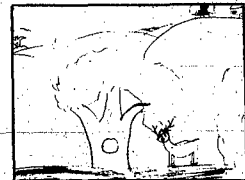

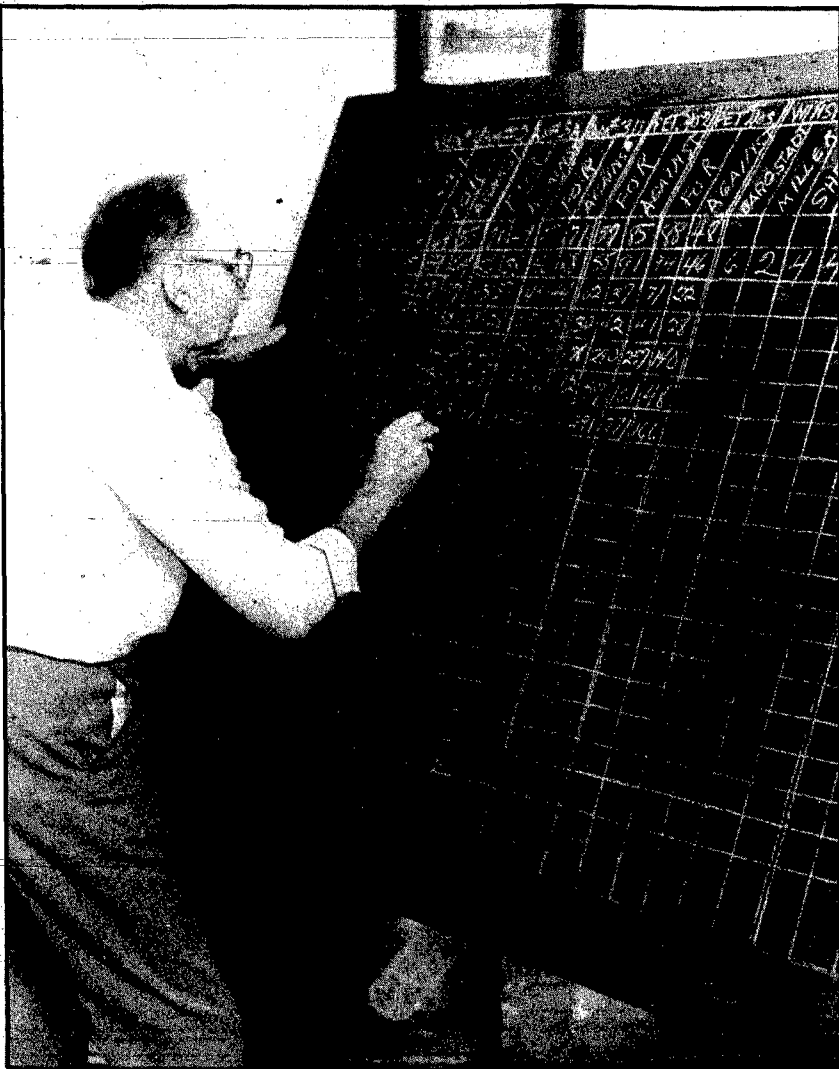

Barclay, O'Leary elected to council; Conway gets close win over Nelson

Republican George Bush, voted in as the next President of the United States, and Republican Congressman Doug Bereuter, who was reelected to the U.S. House, were involved in some of the lopsided wins that took place during Tuesday's general election.

In Wayne County alone, Bush gained 2,306 votes to Democrat Michael Dukakis' 1,068 votes. And Bereuter received 2,688 votes compared to 773 votes for Democrat Corky Jones.

But there was some local races that were close.

In the race for Nebraska's District 17 State Senator, incumbent Gerald Conway received only 71 more votes than his challenger, Tore Nelson in Wayne County and he was defeated by Nelson in Dixon County by 651 votes.

Dakota County, however, recorded 1,169 more votes in Conway's favor. The unofficial final tally, not including the absentee ballots, showed Conway winning with 6,141 total votes and Nelson with 5,552 votes — a difference of 589 votes.

REPUBLICAN incumbent U.S. Senator David Karnes, although defeated (according to later projections) by Democrat Bob Kerrey statewide, won in Wayne County by 365 votes and also won in Dixon County by eight votes.

In several other state races, recorded in Wayne County, Dr. Stephen Becker was defeated by Walter Thompson by a 1,541-1,161 margin for a position on the District 3 State Board of Education; and in the District 3 race for Public Service Commission, Duane Gay defeated Robert Young by a 2,267-898 margin.

Two new faces will be on the Wayne City Council. In the race for the Fourth Ward seat, Jane O'Leary defeated Gary Van Meter by a vote of 303-210 (including absentee ballots). The city of Wayne's Third Ward will be represented by Ralph Barclay, who had 314 votes compared to 174 votes received by his opponent in the election — incumbent Randy Pedersen.

Darrel Fuetlberth, unopposed in the city council's Second Ward, received 333 votes; and Stan Hansen, also running unopposed in the city's First Ward, gained 381 votes.

Wayne County Commissioner Bob

Nissen was unopposed and gained 372 votes.

Incumbents Sid Hillier, Neil Sandahl, and candidate Ken Dahl were elected to the three vacant spots on the Wayne-Carroll Board of Education.

There were two races for posts on this area's Lower Eikhorn Natural Resource District board. In Sub-District Four in Wayne County,

results showed Alvin Wagner with 1,676 votes over Richard Gavitt with 1,007 votes.

And in Wayne County's vote in Sub-District 7, Barbara A. Greve received 1,647 votes to Charles Reppert's 879 votes.

There was also a race for three spots on the Wayne County Noxious Weed Control Authority board. Elected were Dwaine Rethwisch with 2,437 votes, Don Pippitt with 2,259 votes and Lester Menke with 2,185 votes. The other candidate, Kevin Kai, received 1,787 votes.

THE RACE FOR three seats on the Winside Board of Education (voted on in Brenna, Chapin, Garfield, Hancock, Hoskins, Strahan and Winside precincts) were won by Dan Jaeger with 334 votes, Connie Bargstadt with 281 votes and Dean Mann with 267 votes. Other candidates were Pat Miller (214), Randall Jacobsen (196) and Doug Shelton (102).

Wenstrand with 407 votes. Other candidates were Joyce Kuhl (392); J. Dave Rusk (346); and Lawrence Anderson (233).

A contest between Alfred Benson and Gene Kraike for the city of Wakefield's First Ward post was won by Benson with 140 votes to Kraike's 109 votes. And in the Second Ward, Fred Salmon defeated Gerald Muller, 123-74.

Races were also decided Tuesday evening for two spots on the Dixon County Board of Commissioners. In District 2, Earl Rowland was defeated by Palmer Lund, 232-227; and in District 6, Dale Anderson was elected by a 268-222 margin over Eugene Swanson.

Laurel-Concord Board of Education elections also took place. Winning the four seats on the board were Jim Lipp (671), Gene Quist (602), Bob Dickey (439) and Craig Monson

Elected to the three positions on the Allen Board of Education were Diane Blohm with 463 votes; Larry Boswell with 400 votes; and Myrna McGrath with 362 votes. Judy Vavra received 280 votes.

In the Wakefield School Board race for three positions, the winners were Sanford Otte with 452 votes; Michael Salmon with 448 votes; and Ron

Cooperative program for college students begins at Wayne State

Qualifying students at Wayne State College can earn valuable experience and a salary by working for businesses or industry in northeast Nebraska — all while continuing with their college education.

A Cooperative Education Program at Wayne State College, recently begun, provides students with the opportunity to integrate paid, career-related work experience with classroom learning.

Rowan Wiltse, director of cooperative education at Wayne State, briefed faculty members and other Wayne State employees interested in cooperative education during a meeting Tuesday at the college.

On Wednesday, a meeting will take place with business and industrial leaders from Wayne, Pender, Wakefield and the Northeast Station in Concord to explain the cooperative education program.

Students who have applied for the cooperative education program can receive from two to 12 college credits and work from six to 36 hours per week. Each student must undergo two work program experiences and after these experiences, must return to Wayne State for one semester.

THEY CAN work through two different programs — a parallel program where they can work at a business or industry and also attend school; and an alternative program which allows them to leave school for "work only" and then return to Wayne State.

"Fifteen students have already signed up for the cooperative program," Wiltse said. The goal, he said, is to have 60 students involved in the program the first year (Sept. 1, 1988 to Aug. 31, 1989).

Those numbers are listed in a grant received by Wayne State to operate the cooperative education program.

Earlier this year, Wayne State College received a \$69,000 federal grant for cooperative education which will allow students to receive credit hours and a salary while they are employed in professional positions.

Wiltse said there is a difference between an internship and cooperative education program. "Students in the cooperative education program must be compensated, either by salary or perhaps by offering room and board," Wiltse said. Compensation requirements are not

necessary for intern students, he added.

"The salary [paid to students in the cooperative education program] will be left up to the employers," Wiltse said.

Employers can interview the student candidates and select the best person for the job, Wiltse added.

Dr. Donald Mash, Wayne State president, discussed the cooperative education program with those attending Tuesday morning's meeting.

THE PROGRAM, he said, was successful at George Mason University (where he served prior to being selected as Wayne State College president). Early on in the program, some 15 years ago, the faculty at George Mason appeared to not be interested in the program.

"Five years later [at George Mason], the academic departments were clamoring to get involved. The students were doing an outstanding job for the employers," Mash said.

"And the students talked glowingly about their experiences," he added.

Soon, the employers began getting in touch with the university and offered to help with the programs by offering equipment and the funding for grants.

"Faculty members and employers in the community were brought together like never before, and the students and the cooperative education program were the link," Mash said.

MASH SAID if there was not a grant to establish a cooperative education program, he would have initiated efforts to organize the program with or without a grant.

"Students need the connection with the world of work. Cooperative education can do that for them," Mash said. "I am pleased at what I see coming out of cooperative education."

"Indeed it is academic and it doesn't skirt our academic mission. The students are able to add on to their time here and are getting work experience," he said.

"They [the participating students] will find the program will be well worth their time and it will help them get a leg up on the job market," Mash said.

The cooperative education program will "help bring the region into Wayne State," Mash said.

"It will get communities in northeast Nebraska to begin to think about Wayne State College as a real asset for their communities," he said.

At Wayne-Carroll schools

Asbestos reported

Above average asbestos findings in the Wayne-Carroll High School's band room may require remodeling at a cost of \$29,790.

Federal regulations required Wayne-Carroll, and all other schools across the nation, to inventory "asbestos containing materials (ACM)" and develop a management plan to identify and control ACM in their buildings.

The management plan for asbestos at the Wayne-Carroll school buildings was presented Tuesday to the board of education.

Dean Newton and Dennis Mitchell, both of Wayne, were designated by the school district to coordinate the asbestos management plan.

Wayne-Carroll High School, Wayne Middle School, Wayne Elementary in

Wayne and the elementary school in Carroll were asbestos-tested in early August of this year by ATC Environmental, Inc.

IN THE Middle School and elementary schools at Wayne and Carroll, most areas checked (such as the pipe insulation and elbows, ceiling tiles, duct wrap, boiler wrap and floor tile) were in good condition.

These same areas were considered as in good condition in the high school, with the exception of the band room. The band room contains sprayed-on ceiling material, where it was estimated that there is high potential for damage due to accessibility and where it was considered as 'friable.'

It was recommended in the

Science workshop set

Nebraska science teachers and students will be participating in over 40 scientific workshops on Saturday, Nov. 12 at Wayne State College.

The Nebraska Jr. Academy of Sciences and the Wayne State Foundation will be sponsoring workshops featuring regional experts whose purpose is to promote interest in science and serve as positive role models for students.

Students are encouraged to get ideas for future science fair and research projects, according to Ed Brogie at Laurel-Concord School. The workshop also includes some special curriculum ideas for teachers in a variety of areas.

THIS YEAR'S featured speaker will be Dr. Mike Voorhies, curator of the Nebraska State Museum. Voorhies will present "Prairie

Pompeii", a special program on some of the unique fossils found recently in Nebraska that makes Nebraska first in fossil mammal records. The program begins at 9 a.m. in Ramsey Theatre at Wayne State.

Also this year, a variety of workshops in the area of chemistry will be offered including food science, sponsored by chemists from Milton G. Waldbaum Company, and Hach water analysis concerning drinking water purity.

These workshops will provide expensive equipment that is not available in a typical classroom.

Other workshops in the area of biology would be cost prohibited without sponsors, according to

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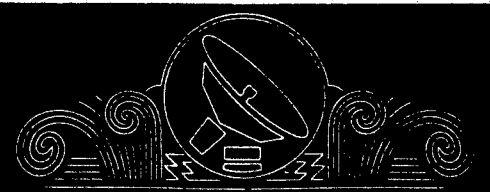

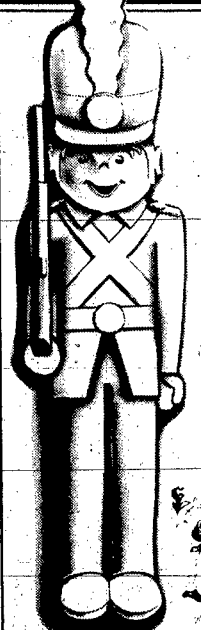

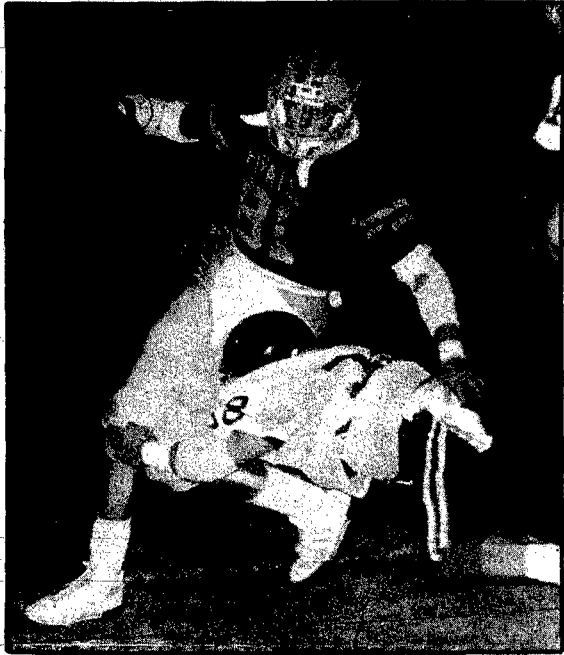

Kearney State hands Wayne State 10th loss

Forty mile an hour winds greeted the visiting Kearney State Antelopes this past Saturday, as they played Wayne State's football team at Memorial Field.

The wind hampered Wayne State's passing attack, which is the Wildcats primary offense. Kirk Meyer spluttered at best at the quarterback slot for Wayne State completing 10 of 25 passes with one interception for only 76 yards.

Kearney State meanwhile, a run oriented football team, enjoyed great success via the ground, racking up 313 total rushing yards enroute to a 37-0 route of the Wildcats. It was the second time in as many weeks that the Wildcats were shutout.

Wayne State received the opening kickoff, but kept the ball only one play as Meyer fumbled on the second play from scrimmage at his own 27 yard line.

Wayne State's defense however, allowed only one first down, that by a personal foul penalty against Wayne State for unsportsmanlike conduct.

Darren Grauerholtz was forced to come in on fourth down and attempt a 28 yard field goal with the wind. The kick was good and Kearney State led 3-0 with nearly 12 minutes left in the opening quarter.

Wayne State was held on its next possession and following a 45 yard punt by Pat Wordekemper, the Antelopes set up shop at their own 26 yard line.

Kearney State put together a 10 play, 74 yard drive capped by Brad Arrowsmith's two yard run, to lead 9-0.

Both defenses then took over until about two minutes left in the first half, when Scott Chochon plunged over from two yards out. Paul Reilly

caught a pass from Gary Hurt to complete the two point conversion, and give Kearney State a 17-0 lead at intermission.

Wayne State had only 34 total yards at halftime, compared to Kearney State's 180. In the second half Kearney State took its second possession 65 yards on four plays to take a 24-0 lead. The touchdown came on a 10 yard pass from Gary Hurt to Doug Banks. The biggest play of the drive came on a Scott Meier run of 49 yards.

Just into the fourth period Greg Schmitz scored on a six yard run giving Kearney State a 31-0 lead. Kearney State's final score of the game came on a 24 yard interception return for a touchdown by Kevin Lyons.

The Wildcats finished the game with 117 total yards while Kearney State netted 381 yards.

Meyer ended up being Wayne State's leading rusher with 26 yards on 15 carries. Meyer incidently, was sacked four times.

Pat Wordekemper was Meyer's favorite receiver, catching four of the ten total completions Meyer threw.

Defensively, Wayne State was led by Mark Voll, with 15 total tackles. Chris Matzen also did a fine job with 12 total tackles. Mo Walker and Doug Blair each totaled nine tackles while Cordell Gregory recorded eight tackles.

Gregory also recorded two tackles for losses as did Walker, Blair and Scott Mayer. Wayne State will close out the 1988 season this Saturday at the UNI-dome in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, against the University of Northern Iowa, and coach Earle Bruce, formerly head coach of division IA's Ohio State.

The two teams went back and forth until the final seconds of the first half. Spencer faced a fourth and goal play at the Wakefield 11 yard line with 10 seconds remaining until intermission.

The Spencer quarterback rolled out and threw towards a well covered receiver in the endzone. He threw the ball and the Wakefield defender missed his jump and the Spencer receiver came up with the ball.

Spencer's second score came with 16 seconds remaining in the game on a run.

NU grapplers excel

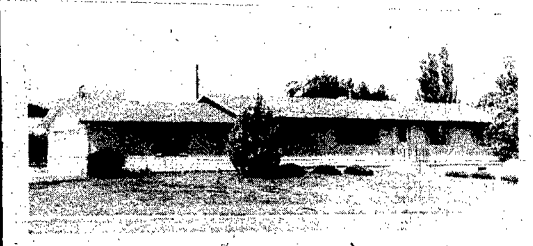
A fair sized crowd turned out Saturday night to witness the University of Nebraska's intra-squad wrestling dual at the high school gymnasium.

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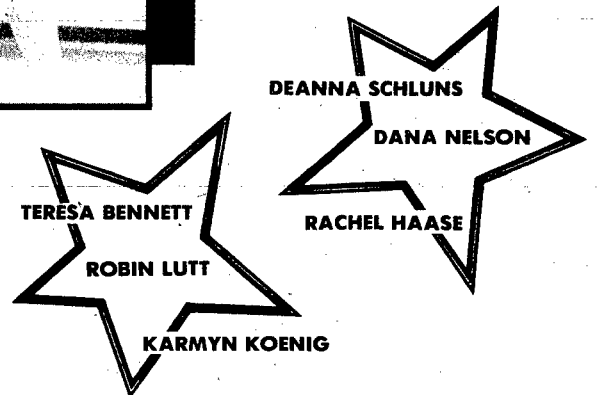
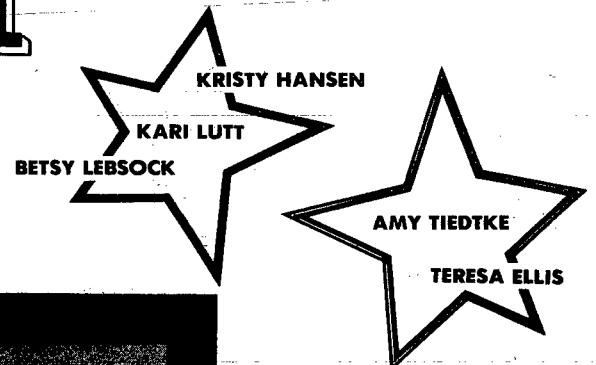
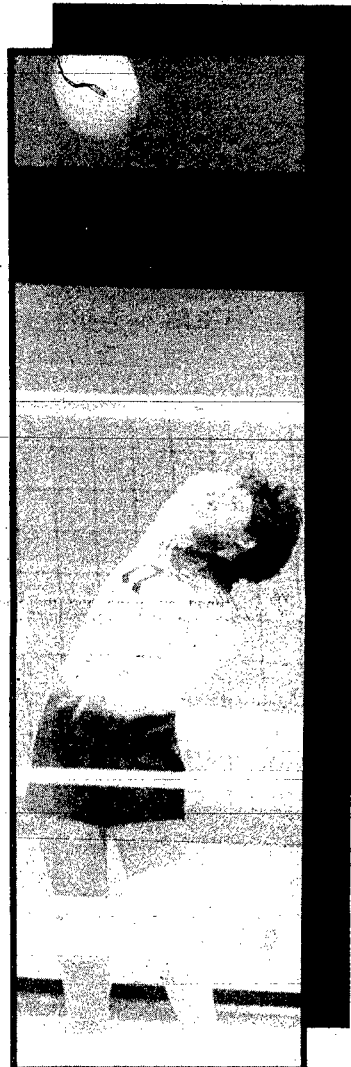

"United States policies should emphasize our non-military advantages in the competition for world influence.

"There are important opportunities for constructive cooperation between the U.S. and the Soviet Union in resolving regional tensions in the Third World."

FOLLOWING GRADUATION from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 1972, Windrum taught in Nebraska public schools for the next four years.

In 1976, she began her seminary studies at St. Paul School of Theology in Kansas City. After receiving her Master of Divinity degree in 1979, she and her husband Tim Fickenschner returned to Nebraska where Windrum served as pastor of Faith-Westwood United Methodist Church in Omaha for four years.

In 1983, she was appointed director of Peace with Justice Ministries of the Nebraska Conference of the United Methodist Church and continues to serve in that capacity.

Brogie. Some of these include dissection, parasitology, sharks and microscopy.

turned down Initiative 402 which would have withdrawn Nebraska from the Central Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact. It would also have required voter approval before a waste-storage facility is built in the state.

Wayne County voted against the proposal by a 1,862-1,585 margin. In Dixon County, there were 1,611 votes against Initiative 402 and 1,284 in favor of it.

INITIATIVE 403, which would put into the state's constitution wording

which would include the right to bear arms, passed overwhelmingly in Wayne County. Those voting for the measure numbered 2,164 voters and there were 1,150 'against' votes. In Dixon County, there were 1,871 for and 803 against the measure.

Amendment 2, which would bring interstate simulcasting to the Nebraska horse-racing industry, appears to have passed statewide. Wayne County showed 1,561 voters in favor of the issue and 1,388 against it.

Nebraskans overwhelmingly approved a measure, Amendment 1, that would clarify a definition in the State Constitution dealing with tax-increment financing, by which local governments sell bonds to aid private development of areas that are considered blighted.

Voting in Wayne County on Amendment 1 showed 1,540 in favor and 1,140 against.

Amendment 3A, if approved statewide, would change from 'elec-

tors' to 'registered voters' those people who are eligible to sign an initiative or referendum petition. Wayne County approved this measure by a 1,890-1,081 margin.

And Amendment 3B, still too close to call, would allow those 18 years of age by the time of the 'general election' to vote in the preceding 'primary election' as well as any local or special election held that same calendar year.

Wayne County voted against this measure by a 1,695-1,463 margin.

abestos management plan that the student activity in the band room be monitored and it was further recommended that the material be removed by a qualified asbestos contractor as part of the school's overall asbestos plan.

Superintendent Francis Haun obtained an estimate cost for the asbestos removal project from Jackson-Jackson and Associates of Omaha. The cost ranged from \$25,815 to \$29,790.

HOWEVER, before the removal project begins, the board of educa-

tion has decided to test the room one more time. One reason for an additional test was that in 1984, a test of the band room revealed there was no asbestos readings that would require extensive remodeling.

If the results of the next test prove that the asbestos must be removed, then it is possible that the remodeling project of the band room would take place during the summer of 1989.

Mitchell and Newton said that the schools can no longer hang items from the ceiling or from the lights. The ceilings, floor tiles or other areas that were tested should not be penetrated, but left as is.

"We advise that if it is not broke, then don't fix it. Leave it alone," advised Mitchell.

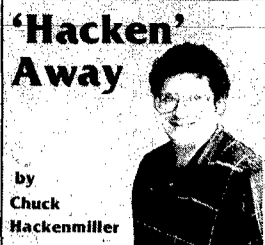

Fever Blister Relief

Fever blisters, also known as "cold sores," are caused by the virus type-1 herpes simplex. Exposure to the virus may result in blister formation on the lips or around the outside of the mouth. Blisters may appear in the same location several times during a person's lifetime. Initial exposure to the virus is thought to occur most frequently during childhood. Sunscreen lip balms will help prevent excessive lip exposure to sunlight.

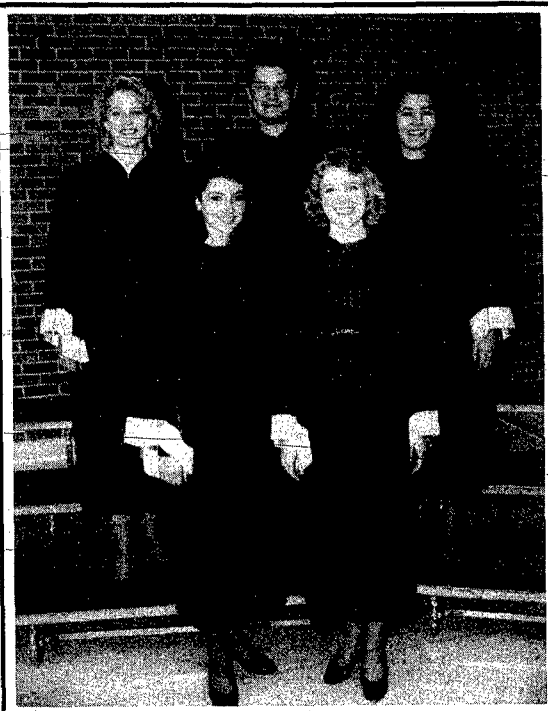

THOSE WHO SERVED

Formerly called Armistice Day, November 11 commemorates the anniversary of peace between the Allied and Central powers, signed in 1918 in France. The end of hostilities between these two powerful opposing forces marked the end of "the war to end all wars" or "The Great War," as it was also called. Stress debriefing program announced

A committee to direct crisis intervention efforts for emergency personnel in northern Nebraska has been formed.

The committee is one of six across the state organized as part of the Critical Incident Stress Debriefing (CISD) Program, an effort of the Nebraska Department of Health, the State Patrol, the State Fire Marshal's Office and the Nebraska Department of Public Institutions.

The 21-member Northern Regional CISD Interagency Committee is composed of firefighters, emergency medical service workers, law enforcement officers and mental health professionals from the Northeast Emergency Medical Services Region.

Dr. John Shybut, a psychologist from Norfolk, is clinical director of the committee. Rita Weiler of the West Point Rescue Squad is chairperson. Other area members are: Bob German, Pierce; Pat Mierhenry, Dr. Tom Surber, Gene Buss, R. L. Brown, and Charles Griffin, all of Norfolk; Lowell Johnson, Wakefield; and Eddy Williams, coordinator for the Emergency Medical Services Division of the Nebraska Department of Health, Lincoln.

The committee has reviewed applications and chosen candidates for membership on crisis intervention teams which will provide support to emergency workers after high-stress rescues.

Candidates for the teams will attend one of two two-day training programs, to be held Nov. 17 and 18 in Kearney and Dec. 1 and 2 in Lincoln. Dr. Jeffrey Mitchell, a crisis psychologist and developer of the CISD process, will teach potential team members at the workshops how to conduct debriefings.

A debriefing is a group interaction where a trained team consisting of a volunteer mental health professional and fellow emergency workers allow participants to talk about their reactions to a stressful event and learn ways to cope with the experience.

Committees for each of six emergency medical service regions in Nebraska have been established. Debriefing teams are expected to be operational across the state by the first of the year.

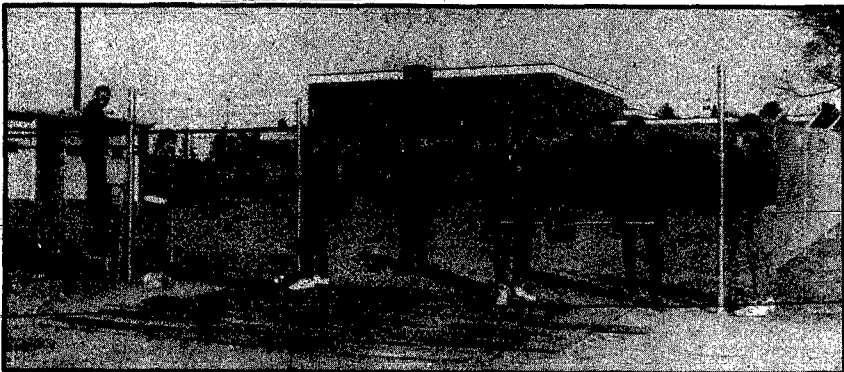

WHAT IS A LOW-LEVEL RADIOACTIVE WASTE COMPACT?

Federal Legislation

In 1980, Congress enacted a law which requires that every state shall be responsible for the disposal of its low-level radioactive waste.

The law, which was amended in 1985, states that the "disposal of low-level radioactive waste can be most safely and effectively managed on a regional basis." In 1983, the Nebraska Legislature unanimously approved participation in the Central Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact.

The Compact, which also includes Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana and Oklahoma, has been ratified by Congress. There are presently nine low-level waste compacts involving 41 states.

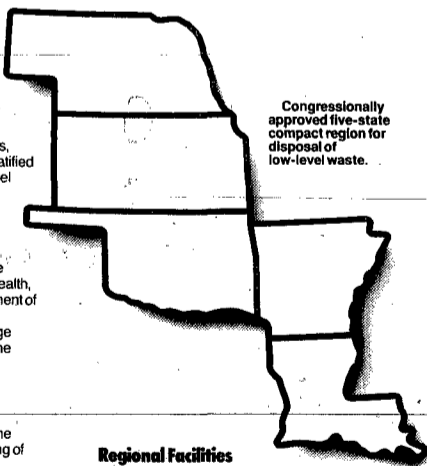
Regional Compact Responsibilities

Our Central Interstate Compact provides the means for the member states to promote the health, safety and welfare of the citizens and environment of the region. It also limits the number of facilities needed to effectively and economically manage low-level radioactive waste and encourages the reduction of such waste.

Host State Rights

The law establishing the Central Interstate Compact creates several important rights for the host state, including the regulating and licensing of any regional facility within its borders.

It also provides that the host state has the right to charge reasonable fees to facility users to cover any costs associated with such facility.



Congressionally approved five-state compact region for disposal of low-level waste.

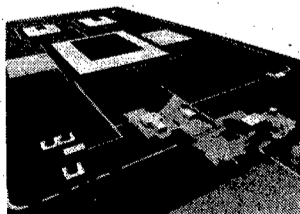
Regional Facilities vs. Single-State Facilities

Nebraska Public Power District has compared the estimated cost of continuing to participate in the Central Interstate Compact with the estimated cost of constructing a facility for Nebraskans only.

The comparison indicates that waste disposal in a Nebraska-only facility would cost approximately three times more for each cubic foot disposed than for the regional compact facility.

Our highest priority must be the protection of the public health and the environment. NPPD will continue to insist that the waste facility provides this protection. And a facility that can safely dispose of Nebraska's waste can also safely dispose of wastes from other states and reduce costs for all Nebraskans.

Taming Your 1988 Tax Liability

Just when you thought tax reform was over, many of the phase-in or phase-out allowances will change on 1988 tax reporting from 1987 levels. This means that it is very important to review your 1988 tax strategies before year end in order to ensure that you've reduced your taxes as much as possible.

Pay off all the personal debt you can. In 1988, only 40 percent of interest paid on personal loans and credit is deductible (it was 65 percent in 1987).

Accelerate deductible expenses. This tried-and-true tax management technique takes on even more importance now. Grouping unreimbursed employee business expenses, tax preparation and income production needs in one year may help you come out ahead. If you are thinking about taking some job-related classes, consider taking them in one calendar year. This may help you take over the limit of 2 percent of adjusted gross income for business expenses.

Beware of "kiddie tax." As a parent, you used to be able to invest for a child, and any earnings would be taxed at the child's rate. No more. Children under age 14 who have unearned income over \$1000 are taxed at the parents' rate and those over 14 are taxed at their own rate.

Offset capital gains against capital losses. Beginning in 1988, net capital gains will be taxed at the same rates as ordinary income. However, it's still possible to offset capital gains 100 percent against capital losses.
