## WSC offered conference membership

Wayne State College has been offered membership in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference (RMAC), according to Wayne State Athletic Director Pete Chapman.

"A recommendation to join the RMAC has been forwarded to Wayne State President Dr. Donald Mash," said Chapman. "At this point, we are looking forward to joining the new league."

Wayne State is one of six colleges offered membership in the RMAC. The other five expected to join are Emporia State, Kearney State, Ft. Hays State, Chadron State and Panhandle State. Those six will join current RMAC members Adams State College, Colorado School of Mines, Ft. Lewis College, Mesa College and Western State College.

"The expanded 11-team league contains two key components for us: Emporia State, Kearney State and Ft. Hays State, the schools who have been with us in our search for a new league from the beginning, will be members. Secondly, 11 members in the conference gives us a lot of flexibility in scheduling for our teams," said Chapman.

Schools in the expanded RMAC will hold dual national affiliations in both the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) at the Division II level and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

Wayne State is currently a member of both organizations. The Wildcats will compete in the new conference in its four women's sports and in its five men's sports.

Wayne State was forced to search for a new conference when four members of its present conference — the Central States Intercollegiate Conference (CSIC) — opted to join a new league: Pittsburg State, Missouri Southern, Missouri Western and Washburn University pulled out of the CSIC to join the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Wayne State would begin competition in the RMAC in 1991.

## Teens prefer more communication

A six member panel, moderated by Jack Thiesen, counselor for the Christ Lutheran Church in Norfolk, gave views and concerns of both teenagers and parents during a Tuesday evening discussion at the Winside Elementary School library.

Teenage panel members included junior Shannon Bargstadt, sophomore Kim Cherry and senior Darren Wacker, students at Winside High School; and Richard Behmer, Rose Janke and Pastor John Fale.

Opening statements were made by the three teenagers regarding results of a survey distributed recently to students in grades 9-12 on concerns of curfew, dating, lifestyles, support from parents and communication.

Joan Jensen, vice president-elect of the Winside Advisory Council, issued a challenge to all parents present to just "listen" to what the kids are saying. There were approximately 36 guests attending the event.

THE CONSENSUS of all three teenage panel members was that "communication" was the most important topic.

"Parents have an advantage kids don't have. The parent has been both. With the oldest kid, parents are often feeling in the dark, not knowing what to do or not to do in situations," said Fale.

"Things that are scary for the kids in this world are also scary for the parents. It's tough for a parent to sit back and watch your kids

make their own decisions, especially when you feel they are wrong," Fale mentioned.

"Communication is the most important issue because if you have this with your kids, everything else seems to fall into place most of the time," said Behmer.

MODERATOR Jack Thiesen, who is also a certified family life educator with the National Council of Family Relations, said: "In a family with four children, none of the children have the 'same parents' as the parents are also growing in their knowledge and experience with each child."

Wacker said all parents should give reasons for saying "no" and not say "just because I say so."

"If they are afraid for the kids, tell them this. Lots of times parents just disregard the teenagers feelings," Wacker mentioned.

"Don't be doing something else [like peeling potatoes] when your child is trying to talk to you. Look them in the eyes and listen to what they are saying," said Cherry. "And we as teenagers should be expected to do the same thing."

"An important point to remember — if a parent is too busy at the time the child wants to talk, set up a time to do it later. Don't just let the discussion drop," Fale remarked.

THIESEN SAID it is important to work with kids on communication when they are young, and not wait until they are teenagers.

"Many times the more you absolutely forbid a child to do something, they will rebel and do it

more. Also parents, a lot of times, assume kids have done things when they really haven't. If you keep telling a person they're dumb or bad, they will start to believe it," said Thiesen.

Questions from the audience were directed at both the parents and teenager panel members.

Thiesen closed the discussion by saying: "It has been a great experience for me being here and listening to the openness and honesty of this panel and the audience. It shows you have a common

set of values as a community."

The panel was hosted by the Winside Advisory Council and the Winside Public School.

Afterwards, a brief council meeting took place.

THE NEXT meeting of the Winside Advisory Council will be Tuesday, May 23, at the high school at 8 p.m. with an open discussion on "Constructive Suggestions and Criticisms for Improving the Winside School System."

The public is welcome to attend.

## Parents influential

The following information was presented from the Wayne-Carroll High School Home Economics Department, entitled Parent-Teen Interactions. Source of the material is from "The Forgotten Half: Pathways to Success for America's Youth and Young Families."

Of the two hours youth spend with adults (other than teachers) each day:

- five minutes are spent alone with father.
- 40 minutes are spent alone with mother.
- 60 minutes are spent with both parents.
- 15 minutes are spent with other adults.

Young people consistently point to their parents as the most influential adult in their lives. The activity young people most enjoy sharing with their parents is "just talking."

— AND ABOUT what do teens feel comfortable talking about?

- 94 percent of the 13-17 year olds feel comfortable talking with parents about school.
- 80 percent will talk about drug use.
- 84 percent will talk about friendships.
- 78 percent will talk about relationship with parents.
- And 71 percent will share their personal problems.

One recommendation in this report is that the nation's political, corporate, educational and religious leadership publicizes the need for families to spend leisure time together and find strategies to help place it high on the national agenda.

## Amusement was Savidge's life

Mabel Savidge, who was Wayne County's oldest citizen, died early Thursday morning.

She claimed to be 105 years old. Family members say that she was 104.

Whatever her age, she lived a prolific and entertaining life. "This I know and believe: It is not how long we live, but how we live that matters" she wrote one time, excerpted from Wayne County Anecdotes and Historical Notes.

The Savidge name is associated with the Savidge Amusement Company — a company based in Wayne that toured throughout the country for 35 years before falling prey to the nation's Great Depression.

keeping the Savidge Amusement Company books and keeping tabs on the operation of the amusement businesses. Her music lived the atmosphere at the shows.

As a young girl, Mabel attended country school and then went on to the Nebraska Normal College in Wayne. She studied piano. Later she attended the England Conservatory of Music in Boston.

In 1911 she married Walter Savidge, a tightrope walker that she became "enchanted with" when she spotted him walking a tightrope between two buildings at the Wayne County Fair. Savidge Amusement Company grew to become the largest of its kind in the United States.

## Mash to stress role of college

Dr. Donald J. Mash will continue stressing Wayne State College's role in developing students and northeast Nebraska when he is inaugurated the ninth president of the 79-year-old institution on Friday, April 7 at 2 p.m. in Ramsey Theatre, located in the Val Peterson Fine Arts Building.

The public is invited to the inauguration and admission is free.

Mash has been delivering a consistent message about the role and direction of Wayne State College since he arrived 10 months ago.

He has been stressing the relationship between higher education and the future development of Greater Nebraska. He believes the College must be a center and catalyst for education as well as the arts, and community and economic development. Several outreach activities have begun to demonstrate that Wayne State College is northeast Nebraska's college.

MASH HAS visited numerous northeast Nebraska communities since he arrived from George Mason University, Fairfax, Virginia last June. During the stops, he has addressed hundreds of community leaders and has encouraged them to begin taking advantage of Wayne State College's presence.

He has shared his vision for Wayne State College and he has encouraged northeast Nebraska communities to join him in pursuit of a broader regional perspective.

On campus, he has promoted a continued emphasis on strong teaching in Wayne State's small, personalized setting. He has been working to develop stronger out-of-class support services for students and has encouraged more emphasis on the importance of serving growing numbers of non-traditional students.

Several special guests will deliver greetings during the inauguration ceremony, including Nebraska Governor Kay Orr. She will be the featured speaker at the inauguration luncheon at 11:30 p.m. in the North Dining Room of the Student Center.

JEAN LOVELL, chairperson of the Board of Trustees for the Nebraska State Colleges, will lead the investiture ceremony. Delegates from colleges throughout Nebraska and many parts of the country will be represented.

Mash received his bachelor's degree in education from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1964; his master's degree in geography from the University of Pittsburgh in 1966; and his Ph.D. in the education program at Ohio State University in 1974.

Mash, 46, began his 24-year career in higher education teaching geography at the University of Pittsburgh-Bradford campus, 1965-68. He was executive vice president for administration at George Mason University when he accepted the Wayne State presidency.

During his 13 years at the institution, a state university, the institution grew dramatically in size and stature. Upon his acceptance of the presidency at Wayne State College, several persons spoke highly of his work and capabilities.

"I doubt that any public university in America has achieved such distinction in so short a time as George Mason," said Dr. James L. Fisher, President Emeritus, Council for Advancement and Support of

The company featured more than just sideshows and amusement rides. There were also dramatic groups that traveled with the company. Some of the actors later became stars in Hollywood.

MABEL WROTE in her published excerpts: "Our 'big tent' seated 1,000 people and as a drawing card we had a wonderful aerial act, the Flying Baldwins, that we paid \$300 a week.

"During summers our specially-made talent served as a theater for the New York and Chicago dramatic productions. The production required eight men to operate the stage and about 15 performers plus numerous vaudeville acts between scenes.

"As our show grew, it was well-known in the Midwest as being the cleanest show in America. The main reason for that was that my husband did not allow smoking, gambling, profanity or messiness to exist, and only married persons could join. Instant dismissal and fines were the results if anyone disobeyed the rules.

"Because of this, the company

soon received the name of 'The Sunday School Amusement Company.'

Many of the company's bookings took place in bible belt communities.

FOR MANY years, it was a long time of summers on the road in the Savidge company's 15-car private Pullman train from April until late fall; and winters in opera houses with vaudeville between acts.

Mabel's last journey with the Savidge Amusement Company came in 1931, when the group traveled to South Dakota. The depression hit and grasshoppers were so thick the railroad cars skidded off the tracks.

She also wrote the following: "I have been a Presbyterian all my life. I have seen 16 presidents come to office (Cleveland twice) in the years of my life. I have been a part of two centuries. What a pleasure to live!"

She had been a resident of the Wayne Care Centre for the last 7 1/2 years. Mabel's family wanted her to move away from Wayne, closer to them. But Mabel refused because she liked Wayne a lot. "It's a nice clean town," she always said.

## Some things never seem to change

By now readers should have noticed a vast change in the look of The Wayne Herald — most of the changes brought out because of the way we are now producing our newspaper.

The copy you read each week is printed by laser. The type is actually larger in size. This can be good or bad. Good because it makes it easier to scan for our readers; and bad because now our mistakes are more visible than before.

To better work with this larger type style, we found that we had to make some changes as to how we lay out our newspaper. That meant changing our flag on the front page — something we were most apprehensive in doing because of the long tradition it has carried. We tried to make as much room as possible for what we would like to see get into the news columns of our newspaper.

OUR TYPESTYLES on news copy and on headlines have also changed. We appreciate our read-

ers putting up with the inconveniences. We — as one familiar saying goes — tried "to find ourselves" and put some consistency back into the news pages. It's been a learning experience, to say the least, in putting our new computers to use, with many problems solved by trial and error.

Some errors, however, aren't noticed until after the newspaper has been rolled off the presses. A case in point was my last column on the story of the cassocks. Those things will happen though, when working with new products.

Much has certainly changed in the way newspapers are now produced. Although I've only been in the business for 14 years and was not in on the Linotype era — the changes still have been staggering.

However, the career choice has been rewarding to me. Just like any other occupation, it has its flaws, like the late evening work hours and time away from the family; or putting up with silly demands of people who think they know more

than anyone about the newspaper business and how it should operate.

OBVIOUSLY, how we produce stories has changed. But not even the latest in technology can tell a person how to create a good and interesting feature article; or how to take piles of notes and arrange the findings into an organized news story.

There has to be someone to focus a camera and click the shutter; someone to express viewpoints once in a while on key issues; someone to add a personal touch to what could be considered an ordinary person's life.

Fourteen years ago, on April 1, 1975, I had the good fortune to work for a newspaper man who never seemed to discourage whatever endeavors I tried to accomplish. He let me write about the people of the area and whatever was so unique in their everyday lives — and he let me polish the stories with my own style.

Through my encounters with

people I've written about, I've found that ordinary people can lead extra-ordinary lives if they believe in themselves and in what they do.

I DIDN'T LEARN all this by punching computer keys. It is talking with these people, face to face, that one realizes that within the realm of technology lies a personal side of life which we so often neglect or avoid.

And it takes a human being, not

a computer, to search out these qualities.

What I'm saying in this column, then, is that although the process of how we publish a newspaper has changed dramatically, the personality associated with a community newspaper such as the Wayne Herald, and others across the nation should never fade away.

If it ever did die, then perhaps we would never hear again about the Mabel Savidges, the Jack Kavanauhs or the other people who deserve a personal touch to get their story out.

Wayne and Wayne County have lost a grand citizen in Mabel Savidge. She was an entertainer at heart throughout her 104, or 105 years.

Much history has been written about her family enterprise. She and Walter Savidge were two legendary Wayne residents that certainly deserve recognition in future recounts of the area's, and the state's history.

conference title again in both the varsity and junior varsity levels.

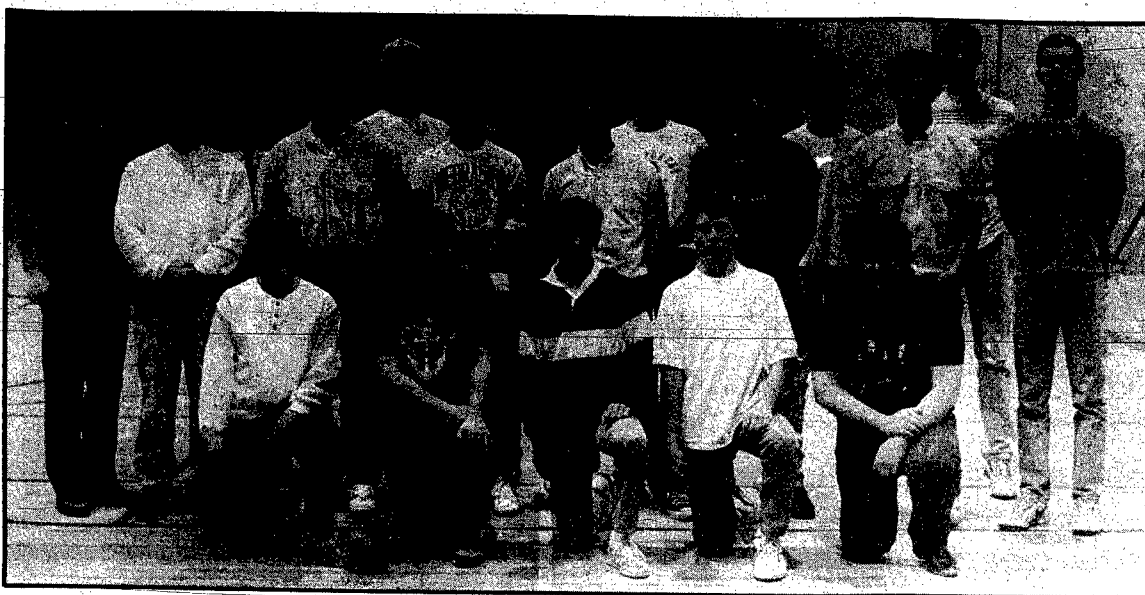

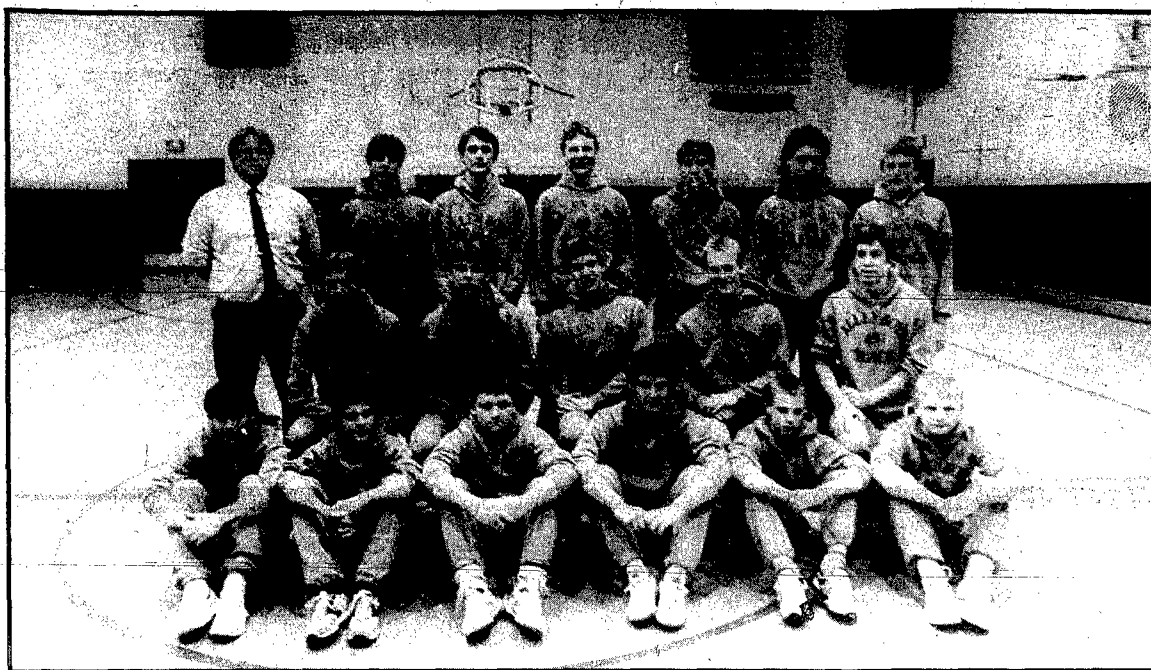

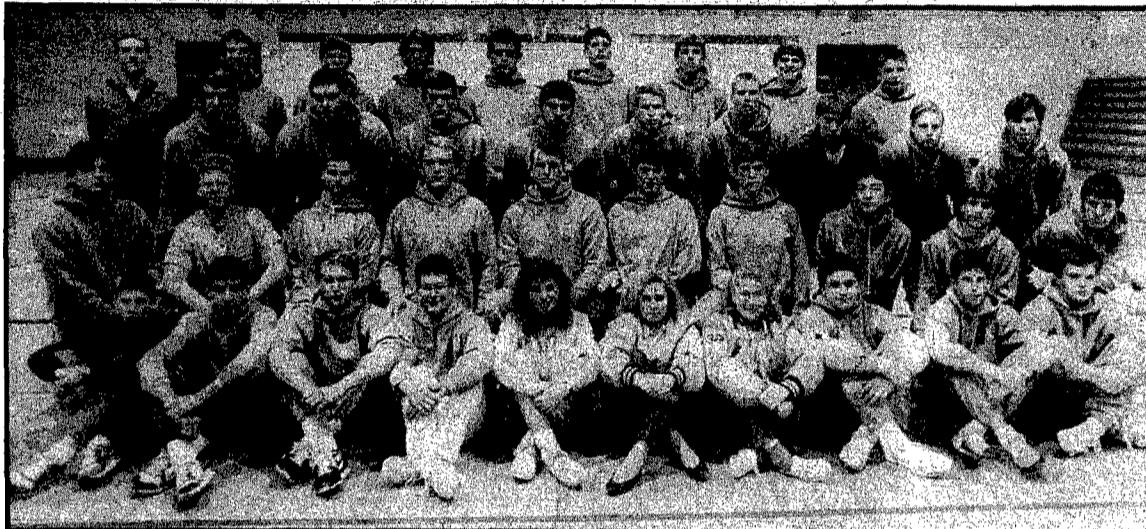
