Janssen said the suspects have been contacted and the department is continuing in-



# Allen home destroyed by fire

fire Wednesday completely destroyed the home of Allen residents Lee and Audrey Harder. Also destroyed in the blaze, which was reported around 10:30 a.m., were all of the contents of the home located along Highway 9 three houses porth of the First I uther an Church. north of the First Lutheran Church.

Lee Harder, who was outside work ing on his son Tyler's car, said he noticed smoke when he went to enter the house and immediately ran to a neighbor's to notify the Allen Fire Department.

Assisting Allen firemen were members of the Martinsburg Fire Department. Firemen remained on the scene until approximately 10 p.m. Wednesday night.

ALTHOUGH NO dollar estimate was available yet Friday morning, Harders said they lost all of their possessions, except some jewelery and a few pictures.

Harders had resided in the hous approximately six and a half remodeling the structure within the past week. Both are employed at the Milton G. Waldbaum Co. in

According to the State Fire Mar shal, Wednesday's fire is believed to have started from a kerosene heater.

"WE'RE JUST SO thankful that no "WE'RE JUST SO thankful that no one was hurt," said Audrey, adding that Lee works part-time at night at the Milton G. Waldbaum Co. and would normally have been sleeping at the time the fire broke out.

Instead, Lee was outside working on his son Tyler's car which wouldn't start. Tyler is a senior at Allen High

In addition to Tyler, Harders are the parents of another son, Troy, who is married and resides in Wayne. A daughter, Tiffanny, is a sophomore at the University of Nebraska-

Harders, who are temporarily staying in Wayne with their son Troy and daughter-in-law Shelly, said they are planning to move into a house located two miles east of Allen until

they decide what to do.
"'We'll rebuild," said Lee

"We won't know the effects of the workshops until later," said Gary Van Meter, owner of Mines Jewelers. "I think that the best thing about it is the perspective that the workshop of-

fers."
"Most of us chose to be in a small town for a reason. We strive to make our stores different. In this new marketing age of retailing, smaller stores can make a difference," Van Meter said

The workshop, he said, helps in-dividuals understand differences that personal service and customer satisfaction can make.

# ESU raises funding level

After nearly four years, the board of directors of Educational Service Unit One has voted to raise the level of funding for nursing services provided to schools served in the unit's

vided to schools served in the unit's six-county area.

Meeting last Tuesday night in Wakefield, board members voted unanimously to increase the level of funding by \$7,500 — from \$205,000 (set in 1985-86) to \$212,500.

"The problem is that next year

there are an awful lot of undetermined costs," said ESU 1 Administrator Rodney Garwood, adding that the unit's advisory committee (comprised of area school superintendents) has studied, restudied and examined

Garwood said although the unit underspent the \$205,000 lid by about \$9,000 in 1987-88, it appears there could be a shortfall of about \$8,200 in 1988-89. Garwood added that the advisory

THE PURPOSE is also to confinue educating and informing the individuals distributing the packets on the prevention, detection and reporting of child abuse and neglect.

Inside the packet are: information Inside the packet are: information pertaining to activities that parents and children can do together; facts on child abuse; brochures on parent tips and children's needs; a special magnet that says "Have You Hugged Your Kid Today"; and pencils donated by area businesses.

These packets will be distributed to

These packets will be distributed to all schools, grades K-6. Kindergarten through third grade will have an additional page to color — designed to let the child, through the act of color ing, depict their family structure and

a family activity.
In the packet for grades 4-6 will be a Spiderman and Power Pack comic book — produced in cooperation with the National Committee for Preven-tion of Child Abuse and The Marvel comic book company.

LETTERS HAVE been sent to elementary principals explaining the materials. Instructions are available to teachers on how to handle and answer questions asked by the answer questions asked by

feed and were presented an update on the company's future by Harvey ranger, Jr., president of Great lane Trailers, Inc. and Ken Mendel,

Dane Trailers, Inc. and Kell Mendel, manager of the Wayne plant. The actual reason for the celebra-tion, Mendel said, is to celebrate the

beginning of the 5,000th refrigerated trailer unit to be built at the Wayne plant. It is a drop frame tram that is being built for IBP in Dakota City.

signt as to now the Wayne moustry is progressing. , "We're very, very pleased with the progress so far at the Wayne plant," said Granger. Great Dane purchased the Timpte

Polypropylene carpeting now popular

Nylon has been the primary residential fiber in carpet since the late 1950's. 
The recent 'stain wars' launched by nylon fiber producers has prompted the producers of polypropylene to have a voice and share in the stain-proof fiber market.

Polypropylene is relatively new to the residential market. Also known as polypropylene olefin, this fiber has almost complete dominance in the outdoor carpet market and has been successful in commercial carpets as well.

Colorfactness and stain resistance are two advantages of polypropylene

Colorfastness and stain resistance are two advantages of polypropylene carpets. The color is usually built-in. Since the color is throughout the fiber it has good resistance to chemicals. The fiber is also resistant to water or hydrophobic, and thus resists water-borne stains. However, grease and oil will stain polypropylene olefin and very hot products dropped onto the carpet may melt the fiber.

A MINOR DISADVANTAGE is that the fiber can not be dyed, without considerable expense, after it has been tutted. This limits to some degree the color flexibility and color choices, yet provides colors and patterns not available in

A disadvantage of polypropylene is that it is less resilient than nylon. Imoper construction will result in crushing and a shorter life span. Loop constructions provide adequate resilience, however, cut pile constructions are weaker. To overcome the lower resilience of cut pile constructions the fiber producers require that the carpets must have a certain weight density factor To meet this requirement and to assure quality, more yarn must be used.

WHEN SELECTING carpets consider looped construction for better resistance and the stain resistance of polypropylene olefin carpets. When selecting a stain-resistant carpet of nylon, polypropylene or polyester, read the labels for information concerning the resistance to certain stains, cleaning instructions, warranties for stains, fading, antistatic, and the color(s) and construction of the carpet.

### LENRD Elects **New Officers**

During the regular Board meeting, held January 26, 1989, at Wayne State College, the Directors of the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District elected officers for 1989.

The slate of officers includes Wendell Newcomb of Norfolk, as Chairman; Alvin Sundell of Wakefield, as Vice-Chairman; Lloyd Nellor of Beemer, as Secretary; and Glen Olson of Wayne, as Treasurer.
