Farm-City days

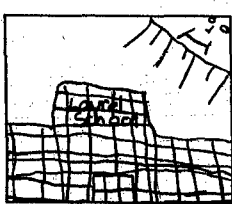
Governor Kay Orr has proclaimed the week of Nov. 18-24 as Farm-City Week in Nebraska.

Chapman resigns as football coach

Pete Chapman has resigned from his head football coach position at Wayne State College to become full-time director of athletics and recreation sports, according to Dr. Donald Mash, Wayne State president.

Chapman has served as head football coach for six years and athletic director and head football coach for the past two years. He is Wayne State's first full-time athletic administrator.

"Two years ago a decision was made, apparently for financial reasons, to place two demanding jobs on the shoulders of one person. It's simply not workable given my expectations of what we need to be doing at Wayne State," Mash said.

Mash first began discussing the separation of the two positions with Chapman when he assumed the presidency in June.

"This is not a decision based solely on this year's football record; it's not the firing of our football coach. Wayne State needs full-time attention given to all aspects of our programs, including the important areas of general student recreation and management of sports facilities. Naming Mr. Chapman to this position on a full-time basis is a means of gearing up to improve the College in several ways," Mash added.

"In the case of intercollegiate athletics, we need to strengthen our current sports and look at adding additional sports. This will require organization, promotion, and fundraising. In the case of athletics, recreation, and intramurals, we need to manage and utilize our fine facilities better. We need to create more recreation and sports-related opportunities for our student body in order to improve campus life. These are the expected outcomes of this reorganization," Mash said.

Chapman finished 29-52-1 in his six seasons as head football coach for the Wildcats. The move to administration fulfills a personal goal, according to Chapman.

"Becoming the full-time athletic director at Wayne State at this time is a tremendous opportunity for me," Chapman said. "My personal goals at Wayne State at a time when its future looks so positive is an added plus."

"The division of my position will allow us to hire someone to devote more attention to Wildcat football, which is a very important part of our athletic program."

"The past few years have placed a great burden on the time and energy of everyone in our athletic program. With Dr. Mash now adding stability and leadership to Wayne State, a full-time administrator is needed to make our athletic program one that can be a great asset for the College as it strives to reach its potential," Chapman said.

Chapman also pointed out some of the challenges ahead for Wayne State.

"Our dual affiliation with the NAIA and the NCAA, increased private fundraising, finding a stable conference affiliation, expansion of our sports and recreation programs, upgrading and maintaining our present facilities, and the general promotion of Wayne State College are some of the activities which the president and I agree need full-time attention," Chapman said.

The search for a new football coach will begin immediately with Chapman chairing a screening committee for the process. "We expect to name a new football coach before Christmas," Chapman added. "We're looking for a sound technician-teacher, who has interest in and the ability to do the tough work of recruiting, and who has the character, and demeanor to motivate young student athletes on the field and in the classroom."

Boosters critical of judge

Wayne-Carroll Music Boosters have mailed a letter to Nebraska Band Marching Festival officials to "request further consideration" of the judging results which the high school band received at Pershing Auditorium.

Brad Weber, band director at Wayne-Carroll, said the high school finished less than a point away from being rated a division one (superior) band during the Pershing performance. The band received a division two (excellent) rating.

The music booster letter which was critical of the judging, dated Nov. 10 and signed by at least 75 music booster members, was sent to Russell A. Quick, chairman of the Nebraska Band Marching Festival. "We are, of course, referring to the blatantly inappropriate marks provided by Dr. [Lee] Mendyk," the letter to Quick read.

The letter to Quick alleges that Dr. Mendyk used the forum "to be vindictive."

In the letter, it alleges that "Dr. Mendyk used [abused] the Pershing competition to settle an old score with the community of Wayne. This apparently stems from an instance in 1973 when he was retrained from Wayne State College after four years on staff."

Mendyk, who now has a position at Winona State University in Winona, Minnesota, had some bitterness over this and several subsequent problems that followed, it was alleged by the music boosters.

The Wayne-Carroll Music Boosters wrote that they were "deeply disturbed with the results of this contest and do not accept the criticism of Dr. Mendyk."

THEY ALLEGED that the criticism of the high school band's performance was "not constructive, contradictory to comments made by other judges and at times, irrelevant and unsubstantiated."

Other judges in the contest, according to Weber, included Larry Mitchell, University of South Dakota band director; Guy Blair, high school band instructor from Pella, Iowa; and Bill Van Devender, band instructor at a high school in Oskaloosa, Iowa.

Weber, who during his first year at Wayne State College had learned to play percussion instruments under Dr. Mendyk, said Tuesday that judges other than Mendyk each gave marks placing the high school band in the middle to upper level of a division one rating. The rating by Mendyk, Weber said, was a low division two rating — almost a three.

Mendyk, when contacted Wednesday

morning at Winona State College, was asked if he carried any vindictiveness towards Wayne.

"Absolutely not. That is utterly ridiculous," Mendyk said. "I have no axe to grind with anybody in Wayne."

He hadn't returned to Nebraska since he left Wayne in 1973, he said.

MENDYK, WHO said he judged music execution at the Pershing event, said he wouldn't change his marks. "I called it as I heard it at the moment it was presented," he said.

When asked if he had provided constructive criticism of the band's performance, he replied: "I thought I did."

"I just judged the music. I did not worry about the marching," he said.

"Wayne-Carroll has a very fine band. They needed a sense of balance," Mendyk said.

"I thought they were an excellent band. I felt they just plain overblew," he added.

He said it was difficult to hear all the other instruments and that the sense of balance wasn't present.

With the balance, the Wayne-Carroll band could get a division one anywhere, he said.

"The percussion is good. But they were too strong, too exuberant."

Chamber announces Christmas activities

New downtown Christmas lights, Holiday Magic and Fantasy Forest are several highlights featured this holiday season in Wayne.

Registration begins Monday, Nov. 21 for "Holiday Magic in Wayne", according to Linda Brown, executive vice president of the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce.

"Holiday Magic" will operate similar to previous years. However, there is a new twist to the popular event, according to Brown.

There will be a "Grand Finale Holiday Magic" cash drawing on Thursday, Dec. 22, when up to \$700 in total cash will be given away (a \$300 winner, a \$200 winner and two \$100 winners).

Prior to Dec. 22, up to \$2,500 will be given away during five drawings (each totaling up to \$500 each) planned during late November and December.

Each time an individual makes a purchase in a Holiday Magic participating business, the name and amount of the purchase will be registered. If no purchase is made, customers are still eligible to register and win \$1 for entering the contest.

If that individual's name is drawn in the Chamber's weekly drawing, they win a gift certificate for the dollar amount indicated on the slip (up to \$50), redeemable at any Chamber business.

The first drawing falls on Friday, Nov. 25 (day after Thanksgiving). Other drawings are slated for Thursday, Dec. 1; Thursday, Dec. 8; Thursday, Dec. 15; and Tuesday, Dec. 20; with the grand finale on Dec. 22.

THE FOURTH annual Fantasy Forest is scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 1 through Sunday, Dec. 4 at the Wayne City Auditorium. The event is sponsored by the Wayne State College Interior Design, in conjunction with the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce.

Artificial trees, colorfully decorated by participating businesses or organizations, will be judged for placings and prizes. Those viewing Fantasy Forest have an opportunity to vote for their favorite exhibit.

The tree lighting ceremony has been scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 1.

Holiday lights in Wayne will be turned on Friday evening, Nov. 25, and onlookers will view a light display different than previous years.

Brown said the Chamber has purchased 12 more large snowflake decorations to place on poles in Wayne. "This year the snowflakes will have blue lights and the trees downtown will be decorated in white lights," Brown said.

Downtown buildings within a four block area (from Carhart's north to the Wayne Vision Center on both sides of Main Street) will be outlined in white lights, said Brown.

"The Chamber has budgeted money each year to pay for the lights. We started work on improving our Christmas decorations in 1986 and in 1987, made more improvements. This year we are adding 12 new snowflakes and the lighting around the buildings," she said.

ALONG WITH the holiday lighting of Wayne, the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce is also sponsoring a "Home Lighting Contest" similar to last year.

Seventeen homes entered the contest last year. This holiday season, the contest deadline is Monday, Dec. 12.

Wayne falls to York at State

Of the state's 64 Class B schools, only eight make it to the State Volleyball Tournament held annually in Lincoln. This year the Wayne Blue Devils earned the trip for the first time in 13 years.

Wayne faced York in a 5 p.m. contest held at Pershing Auditorium. At the same time the Blue Devils were playing, Clarkson and Shickley were going at it in their state match on the other end of the court.

With a 5 p.m. game, the Blue Devils had the whole day to wait around before they played. "We took the girls to Pershing in the morning so they could see the place where they were going to play," coach Marlene Uhing said. "The gesture was to relax the team and let them watch a game."

The Blue Devils then went through a workout at Lincoln Northeast. Finally, the time had arrived to play in the game they had played for all season — the first round of state.

Kristy Hansen began the first set serving. Her first three serves resulted in Blue Devil points, and quickly Wayne was up 3-0. York drew close at 3-2, before Robin Lutt upped the Wayne lead to 5-2.

York however, battled back to tie the score at five apiece before Karmyn Koenig notched Wayne's sixth point, and another Blue Devil lead. Once again though, York tied the score at six. Teresa Ellis then put Wayne up 8-6 before the Lady Dukes knotted the score once again at 8-8.

Dana Nelson and Kristy Hansen each notched another point, but as fast as the scoreboard changed the numbers on Wayne's side, they had to match it with York's points, because once again the score was knotted at 10-10.

Robin Lutt then put the Blue Devils up for good in the first set with two straight points and a 12-10 lead. Karmyn Koenig made it 13-10 before York scored its 11th and final first set point. Deanna Schluns served the 14th point and Kristy Hansen closed out the first set with her fifth point of the set.

"We really came out and played well in the opening set," Uhing said. "York was a very quick team, perhaps the quickest in the tournament in Class B." Wayne's gameplan was to serve aggressively, and so far it was working to perfection.

In the second set York jumped to a 2-0 lead before Kristy Hansen responded with four straight points to give the Blue Devils the lead. York then scored five unanswered points to take a 7-4 lead before Teresa Ellis managed to score.

The Dukes however, scored the next four points and held a commanding 11-5 lead and went on to win the second set, 15-6. "It seemed like we got more tense as the match progressed," Uhing said. "Our offensive front line was shorter and York began exposing our weakness."

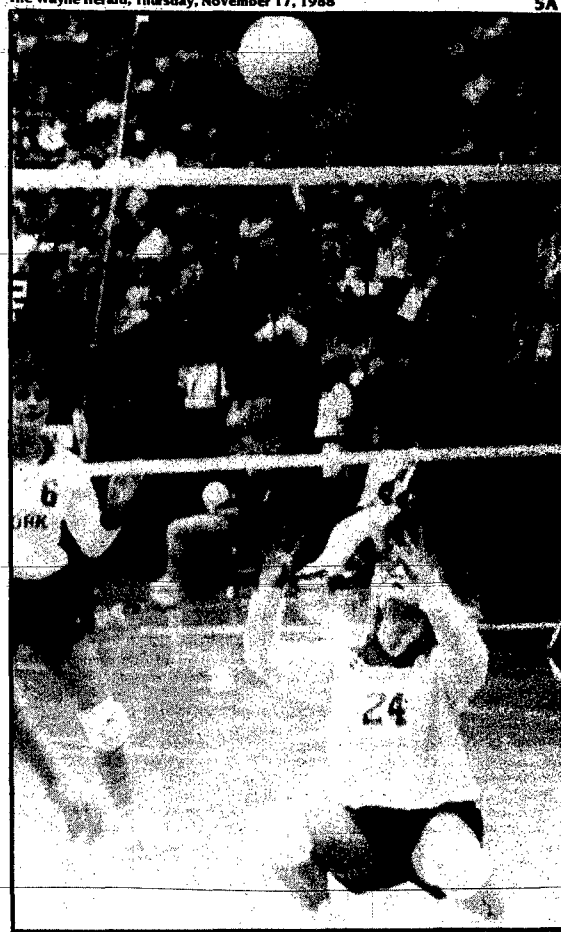
The third set was completely dominated by the Dukes as they easily defeated Wayne, 15-3. York was up 13-1 before the Blue Devils scored their second point.

"A lot of times when a team plays in the State Tournament, their weaknesses are exposed more by the better teams," Uhing said. "York had a taller front line than we did and we have battled around that problem all year. But their quickness added to their height, allowed them to spike a lot of balls, plus they did a good job of blocking our spike attempts."

Kristy Hansen finished with nine points to lead the Blue Devils in scoring while Teresa Ellis managed six points. Robin Lutt followed with five. Ellis had three serving aces to lead the squad while Hansen and Lutt each had two.

Karmyn Koenig led the team in spiking with five kills while Teresa Ellis managed four and Robin Lutt three. Both Kristy Hansen and Teresa Ellis recorded four assists from their setting positions, while Kristy Hansen and Betsy Letsock notched two blocks apiece. Dana Nelson was Wayne's top passer.

For the match, Wayne outERVED the York squad with 10 ace serves to five for the opponent. The Blue Devils finished the season with 16 wins and nine losses.

Wildcats end season

Wayne State's football team traveled to Cedar Falls, Iowa, this past weekend to end their 1988 football campaign against the University of Northern Iowa.

It was the first time Wayne State has ever played in a dome stadium, but the Wildcats were completely outmaneuvered by the superior team of Northern Iowa and coach Earle Bruce.

Wayne State failed to score for the third consecutive week, falling by the count of 77-0. The game also marked the end of head coach Pete Chapman's reign as mentor of the Wildcat football program.

Chapman resigned his position as coach to step up into the full-time seat of Athletic Administrator.

Steve Hougom got things started in the right direction for the home team with an eight yard run in the first quarter. Doug Jackson converted the extra point attempt for a 7-0 lead, with over nine minutes remaining in the opening quarter.

Wes Anderson took the first play from scrimmage on Northern Iowa's next possession from his own 29 yard line, and rumbled 71 yards for UNI's next score. Courtney Messingham rounded out the first quarter scoring on a 40-yard pass reception from Anthony Price.

Errol Peebles got into the scoring act in the 28 point second quarter explosion on a one yard burst. Wes Anderson scored the next two

touchdowns on runs of 49 and three yards.

Troy Alexander caught an 11-yard touchdown pass from Troy Green to put the intermission score at 49-0.

Steve Hougom scored two third quarter touchdowns on runs of six and 21 yards, while sandwiched in-between his scores, was Charles Young's one yard plunge. Greg Wallace rounded out the scoring on a three yard run. Incidentally, Doug Jackson was 11-11 on extra point attempts in the contest.

Wayne State was held to 116 total yards while UNI rolled up 431 yards rushing and 128 yards passing for 559 total yards. UNI also racked up 131 yards in return yardage on punts, while the Wildcats were held to minus four yards on its only punt return.

Pat Wordekemper caught four of the seven completed passes from Kirk Meyer for 17 yards. Wordekemper however, did a fine job of punting the ball, averaging 34.8 yards a kick on 10 punts.

Meyer was Wayne State's leading rusher with 41 yards on 15 carries. Travis Bahnsen and Brian Jepsen each finished with 19.

Mark Wolf was the standout on defense for the Wildcats, with 12 unassisted tackles to lead the team. Chris Matzen and Jim Sibbel each recorded seven stops, while Paul Parker had five. Mike Kennedy, Doug Blair and Dave Gerkin each recorded four tackles.

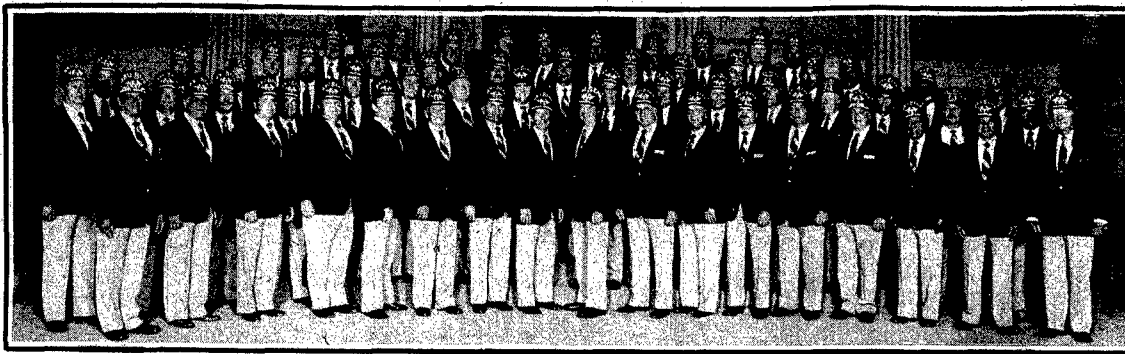

Wayne areas experience power outage

Power outages in Wayne during Tuesday night's high winds and blowing snow wasn't blamed on the weather.

However, the terrible weather conditions certainly played a part in creating problems in returning things back to normal.

Garry Poutre, assistant superintendent of electrical distribution for the city of Wayne, said some residences in the west sections of the city were without electricity Tuesday evening for two to three hours.

First the city's utility crews restored, within a 20 to 25 minute time span, electricity to Wayne State College, the Wayne Care Centre and the northwest section of the city of Wayne.

Then, from the city's north end they worked their way to the south end (on the west edge of the city) to restore electricity.

Poutre said the city utility crew was first considering the outage problem as weather-related.

The line crews worked until the morning hours, in the snow and driving wind, climbing poles and trying to find what was causing the outage problem.

As the evening progressed, they found the problem to be an underground wiring problem at the city's substation. "It could have happened at any time," he said.

Trying to find the source of the problem, and fighting the weather elements, led to a longer time to restore the electricity to those experiencing the outages, Poutre said.
