. was the only quarterfinal game yet to be played to determine the semi-final pairings, and who would play Hickman-Norris.

What could have been disaster, turned into gold for the host team. Wayne, trailing 4-1 heading into the bottom of the seventh inning, put their rally caps on and came from behind to win the game 5-4, on Eric Cole's run on an errant overthrow by the Gretna catcher.

Jeff Luft was on the mound throughout the game for Wayne and he let the visitors from Gretna know early that not only could he throw heat, but he could field as well.

In the opening inning Luft struck out two Gretna batters and Brian Lentz took care of the third out on a routine grounder. Wayne however, was unable to get anything going early either, as the only bright spot in the first inning was Rusty Hamer's single.

Luft came out in the second and let the first batter ground out to the first baseman Lentz. He then walked a batter on four pitches, but retaliated by striking out the third batter. Lentz, who was as busy as Luft was on the mound, playing first base, snagged a line drive for the third Gretna out in the second inning.

Wayne's first taste of ill-fate came in the bottom half of the second inning. The first two batters reached base. Lentz by way of a walk, and Matt Bruggeman via an infield single.

Jeff Griesch attempted to advance the runners by bunting. However, the attempt failed as Griesch popped the bunt into the air as Lentz was racing toward third base. The Gretna catcher caught the ball and fired to first base to attempt to get Bruggeman who was racing back to first after having been half way to second.

Bruggeman was safe, but the quick thinking first baseman fired to second base and nailed Lentz for the double play.

Gretna could not find the groove on Wayne pitcher Jeff Luft. In the third inning Luft forced the first two batters into grounding out to him. Meanwhile the third batter of the inning was called out on a ground ball to shortstop Matt Peterson, who then fired to first.

Wayne's rendition of the third inning was non-productive as well as all three batters flew out to the outfield.

The fourth inning proved to be a repeat of the third for Gretna as Luft forced the first two batters to ground out to him.

Luft walked the third batter of the fourth inning, but picked him off on a marvelous throw to first as Gretna's base runner strayed a little to far from the base.

Wayne went down in order in the fourth inning and after four complete innings, Rusty Hamer's first inning single was the game's only hit for either side.

Looking to change the goose egg in the hit column, Gretna managed a single in the fifth, but Luft struck out two batters in the inning and caught a pop fly which shot down Gretna's scoring dream as fast as they had mounted a threat.

Wayne's bats however, were not producing as again the host team went down in order in the fifth.

Gretna's first batter of the sixth singled and scored on an overthrow on the part of catcher Cory Wiesler at second. Smart base running brought the Gretna runner all the way home as Wayne failed to get the ball into the infield.

With two out Gretna managed another single and again stole its way to third base on passed balls. Gretna's second run in the game scored on another passed ball. Gretna scored its third and fourth runs on back-to-back singles. Luft, failing to get shook, picked off his second runner of the game at first base to end the erroneous sixth inning with a 4-0 deficit staring them in the face, and six outs away from elimination.

Wayne's sixth inning was slightly productive as Matt Peterson scored on a Jeff Luft fly ball to center field for the sacrifice. However, the brief rally attempt was cut short as Brian Lentz was struck out.

Luft again forced two Gretna batters into grounding out to him in the seventh, while Eric Cole took care of the third Gretna out on a routine ground ball.

So now the stage was set. Wayne, with its back to the wall realized it was the end of their season starting right into their eyes if they didn't rally.

Matt Bruggemann reached base on an error. Problems then mounted for Gretna. Jeff Griesch hit into a fielders choice, but Gretna errored and both runners were safe at first and second.

Brian Moore then walked to load the bases. Eric Cole was also walked which scored Bruggeman. Matt Peterson then greeted a new Gretna pitcher with a 2-run double to tie the score at four.

Eric Cole would prove to be the game's hero. Sitting on third base, Cole was seemingly tantalizing the catcher into throwing the ball to third to attempt a possible throwing error.

The idea worked to perfection as the Gretna catcher rocked and fired to third, overthrowing the third baseman. Cole then waltzed home for the victory.

The run was a culmination of a 4-run rally in the bottom half of the last inning. Incidentally, there were no outs when Cole scored the winning run.

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
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
