Paper drive

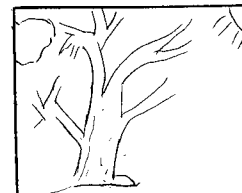
The Boy Scout paper drive in Wayne has been scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 3.

NE Nebraska to benefit from growth of WSC

A message on a Wayne State College brochure states the following: A dollar invested in Wayne State College is a dollar invested in Northeast Nebraska.

Such was the message expressed during an 'appreciation breakfast' Tuesday morning at the college, provided for area individuals and business representatives and sponsored by the Wayne State College Foundation.

The breakfast served as a way for the Foundation to express thanks for past support, and it also served as a kick-off for the Foundation's annual community business drive.

Contributions to the drive provide funding for scholarships, college programs, faculty incentives, endowment growth and operating money for the Wayne State College.

A goal set for the business fund drive has been established at \$15,000.

President of Wayne State College, Dr. Donald Mash, addressed the audience following Tuesday's appreciation breakfast.

THE WAYNE community has a big stake in the success of Wayne State College, Mash mentioned. However, he said the college is striving to "see

that the base of support for Wayne State College is broadened."

Broadening the base of support would result in the community having a smaller share of the burden, he said. However, he added that this factor should not diminish the importance of maintaining the level of contributions provided by the community and the surrounding area.

"Wayne State College is very important to northeast Nebraska — maybe even critical," he said.

"We're not just about education," he said. The college can act as a catalyst in "helping northeast Nebraska grow and thrive," he added.

Mash outlined several goals which he said "is simply what we need to be doing in terms of outcome at Wayne State College."

THOSE GOALS, he said, include the following: to projecting a more positive attitude about Wayne State College, building on trust and a sense of pride; to generate growth and movement and increase the level of support; to increase the college visibility in the region and in the state; to secure the resources needed

Mammography unit leased

Breast cancer

It's the most common cancer in white females over 40 years of age. About 750 new cases of breast cancer are diagnosed each year in Nebraska.

On a national average, it is estimated that one out of every 10 women will develop breast cancer.

What is the best way to reduce death from breast cancer and to get an effective cure? Early diagnosis.

Recently, Providence Medical Center in Wayne entered into a leasing arrangement involving the obtaining of a mammography screening unit. Now, instead of a mobile mammography unit visiting Providence Medical Center only twice a month, a mammography unit will be available to area residents five days a week.

"We found that the hospital was doing enough volume [of mammography exams] so we decided to lease our own unit," said Sister Kevin Hermesen, assistant administrator and radiology director at Providence Medical Center.

Sister Kevin and Nadine Bjorklund will be operating the mammography unit. "The mammograms will be read by certified radiologists," Sister Kevin said.

The mammography unit is located in the outpatient examination room — where the pharmacy at the hospital was previously located. The pharmacy has been relocated as part of the renovation project currently

underway at Providence Medical Center.

A great strength of mammography lies in its ability to detect cancer very early.

RADIATION danger from mammography is very low, according to information shared by Sister Kevin. In those over 50 years of age, there is proof that screening, including palpation and mammography, substantially reduces the mortality from breast cancer.

Because of "the older the woman, the greater her risk of developing breast cancer", periodic screening is advisable as part of a routine health exam. However, since the symptomatic woman of any age may have an underlying cancer, a complete breast examination, including mammography, should be performed.

HIGH RISK groups include women with a strong family history of breast cancer; patients who have already had breast cancer; women with an indication such as a nodule, pain; or other signs.

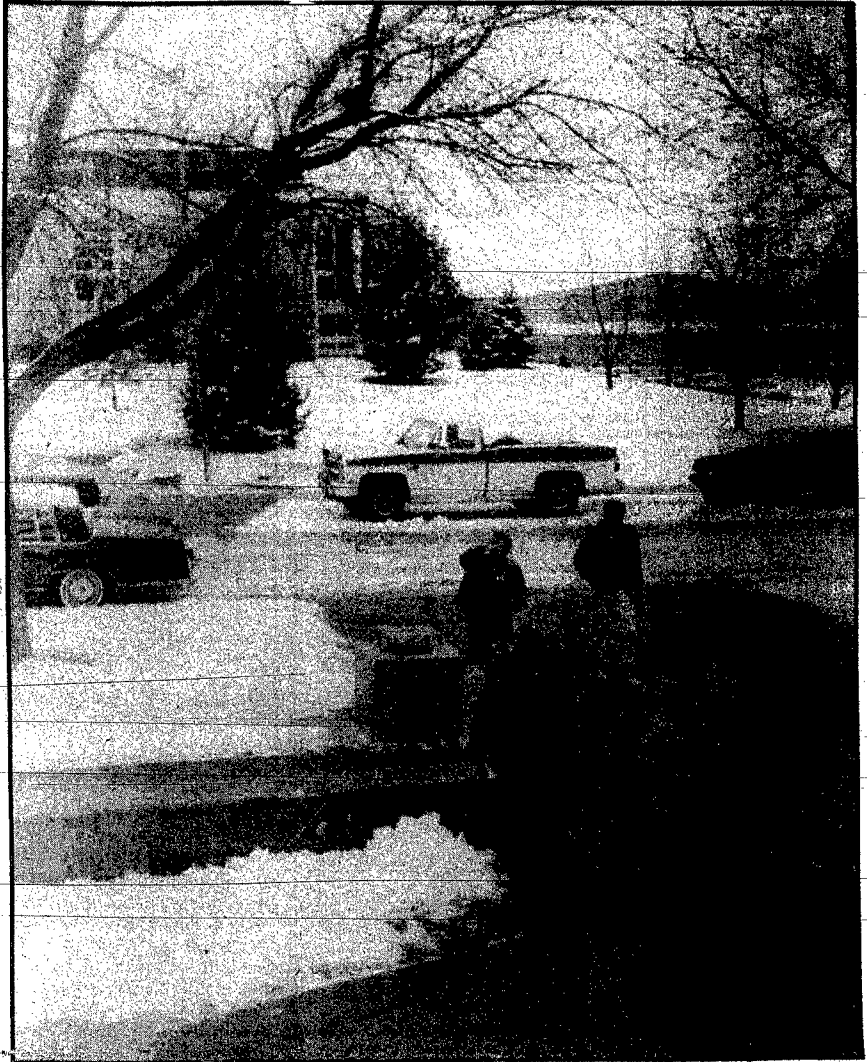
Mammography is a screening technique which can detect non-palpable cancers. Results by this technique has been two to four cases of breast cancer per thousand women screened, and an accuracy of 85-92 percent is reported.

"Mammography exams are simple and relatively painless," said Sister Kevin.

Trees 'star' in Fantasy Forest

For those people who enjoy the bright and colorful sights of Christmas, they won't want to miss the fourth annual Fantasy Forest at the Wayne City Auditorium.

The Christmas tree fantasy, sponsored by the Wayne State College Interior Design Club in cooperation with the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce, will open tonight (Thursday, Dec. 1) and it will continue until Dec. 4.

"And all those people who attend and view the trees will be able to vote for their favorite tree," Metz said. The contest winner will be decided based on how the public votes.

Hours of Fantasy Forest are Thursday from 6:30 p.m. to 9 p.m.; Friday, 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.; Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.; and Sunday from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

On the opening night (Thursday), events will include a welcome address from the Interior Design Club followed immediately at 7 p.m. by the lighting ceremony.

Also Thursday evening, music will be provided by the Wayne High School Swing Choir. Santa Claus will arrive on the scene at around 7:20 p.m.

OTHER EVENTS Thursday evening include a bake sale. Drawings will take place for Christmas tree decorations during the event.

The City of Wayne will be participating in the Fantasy Forest by supplying a mitten tree. People who have mittens or gloves which they would like to donate to needy individuals can bring them to Fantasy Forest and place them on or near the tree.

Those attending Fantasy Forest can also adopt a child in the Goldenrod Hills Toys for Tots Adoption Program.

Families or individuals can adopt one needy child, or more children if they so desire, at the Toys for Tots booth throughout the four days of Fantasy Forest. The adopting participants then buy the child or children Christmas gifts.

Misti Halsey, Goldenrod Hills human development worker in Wayne, said she will be assisted in the Fantasy Forest Toys for Tots Booth by senior scouts and two other volunteers.

High Blood Pressure Medicines

High blood pressure medicines work in a variety of ways. These medicines may:

Reduce the amount of blood pumped: Beta blockers protect the heart from nervous system stimulation, decreasing the amount of blood pumped out of the heart during each heartbeat. Commonly used beta blockers include *propranolol*, *nadolol*, and *metoprolol*. Enzyme inhibitor high blood pressure medicines such as *captopril* reduce the amount of blood pumped from the body back into the heart.

Dilate blood vessels: Several different types of high blood pressure medicines including the enzyme inhibitors, calcium channel blockers (*nifedipine* and *verapamil*) and direct acting vasodilators (*hydralazine* and *minoxidil*) lower blood pressure by causing certain blood vessels to dilate (become larger).

Inhibit nerve receptors in the brain: Blood pressure medicines which inhibit nerve receptors in the brain are called "central acting agents" to distinguish them from medicines that work directly on the heart or blood vessels. These potent medicines, which include *methyl dopa* and *clonidine*, are widely used to lower elevated blood pressure.

WSC Women lose contest

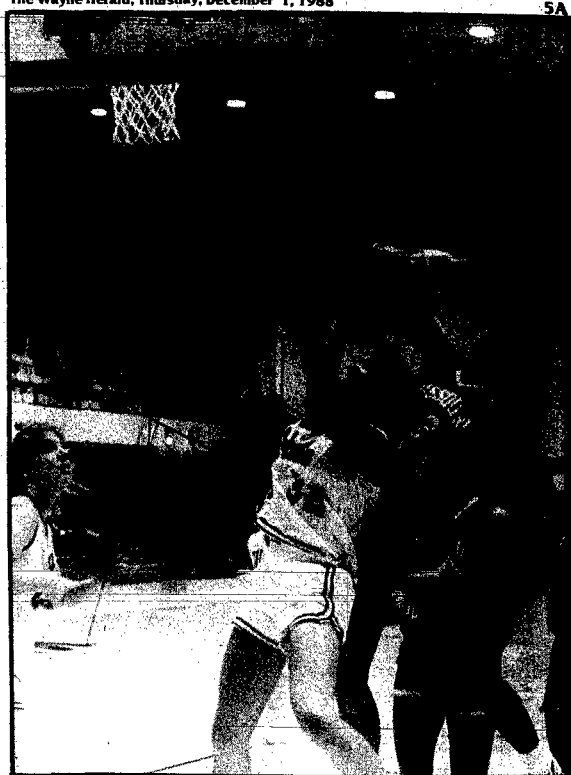
The Wayne State women's basketball squad entertained Missouri Western last Tuesday in what was the initial home contest for the Lady Wildcats.

WSC Women lose contest

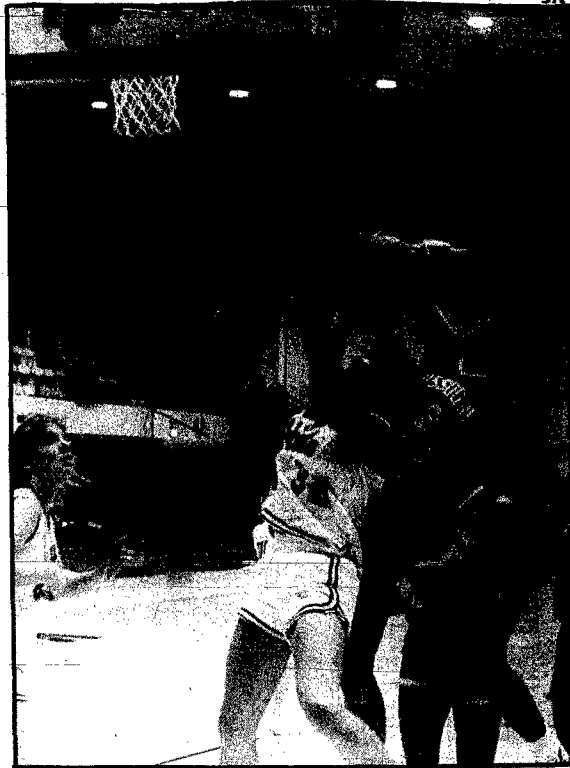
The Wayne State women's basketball squad entertained Missouri Western last Tuesday in what was the initial home contest for the Lady Wildcats.

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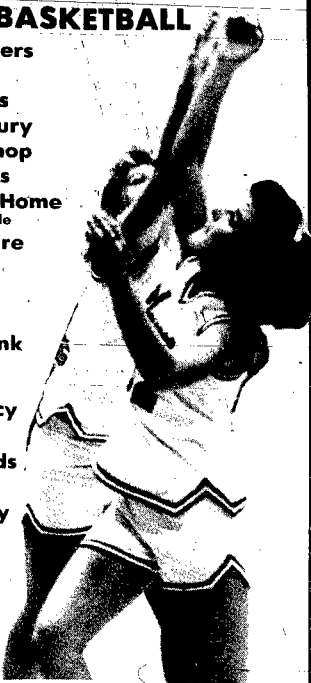

Schoning did note however, that the squad is working hard. "Experience wise, we're definitely a

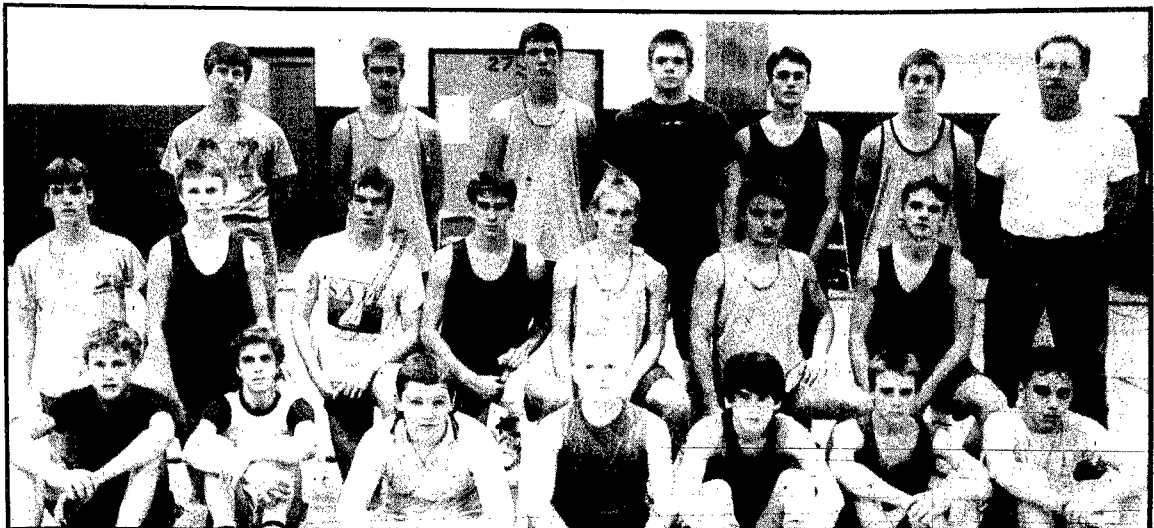
plus," Schoning said. "I don't plan on changing a whole lot in the offense so many of the girls know how to run the plays."

return to help aid Allen in their quest to get back on the winning track.

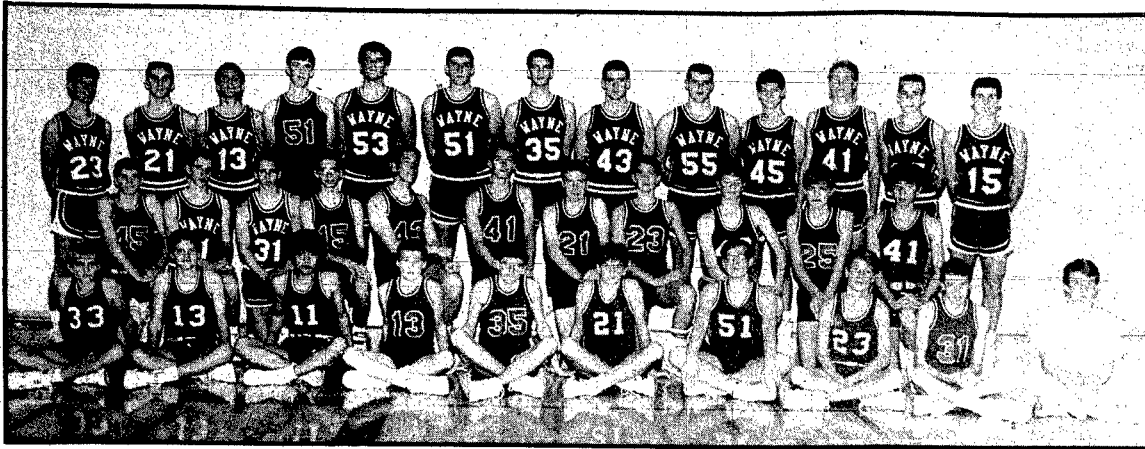
"I'll take some time to get together," Troth said. "The guys will have to get use to the coaching changes and what it is that I'm asking of them."

One thing Uhing noted that they are working hard on is making sure the kids take the open shot when they have it, and not to over pass.

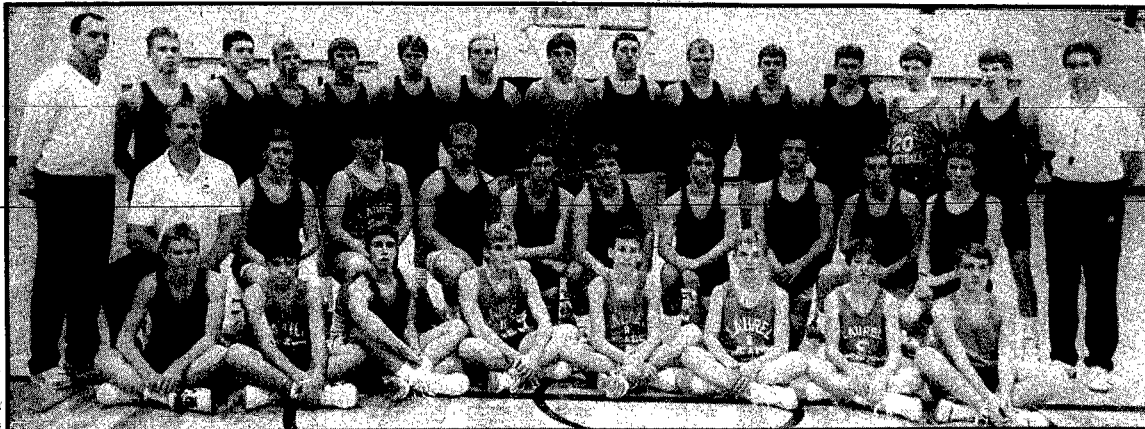
"This year we have changed our fast break, and I think we're running a lot better than we did last year," Uhing said. "We have our running game under control."

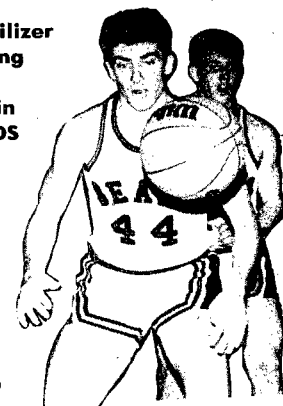

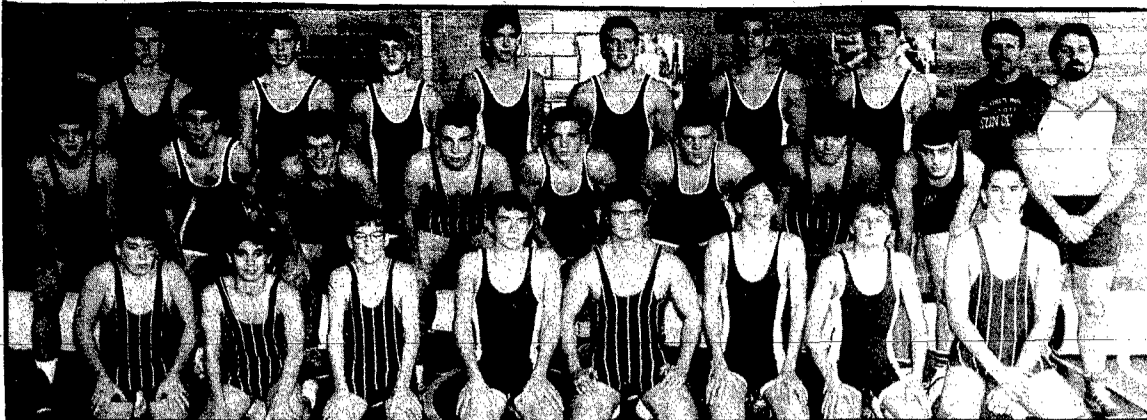
Winside Wrestling

Winside wrestling coach Paul Sok enters his eighth year at the helm of the Wildcats, and this year's team may be one of surprise. Sok's 11 total participants out for the sport which Winside is traditionally known for, includes no seniors, and only one junior. Seven sophomores and three freshman will try to pick up the slack. "Obviously we're very young," Sok said. "However, we should still be very competitive in the weight classes we fill, and I feel that we have a legitimate shot at sending at least as many to state as last year." Gone from last year's team is 130 lb. state champion Mace Kant, who now wrestles for the Air Force. But

returning to this year's team is 135 lb. runner up state medalist Max Kant, and Chad Carlson who placed fifth at state last year. For the first time in his four year reign as the Wayne wrestling coach, John Murtaugh returns 13 letterwinners from a year ago. "This is the most experience I've ever had coming back," Murtaugh said.

Wayne qualified four wrestlers for the state meet last year in Lincoln, after failing to qualify anyone the previous year. "Our goal this year is to at least equal last year's performance," Murtaugh said.

Murtaugh noted that the squad has tremendous work ethic in practice which carried over from last year's success. "We're getting tremendous leadership from our seniors right now," Murtaugh said. "We seem to

be senior-sophomore dominated on the team."

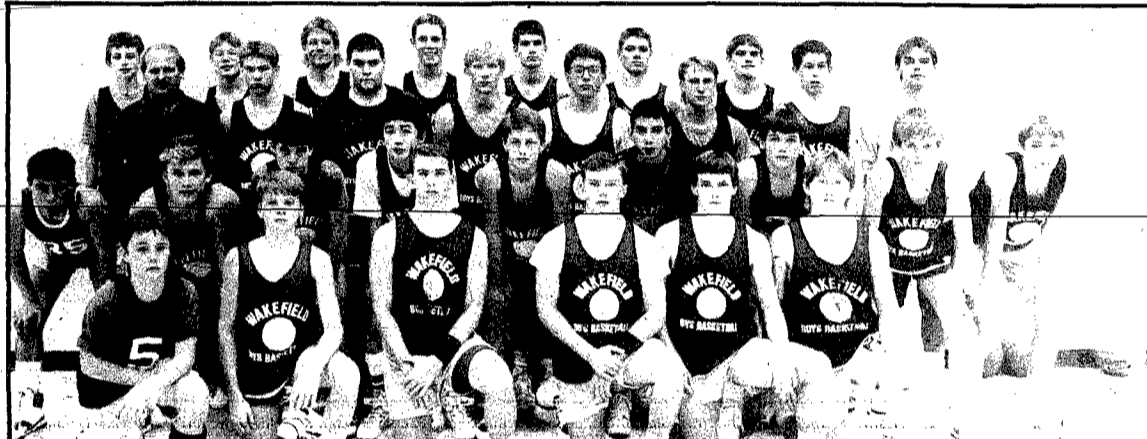

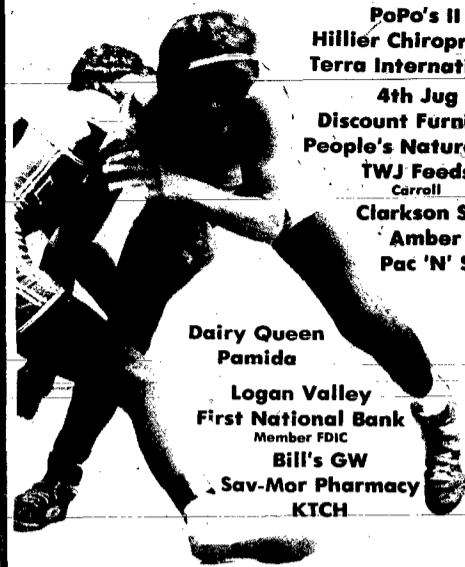
"There'll be some teams who will probably take us a little lightly," Studer said. "I do think however, that this particular group of girls feel that they will win some games."

Frederick 'Fritz' Witt

Frederick 'Fritz' Witt, 69, of Winside died Wednesday, Nov. 23, 1988 at his home in Winside.

Services were held Saturday, Nov. 26 at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Winside. The Rev. John A. Fale officiated.

Frederick Carl Witt, son of Fred and Emma Hoffman Witt, was born May 19, 1919 at Winside. He was baptized and confirmed at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Winside. He graduated from Winside High School in 1937. After high school, Fritz moved to Cincinnati, Ohio and worked for the Shaper Tool Company. He entered the service on May 15, 1944 and served in World War II until April 20, 1946. After the war, Fritz came back to Winside and operated Witt Welding. He married Bernice Wille on Feb. 12, 1950 at Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Norfolk. Fritz was a member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, American Legion Post No. 252, and had served on the Town Board and the Winside Volunteer Fire Department.

to move Wayne State College forward; and to attract good quality people to Wayne State.

Mash commented on the priorities of student development and regional development.

Prospective students "should know that Wayne State College is accessible and affordable and that we will support them," Mash said.

"We need to make sure we provide a quality experience for the students at Wayne State College," said Mash.

HE SAID Wayne State College represents a major resource in this rural region. "Visibility can be attained through actions such as the offering of extended campus or additional graduate courses."

Wayne State has established a Center for Cultural Outreach — to broaden the cultural activities of Wayne State College to the outlying areas of northeast Nebraska. The college is also in the process of establishing a Center for Community and Economic Development.

"Through this, the business community, local government and education establishments can work together for the development of the community in general," Mash said.

He mentioned some of the challenges ahead for Wayne State. "Resources are necessary to do what we want to be doing," he said.

ANOTHER challenge, in addition to resources, is to deal with attitude. Mash said the community needs

"to take advantage of Wayne State College."

"The community needs to exploit the presence of the college year in and year out. It should never waiver," he said.

The Foundation's community business drive begins now and runs through Jan. 15.

Other fund raising drives to finance the Foundation's annual fund include the President's Society, where individual and business contribution levels begin at \$500 and corporation and foundations at \$2,500; the Alumni Phonathon fund raiser in late January and during February (students and volunteer alumni and Foundation trustees call over 10,000 alumni each year asking for support); the Parents Phonathon; and the faculty/staff drive.

City parking rules for winter announced

Parking procedures in Wayne, during the winter months, are as follows:

— If it becomes necessary, the city will declare a "snow emergency" based on current weather conditions or a forecast by the area weather bureau. Five hours after the declaration has been announced, no car can be parked on any of the streets in Wayne. This will allow city crews to clean the streets the full width.

— Parking is prohibited automatically on any municipal street where there has been at least five inches of snow accumulation, for at least an hour or more, between 7 a.m. and 10 p.m. of any day.

— Members of the police department and public works department have been authorized to remove vehicles

from streets to the nearest garage or other places of safety when the vehicle violates the parking prohibition as stated in the written ordinance.

That policy also extends to stalled vehicles if there is no effort in removing it from the snow, sleet or ice-covered streets.

— Snow plow operators will not clear private drives. The snow that is placed in the driveways by the snow plows is the responsibility of the property owner to remove. Snow from a private driveway may not be placed on a city street.

— It is unlawful for property owners to allow snow, sleet, mud or ice to accumulate on any sidewalk abutting their lot. The sidewalks should be cleaned off within 24 hours after the storm.
