

Chapman resigns as

Pete Chapman has resigned from
his head football coach position alWayne State College to become fulltime director of athletics and recreation sports, according to Dr. Donald

football coach

Mash, Wayne State president.

Chapman has served as head football coach for six years and athletic director and head football coach for the past two years. He is Wayne State's first full-time athletic administrator.

ministrator.

"Two years ago a decision was made, apparently for financial reasons, to place two demanding lobs on the shoulders of one person. It's simply not workable given my expectations of what we need to be doing at Wayne State," Mash said.

Mash first began discussing the separation of the two positions—with. Chapman when he assumed the presidency in June.

presidency in June.

This is not a decision based solely on this year's football record; it's not the firing of our football coach. Wayne State needs full-time attention given to all aspects of our pro-grams, including the important areas of general student recreation and management of sports facilities. and management of sports racillities.

Naming Mr. Chapman to this position on a full-time basis is a means of gearing up to improve the College in several ways." Mash added.

"In the case of intercollegiate athletics, we need to strengthen our current tent and look at additional.

current sports and look at adding adcurrent sports and look at adding additional sports. This will require organization, promotion, and fundraising. In the case of athletics, recreation, and intramurals, we need to manage and utilize our fine facilities better. We need to create more recreation and sports-related apportunities for our student body in opportunities for our student body in order to improve campus life. These are the expected outcomes of this reorganization," Mash said.

Chapman finished 29-52-1 in his six seasons as head football coach for the Wildcats. The move to administration fulfulls a personal goal, accor-

ding to Chapman.

"Becoming the full-time athletic-director at Wayne State at this time is a tremendous opportunity for me."
Chapman said. "My personal goals at Wayne State at a time when its future looks so positive is an added

The division of my position will more attention to Wildcat football,

"The past few years have placed a great burden on the time and energy of everyone in our athletic program. With Dr. Mash now adding stability and leadership to Wayne State, a fulltime administrator is needed to make our athletic program one that can be a great asset for the College as it strives to reach its potential," Chapman said.

Chapman also pointed out some of the challenges ahead for Wayne State.

'Our dual affiliation with the NAIA "Our dual attiliation with the NAIA and the NCAA, increased private fundraising, finding a stable conference affiliation, expansion of our sports and recreation programs, upgrading and maintaining our present facilities, and the general promotion of Wayne State College are some of the activities which the president and the activities which the president and I agree need full-time attention," Chapman said.

Boosters critical of judge

Wayne-Carroll Music Boosters have mailed a letter to Nebraska Band Marching Festival officials to "request further consideration" of the judging results which the high school band received at Pershing

Auditorium.

Brad Weber, band director at Wayne-Carroll, said the high school finished less than a point away from being rated a division one (superior) band during the Pershing perfor-mance. The band received a division

mance. The band received a division two (excellent) rating.

The music booster letter which was critical of the judging, dafed Nov. 10 and signed by at least 75 music booster members, was sent to Russell A. Quick, chairman of the Nebraska Band Marching Festival. 'We are, of course, referring to the

we are, or course, reterring to me blatantly inappropriate marks pro-vided by Dr. [Lee] Mendyk," the let-ter to Quick read. The letter to Quick alleges that Dr. Mendyk used the forum "to be

vindictive."
In the letter, it alleges that "Dr. Mendyk used [abused] the Pershing competition to settle an old score with the community of Wayne. This apparently stems from an instance in 1973 when he was retrenched from Wayne State College after four years Winona State University in Winona, Minnesota, had some bitterness over this and several subsequent pro-blems that followed, it was alleged

by the music boosters.
The Wayne-Carroll Music Boosters wrote that they were "deeply disturbed with the results of this contest and do not accept the criticism of Dr. Mendyk."

THEY ALLEGED that the criticism of the high school band's performance was "not constructive, contradictory to comments made by other judges and at times, irrelevant and unsubstantiated."

Other judges in the contest, according to Weber, included Larry Mitchell, University of South Dakota band director; Guy Blair, high school band instructor from Pella, lowa; and Bill Van Devender, band instruct

and Bill Van Devender, band instruc tor at a high school in Oskaloosa,

lowa.
Weber, who during his first year at
Wayne State College had learned to
play percussion instruments under
Dr. Mendyk, said Tuesday that
judges other than Mendyk each gave marks placing the high school band in the middle to upper level of a divi-

in the middle to upper level of a divi-sion one rating.

The rating by Mendyk, Weber said, was a low division two rating — almost a three.

Mendyk, when contacted Wednes-

day morning at Winona State College, was asked if he carried any vindictiveness towards Wayne.
"Absolutely not. That is utterly ridiculous," Mendyk said. "I have no ax to grind with anybody in Wayne."
He hadn't returned to Nebraska since he left Wayne in 1973, he said.

MENDYK, WHO said judged music execution at the Per-shing event, said he wouldn't change his marks. "I called it as I heard it at the moment it was presented," he

When asked if he had provided con-structive criticism of the band's per-formance, he replied: "I thought I

"I just judged the music. I did not worry about the marching," he said. "Wayne-Carroll has a very fine band. They needed a sense of balance," Mendyk said.

"I thought they were an excellent band. I felt they just plain overblew,"

He said it was difficult to hear all the other instruments and that the sense of balance wasn't present. With the balance, the Wayne Carroll band could get a division one

anywhere, he said. "The percussion is good. But they were too strong, too exhuberant.

Many liquid nonprescription medicines such as cough and cold preparations contain ethyl alcohol. Although alcohol may be included to make some ingredients more soluble, this hidden solvent can lead to certain problems. For example, narcotic pain relievers, tranquilizers, antianxiety agents, or sedative-type sleep medicines, if taken while consuming alcohol or alcohol-containing medicines, may cause headaches, rapid heartbeat, or impaired mental judgement.
