Teens prefer more communication

A six member panel, moderated by Jack Thiesen, counselor for the Christ Lutheran Church in Norfolk, gave views and concerns of both teenagers and parents during a Tuesday evening discussion at the Winside Elementary School library.

Teenage panel members in-cluded junior Shannon Bargstadt, sophomore Kim Cherry and senior Darren Wacker, students at Win-side High School; and Richard Behmer, Rose Janke and Pastor John Fale.

Opening statements were made by the three teenagers regarding results of a survey distributed recently to students in grades 9-12 on concerns of curfew, dating, lifestyles, support from parents and communication.

Joan Jensen, vice president-elect of the Winside Advisory Council, issued a challenge to all parents present to just "listen" to what the kids are source. what the kids are saying. There were approximately 36 guests attending the event.

THE CONSENSUS of all three teenage panel members was that "communication" was the most important topic.

"Parents have an advantage kids don't have. The parent has been both. With the oldest kid, parents are often feeling in the dark, not knowing what to do or not to do in situations," said Fale.

"Things that are scary for the kids in this world are also scary for the parents. It's tough for a control."

the parents. It's tough for a parent to sit back and watch your kids

make their own decisions, especially when you feel they are wrong," Fale mentioned.

"Communication is the most important issue because if you have this with your kids, everything else seems to fall into place most of the time," said Behmer.

MODERATOR Jack Thiesen, who is also a certified family life educator with the National Council of Family Relations, said: "In a fam-ily with four children, none of the children have the 'same parents' as the parents are also growing in their knowledge and experience with each child."

Wacker said all parents should give reasons for saying "no" and not say "just because I say so."

"If they are afraid for the kids, tell them this. Lots of times parents just disregard the teenagers feelings," Wacker mentioned.
"Don't be doing something else [like peeling potatoes] when your child is trying to talk to you. Look them in the eyes and listen to what they are saying," said Cherry. "And we as teenagers should be expected to do the same thing."
"An important point to remem-

"An important point to remem-ber — if a parent is too busy at the time the child wants to talk, set up a time to do it later. Don't just let the discussion drop," Fale re-

THIESEN SAID it is important to work with kids on communication when they are young, and not wait until they are teenagers.

"Many times the more you absolutely forbid a child to do some-thing, they will rebel and do it

The Savidge name is associated with the Savidge Amusement Company — a company based in Wayne that toured throughout the country for 35 years before falling prey to the nation's Great Depression.

HER TALENT was not limited to

keeping the Savidge Amusement Company books and keeping tabs on the operation of the amusement businesses. Her music livened

the atmosphere at the shows.

As a young girl, Mabel attended country school and then went on to the Nebraska Normal College in Wayne. She studied piano. Later she attended the England Conser-vatory of Music in Boston.

1911 she married Walter avidge, a tightrope walker that ne became "enchanted with" when she spotted him walking a tightrope between two buildings at the Wayne County Fair. Savidge Amusement Company grew to become the largest of its kind in the United States.

Interiors fit for any age

We take the time to be fitted for a suit or dress — but do we take the time to be fitted for a suit or dress — but do we take the time to be fitted for our furniture? In addition to fitting furniture to our body size, comfort, function, safety and convenience are important features when buying furniture.

These are features most of us want. But, they take on increasing im-

portance for us as we grow older.

The needs of the elderly are diverse. Aging may bring about some physical changes which need to be considered in selecting furnishings for our environment. For example, studies indicate that a decrease in height may occur, and our upward reach may be reduced.

LESS PHYSICAL space may be present or required in our homes.

LESS PHYSICAL space may be present or required in our homes. Furniture that is smaller in scale and dual-purpose may be more functional. Light-weight furniture creates a feeling of more space, and is easier to move. However, it should still be sturdy and safe.

Furniture that is sturdy may be used for support in walking by some individuals. Items easily tipped, such as some types of pedestal tables, should be avoided if the individual puts weight on the edge when sitting down or rising. Easily moved furniture for cleaning may be needed. If an item has casters, brakes are suggested.

Comfortable chairs that are easy to get in and out of are essential. Chairs with low drop seats should be avoided. The height of the seat should allow the feet to rest comfortably without causing pressure behind the knees, which cuts off circulation.

The chair should allow the feet to be placed under the body for leverage in rising. The depth of the seat is also important in getting in and out of the chair.

Chairs with arms are a good choice because they offer support when

Chairs with arms are a good choice because they offer support when rising and sitting. Chair arms that come to the front of the seat, and are wide enough to rest the arms comfortably are suggested. When your arm is at your side, the chair arm should fit comfortably under your forearm without causing you to lean over or hunch up your shoulders.

SOME INDIVIDUALS may need increased levels of light two or three times as much as normal to see adequately. Well-planned

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

we paid \$300 a week.
"During summers our speciallymade talent served as a theater

dramatic productions. The production required eight men to operate

"As our show grew, it was well-

known in the midwest as being the cleanest show in America. The main reason for that was that my husband did not allow smoking, gambling, profanity or messiness to xist, and only married persons could join. Instant dismissal and fines were the results if anyone disobeyed the rules.

"Because of this, the company

soon received the name of The Sunday School Amusement Com-

pany.*

FOR MANY years, it was a long time of summers on the road in the Savidge company's 15-car private púllman train from April until late fall; and winters in opera houses with vaudeville between

Mabel's last journey with the Savidge Amusement Company came in 1931, when the group traveled to South Dakota. The depression hit and grasshoppers were so thick the railroad cars skidded off the tree railroad cars skidded

off the tracks.

She also wrote the following: "I have been a Presbyterian all my life. I have seen 16 presidents come to office (Cleveland twice) in the years of my life. I have been a part of two centuries. What a pleasure to live!"

She had been a resident of the Wayne Care Centre for the last 7 1/2 years. Mabel's family wanted her to move away from Wayne, closer to them. But Mabel refused because she liked Wayne a lot. "It's a nice clean town," she always said.

Some things never seem to change

By now readers should have noticed a vast change in the look of The Wayne Herald — most of the changes brought out because of the way we are now producing our newspaper.

The copy you read each week is printed by laser. The type is actually larger in size. This can be good or bad. Good because it makes it easier to scan for our readers; and bad because now our mistakes are more visible than before.

To better work with this larger type style, we found that we had to make some changes as to how we lay out our newspaper. That meant changing our flag on the front page — something we were most apprehensive in doing because of the long-tradition. It has carried. We tried to make as much room as possible for what we would like to see get into the news columns of our newspaper. columns of our newspaper.

OUR TYPESTYLES on news copy and on headlines have also changed. We appreciate our readers putting up with the inconveniences. We — as one familiar saying goes — tried "to find ourselves" and put some consistency back into the news pages. It's been a learning experience, to say the least, in putting our new computers to use, with many problems solved by trial and error.

Some errors, however, aren't

Some errors, however, aren't noticed until after the newspaper has been rolled off the presses. A case in point was my last column on the story of the cassocks. Those things will happen though, when working with new products.

Much has certainly changed in

the way newspapers are now produced. Although I've only been in the business for 14 years and was not in on the Linotype era — the

changes still have been-staggering.
However, the career choice has been rewarding to me. Just like any other occupation, it has its flaws, like the late evening work hours and time away from the family; or putting up with silly demands of people who think they know more

than anyone about the newspaper business and how it should oper-

OBVIOUSLY, how we produce stories has changed. But not even the latest in technology can tell a person how to create a good and interesting feature article; or how to take piles of notes and arrange the findings into an organized news

Story.

There has to be someone to focus a camera and click the shutter; someone to express viewpoints once in a while on key issues; someone to add a personal touch to what could be considered an or-

dinary persons life.
Fourteen years ago, on April 1,
1975, I had the good fortune to
work for a newspaper man who never seemed to discourage whatever endeavors I tried to accomplish. He let me write about the people of the area and whatever was so unique in their every day lives - and he let me polish

stories with my own style.

Through my encounters with



found that ordinary people can lead extra-ordinary lives if they be-lieve in themselves and in what

I DIDN'T LEARN all this by punching computer keys. It is talk-ing with these people, face to face, that one realizes that within the realm of technology lies a personal side of life which we so often neglect or avoid.

And it takes a human being, not

computer, to search out these

qualities.
What I'm saying in this column, then, is that although the process of how we publish a newspaper has changed dramatically, the personality associated with a community newspaper such as the Wayne Her-ald, and others across the nation should never fade away.

If it ever did die, then perhaps we would never hear again about the Mabel Savidges, the Jack Ka-vanaughs or the other people who deserve a personal touch to get


