Scholarship

Milton and Mirni Waldbaum have announced the establishment of a scholarship program to benefit the children and grandchildren of employees of the Milton G. Waldbaum Company. In announcing the plan, Dr. Waldbaum expressed gratitude to the people of the area.

"We wanted to do something to recognize the contributions of the people who helped build the company," he said.

Four tuition grant scholarships to Wayne State College and two \$3,000 scholarships to the University of Nebraska, Lincoln or Omaha will be awarded annually.

Parents or grandparents of the applicant must have been employed by the Milton G. Waldbaum Company for a continuous period of two years during the years 1950-1988. Applicants must be students in good standing, pursuing a degree program and enrolled for nine hours in one of the institutions.

The first scholarships will be awarded for the 1989-1990 school year. Interested students should apply at the institution of their choice.

Fire call

Open hours Mondays through Fridays beginning Monday, Dec. 19 are 12-8 p.m.

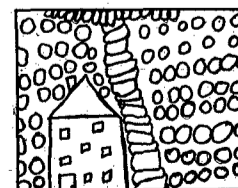

Hollywood comes to Wayne

Hollywood has come to Wayne. At least in poster form.

A Hollywood poster exhibited titled "Reynold Brown/Movie Illustrator" — depicting the artist's movie posters from the 1940's to the 1960's — will be on display until Jan. 5 at the Great Plains Room of the U.S. Conn Library at Wayne State College.

The exhibit is being sponsored by Wayne State's newly established Center for Cultural Outreach, a center established to bring cultural enrichment to the Northeast Nebraska region.

Brown, America's best known and most distinguished movie poster artist, was born in 1917 in Los Angeles, California. The 71-year-old illustrator is currently residing outside of Winney, Nebraska — painting Nebraska landscapes.

On the walls of Conn Library spans Brown's works for movies of all types — science fiction (monsters) movies, cowboy movies, war movies and more.

During his career as an illustrator, he worked in New York and Los Angeles on a number of significant projects including the comic strip "Tall Spin Tommy", aircraft design for North American Aviation during

World War II, magazine illustrations and the first pocketbook cover illustrations.

In 1951, he joined the faculty of the Art Center School of Design in Los Angeles, where he taught for 26 years. He later met the Art Director for Universal Studios, who asked him if he would like to work on a poster for a movie "The World In His Arms."

Over the course of 20 years, Brown worked on campaigns for about 275 movies and his work was used on billboards and in magazine and newspaper ads.

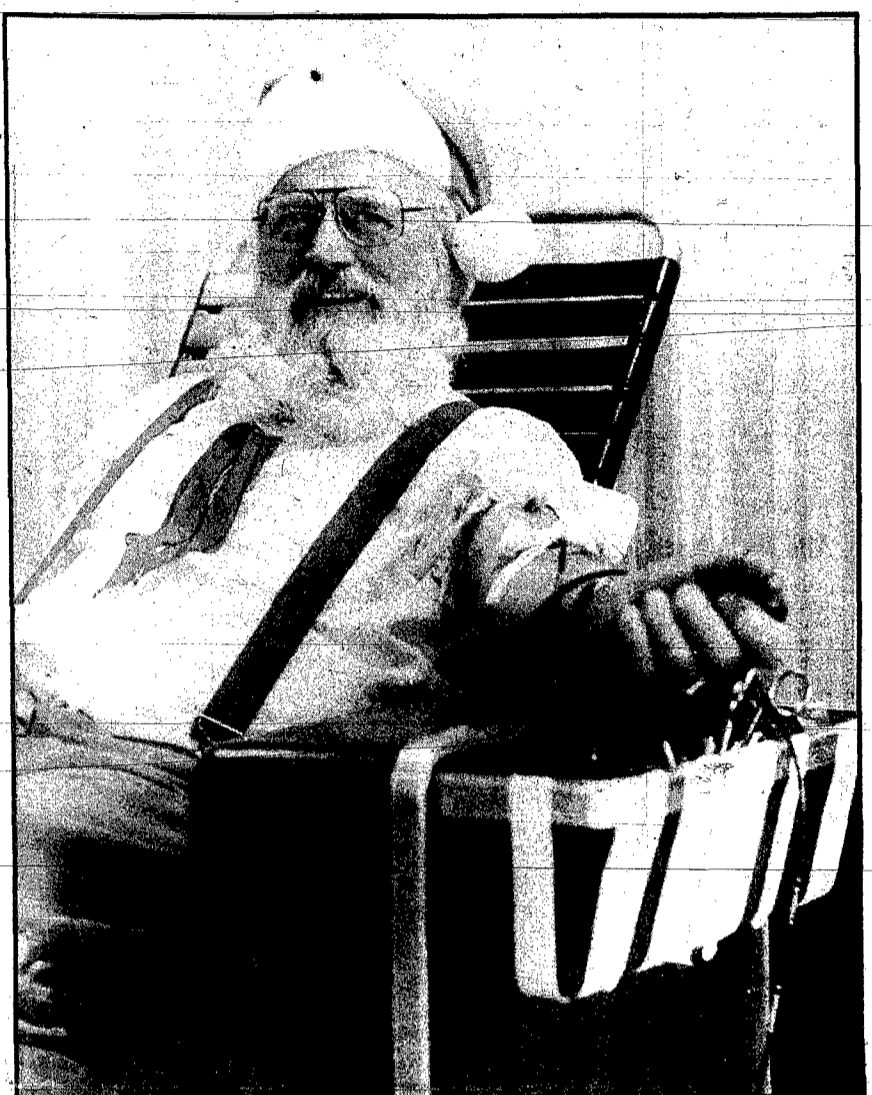
Brown left the poster work in the late 1960's to participate in the western art market. He produced about 400 works in the next six years — popular among collectors.

Then in 1976, Brown suffered a stroke that paralyzed his left side. He normally painted using his left side. Mary Louise, his wife and also an artist, aided in retraining Brown to continue his artwork by using his right hand.

Brown continues to paint today. His son, Franz, is a free-lance photographer and illustrator who works to keep his father's art collection available to the public through exhibits, shows and articles.

City audit reviewed by council

All in all, the annual city audit by Peat Marwick Main and Co. of Lincoln indicates that the city's financial statements provide a fair presentation of the financial condition of the city of Wayne.

Mark Nelson, from the auditing company of Peat Marwick Main and Co., presented the annual audit to the Wayne City Council Tuesday evening — adding that the principal responsibility of the auditor is "to express opinions on the city's financial statements."

He made several suggestions in the areas of accounting methods for revenues and receivables, particularly in what the city currently labels the special assessment funds.

THREE NEW funds should be established in place of the special assessment fund item, he said.

Those funds include a debt service fund (for the servicing of special assessment debts); a capital project fund (to account for all capital expenditures the city undertakes); and a long term debt group of accounts (to keep track of the total amount of long term debts).

Some future plans by the city personnel, Nelson said, are to split the present "water and sewer fund" into two different funds — one for water and another for sewer.

"This way, we can see more readily if the charges are covering the cost of the water department, or if the sewer charges are covering the cost of the sewage department," Nelson said.

"This gives you a clearer picture of

whether the rates are too high or too low. It is hard to tell with two operations within one fund," he added.

FUTURE PLANS are also to split out, into a separate fund, the landfill operation, he said. "This way, the city can see if they are charging an appropriate fee for these services," Nelson said.

One area not covered in the audit report falls into the city's fixed asset account. Data still has to be updated on the fixed assets before an accurate audit can be made, according to Nelson.

A reason why the fixed assets compilation project has not been completed, Nelson said, is because there hasn't been "personnel available to do the research or dating through the old files."

"The present city staff has more than enough to do with the daily activities. My observation is that you are running a lean staff right now," Nelson said.

"Through my experience working with city personnel, based on the staff level, everyone is doing an excellent job," he said. "The people you have on board here are doing a very good job keeping things in order."

IN OTHER action, the Wayne City Council:

— Approved an ordinance dealing with revisions for compliance with the Open Meeting Law.

In the past, visitors attending council meetings could discuss before the city council topics other than what was listed officially on the agenda. The council could take no action on the topic, however, unless it became

an agenda item. Now, if anyone plans to make a presentation to the city council, the individual or group's topic must be placed on the agenda for the upcoming council meeting.

The city council meets on the second and last Tuesday of each month, with the exception of December, when they will meet on the second and third Tuesday.

To be placed on the agenda, contact the city clerk on the Friday morning prior to the following week's council meeting.

— Approved an ordinance establishing a new handicapped parking location at Third and Pearl Streets (in a spot located just west of Jones Intercable).

— Opened three bids on equipment and materials for the upcoming electrical improvement project. Currently, there exists an unbalanced voltage with the northwest section of Wayne and other areas. These areas will be converted to provide a higher voltage service.

Bids were received from the Duffton-Lainson Company of Hastings; Chris Davis Company from Fremont; and Westinghouse Electric Supply Company from Sioux City.

The bids were relayed to the engineers of the project, DeWild Grant Reckert & Associates of Rock Rapids, Iowa, for further analysis and a recommendation to the city council at a later meeting. — Approved a resolution accepting the street improvement district 85-2 (Providence Road), confirming the ordering of plats and schedules of special assessments.

state competition. "It was close between second and third place," said Winside High Drama Coach Penny Balor. "We tied for second in the ranking part of the judging, so they counted total points to break the tie."

The team finishing second was Stapleton, which received one first place and two third place votes. Winside received two second place and one third place vote. Potter-Dix High

School captured first place in the state competition with two first place votes and a second place vote.

Give a gift that shows you care

Are you still looking for a gift to give a friend or family member? Last minute gift buying can be frustrating. Why not give the gift of safety and protection — a fire extinguisher.

Many homes today have potential fire sources but are not adequately protected. Space heaters, wood stoves, fireplaces and the use of candles in home decor increase chances of a home fire.

Fires that are likely to occur in the home fall into three classifications:

- Class A — fires that are fueled by wood, paper, fabric or other combustible solids.
- Class B — fires that include flammable liquids, such as gasoline, grease, oil and solvents.
- Class C — fires involving electrical equipment.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS are labeled according to the type of fire they will extinguish. Many fire extinguishers sold for the home are a dry-chemical that are effective on all three types of fires. Other types are also sold that may be effective for one or two classes of fires.

Read information on the package carefully to insure that the fire extinguisher you buy is approved for the conditions where it may be used.

For more information about selecting a fire extinguisher ask your local extension office about the NebGuide "Know Your Fire Extinguisher" G78-399.

The suggested practice is to have a minimum of one fire extinguisher on each floor of your home. You may also want an extinguisher in the garage, home workshop, kitchen and by a wood stove.

ANOTHER GOOD GIFT idea is to give family members a smoke alarm if their house is not equipped with them. Smoke alarms need to be located on each floor of the home.

Contact your local fire department about selecting the best smoke alarm for your needs.

Either a fire extinguisher or a smoke alarm can be the gift that shows you care year round, not just during the holidays.

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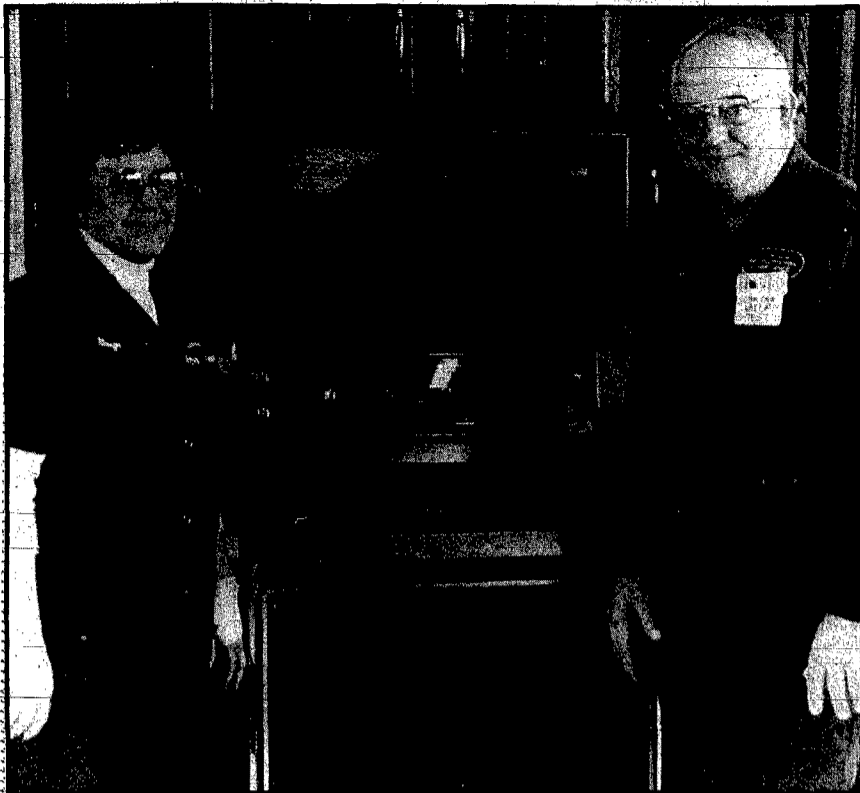

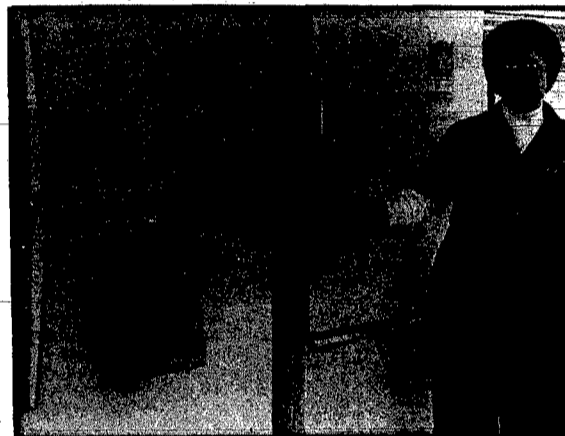

Wayne splits games at Wisner

The Wayne Blue Devils boys and girls teams traveled to Wisner Friday night to take on the gators.

The girls came away with an easy 49-24 victory in a game which saw everyone on the bench see playing time. Unfortunately, Marlene Uhing was unavailable at press time for statistics and comments. Wednesday's paper however will have a thorough account of Wayne's victory.

The boys team ran head on into an undefeated Wisner team led by 6-8 junior Mike Kloth and point guard Jerry Rabe.

Wayne got off to a very slow start and soon found themselves down by 13 points at 10:5. That's when poise took over for the Blue Devils for the rest of the first half. Wayne came back to outscore Wisner 21-8 to knot the game at 26 at intermission.

The Blue Devils however, faced another dry spell at the beginning of the third quarter. Again they found themselves down by nine points late in the third quarter.

This time unfortunately, the lead was too much to overcome, as Wayne dropped a 59-56 decision, which dropped its record to 1-3.

With seven seconds left on the clock Wisner-Pilger missed the front end of a one-and-one opportunity and Wayne had a chance to tie the game. Wayne, without any timeouts remaining tried to get the ball into 3-point specialist Rob Sweetland's hands, failed to get a shot off.

"Those two spurts in the first and third quarters is what lost the game for us," head coach Bob Uhing said. "Our kids played a lot better though and showed some emotion, which is what we need to be a better ball club."

Uhing noted that his squad didn't stand around as much as they did at Schuyler. "Moving without the ball is the key," Uhing said. "Playing intense ball with emotion is what we need to continue to improve on."

Jarrold Wood led the Blue Devils with 16 points and six rebounds. "Jarrod had a good game on both ends of the floor," Uhing said. Rob Sweetland followed 12 points including two 3-pointers.

Doug Larsen added nine while Neil Carnes and Willy Gross netted six each. Jess Zeiss recorded five points and Jed Reeg, two.

Coleridge guards Mike Schnoor and John Heithold combined for 51 points Friday night as Coleridge blasted Winside 77-54. Schnoor, a point guard had 27 points including five 3-pointers while Heithold had a pair of long range bombs enroute to his 24 points.

Winside's record falls to 2-2 while Coleridge remains undefeated on the season.

Girls lose big

Just as the boys dropped their season record to 2-2, the Winside girls did likewise. The Lady Wildcats didn't seem to show up for their home contest with Coleridge until the third quarter.

Winside trailed 31-15 at intermission before outscoring the visitors 13-5 in the third quarter. However, in the fourth quarter Coleridge came on strong and outgunned Winside 21-10 to account for a 57-38 victory margin.

"Coleridge has a very good team," head coach Paul Giesselmann said. "But we did a good job of beating ourselves as well as they did."

Giesselmann said that turnovers and rebounding haunted his team into losing its second consecutive game. "Coleridge outrebounded us 47-32," Giesselmann said. "The bad thing is out of their 47 rebounds, 20 were offensive rebounds, which meant they got a lot of second chance points."

As far as turnovers go, Winside suffered 21, one less than Coleridge's 22. "We only played one good quarter," Giesselmann said. "And that was the third quarter."

Kristy Miller had an outstanding offensive night with 27 points. Tinia Hartmann followed with six while Christina Bloomfield and Jenny Topp each had two. Lisa Janke finished out the scoring with one point.

Topp led the rebounders with eight to her credit while Kristy Miller and Lisa Janke each hauled down five.

"They pressed us but that wasn't the key," Giesselmann said. "We just plain couldn't get the ball to go in the hole."

Giesselmann did note that a bright spot came from Doree Brogren, who came off the bench to supply Winside with some good solid defense.

Trojans win

Paul Eaton's Wakefield Trojans raced to a 22-13 lead in the first quarter of Friday night's home contest with Hartington, and from there, they never looked back enroute to their third consecutive convincing victory, 85-37.

The 3-1 Trojans had 11 players get into the scoring column in a complete team oriented victory. "We played pretty well," head coach Paul Eaton said. "Hartington seemed to lose a little confidence when they got down early and from there it compounded."

Eaton's Trojans used an aggressive man-to-man press which caused some Hartington turnovers, thus converted into easy points for the Trojans.

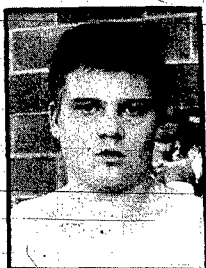

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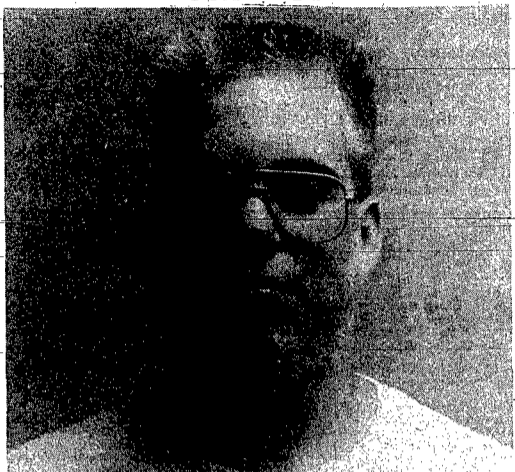

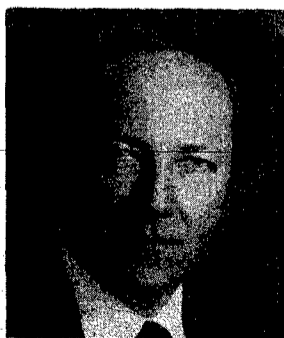
