

The exhibit is being sponsored by Wayne State's newly established Center for Cultural Outreach, a center established to bring cultural enrichment to the Northeast Nebraska region.

Brown, America's best known and

Brown, America's best known and Brown, America's best known and most distinquished movie poster artist, was born in 1917 in Los Angeles, California. The 71-year-old il-lustrator is currently residing outside of Witney, Nebraska — painting Nebraska landscapes.

On the walls of Conn Library spans


Brown's works for movies of all types

During his career as an illustrator he worked in New York and Los Angeles on a number of significant projects including the comic strip "Tall Spin Tommy", aircraft design for North American Aviation during World War II, magazine illustrations and the first pocketbook cover it-

and the first pocketbook cover il-lustrations.
In 1951, he joined the faculty of the Art Center School of Design in Los Angeles, where he taught for 26 years. He later met the Art Director for Universal Studios, who asked him if he would like to work on a poster for a movie "The World In His Arms."

Over the course of 20 years, Brown worked on campaigns for about 275 movies and his work was used on billboards and in magazine and newspaper ads.

City audit reviewed by council

All in all, the annual city audit by
Peat Marwick Main and Co. of Lincoin indicates that the city's financial statements provide a fair presenta-tion of the financial condition of the

tion of the financial condition of the city of Wayne. Mark Nelson, from the auditing company of Peat Marwick Main and Co., presented the annual audit to the Wayne City Council Tuesday evening — adding that the principal responsibility of the auditor is "to express opinions on the city's financial statements."

He made several suggestions in the areas of accounting methods for revenues and receivables, par-ticularly in what the city currently labels the special assessment funds.

THREE NEW funds should be

established in place of the special assessment fund Item, he said.

Those funds include a debt service fund (for the servicing of special, assessment debts); a capital project fund (to account for all capital expensions). ditures the city undertakes); and a long term debt group of accounts (to keep track of the total amount of long

Some future plans by the city per-sonnel, Nelson said, are to split the two different funds - one for water

two different funds — one for water and another for sewer. "This way, we can see more readi-ly if the charges are covering the cost of the water department; or if the sewer charges are covering the cost of the sewage department," Nelson

'This gives you a clearer picture of

whether the rates are too high or too low. It is hard to tell with two opera-tions within one fund," he added.

FUTURE PLANS are also to split out, into a separate fund, the landfill operation, he said. "This way, the ci-ty can see if they are charging an ap-propriate fee for these services," Nelson said.

Nelson said.

One area not covered in the audit report falls into the city's fixed asset account. Data still has to be updated on the fixed assets before an accurate audit can be made, according to Nelson.

A reason why the fixed assets compilation project has not been com-pleted, Nelson said, is because there hasn't been "personnel available to do the research or dating through the old files."

"The present city staff has more than enough to do with the daily activities. My observation is that you are running a lean staff right now," Nelson said.

Nelson said.
"Through my experience working with city personnel, based on the staff level, everyone is dong an excellent job," he said: "The people you have on board here are doing a very good job keeping things in order."

minute gift buying can be frustrating. Why not give the gift of safety and pro-a fire extinguisher.

Many homes today have potential fire sources but are not adequately pro-tected. Space heaters, wood stoves, fireplaces and the use of candles in home decor increase chances of a home fire.

Fires that are likely to occur in the home fall into three classifications Class A — fires that are fueled by wood, paper, fabric or other combustible

Class B — fires that include flammable liquids, such as gasoline, grease, oils nd solvents.
Class C — fires involving electrical equipment

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS are labeled according to the type of fire they will extinguish. Many fire extinguishers sold for the home are a dry-chemical that are effective on all three types of fires. Other types are also sold that may be effective for one or two classes of fires.

Read information on the package carefully to insure that the fire extinguisher you buy is approved for the conditions where it may be used. For more information about selecting a fire extinguisher ask your local extension office about the NebGuide "Know Your Fire Extinguisher" G78-399.

The suggested practice is to have a minimum of one fire extinguisher on each floor of your home. You may also want an extinguisher in the garage, home workshop, kitchen and by a wood stove.

ANOTHER GOOD GIFT idea is to give family members a smoke alarm if their house is not equipped with them. Smoke alarms need to be located on each floor of the home.

Either a fire extinguisher or a smoke alarm can be the gift that shows you care year round, not just during the holidays.

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
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TERESA ELLIS eyes an opening toward the basket in action against Wisner-Pilger Friday night. Wayne won easily, 49-24.



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
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LENRD Purchases Land Adjoining Maskenthine Lake

By a vote of 10 to 4, the Board of Directors of the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District approved the acquisition of 160 acres in Stanton County. This action was taken during the regular monthly meeting, held in Wakefield, November 22, 1988.

The land, which is located just north of the Maskenthine Lake, will provide protection from sedimentation of the lake, and expand recreation areas. By authority granted to NRDs through Nebraska Statutes, Section 2-3229, this land can be used for erosion prevention and control; prevention of flood damage and sediment; development and management of fish and wildlife habit, and development and management of recreational facilities.

Stan Staab, General Manager, reported that of the 160 acres, 122 acres are currently enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program with eight years remaining on the contract. The District will receive the annual CRP payments of \$8540.00 and apply them towards the \$96,000.00 purchase price. Possession of the land will take place March

In other action, the Board approved public hearing procedure for establishment of an Improvement Project Area in the counties of Burt. Washington, and Dodge. This process will allow the District to establish the Logan East Water District. According to Dick Seymour, Assistant Manager, the District will now conduct a public hearing for interested parties which will give the public an opportunity to express their need for a water system. Notices of the hearing will be published in local papers when a hearing date is selected.

The next regular board meeting will be held December 22, 1988, in Norfolk.

LENRD Approves Wildlife Habitat Improvement Program


Preservation of wildlife enhances the lives of all and has a place in every conservation plan. However, due to the trend of fence-to-fence farming within the Lower Elkhorn NRD much of our wildlife habitat has been destroyed. With that in mind, the Directors of the LENRD approved a new "Wildlife Habitat Improvement Program" (WHIP).

Under this program, landowners willreceive payment for setting aside and/or improving areas for wildlife habitat. Contracts running from 1 to 10 years will be approved to establish food plots, tree plant-ings, as well as, grass plantings. In addition,

there are practices that can be established on land enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program.

"WHIP" is a cooperative program with the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, the Soil Conservation Service, and the Lower Elkhorn NRD.

Interested landowners may submit a habitat plan at their local Soil Conservation Service Office during the months of January through March. Brochures explaining the program are available by contacting the Lower Elkhorn NRD, P.O. Box 1204, Norfolk, or by-calling 371-7313.

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
