Norbert Brugger was unanimously reappointed as Chairman of the Board for another term during the monthly meeting of the Wayne Housing Authority Board of Commissioners.

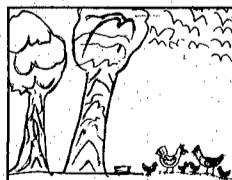

Beckenhauer gains recognition

Members of the Wayne Rural Fire Board and the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department gave special recognition Tuesday evening to Ralph Beckenhauer of rural Wayne for his many years of service to the rural fire protection district.

Beckenhauer was recognized "for 40 years of continuous service" to the Wayne Rural Fire Protection District II.

He is the only active charter member of the rural fire protection district board, organized in 1947-48. He has served as a rural fire protection district board director for 40 years.

"During 25 of those years, he had served as the rural fire district president.

One of the rural fire district's first purchases was a four-wheel drive fire truck at a cost of about \$12,000, said Beckenhauer. The district was organized through

a petition drive that was presented and okayed by the county commissioners, he said.

Serving on the board, he said, has "been a very, very nice experience."

"We never had one bit of trouble with the city of Wayne," he said. "I don't know how we can improve on it."

A special plaque and certificate was presented to Beckenhauer Tuesday evening by current president of the Wayne Rural Fire Board — Neil Sandahl. Others officers present were Lavern Harder, vice president; Harold Fleer, secretary-treasurer; Don Pedersen, board member; and Gilbert Krallmann, board member.

Also present were Wayne Volunteer Fire Department President Roger Niemann and Fire Chief Dale Preston.

To meet priorities

College appointments, hirings announced

New appointments and promotions in the areas of student admissions and student environment at Wayne State College were announced on Monday by Dr. Donald Mash, president at Wayne State.

Mash said that Dr. Robert H. Lohrborg has been promoted to a position entitled director of administrative services. He was previously dividing his duties at Wayne State between housing and logistics. Now he will concentrate exclusively on administrative services.

Larry Emanuel, a native of North

Bend, has been appointed interim director of housing.

The move, Mash said, will enable the college to address several priorities — student access, student housing and administrative services.

"Enhancing the staffing of student housing should enable us to create a better on-campus living experience for students," said Mash. "The administrative services thrust is aimed at making the college a better run organization."

Lohrborg came to Wayne State in 1981 and was named director of housing and placement. Before joining the college staff, he served 22 years

as a teacher, coach and principal in several high schools and junior high schools. He received his bachelor's degree, master's degree and doctorate from the University of Nebraska.

Emanuel, a native of North Bend, obtained his bachelor's degree from Wayne State in 1983 and his master's degree from Bowling Green University in 1987.

He served as interim residence hall coordinator and assistant director of international student programs at Heidelberg College in Tiffin, Ohio from 1985-87, doing so while enrolled in the master's program at Bowling Green.

ANOTHER PRIORITY which will be addressed, according to Mash, is in creating greater enrollment at Wayne State College among the traditional students (graduating high school seniors).

Two full-time admissions counselors have been hired at Wayne State for the purpose of visiting more high schools and providing more information about the college.

Those new staff members are Tom Heeren and Deann Clyde. Heeren from Hawarden, Iowa, graduated this past week from Wayne State College. Clyde of O'Neill is a 1985 graduate of Wayne State.

Mash said statistics concerning the amount of traditional students atten-

what the "intent" of the legislation might have been when certain laws were passed," he said.

LB 940, approved on April 8, was one of those controversial pieces of legislation, said Wiseman. This bill had immediately drew concerns from the Nebraska School Improvement Association (NSIA).

A petition drive was mounted, but had failed, to place LB 940 on the November ballot for the electorate's approval or disapproval. "We understand that Wayne County did surpass their quota of signatures for such action. LB 940 will certainly affect the school systems of Nebraska," mentioned Wiseman.

Frances Doring asked that members report to the executive committee about food donations for the Sept. 26 veterans supper. Ruth Korth presented the audit report.

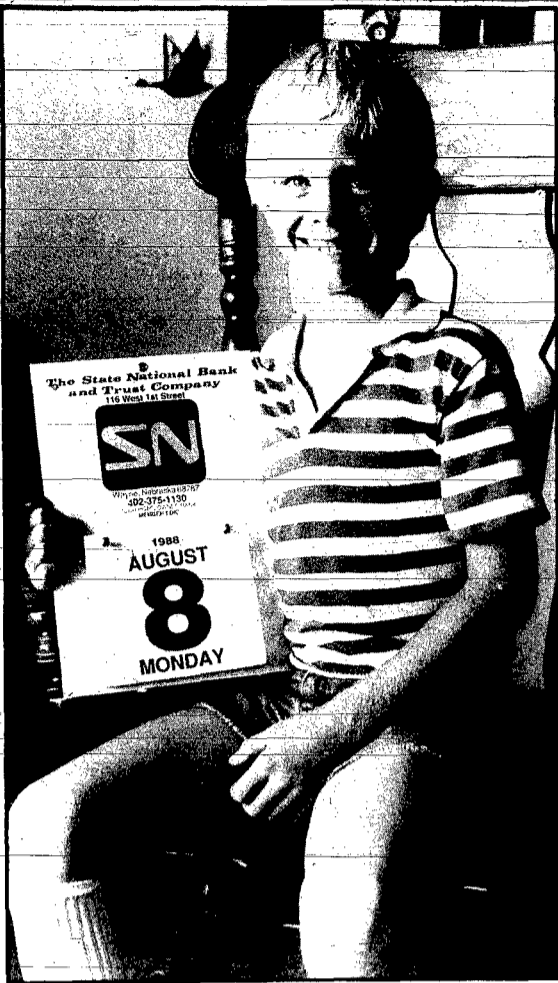

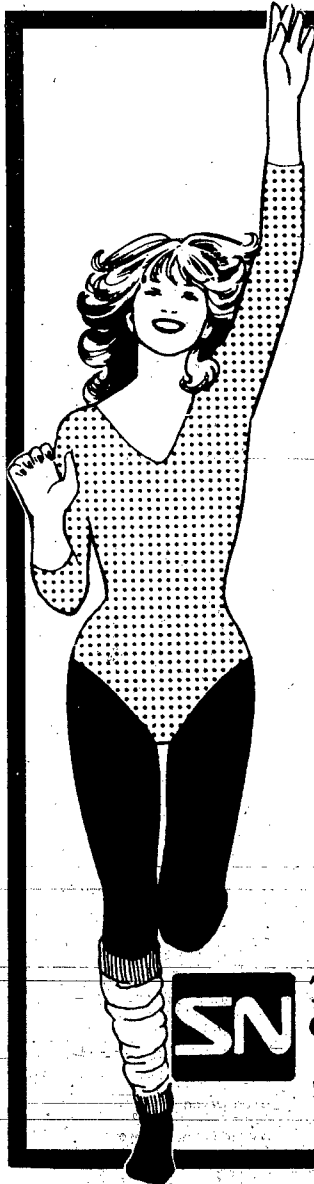

Living mulch control explained

Establishing a living mulch in a soybean-corn crop rotation could help control soil erosion and weeds, but a University of Nebraska researcher says the system has some snags and needs more study.

Russell Moomaw, extension crops and weed specialist at NU's Northeast Research and Extension Center in Concord, is exploring the unconventional cover crop system. His research will be among the work featured during tours at the center's Field Day Aug. 23.

Cover crops sometimes are planted to ease erosion problems in the rolling hills of eastern Nebraska and erosion-prone areas across the Midwest. Traditionally, grasses, vetch or clover are planted into a row crop, such as corn, late in the growing season or after harvest. The cover crop provides ground cover in the field through winter and early spring. It is destroyed by tillage or killed with herbicides in the process

of planting the second-year row crop. Moomaw is exploring the potential for planting a cover crop into soybeans that would remain when corn is planted the second year. The idea would be to maintain the living mulch for erosion and weed control but keep it from competing with the row crop, Moomaw said.

"Establishing a cover crop in growing soybeans to provide winter soil cover and then maintaining that mulch on through the no-till corn production year could be a significant step toward sustainable farming practices," Moomaw said.

DEVELOPING A living mulch system in a soybean-corn rotation faces at last two major obstacles, he said.

The first is establishing the mulch crop in soybeans. The cover crop seed is dropped on the soil surface in early to mid-July and incorporated with a rolling cultivator. A chemical growth regulator, Cerone, is used on

soybeans to keep the crop canopy open enough to provide sunlight for the underseeded crop, Moomaw said.

While the growth regulator helps establish a cover crop, it may cut soybean yields, Moomaw said. More research is needed on when the regulator should be applied to minimize yield losses.

The second and perhaps largest problem is to suppress but not kill the mulch so the second year's corn can become established with minimal competition from the mulch, Moomaw said.

PRELIMINARY research shows dryland corn yields can be reduced as much as 20 percent with living mulch competing for soil moisture. In some instances, the mulch didn't affect yields.

Chewing fescue or creeping red fescue look promising as grass mulches, Moomaw said, but they are

expensive. Both grasses are perennials and might provide a semi-permanent mulch that could be used for more than a two-year crop rotation. More study is needed to identify other mulches that might be better, he said.

Moomaw's work and other research projects at the Northeast Research and Extension Center will be explained during public tours throughout the day Aug. 23.

Environmental stewardship is the theme of this year's Field Day, which begins with registration at 9 a.m. and ends at 2:30 p.m. at the center.

Morning tours will be from 9:30 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. followed by a complimentary lunch. Roger Gold, interim director of UNL's Water Center, will speak at 12:45 p.m. Afternoon tours run from 1:30 p.m. until 2:30 p.m.

A concurrent home and garden program also will stress environmental stewardship.

Safety workshop offered

Farmers and emergency personnel can learn about farm accidents and safety at a workshop to be offered in West Point on August 13.

Extrication and emergency care of victims injured as a result of tractor overturns, auger and power takeoff equipment entanglements, and other farm-related accidents will be discussed. The instructor for the workshop is Chuck Woll, a paramedic who has had extensive experience with farm accidents.

The workshop will be held Saturday, August 13, at the Cuming County Fairgrounds, West Point, from 12:45 to 6:00 p.m. The program is free of

charge and open to farmers and their families, pre-hospital providers, nurses, doctors, fire fighters, law enforcement personnel, and interested members of the public. Participants will receive five contact hours of credit for renewal of a certificate of competency for ambulance technicians.

Sponsors for the workshop are West Point Fire and Rescue, Cuming County Fire and Rescue Services, St. Francis Memorial Hospital, Northeast Community College, the Northeast EMS Advisory Committee and the Emergency Medical Services Division of the State Health Department.



The intent of the legislation is to encourage an "orderly and approved reorganization of school districts" as follows:

— A county reorganization committee will receive and consider all plans and procedures submitted to it by the state committee for reorganization. This county committee would prepare and submit (to the state committee for approval or disapproval) a plan of reorganization of school districts for the county.

THE PLAN HAS to be submitted to the state by Jan. 1, 1990.

Membership on the county reorganization committee must be no less than seven and no more than 12. All members of the school boards and boards of education are to determine, by a majority vote, the number of members of the county committee.

— On the committee should be the county superintendent; a member from each class of school district within the county with the remaining members to be elected from any Class I district not associated with a Class IV district; and any Class II-VI within the county.

Total committee membership should be on a designated proportionate basis and members would serve four-year terms.

"Requests for board attendance to develop the reorganization committee will be in the mail within 60 days, and we anticipate full cooperation among all boards so that we may comply with LB 940," said Wiseman.

Wiseman said that a nine-member county committee would be workable for Wayne County, based on the formula prescribed by the state department and the 1988 office file census reports.

"Two members from Class I districts; six members from Class III districts; and the County Superintendent who has non-voting status, would make the ninth member of the committee," said Wiseman.

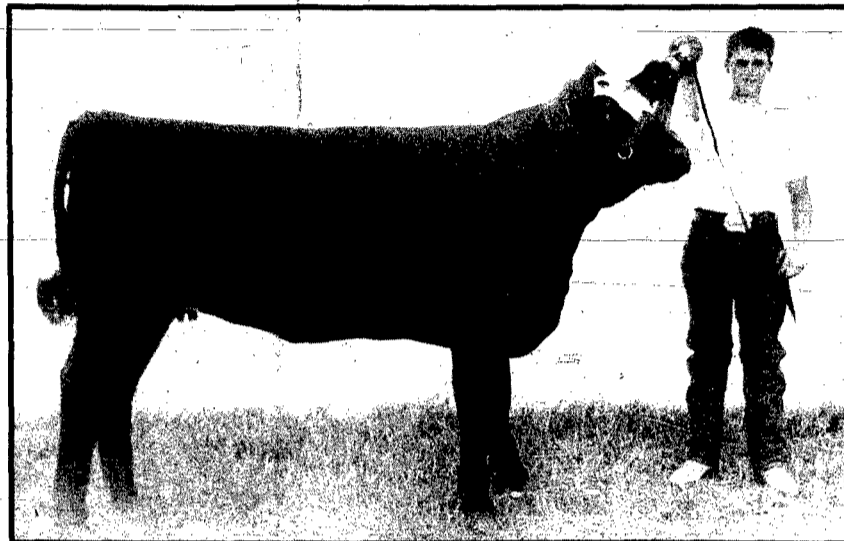

The member identifies three animals to be weighed and appraised at market value in February.

Suggested rations and computer projection of cost and returns are furnished to the 4-H'ers on weigh day. The owner records feed used throughout the project.

The final step occurs at the Fair when the animals are again weighed and appraised. A final computer output is run to determine the costs and returns on each pen. Costs figured include items such as feed, interest, yardage fees and veterinary costs.

The top achiever in this year's project was Jeremiah Rethwisch, son of Jon and Cynthia Rethwisch of Wayne. Other project participants were Scott Sievers, Kelly Meyer, Chad Spahr (2 pens) and Deb Sievers.

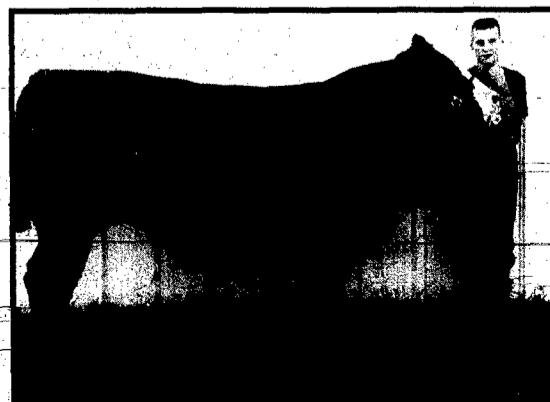

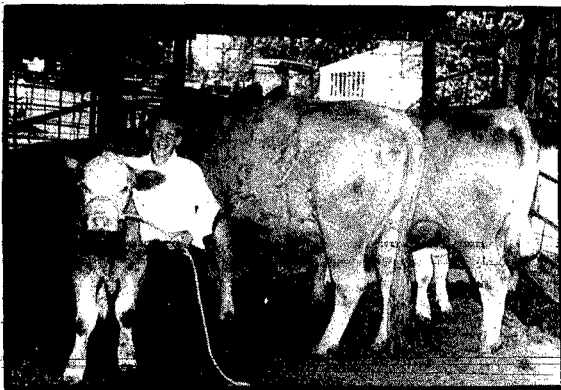

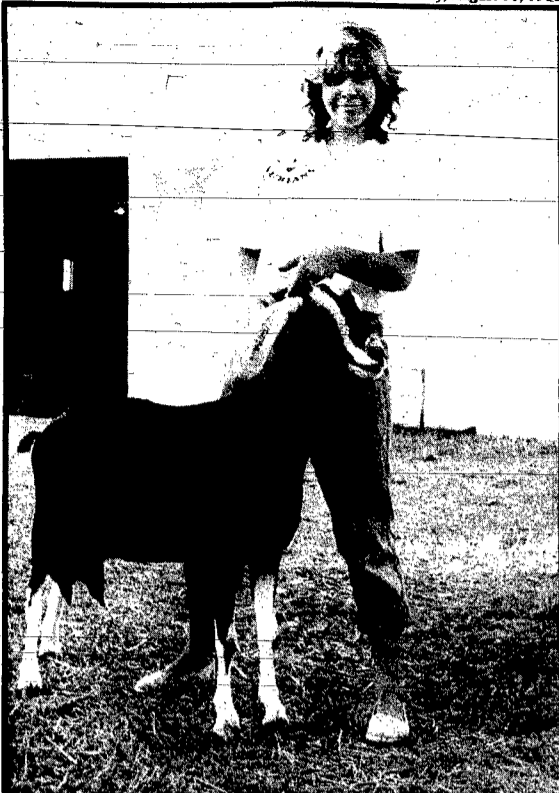

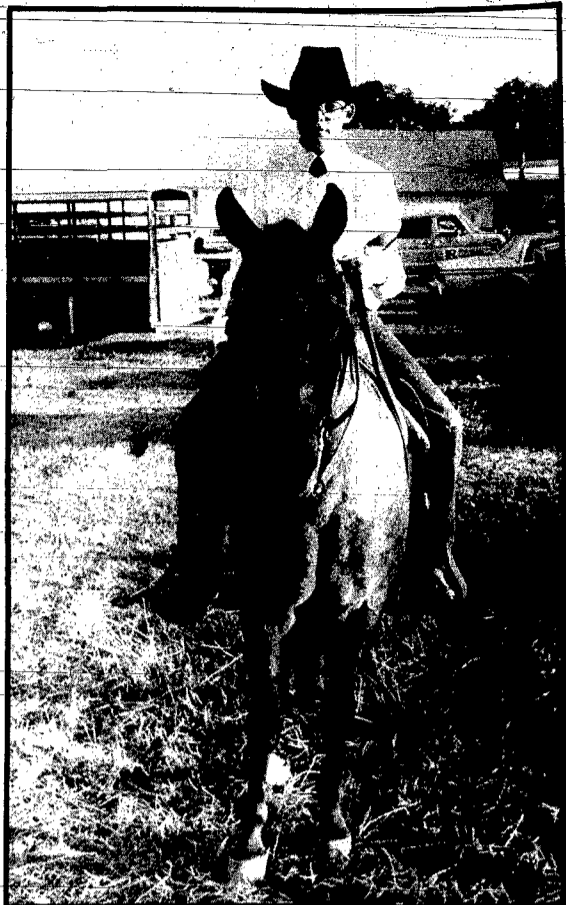

Why Some Drugs Require a Prescription

Have you ever wondered why some drugs require a prescription and others do not? Approval of drugs for over-the-counter (OTC) use is based primarily on two factors: (1) the safety of the drug when used without physician supervision and (2) the drug's effectiveness.

An OTC drug is considered safe if it has a low incidence of side effects when the recommended dose is used. The drug is considered effective if it produces the expected effect in a large percentage of the group for whom the drug is intended. For example, ibuprofen in a dose of 200mg is considered both safe and effective as an OTC drug for the temporary relief of minor pain such as headache, toothache, muscular aches, and the pain associated with menstrual cramps.

If a physician's diagnosis or supervision is needed, drugs selected will generally require a prescription. Infectious diseases, for example, usually require a physician's diagnosis. Oral antibiotics, which are commonly prescribed for infections, require physician supervision of antibiotic use. Thus, all oral antibiotics require a prescription.

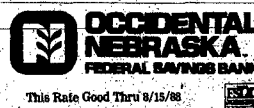
