# Wayne lays claim to state golf capital

The Wayne Blue Devils may well have laid claim as the golf capitol of Nebraska Thursday when the Blue Devils literally breezed to a 16-stroke championship victory, giving Wayne its second state title in five years.

Once again that familiar five-some of Eric Runestad, Jed Reeg, Robb Reeg, Elliot Salmon and Kevin Hausmann came through in the clutch for coach Terry Munson. Wayne carded a scored of 315 while Lincoln Pius X finished in the runner-up slot with a 331.

Lexington managed third place in the team total with a 336 and McCook placed fourth with a 341. West Point edged York and Gothenburg for fifth place by one stroke with a 344. Columbus Scotus finished in the eighth slot with a 346 and Nehraska City and Waa a 346 and Nebraska City and Waverly tied with a 351 to round out the top ten. Grand Island North West, Chadron, Crete, "Syracuse and Hastings Adams-Central were the remainder of the teams competing. peting.

A TOTAL of 95 golfers embarked on the Wayne Country Club which when the day started, had the makings of being a repeat of the 1988 state championship that was marred by thunderstorms and lightening. Wayne never got the latter but they got plenty of rain. In fact, the play was delayed for 2 1/2 hours to allow for the rain

to stop.
At 3:00, play resumed and not only did the sun shine for the re-mainder of the meet, but it shined especially bright for the Wayne Blue Devils, who got a tremendous monkey off their back.

"We've lost some close state tournament meets in the past couple years," senior golfer Jed Reeg said. "People always say don't think about what's happened=in the past and you say you don't, but it always in the back of your mind. It's a great relief to win the state tournament, expecially to get the

its a great relief to win the state tournament, especially to get the monkey off our backs." THIS particular group of athletes which make up the Wayne golf team has maintained a high confidence level despite being labeled in the past as a team that can't win that ultimate

rear that can't win that ultimate meet, (The State Tournament).

"People talk a lot," Robb Reeg said. "Even though we felt that people may be losing faith in us because we just couldn't pull off that state tournament win, we all maintained that confidence that we could eventually do it. And now we could eventually do it. And now we have and it feels excellent. We have been playing consistent golf all season and we went out there today with the attitude that we just had to maintain that same consistency that won us several In-

vitationals throughout the year."

The thing that has made Wayne

so tough during the past few years is the fact that all five of the golfers on the varsity have the ability to be the medalist at any

meet. The consistency level has been on an even keel all season.
"WE HAD something to prove and we went out and did it," Elliot Salmon said. "We have been waiting for this moment for three years and we weren't going to let this last chance slip through our fingers.

It's a nice feeling to get the monkey off our backs.

"We knew we had the capability to win the championship but after suffering some of the bad luck we've encountered the last couple

we've encountered the last couple years, winning the state championship in our last year makes it really special, "Eric Runestad said.

Perhaps none of the four golfers mentioned already had it any tougher than Kevin Hausmann did this week. "It's been a very tough week for me," Hausmann said. "I week for me," Hausmann said. "I had to qualify to play in-the state meet by defeating a couple of underclassman who really have pushed me all season long." But that added pressure on Hausmann may have helped his concentration level and after defeating his friendly foes, he once again found himself on the state team himself on the state team.
"It doesn't get any better than

"It doesn't get any better than this," Hausmann said smiling after it was known that the Blue Devils did win the championship. "What a graduation present this is."

On Wednesday evening the Blue Devils took off for Sloux City, Iowa, to get away from the sitting around and waiting atmosphere. According to Jed Reeg it helped.

# County shed bids received

Bids were received Tuesday by the Wayne County Commissioners for the construction of a county shed on the north edge of Carroll.

sned on the north edge of Carroli.

The shed will be a 60° x-80° structure located immediately west of the present county shed at the District Two county shop, according to Sid Saunders, Wayne County Highway Superintendent.

Saunders said the county com missioners said the county-com-missioners approved the specifica-tions for the new all steel pre-en-gineered building at their May 2 meeting. "Bids taken last Tuesday were just on the new steel building itself. Our own crews will be putting in an office and bathroom inside the new building," said Saunders.

**ELECTRICAL** wiring of the facil-

ity will also come later, he said.

Hespe Co., Inc., Norfolk, \$61,630; Kingson Builders, Inc., Norfolk, \$57,196; Northeast Nebraska Builders, Wakefield, \$61,533; and two bids by Otte Construction—Co. of Wayne, one for \$62,755 and another, \$57,589. The commissioners are seeking an Oct. 1 deadline for the

an Oct. 1 deadline for the completion of the steel building. After that date, the selected contractor will be paying a \$300 penalty per day for each day after the Oct. 1 date. That is so that the county crews will still have some time to construct the office and bathroom facilities inside the new structure before winter arrives.

SAUNDERS said the present county shed in Carroll will not be demolished but will continue to be used for storage. "Most of the old frame building could not be heated in the winter, and it was dirt floor throughout most of it," said Saunders. It was difficult to do major equipment repairs there in winter months, he said.

"With the new building, we can get any of our equipment inside there and get the repair done any time of the year," Saunders sald. "The intent for constructing the new building was not for storage, but for making repairs on equipment of the same of the storage of the same of the sa but for making repairs on equip-

County shops are also located at Winside and Wayne. Repairs and storage of county road equipment will continue to be done at these shops, Saunders said.

The county commissioners took no action on the seven bids Tuesday. They recessed their Tuesday meeting until Monday, May 22 at 1:30 p.m. at the county court-house.

# Administrator voices cor about long term care The quality of care we have a right to expect from our nation's nursing homes is being jeopardized by forces largely beyond our control. That is what Wayne Care Centre Administrator CII Haase said Wednesday evening to 33 Wayne citizens in a special Town Hall Meeting conducted at the Care Centre. According to Hasse, the nation's nursing shortage is having a profound effect on nursing homes. Interest in nursing as a career has dropped substantially over the last several years at a time when the health care needs of the nation are growing. As a result, he said, recruiting skilled and caring nurses is sometimes very difficult. He pointed out that the problem of attracting nurses to the nursing home setting is aggravated by low government funding levels, which limit staff salaries. "Few Americans realize that Medicaid, the poverty program pays for a large proportion of the long term care in this country. And although catastrophic health care legislation was enacted last year, Congress failed to include the costs of nursing home care, even though it is the single largest catastropic expense elderly Americans face," Haase said. Haase urged those in attendance to write letters to lawmakers urging them to give long term care the attention and financing it deserves; to support legislation which will "ensure a high quality of care" for elderly and disabled Americans. "An informed and motivated public is critical in influencing the development of sound public policy," said Haase. The commitment of all citizens will be essential if quality nursing home services are to be available in the future for future generations."

Risk-taking a part of teens growing up

Although risk-taking sounds dangerous, it is a normal part of growing up for adolescents. Even graduating from high school can be a risk. The trick is in helping youth avoid the dangerous ones.

Trying out for the class play, venturing a "hello" to a new student, and cooking the family dinner are situations where teens take risks. These risks can help them grow, feel good about themselves, help others, and begin to feel safe and competent in their world.

However, young teens lack the experience and skills to exercise sound judgment in every situation. They are very susceptible to peer pressure, adult role models and media messages. This vulnerability can lead to dangerous and even life-threatening situations.

ALTHOUGH THERE is no foolproof way to protect teens from dangerous risk-taking, adults can help.

First, understand the normal changes children go through as they

move from childhood into adolescence. It is normal for young teens to try to meet their needs through risk-taking behavior.

For example, bicycle racing on a busy street may meet the teen's need for mastery and competency, power over the environment, and testing of physical abilities. Drinking alcohol may meet the teen's need for acceptance by the peer group, experimentation with a new behavior, appearance of maturity, or escape from pressure.

Second, strike an appropriate balance between freedom and clear limits. Young teens are seeking and sometimes demanding increased autonomy. At the same time, they look to adults to tell them when enough is enough. If you, as a responsible adult, feel that an activity is too risky,

THIRD, SUPPORT them in taking positive risks. Encourage them and become involved by doing things like helping them practice lines for the play tryouts, attending track meets, going canoeing together, and discussing how difficult it can be to stand up for what you believe.

Fourth. help them get the facts about the risks involved in certain behaviors. A parent must be well informed. Read reliable material on topics

such as teen pregnancy, suicide, accidents, and alcohol, tobacco and drug

If they question your stand on risk-taking behavior, you can back up your statements with reliable sources. Also, consider that teens may weigh the facts more heavily when they come from an older sibling, a peer, or adults outside the family who they like, trust and respect. Sometimes they can be a valuable resource in reaching a teen.

Fifth, be able to distinguish normal activity from serious trouble. The frequency of abnormal behavior and drastic changes in behavior patterns often senarate normal teen development from disturbed behavior.

If a youth you know is taking abnormal risks, refer them to a school counselor, clergy or mental health agency.



Free mile seed for wildlife food plots on ACR acres is currently available at Clark Bros Transfer. The 50 pound bags of seed are Pheasants Forever is an organization started in Minnesota.

The Norfolk group was the second chapter formed in Nebraska.

The goal of Pheasants Forever is to assist landowners in developing and establishing habitat areas for wildlife, according to Jim LaFleur, board member of the Norfolk chapter. Jim said that each Pheasants Forever chapter "raises local money and spends the money locally" for this purpose. One of the main ways that the chapters do this is by providing landowners with free seed that can be used for food by wildlife and for nesting habitat.

This is the fourth year for the free milo seed program in this

One fifty pound bag of milo will easily seed six acres of food

plot. This mile can be used for ACR acres or on CRP acres designated for use as food plots. The seed can be picked up at Clark Bros Transfer at 900 North

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District and Pheasants Forever are also providing free rye grain, sweet clover and red clover-sweet clover mix seed through local seed dealers. This seed is for use on ACR acres and an application must be completed to qualifyfor this free seed program. Applications can be obtained at SCS offices or at the Lower Elkhorn NRD office in Norfolk.

#### **CLEAN LAKES PROGRAM GRANT**

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District will receive a grant of \$83,000 approved by the Environmental Protection Agency to study the water quality of Willow Creek Reservoir in Pierce County and Maskenthine Reservoir in Stanton County. This grant was awarded through the National Clean Lakes Program which addresses surface water quality problems.

A study of the water quality of both reservoirs will occur over a period of two years. The study will concentrate on silt, ag chemicals and livestock contamination problems. These sources of contamination can result in high turbidity and extensive green algae blooms which appear at Willow Creek and high sediment de-posits which occur at Maskenthine.

Once the study is completed, recommendations to improve the situation can be made. A federal grant to pay 50 percent of the cost for the restoration phase will be sought. The remaining 50 percent would come from state and local funds. The \$83,000 grant for the phase on study is composed of 70 percent federal funds and 30 percent local funds.

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#### PUBLIC NOTICE

Wayne County Weed Control Authority has dedicated itself not only to noxious weed control, but also to the prevention of dessemination of noxious weed seed. The Director of Agriculture has determined that noxious weeds seed may be desseminated through the movement of machinery and equipment, grain and seed, hay, straw, nursery stock, fencing materials, sod, manure, and soil as well as articles of similar nature. Methods of treatment have also been prescribed by the Director and may be obtained from the Wayne County Weed Control Authority.

With the harvest season approaching very rapidly, please keep in mind the provisions of the law requiring owners of harvest equipment to clean prior to movement to another field. This machinery and equipment being used in the harvest of crops should be treated or cleaned as follows:

1. Removal of all material from the tops and sides of all parts of the machine by sweeping and the use of forced air and water.

2. Opening the lower end of all elevator returns, and measuring devices and removal of all noxious weed seeds and seedlings from shakers, sieves, and other places of lodgment.

3. Run the machine empty for a minimum of five minutes, alternately increasing and decreasing the speed.

4. Follow the manufacturer's detailed instructions for cleaning the machine.

These treatments should be performed while the article or the machine itself is still on the land in which it became infested if at all possible. This will not only prevent spreading noxious weed seed from one field to another, but also from one land owner to another.
