## At A Glance

### Saving energy

Carroll Elementary in Carroll realized savings of \$1,305 after implementing energy-saving building improvements. Carroll reduced energy use by 13 percent.

The building improvements were financed through the Nebraska School Weatherization Grant Program operated by the Nebraska Energy Office.

The building improvements included attic insulation. "This improvement could save the school district as much as \$19,575 over the next 15 years," said Gary Rex, director of the Energy Office.

"I hope this success will encourage more Nebraska school districts to consider applying for technical analysis grants and no-interest loans," Rex said.

School district representatives may contact John Osterman at the Energy Office, 9th floor, State Capitol, for further information about technical analysis grants and no-interest loans, according to Rex.

### It passes

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that the referendum on the 100 percent Pork Checkoff passed by a margin of 77 percent.

Under the 100 percent Pork Checkoff, which went into effect Nov. 1, 1986, producers contribute 25 cents of every \$100 received when a hog is sold. The money is collected and disbursed by the National Pork Board, which is made up of 14 producers and one importer.

Acting on recommendations from producer policy development groups, the Board determines how checkoff dollars are invested in the areas of promotion, research and consumer education.

### Ballot issue

The Wisner Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a question and answer meeting with two candidates — Dr. Stephen Becker of Wisner and Walter Thompson of Oakland — both vying for a post on the District 3 State School Board.

The meeting is slated for Tuesday, Oct. 11 beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the Wisner Fire Hall. The moderator will be State Senator Stanley Schellpeper.

### Candy sales

The Wayne Lions will be conducting their annual Halloween candy sales Sunday afternoon and evening (Oct. 2), and Monday evening (Oct. 3). Local Lions members will be calling on Wayne residents door to door in the residential areas.

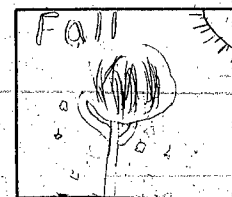
Proceeds from the candy sales are designated for the Quest Program, for sight and hearing projects and for community improvement programs.

## Renown choir to perform

The Romanian National Choir, which has received critical acclaim throughout the world, will initiate the 1988-89 Black & Gold Series at Wayne State College with a Wednesday, Oct. 19, 8 p.m. performance in Ramsey Theatre.

This highly diversified program, enhanced by beautiful costumes, presents an evening of the finest vocal music presented with elegance, charm and variety, according to James Day, professor of music at Wayne State and director of the Black & Gold Series.

One of the special features of a Romanian National Choir concert is its fascinating program — quite out of the ordinary format of the general choral concert.

The program is divided into three sections, each of a contrasting nature, and each with a change of costume.

THE OPENING group is composed of music from the Renaissance, Elizabethan and Baroque periods with the Choir dressed in Renaissance costumes, no two alike, which presents a feast for the eye as well as the ear.

The second group is from the Classical and Romantic periods with a bit of contemporary repertory as well. The dress for the Choir in this group is formal concert attire with the ladies in white formal concert gowns and the men in white ties and tails.

Group three consists of selected numbers from the Romanian and other folk repertory, with the Choir attired in Romanian folk costumes, again no two alike.

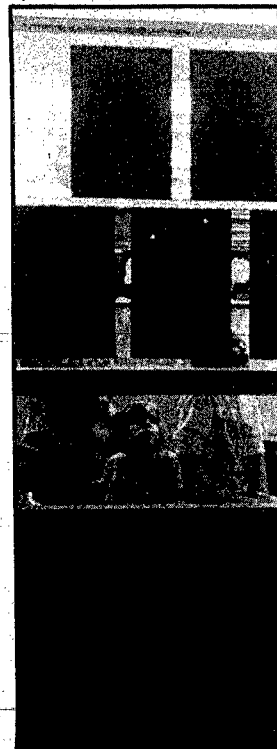
The Romanian National Choir was founded in 1963 by its present conductor, Marin Constantin, and is composed entirely of the best students and graduates of the Bucharest Conservatory. The ensemble now makes approximately 10 tours each year, performing for enthusiastic audiences throughout Europe, the United States and Canada.

## Area Ak-Sar-Ben winners announced

Several northeast Nebraskans participating in this year's Ak-Sar-Ben Livestock Exposition came away with high placings.

Wayne County 4-H'er Chris Luft picked up the championship trophy in the Advanced Western Pleasure event, marking the third win in a row of a major win at the Omaha event.

Chris, the 18-year-old son of Louis and Mavis Luft of Wayne, rode an 8-year-old Quarter Horse gelding named Powder Jelly Bean. Last year at Ak-Sar-Ben, Chris and Jelly Bean won the same event and also teamed up for the reserve championship in Advanced Western Horsemanship. He won western riding at Ak-Sar-Ben in 1986.

Chris and Jelly Bean also have won

two championship level trophies at the Nebraska State 4-H Exposition at Grand Island.

Todd Erwin, son of Richard and Ellen Erwin of Laurel, rode his 10-year-old Quarter Horse mare, Sweet Taddy Too, to reserve championship honors in the Senior Western Pleasure event. This is the second year in a row he has received this honor. They won the same spot at

the State 4-H Horse Exposition in Grand Island last July.

In the senior girls division of Western Pleasure, Trisha Luft of Wayne received a purple ribbon and Camela Behmer of Hoskins was a blue ribbon winner.

Scott Lund of Wakefield won the

## United Way board announces campaign goals

"When this placed opened up in 1962, some people said it wouldn't last a year."

Hank Overin, city of Wayne recreation director, was speaking about the Wayne youth recreation center (above the Wayne Fire Station) which was the site of Friday's Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce Coffee.

Purpose of the Chamber Coffee was to inform the public about the upcoming Wayne Community Chest 34th annual United Way Fund Drive. The Wayne Recreation Fund, which helps operate the recreation center, relies on financial assistance from United Way.

"This place is still going strong. And we hope we can keep it going through United Way backing," Overin said.

President of the United Way Board of Directors in Wayne is Mark Sorensen, who greeted the guests at the Chamber Coffee and introduced the other board members. "Our goal in 1988 is \$15,800, based on the agency requests for help that were submitted last July," Sorensen said.

Last year's United Way goal was \$15,700.

Agencies requesting funds from this year's United Way campaign include the following:

Wayne Recreation Fund — \$5,000. List of activities include football; basketball for boys, girls, men and women; baseball for boys and softball for girls; golf, swimming, tennis, volleyball and soccer for boys and girls. The Summer Park Recreation Program also involves scores of youngsters.

Mid-America Council of Boy Scouts — \$3,350. This gift from the United Way helps support a professional organization which involves 100 boys and leaders in Wayne and helps the volunteers make scouting flourish.

Prairie Hills Council of Girl Scouts — \$3,150. Camping, council-wide events and wider opportunities are only a few ways in which the Girl Scout Council provides an exciting program for more than 100 girls and adult leaders in Wayne.

Salvation Army — \$600. Provides emergency assistance to those in need. The Salvation Army merits aid for what it does here and elsewhere.

Wayne Senior Citizens Center — \$1,000. Provides fellowship, promotes meaningful activities and encourages continued independence.

Red Cross — \$200. Provides first aid instruction, swimming classes, disaster relief, local nursing scholarships and is liaison with service men and women when needed.

Wayne Hospice — \$1,200. Helps people deal with the natural emotions, reactions and problems accompanying a life-threatening illness.

Hospice focuses on comfort and support.

Contingency and Administration — \$1,300.

Sorensen said the United Way Business Drive in Wayne, chaired by board member Jim Markham, gets underway on Monday, Oct. 3 at the Black Knight in Wayne. The Residential Drive starts on Sunday, Oct. 16, and the chairperson is Lorraine Johnson.

Another goal which United Way

board members hope to accomplish is that people will not be contacted to contribute "more than once." In other words, those that give during the business drive will not be approached for contributions during the residential drive.

Other United Way board members include Phyllis Spethman, secretary-treasurer; Kathy Tooker, Connie Hall, Sam Schroeder, Don Zeiss, Gary VanMeter, Julie Mash, Roy Cook, Max Lundstrom and Bob Nelson.

"Stop in, you'll be surprised at what we have."

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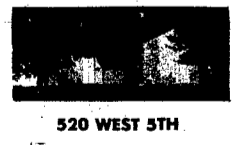

Tasting sweet victory for the first time this season and for the first time in his coaching career, Winside and Paul Giesselmann came out on top of Coleridge in straight sets Thursday night.

"I knew all along that if our girls put it together we would come out alright," Giesselmann said. "We played a complete game against Coleridge."

Giesselmann was especially pleased with the victory because Coleridge is in Winside's sub-district. "The girls are extremely excited about the win," Giesselmann said. "As well they should be because they really deserve it."

The win notched the first "W" in Giesselmann's initial coaching year. For his efforts the Winside players treated him to a shower in which they all threw him in.

"We really didn't do anything different against Coleridge," Giesselmann said. "We just passed consistently well all night and we had some good sets from Tina Hartmann."

The key to the Wildcat victory may well have come from the defensive standpoint as Winside blocked nine of Coleridge's spike attempts. Winside came out on top in straight sets, 15-13, 15-8.

Kristina Bloomfield led the attack on serving with a 12-12 effort with three aces. Shannon Holdorf followed with a 9-9 outing and a pair of aces while Kristy Miller went 6-6. Tina Hartmann was 5-6 with one ace and Jenny Jacobsen was 5-7 with one ace.

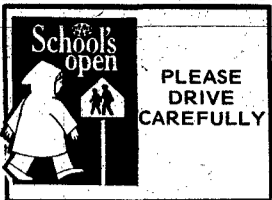

**Nuclear Power**

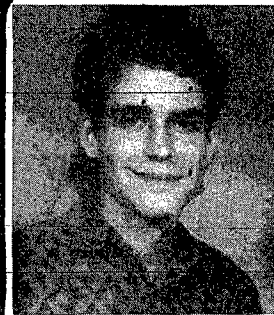
