Wakefield budget

The Wakefield Community Schools board of education recently approved a budget for 1988-89 with expenditures reflecting a 5.2 percent increase.

Superintendent Derwin Hartman said property tax requirements for 1988-89 will be \$22,938 less than the previous year's budget. The figure represents a 2.3 percent decrease in property tax requirements.

Registration for classes at Allen Consolidated School for students in grades 11 and 12 will be Wednesday, Aug. 24 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

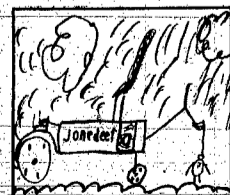

Longtime coming

Wayne men presented Prisoner of War medals

It was a while in coming, but Tony McGowan of Wayne and others finally gained some national recognition for something that happened long ago — between December, 1944 and June, 1945.

During that period when World War II was in progress, McGowan was fighting battles in Germany. He was captured and became a prisoner of war.

THIS PAST year Congress authorized the presentation of a Prisoner of War Medal to those people who served as a prisoner of war after April 15, 1917. The medal "recognizes the special service and sacrifice" that these individuals have given for their country.

Last Monday, Wayne County Veterans Service Officer Wayne Denklau presented McGowan with the special prisoner of war medal. The medals will also be presented,

posthumously, to the Vernie R. Brockman and Albert R. Hunt families.

On the front of the special medal is an eagle, a symbol of the United States and the American spirit. Although surrounded by barbed wire and bayonet points, it symbolizes the hope that upholds the spirit of the prisoner of war.

The reverse side allows for the engraving of McGowan's name and an inscription, naming the purpose of the award, that reads "For honorable service while a prisoner of war."

MC GOWAN WAS held prisoner in an area near Luxembourg for about a six month period, from Dec. 19, 1944 to sometime in June of 1945.

Prior to the time of his capture, the Army veteran was with the 707 Tank Battalion, designated as an assistant driver. McGowan had received his military training at Fort Knox, Kentucky before departing overseas in December of 1943.

The 250 men in his tank battalion had spread out over the hills following a major battle, McGowan said, primarily for some rest and some time to recuperate. "First thing we knew, we were where the Germans were," said McGowan.

An end to his prisoner of war term came when the prisoner camp was disbanded. The prisoners were being taken to another location, but there were only 40 guards to the 1,500 people inside the prison camp.

"Within 24 hours, we were scattered all over," said McGowan, admitting that he didn't like to talk about his six months at the prison camp.

They eventually met up with U.S. troops and their freedom was returned.

McGowan retired in 1973 as a mail carrier for the Dixon-Concord area, a position he held for nearly 29 years. He said he was happy to see that prisoners of war were being given the recognition they deserve.

At Wayne State College

New general education requirements set

New students enrolling this fall at Wayne State College will be required to complete new general education requirements, according to Dr. Donald Whisenand, provost and vice president of academic affairs.

The changes, which place more emphasis on science and computers, are designed to broaden students' education.

Four areas will be primarily addressed — physical education, com-

puter literacy, philosophy and technology's impact on society.

Forecasters estimate

Corn, soybean yields lowest since '83, '84

Nebraska's corn production is forecast at 752.4 million bushels, 7 percent less than last year and 16 percent below production in 1986, according to the Nebraska Agricultural Statistics Service.

All-corn acreage planted at 6.9 million acres is 6 percent above last year but 5 percent below 1986.

Acreage expected to be harvested for grain at 6.6 million acres is 6 percent above last year and is 95.7 percent of the acreage planted. This compares with 95.4 percent of the acreage planted last year and 95.9 percent in 1986.

YIELD IS FORECAST at 114 bushels per acre, 17 bushels below last year and 14 bushels below 1985 and 1986 yields.

A spokesman for the Nebraska Agricultural Statistics Service said hot, dry conditions during the month continued to stress the state's row crops resulting in substantially lower yields, particularly in the eastern and south central districts of the state.

IRRIGATED CORN production is forecast at 609.7 million bushels, 4 percent below last year and 10 percent below production in 1986. Yield is forecast at 134 bushels per acre, 14

bushels below last year's record high yield and 6.5 bushels below 1986. Acreage for grain harvest is estimated at 4.55 million acres, 250,000 acres more than last year.

Nebraska's estimated irrigated acreage represents 68.9 percent of the acreage for grain and accounts for 81.0 percent of the total corn production forecast.

Dryland corn production is forecast at 142.7 million bushels, 19 percent below last year and 36 percent below the 1986 production. Yield is forecast at 69.6 bushels per acre, 22.9 bushels below last year, 31.1 bushels below the 1986 record yield, and the lowest since 1983 when the yield averaged 58.4 bushels per acre.

Acreage for grain harvest at 2.05 million acres is 150,000 acres more than a year ago.

PRODUCTION OF soybeans, the lowest since 1984, is forecast at 73.6 million bushels — 10 percent below last year and 21 percent below the 1986 record production.

Planted acreage at 2.35 million acres with 2.3 million acres to be harvested for beans are both unchanged from last year.

Expected yield of 32 bushels per acre is 3.5 bushels below 1987 and six bushels below the 1986 record yield.

Wayne-Carroll classes slated to begin Aug. 29

Students in the Wayne-Carroll district have just one week to purchase their pencils and notebooks in preparation for the first day of the 1988-89 school year.

Regular classes for students in the Wayne-Carroll district will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Monday, Aug. 29.

Students who are new to the Wayne school district and have not yet registered are asked to do so as soon as possible. School offices are open daily from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

SUPERINTENDENT FRANCES Haun said busses will run regular routes on the opening day of school.

Students riding the bus will be mailed a bus route prior to the opening day of school and will be able to anticipate the approximate time of the bus arriving at their home.

Haun added that busses will leave the Wayne schools at approximately 3:45 p.m. on the first day of school.

THERE WILL BE three sections of kindergarten in Wayne, with the morning session running from 8:30 to 11 a.m., and the afternoon session running from 12:30 to 3 p.m.

All other classes begin at 8:30 a.m., with the first and second grades dismissing at 3:15 p.m., and third and fourth grades at 3:20 p.m.

Middle school students will dismiss from 3:30 to 3:45 p.m., and high school at 3:45 p.m.

Carroll school classes begin at 8:20 a.m. and dismiss at 3 p.m. Kindergarten classes at Carroll will be in the afternoon.

ON THE FIRST DAY of school, seventh and eighth grade students are asked to pick up their class schedules in the gymnasium at 8:20 a.m. Fifth and sixth grade students will find their home room assignments posted outside their classroom.

Ninth grade students are asked to report to the lecture hall for orientation on Monday, Aug. 29 at 8:30 a.m.

Tenth, 11th and 12th grade students are requested to report to the high school commons to pick up their class schedule cards at 8:10 a.m., and report to their regular classes at 8:30 a.m. Lunch tickets may be purchased beginning at 8:10 a.m.

Teachers will report at 8:15 a.m. on Aug. 24, 25 and 26 for workshop activities.

SUPERINTENDENT HAUN said there will be no change in the cost of school lunches for the 1988-89 year.

School lunch prices are \$1.20 for high school and middle school students daily; \$5.75 for high school and middle school students weekly; \$1.10 for elementary school students daily; \$5.25 for elementary school students weekly; \$1.45 for adults daily; and \$7.25 for adults weekly.

For building improvements

Wakefield schools to receive \$12,732 loan

The Nebraska Energy Office has earmarked \$12,732 in no-interest loan funds from the Nebraska Energy Efficiency School Loan Program to make building improvements in the Wakefield elementary school building.

The project will replace the existing lights in the gymnasium and recalibrate the heating and ventilating systems.

GARY REX, Director of Policy Research and Energy Office, said the projected first year savings should equal \$1,818.

"Under the program, one-half of the savings is earmarked annually to repay the loan and the school district gets to keep the other half of the savings," said Rex. "We expect the loan to be repaid in 14 years."

The school district previously received a grant from the Energy Of-

fice totaling \$2,100 which identified the improvements being made. To complete the project, \$1,512 is being provided from the district's cash resources.

GOVERNOR KAY Orr stated that the Nebraska Energy Efficiency School Loan Program is funded from a portion of the oil and natural gas severance tax collected by the state.

Orr said \$4.75 million is available annually from the fund for public school districts in the state which want to realize the financial benefits of making energy saving building improvements.

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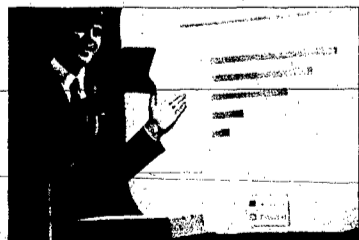

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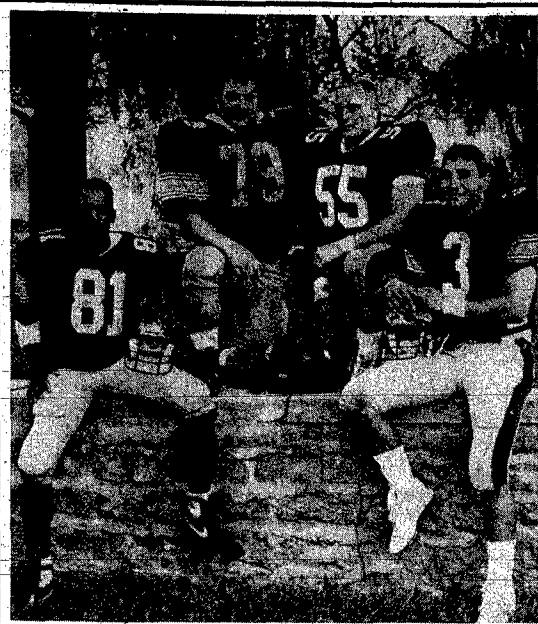

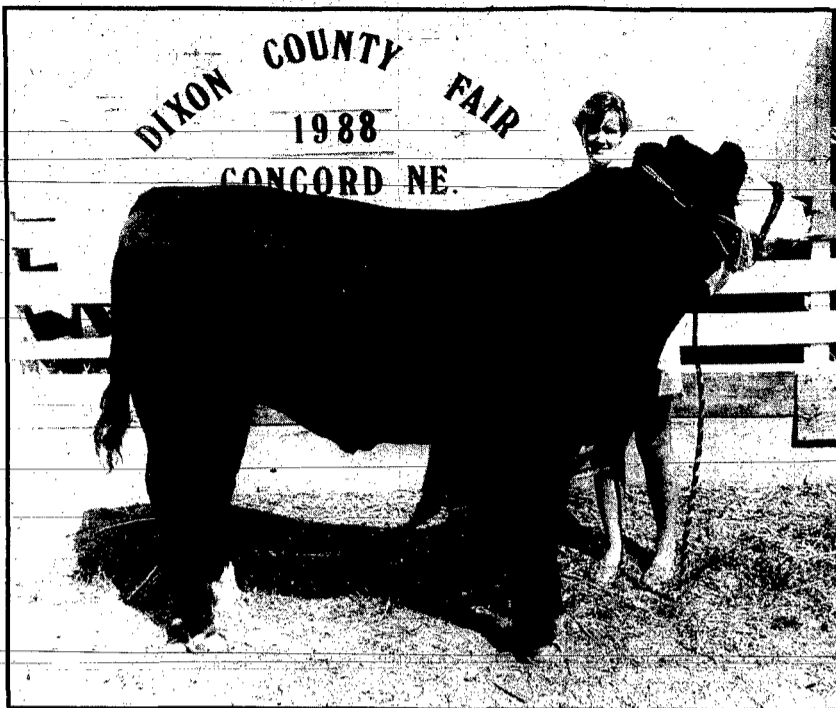

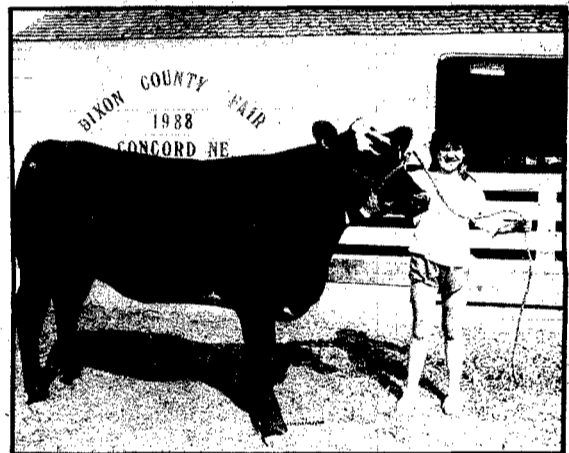

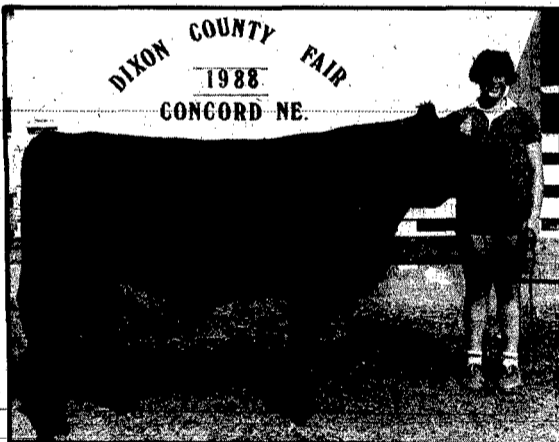

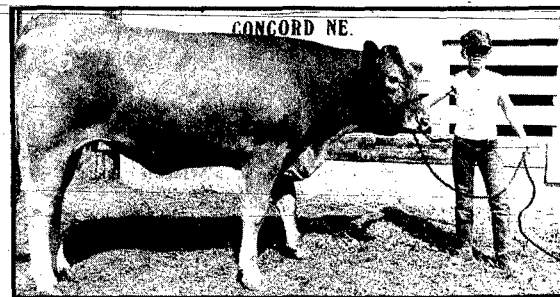

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'Irrigation is not a utopia'

While the more than 4 million acres of irrigated corn in Nebraska provide a cushion against the drought not present in previous dry spells, "irrigation is not a utopia" to individual producers in terms of profitability.

This sobering observation comes from Lynn Lutgen, University of Nebraska grain marketing specialist, who stresses that being able to irrigate is better than drying out, but "the assumption of some that those fortunate irrigators will need trucks to haul profits to the bank is false."

Lutgen warned that four factors combine to short-circuit dreams of high profit margins for irrigated corn growers, who are expecting to capitalize on a combination of having a substantial crop to sell at a high market price. The latter is anticipated by some because of drastic reductions in yields and consequently the total 1988 crop in the Corn Belt.

In a drought situation, such as that which already has slashed yields in eastern Cornbelt states and affected parts of eastern Nebraska, irrigated corn still will be stressed and will not produce to its maximum potential as it does in a year of ample rainfall.

Additional irrigation pumping costs, even with current favorable prices for petroleum-based fuels, will raise the breakeven price of a bushel

of corn substantially, significantly diminishing profit potential.

High corn prices this summer will lead to "price rationing"—reluctance by buyers to purchase any more corn than they absolutely need—which will increase the build-up of "free" or available corn stocks and force lower prices later in the marketing year, which ends in October.

Based on past history of cycles of drying and wet years and impacts on pricing, it is "irresponsible at best" to assume, as some analysts have, that all irrigated corn will be sold at a level above \$3 per bushel. This is highly unlikely, the extension economist said, when the 1988 carryover, or free stocks—not including corn tied up in government reserves—is projected at more than 4 billion bushels.

Lutgen noted that in the dry year of 1983 in Nebraska, irrigated corn yield per acre was 116 bushels, while in three good years—1985, 1986 and 1987—yields were 141.5, 140.5 and 148 bushels per acre, respectively.

THE PRICE OF corn in 1983 was \$3.12 a bushel, while it was \$1.45 in 1986 and the preliminary figure for cash corn in 1987 is \$1.75 per bushel.

The striking difference between the drought years of 1983 and 1988, Lutgen said, is that the national corn

stocks at the end of the 1983 marketing year totaled only 545 million bushels, while stocks in late 1987 were 4.1 billion bushels. Total uses of corn in 1987 were 7.8 billion bushels, while production last year was slightly less than one year's usage—7.06 billion bushels.

The truth that corn plants do not function to full capacity under sustained high periods of high temperatures, even under heavy irrigation, is dramatically borne out, Lutgen said, in a comparison between a very dry year—1980—and a banner year for corn production in the state, 1987.

In 1980, the average yield per acre for 4.95 million acres of irrigated corn in the state was 116 bushels; dryland corn on 2.15 million acres had an average yield of 48.2 bushels per acre.

In 1987, 4.3 million acres of irrigated corn, in a year of good rainfall, averaged 148 bushels per acre while dryland corn on 1.9 million acres still averaged 92.5 bushels per acre.

Increases in operating costs, especially for irrigation, were compiled by Lutgen for an average crop year and a drought scenario, for central Nebraska conditions under both center pivot and gravity irrigation systems.

HE ASSUMED AN average or normal year would see a yield of 135 bushels per acre under center pivot irrigation, with a break-even cost of \$2.48 per bushel. Drought conditions reduced yields by 25 bushels per acre, to 110 bushels, while variable irrigation costs were increased by 30 percent. This resulted in break-even costs rising from \$2.48 to \$3.15 per bushel.

The same kind of comparisons for a gravity irrigation system in central Nebraska assumes yields decreased from 145 bushels in a normal year to 120 bushels per acre in a drought year. The budget assumes an increase of 30 percent in variable irrigation costs in the drought year.

In a normal year, under a center pivot operation, the total cost per acre to produce 135-bushel-per-acre corn was calculated to be \$334.92; in the drought year, the cost would be \$345.96 per acre to produce only 110 bushels per acre average.

"The purpose of compiling and highlighting this information is not to play down the seriousness of the drought or its impact on dryland production," Lutgen said, "but merely to point out that the concept that the world has that irrigators, such as we have in Nebraska, will become filthy rich as the expense of their neighbors, is false."

The rules of mail order

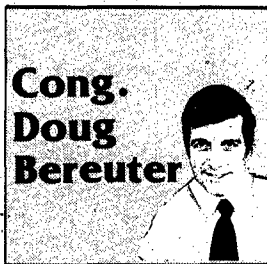
Mail order purchasing is becoming increasingly popular. Many people find this a convenient and very satisfactory way to purchase goods. Occasionally a mail order purchase does not work out. When that happens, consumers need to know how the law protects them and what steps they can take to correct the situation.

Allow the stated time for delivery before contacting the company. If you have waited and your package hasn't arrived, you have certain rights under the Federal Trade Commission's mail order rule. Under this rule, if no delivery time is stated, the firm must:

—send your order within 30 days; —if the promised shipping date can't be met, the firm must make you a notice stating the new shipping date and giving you the option to cancel your order for a complete refund, and;

—the notice must give you a postage-free way to respond to the company.

However, if you don't reply, it means you agree to the delay. (These rules don't apply to photo finishing, seeds and plants, magazine subscriptions, COD orders or orders by



telephone unless you pay by mail.)

Fair Credit Billing Act

This Act provides protection against some consumer problems if you paid for your order by credit card. Under this law, you may withhold payment of the disputed amount of your bill until the dispute is resolved if you notify your credit card company of your problem in writing within 60 days of receiving your bill.

Unordered Merchandise Statute

This federal law prohibits companies from mailing unordered mer-

chandise and then demanding payment. If you are sent merchandise through the mail that you didn't order, you have the right to keep it as a free gift.

Records, books, and tapes are items often sold through membership in a negative option club. Usually, you receive an introductory offer, such as three books for \$1, if you agree to purchase more items. The Federal Trade Commission's Negative Option Rule requires the company to give you at least 10 days to reject the monthly or periodic selection.

If You Have a Problem

Contact the Company - Phone the company to see if your problem can be resolved immediately. Follow up with a letter to the director of customer service or consumer affairs at the company and keep a copy.

Seek Third-party Help - If the company won't resolve the matter, send your letter asking for assistance and copies of relevant documents to the state or local consumer protection agency or Better Business Bureau where the business is located.
