Medi-Tedi is certainly making

the rounds these days.
You'll find the stuffed animal in ambulances; highway, sheriff and police patrol vehicles. Earlier this year, Dixon hosted a pancake feed - to benefit the fire department

and rescue unit — and Medi-Tedi was represented along with Smokey The Bear.

The Medi-Tedi has been adopted by the Nebraska State Health Department-Division of Emprency Medical Services as a Emergency Medical Services as a mascot for children. Medi-Tedi serves as a friend of a child who is in need of comfort after physical or emotional trauma following an

emergency situation. Stuffed animals, like Medi-Tedi, tend to have a calming effect on traumatized children who could be injured, emotionally upset or scared. The panda is about eight inches high.

TUESDAY NIGHT, area fire department and rescue unit personnel were presented their first

Medi-Tedi to place in their respec-tive transportation units during a burn emergencies workshop at the

Wayne Fire Department.

Therefore, the back nine is suffering moisture stress right now that would normally occur in Au-gust. The country club board of directors is currently reviewing bids for installation of an automatic irrigation system for the back nine

Berres said the 18 hole course still is the best in northeast Ne-braska when comparing how the dry spell has affected other

So the course should provide a strong challenge to the 95 high school golfers competing Thursday.

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



# Border change proposed

As the Legislature heads into the last few days of the session, the work on the budget continues. The past week we discussed the mainline budget presented by the Appropriations Committee. Several amendments have been attached to the budget and more changes are expected.

Some increases have been proposed to the general operating expenses of state government as well as aid to existing programs. Increases were made to entitlement programs such as special education reimbursements were increased by \$3.9 million in the 1989-90 year and by \$9.5 million in 1990-91. The largest individual increase to a program was made to Medicaid. This increase was in part brought about by changes in federal law. Under the Federal Nursing Home Reform® Act, the federal government provided substantially decreased funding in this area causing the state to pick up a much greater share of the costs.

THE REMAINING amount of revenue over expenses is available for current proposed legislation. Some of the larger programs competing for these funds for example are property tax relief (LB 84) and teacher salaries (LB 89). Additionally, many-smaller programs have received first round approval. Sustainable funding will make it more difficult to find support for these programs during the second round of debate.

The Nebraska Constitution requires the state to have a balanced budget. To achieve this, priorities must be determined. This will cause some very tough decisions in the few days remaining.

Last week, second round approval was given to LB 817, a bill 1 co-introduced in conjunction with the Governor. The bill declares the middle of the current main channel of the Missouri River to be the boundary between Dakota County Nebraska and Union County South Dakota. Currently, the border is where the channel was located when we entered into a compact with South Dakota in 1905. However, disputes have arisen as the forces of nature and human intervention has changed the course of the river channel. According to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, this section of the river is now stabilized and should not create future problems.

UNDER THE bill, approximately 1,400 acres of Nebraska land located across the river would be deeded over to South Dakota. The change in the river's course has caused this portion of land to be literally inaccessible to Nebraska. (This makes it almost impossible for Nebraska to provide services to these areas.)

South Dakota earlier this year signed a version of the boundary legislation. Both states will present the agreements to Congress for ratification. Before the agreements were entered into all affected Nebraska subdivisions were contacted. There was common consensus and no objections were found. Additionally, the bill does not affect the private property rights to the land being transferred. There are several other problems associated with the border up river between South Dakota and Nebraska as well as with lowa, however, a consensus solution has not been reached.

## Toxic algae possible in ponds

livestock producers should examine ponds and shallow lakes for blue-green algae, which are potentially hazardous to animals consuming contaminated water sources, said Dr. Norman Schneider of the University of Nebraska's Veterinary Diagnostic Center.

Excessive growth of these microscopic aquatic plants, called overgrowths or blooms, appear as a thick floating mass of greenish paint-like scum on water surfaces. The blue-green algae blooms are not always poisonous. Toxic blooms most often occur when high daytime temperatures are combined with shallow surface water containing agricultural fertilizer runoff or animal waste.

SCHNEIDER SAID a green-blue algae bloom occurred in some waters during 90-plus degree weather in April, and one suspected case of poisoning was reported. Livestock and pets have been fatally poisoned in past years. People and animals should be kept away from water if the sur-

People and animals should be ept away from water if the sur-ice looks like green paint scum. Blue-green algae are not the same as common green algae found in

almost all Nebraska waters. Blue-green algae often overgrow shortly after heavy growth of green algae have died down. Blue-green algae float on the surface, and the algal layer often is thickest on the wind-ward side of a pond or lake.

Distinguishing between harmless Distinguishing between harmless and hazardous algae is difficult, Schneider said, so avoiding suspicious water is the best policy. Examination under a microscope is one way to identify toxic bluegreen algae.

Livestock may have drunk from the same pond or lake for years without ill effects before conditions arise that cause poisoning. A number of toxins are produced by a variety of blue-green algae. Algal poisons often break down rapidly so waters may remain toxic for just

a few days.

ALGAL POISONING can cause sudden death and may cause clinical signs similar to pesticide poi-soning, he said. Humans could be affected if they swallow some toxic algae while swimming.

Blue-green algae blooms suspected of being poisonous can be reported to Schneider at (402) 472-1434; or to Sidney J. Stohs or Steven J. Hermansky at Creighton University, (402) 280-2020, who are studying the development of an antidote to the toxin.



Migraine Headache Relief

Over 40 million Americans seek the advice and care of physicians each year for the relief of headaches. Migraine headaches are one of the most common headache types, occurring in about 15 percent of persons over 40 years of age. Migraine headache occurs when blood vessels in the head enlarge and press on nerves, causing headache pain. The pain is reported to be so and throbbing or pulsating, typically occurring on the side of head but sometimes spreading the opposite side of the head.

Although stress is the major factor triggering migraines, headaches can result from exposure to bright lights or a stuffy room to the ingestion of foods such as chocolate, aged cheese, nuts, and citrus which contain the blood vessel dilator tyramine.

Mild migraine headaches may respond to nonprescription med cines such as aspirin or acet aminophen. More severe attacks may require ergotamine, which constricts blood vessels. Some medicines can also be used to pre-vent migraine headaches. Propranalol, one of the most effec tive medicines against migraines prevents blood vessel dilation Other medicines which preve migraines include amitriptyline nidine, and methysergide.
