Those individuals beginning a three-year term are Connie Endicott, Jane Ahmann, Jeryl Nelson and Faunell Bennett.

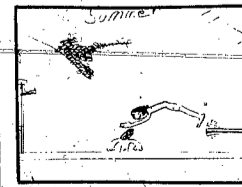
Serving as president for the upcoming year is Lorraine Johnson. President-elect is Connie Hall and secretary/treasurer is Phyllis Spethman.

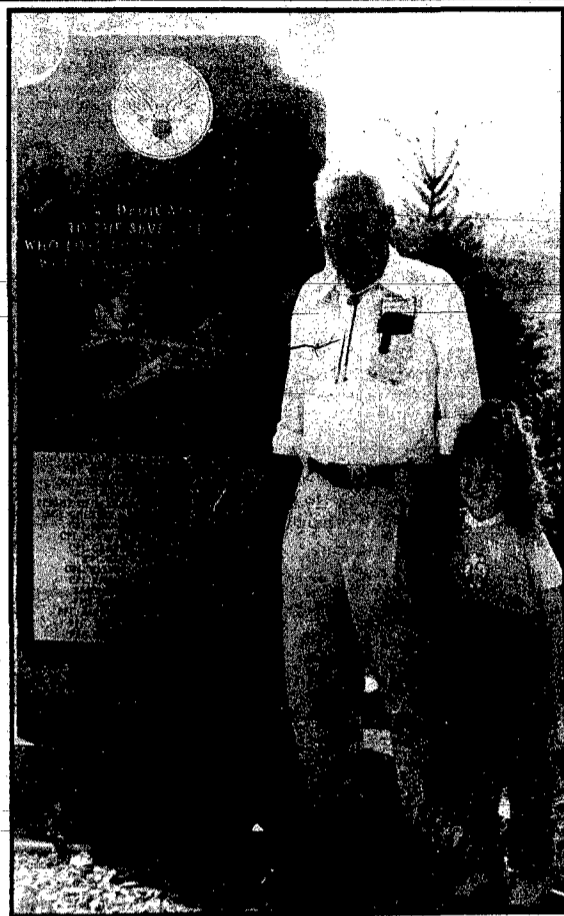

## Air crash recalled during dedication

There were 17 servicemen who died in an August 1944 plane crash near Laurel.

They included 2ND LT. Kenneth M. Dewey of Grosse Pointe, Michigan; 2ND LT. Joseph E. Mead of Danbury, Connecticut; 2ND LT. George M. Nelson of Goldfield, Iowa; 2ND LT. Archie Moran of Chicago, Illinois; Flight Officer William Kavnor of Brooklyn, New York; SGT. Chester A. Jurkowski of New Boston, Michigan; CPL. Bernard D. Ryder of Haskins, Ohio; CPL. Nelvin B. Matthews of Jeanette, Pennsylvania; CPL. George Brada of Cleveland, Ohio; CPL. Ben E. Wall of Madison, North Carolina; CPL. Walter Jacques of Pawtucket, Rhode Island; CPL. Richard L. Davis of Oakland, California; PFC. Paul J. Berum of Tucson, Arizona; PFC. Dean W. Still of San Diego, California; PFC. Jack L. McCullough of Coolidge, Arizona; PFC. Jack Inc. of Salt Lake City, Utah; and PFC. Wilbur J. Utter of Prescott, Washington.

Memories of the crash were retold this past Memorial Day in Laurel as a B-17 Memorial Monument

constructed near the community was dedicated in remembrance of those who were killed in the crash. The monument project, close to the site where the aircraft disaster occurred, was started this spring and completed in May by the veteran groups of Laurel.

L. J. Mallatt of Laurel, who during the dedication ceremony Monday morning gave a history of the air disaster, said at least four families of the deceased veterans were present for the dedication. Some traveled 1,500 miles or more to the dedication to witness the unveiling of the monument project that was financed through private donations.

SEVERAL CAME to Laurel just to find out what really did happen that fateful day in August, 1944.

Among the visitors was David Harvey of Raleigh, North Carolina. His father, George Nelson, was among those listed with the 16 others on the special monument.

"We are overwhelmed by the dedication, planning care and love of all the people of Laurel. This is just incredible and the families really appreciate it," Harvey said after the ceremony.

Harvey said the Laurel event has helped fill a void in understanding how the accident actually happened.

"My father died five months before I was born," he said. "This [ceremony] was about as much as I had heard about the incident that happened 44 years ago."

"Seeing people who were eye-witnesses to the crash made it better. We only knew about it second or third hand," Harvey said.

Mallatt said his historical account of the crash coincided with Air Force investigations. "I think we can say it is pretty much on target and is accurate," he said.

IT WAS AUG. 5, 1944, at 6 a.m. when crewman at the US Army Air Base — a B-17 Training Base — ate their breakfast and got into their airplanes. The group of 18 planes (six planes to a group and nine people to a plane) took off from the Sioux City base to conduct a high altitude training mission over central Nebraska and into South Dakota.

"There was already sadness in Laurel that morning, as we had learned there were three local men killed in action during that

particular week," Mallatt said.

It was 11 a.m. when Mallatt said he watched a group of sleek fuselages flying in the air approaching from the west of Laurel and heading east. "About where this [monument] site is today is where they completed a maneuver and were getting back into position. One of the aircraft went down and to the right slightly," he said.

The wings of the aircraft dipped from side to side. The aircraft bumped another aircraft and they came together like sandwiches, going toward the east."

The 16 other aircraft departed the area immediately. Both planes flew down the road to the east for about two miles, Mallatt said, continuing to lose altitude. The disaster then occurred, with wreckage scattered over a wide area in an oats field approximately a mile and a half east of Laurel.

"We all rushed to the scene, hoping we could give assistance. But there was none to give," Mallatt said.

ONLY ONE of the 18 crew members in the two aircraft had survived, being blown clear of the crash site. The survivor was found

east of Laurel. He was picked up by a local farmer and was later treated for an ankle injury.

"We say 17 young people whose lives had perished. The war had come to Laurel, Nebraska. It came that day and in the days thereafter," Mallatt said.

People in the Laurel community realized that death in the service could happen to their own boys. There was not a dry eye in the community for a while after the crash. "Forty-five years later, we still have not forgotten it," Mallatt said.

Paul Honke of Naper, Nebraska, present for the Memorial Day ceremony, was a pilot in one of the surviving aircraft of the squadron. He said his plane was just above and in front of the collision and he saw just for an instant what had happened.

"It was an accident, that is how I saw it. After seeing the two planes collide, our formation dispersed and went in to land at Sioux City," Honke said.

"This [monument] is wonderful. There has been a lot of hard work put into it. And it is nice that the

## Emergency haying, grazing approved

Wayne County, in light of the dry conditions, has been approved for emergency haying and grazing of ACR and CU for Pay acreages.

Before producers can hay or graze these acres, they need to stop into the Wayne County ASCS office and sign a request to do so. Producers who fail to sign a request will be penalized.

To remain eligible for program benefits, participants who request emergency haying or grazing of approved cover on 1989 ACR and CU for Payment acreage are required not to:

— Remove cover to the extent that the land is not adequately protected from wind and water erosion.

— Permit grazing or haying of wildlife food plots, wildlife habitat, go-down acres and close sown program crops.

— Charge for the value of growth hayed or grazed when used by another producer. Charges are permitted for normal and reasonable costs for services such as installing temporary fences, pumping water for grazing livestock; cutting raking, baling or other steps in haying, green chopping or ensiling.

— Graze or hay cover established on the ACR or CU for Payment acreage with ACP funds until the growth is well established.

## At Wakefield Health Care Center Agreement changes

## City considers options

## Bugs causing problem

Wayne apparently has enough midges — chironomid midges — to cause an insect nuisance problem within the city limits.

At the May 9 city council meetings, city council members were informed of a complaint from a home owner residing on East Fifth Street concerning the midges. Midges have a mosquito-like appearance.

At that May 9 council meeting it was decided to have Wayne Kramer, medical entomologist in the Division of Environmental Health and Housing Surveillance evaluate the midges problem in the city.

Kramer visited Wayne and presented a written response to the city, which was read by City Administrator Phil Kloster during the council's regular meeting Tuesday night (May 30).

Kramer wrote that the immature or larval stages of the midges live in the top one inch of mud on the bottom of the lagoon near the city's wastewater treatment plant.

"Insects are a problem in your situation because the input of organic matter (sludge) into the aquatic lagoon provides the optimum environment for their development," Kramer said.

overwinter in the lagoon, then emerge in the spring when the warmer temperatures occur. Kramer said April's warm weather may account for the emergence of the midges this year. "In a year such as this, the populations may be larger as the midge populations have the ability to grow throughout the season," Kramer said.

He said control of the larval midges can be undertaken by using a material (Abate) that has a one-time treatment cost of \$250. A boat has to be used in applying the material in the lagoon, using a broadcast cyclone-type spreader.

"An area that would yield considerable information and would be worthwhile would be to begin a program to monitor the population in the lagoon," Kramer said. "The influence of water temperature could be monitored in relationship to both larval populations and adult emergence."

Control of the adults, who pose the nuisance problem because they are attracted to lights and may annoy home owners, is not practical nor effective, he said.

THE CITY WILL continue monitoring the midge problem to see how much control application would be necessary. The city council was informed that the midge problem is not limited to just areas around East Fifth Street, but also the insects are plentiful in the

Roosevelt Park Addition in Wayne.

Also Tuesday evening, the city council approved a request to remove "no parking" limitations along a segment of South Windom Street.

Kloster said a petition has been presented by property owners in Roosevelt Park who live along South Windom Street to remove the "no parking" restriction on the west side of the street from Fairground Avenue to Folk Street.

Instead, the property owners would like to see the "no parking" signs replaced with "no parking between 12 a.m. to 5 a.m.," according to Kloster.

The city council approved the parking request.

In another parking matter, the city council passed an ordinance allowing for the establishment of truck routes and prohibiting trucks having 10,000 or more pounds of total weight from parking in Victor Park on the south edge of Wayne.

THE TRUCK route framework has been set up so that if some time the council decides they want to deny truck travel within some of Wayne's city streets, they can list them in the ordinance, said City Attorney Kem Swarts.

"Currently, we have not listed in the ordinance any streets in the

## Golden anniversary observed by Bleckes

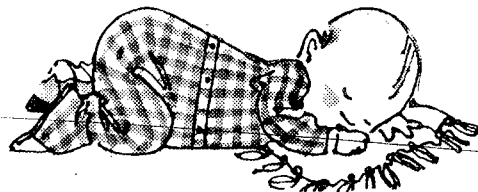

Angela is a sophomore nursing student at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and is currently employed at the Wakefield Care Center.

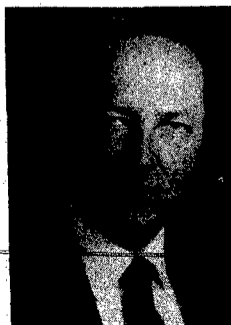

Senior girls softball team ready for season

One thing coaches in all sports dream about is having a good team one year, and then returning every single player the following year.

Bailey guided his young stars to a third place finish in the Annual Nebraska Girls 19 and Under State Fast Pitch Tournament last year in Grand Island, and believe it or not, every girl in every position is back again this year.

"Beating the Silver Bullets was definitely a season highlight," Bailey said. "They are always considered to be one of the best teams because they play a lot of Class A teams. When we beat them 2-0, I was ecstatic."

Bailey says the team goals for this year include winning the league, which is no easy task considering Emerson is in the league. Emerson won the state championship in Class C two years ago and finished in the top three last year.

Other teams in the league include Pender, Hubbard, Wakefield, Homer, Winnebago, Allen, Ponca and Newcastle. Bailey expects Pender and Emerson to push Wayne for the league title with Ponca and Allen being darkhorses.

Bailey's second goal of the season is to improve within each game. And thirdly, to compete well at the state tournament which will be held July 21-22-23 at Grand Island.

As already mentioned Wayne will be involved in more games this year, approximately 35 as of right now. Wayne will be involved in five tournaments as compared to three last season. Bailey has added a York Tournament as well as a Sioux City Tournament to the list of games to be played.

Robin Lutt returns as the team's top pitcher and hitter. Lutt has excellent speed and good ball placement as well as hitting .538 last year. Lutt will be throwing to catcher Tracy Gamble who was also one of five batters to hit over .400 last season. Gamble's ability to throw the ball to any base with a flick of her wrist makes the opposition's base stealing hazardous to their chances of winning.

Kristy Hansen returns to man the first base position and the left hander has become one of Wayne's most consistent performers both offensively and defensively. She has deceptive speed and hit very well last season.

Leslie Keating may be one of the hardest working individuals on the team at second base. Keating blends in very well with the balanced infield Wayne has. Dana Nelson will return to the shortstop position where she is a very consistent performer. Nelson will also pitch when called upon to relieve starter Robin Lutt. Nelson also exhibits excellent base running skills and is a very smart player. "Dana really makes things happen when she gets on base," Bailey said. "She has good bat speed and I guess you could call her the catalyst of the team."

Susy Lutt will play third base for Wayne, the same place she played last year. She has a very strong arm and offensively, was another of the .400 plus hitters. The outfield will consist of Shelly Gilliland at left field, Marnie Bruggeman at center field and Tonya Erleben at right field.

Gilliland was the most improved player on the team from the beginning of last year to the end of last year according to Bailey. She has a good arm and when the time comes when Bailey calls for a bunt, Gilliland's among the best in the business.

Bruggeman in center field has an excellent arm according to Bailey and she makes very few mental errors which makes her extremely strong. Bruggeman is also a good batter. Tonya Erleben rounds out the field of nine in right field. Erleben has a very strong arm and has a strong bat. Tonya missed the first part of last season but Bailey is assured that this season she'll be there throughout,

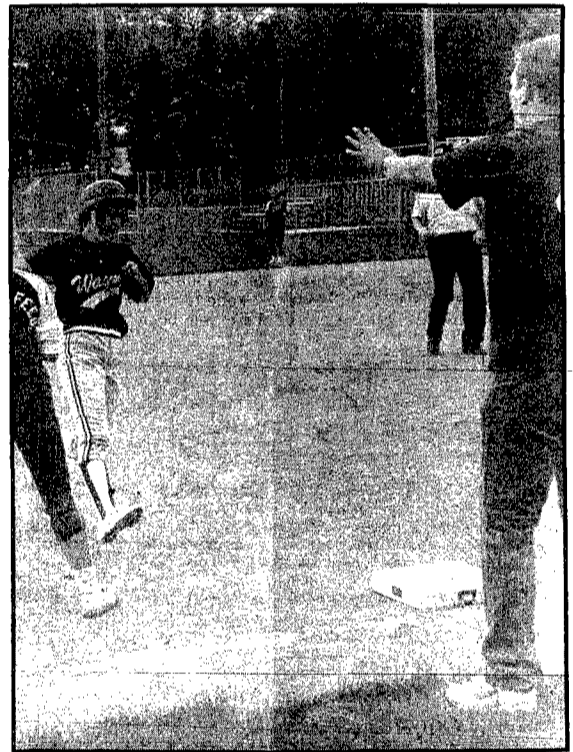

monument is so close to the highway," he added.

During Monday's dedication ceremony, small flags were placed at the monument site, each representing one of the crewman who had died in the air disaster. Crosses were placed in fields where the bodies of the crewmen were found.

WM. NORVELL, Larry Harrington and Dewayne Freeman participated in the unveiling of the monument. Roll call and presentation

of medallions to the deceased veteran survivors were presented by Gerald Cunningham and Gene Twiford.

Col. Dennis Sandstrom, commander with the Iowa Air National Guard at the Sioux Gateway Airport, announced that the Memorial Flyover of Squadron members from the 185th Air Guard would be participating in the dedication ceremony, flying in the missing person formation. Sandstrom said the Laurel monument dedication ceremony on Monday "put tingles up and down my spine."

"We have already done 10 'fly-bys' in northwest Iowa and north-

east Nebraska. They will have done 26 'fly-bys' before the day is done. This is one of the most impressive ceremonies. I think this is just phenomenal," Sandstrom said.

Winston Nelson of Sierra Vista, Arizona, older brother of deceased veteran Nelson, summed up most of the feelings of the visiting family members of the deceased veterans. He said it is "absolutely amazing what this community [Laurel] has done."

"It has been our privilege to come from Arizona and to ....experience....and I believe that's the word to describe it...this particular event," Nelson said.

### Area farmers to be surveyed

AREA-A nationwide survey to estimate 1989 crop acreages, grain stocks and livestock numbers will include interviews with Wayne county farmers, the Nebraska Agricultural Statistics Service announced.

Virginia Gosch of Randolph, with the Service's field staff, will contact local producers beginning June 1 for information about crops planted and planting intentions planned for 1989 and number of livestock on hand. Some producers may be telephoned from the Lincoln office.

All individual information collected is confidential and used only in developing official national and state estimates. Elevators will also be surveyed to obtain supplies of off-farm grain programs.

Gosch said that farmer cooperation is necessary to provide accurate crop and livestock estimates. The results of this survey will provide farmers, ranchers, merchants, policy makers and other agricultural data users with expected supplies from agriculture this year.

### Andersen becomes officer candidate

Anderson of Pilger who is located with the Wayne Guard Unit, began the first step in becoming officers May 20 when they reported for Officer-Candidate School at the Nebraska National Guard Military Academy in Camp Ashland, Nebraska.

They began two weeks of intense training designed to train them in decision-making and teamwork under the extreme stress that military leaders must face.

## Session ends on tax note

The Ninety-First Legislature-First Session concluded its business and officially adjourned sine die last Wednesday. The 90 day session has been repeatedly heralded for the accomplishments in tax relief. In place is a dual tax package which is the hallmark of the session. Next fiscal year \$122 million will be returned to taxpayers through a property tax plan and modifications in the income tax system.

LB 84, which has been signed by the Governor, provides for a 8.5 percent reduction in property taxes valuation for all homeowners, business owners and farmers. Under the plan \$98 million will be returned to property owners next year. The Governor has also signed LB 739. This bill would provide about \$24 million a year in income tax relief. The measure provides for a reduction in the marginal tax rate for the middle-income brackets, increases the personal exemption, and provides a state child care credit, and also raises the elderly credit.

THIS SESSION the Legislature also put into place a plan that in two years calls for permanent tax relief. To correct the over reliance on property taxes, LB 84 was tied to LB 611. Under LB 611 the Legislature declared its intent to replace the current school finance system with an income tax based system. While the bill does not enact the system to be used, it does force a change by ending all state aid to education by June 1991.

Advancements were also made in the area of economic development. Passed and signed by the Governor was a measure increasing the tax credits for small businesses. Under LB 335, the necessary investment required to be eligible for tax incentives under the Employment Expansion and Investment Act was decreased from \$100,000 to \$75,000. The bill increased the tax credit from \$1,000 per employee to \$1,500 and also gives an \$1,000 credit for each investment of \$75,000. Also passed was a bill that would aid the development of cities. The Legislature approved a bill that would give \$9 million to communities for street, sewer and other infrastructure improvements.

SEVERAL landmark education measures were also passed. In an effort to improve education by better compensating our teachers, the Legislature approved LB 89. The bill is designed to be an incentive for local school boards to at least \$16,000. Under the bill, \$20 million per year has been earmarked for teacher's salaries.

Nebraska became a leader in two important issues. Building on the experience of other states, Nebraska became the fourth state to approve a school choice bill. LB 183 gives students the right to attend another school district without paying tuition. Also, Nebraska become one of the first states to call for a phasing out of petroleum-based plastic products. Environmental concerns prompted the Legislature to require these products to be replaced with degradable corn-based plastic in future years.

horizons, tomorrow's student will learn to use the resources of our nation and will be prepared to keep America, the foremost nation in the world.

"Another bridge to America's future will come from the use of knowledge and technology. Our economy and defense must employ the most sophisticated techniques and equipment in order to ensure the rights to life, liberty and pursuit of happiness. America's current leadership in the technological field cannot be allowed to falter. The educated men and women of the future will make the United States a country that foreigners and oppressed people will continue to view in awe and hope.

"OUR ADVANCES and discoveries must also be used to preserve the spirit and drive of American citizens. Frontiers can be pushed outward, whether they are in the ocean or in the vast arena of outer space. The exploration of these

frontiers and the elimination of barriers will yield new discoveries and can develop American pride like little else.

"The government of the United States of America has perhaps the most direct influence upon our country's future. Policies that are developed, and decisions that are made by our leaders today will determine this nation's course tomorrow. Our government is, in fact, responsible for preserving itself — a government for the people, by the people. The leaders of our country are, as always, obligated to uphold the Constitution, a document so carefully and conscientiously compiled that its values and insight are more valuable today than ever before.

"Finally, America may certainly not become isolated from the rest of the world. We are responsible for upholding democracy and standing up to tyrannical and oppressive regimes. The nation of American citizens is not merely concerned with itself. It is con-

**Athlete's Foot Treatment**

Athlete's foot is the most common fungal infection occurring on the skin. The infection may cause pain, inflammation, scaling, breaks in the skin, and possibly a loss of the top layer of skin. The areas between and under the toes are most frequently affected. The organisms that cause athlete's foot thrive in a warm, moist setting. While severe athlete's foot may require the care of a physician, many infections can be prevented or treated with self care and the use of nonprescription medicines.

Keep both feet as clean and dry as possible. Change socks frequently, especially during hot weather. Carefully dry the feet after bathing or swimming. Wear wooden or rubber clogs when staying at motels or using public showers and swimming pools. During hot days wear sandals or no shoes at all.

If athlete's foot develops, apply topical antifungal creams, sprays, or powders. Two of the most effective topical antifungal medicines are available without prescription - *tolnaftate* and *miconazole*. Daily use of topical medicines containing salicylic acid may help remove dead skin so that antifungal medicines will reach the areas of infection and work more effectively.

I had a postcard early in the month inviting me to the "Centennial observance" or the Waco High School Alumni Association. It wasn't a reunion year for me, but I had missed my 30-year affair to attend the only one Hoskins High School ever had.

So I sent a note saying we would try to be there. It was not to be in the old school gym because the school has been sold and is now Waco Lutheran High School, complete with dorms.

The banquet was at the "Chances R" beer garden in York. I'd been there, and I knew the food was great. The garden isn't a garden at all, but a big old warehouse, decorated with old gasoline pumps and ads. Which doesn't sound like much of an atmosphere, but you have to see it.

Waco High graduated its last class in 1967, and the alumni association has been struggling ever

since. In fact, it's been called a dying organization. This has happened in a lot of small towns today. But there were 160 good folks there last night who were very much alive and having a good time.

The superintendent for the class of '49 came from Torrington, Wyoming and reminded us that he had been, at the age of 22, the youngest school administrator ever in the state.

He earned \$3200 that year and bought a new Ford for \$900. Gas was 20 cents a gallon and hamburgers a quarter. He commented that the gals all wore girdles, too!

THEN MY former typing teacher got to the mike and said he had earned \$3600 just seven years later. He served as principal, taught five classes out of six periods, directed the class plays (insisting that we know our lines), put the yearbook together, and collected hot lunch money.

He admitted he had stopped in Seward to ask where Waco was, and that when he saw the four hitching posts still on main street, he almost left again.

That reminded the MC that a minister of that era had once told him that when he came to Waco and saw the awnings still over the fronts of the stores, he expected Matt Dillon to appear at any moment.

Old annuals and school photos were passed around, we sang the school song, I talked to a past piano teacher and a 4-H leader, and exchanged a bunch of hand shakes and hugs and laughs.

The Big Farmer even ran across an old fraternity brother, and found a few farmers to trade tales of dry weather with. (It was pouring there when we left.)

There was one gentleman from the class of 1924. Even if it was a ten-year school then, he must be past 80.

The representative of the class of '39 was delightful. She said their graduation speaker had challenged them to "go with the green lights", and hers had all become amber.

SHE ALSO told us she spent a lot of time thinking about the hereafter: as in going to the next room and saying, "Now what did I come in here after?"

It reminded me of the T-shirt on the friend who joined us for supper on Saturday that said, "Of all the things I've lost, I miss my mind the most."

The peonies were beautiful. We froze on Sunday and cooked on Monday. The first summer holiday weekend is past. There were reunions, birthday parties, and Memorial Day ceremonies.

They helped us to reminisce, to pause and remember, to store more memories, renew old acquaintances, and count our blessings. I kind of think being from a small town is one of those.

Check exchange source Searching for hay?

Many livestock producers in drought areas are already searching for emergency sources of hay or pasture, and electronic help is on the way.

Starting in late May, a "hay and grazing exchange" will provide free information on available supplies over a wide area of the United States. Data will include location of the hay or pasture, along with telephone number of the owner and other basic facts.

While the program is nationwide in scope, it is being coordinated by the Nebraska Department of Agriculture and the University of Nebraska Extension Service. Data Transmission Network will publish new listings each day.

Producers with hay to sell or pasture to rent call a toll-free number, 800/446-9903. Their no-cost listing is processed, then electronically delivered nationwide to some 40,000 video units on farms and in agribusinesses. In some county extension offices, a special DTN receiving unit is available for public use at no cost.

Sellers will need the following information when they phone in: State, county, phone number, type of hay, bale size, approximate

quantity and quality.

"THIS JOINT effort is aimed at helping those in need find workable answers to their problem," says DTN spokesman Jim Marquiss. "The system delivers information, not hay, and we are doing it with speed and accuracy."

"Four organizations are underwriting costs of this project," says Marquiss. "They are the University, the Department of Agriculture, Pfizer U.S. Animal Health Operations, and DTN. These efforts will be appreciated by those in need."

The system was tested in the summer of 1988. Even with a late start and a limited test area, more than 500 listings of forage were carried. Some hay was offered at no cost in an attempt to help those caught in extreme drought conditions.

"In summary, this idea operates at no cost to the buyer or seller; it is strictly a way to bring them together for mutual benefit," says Marquiss.

DTN provides nearly 100 pages of up-to-the-minute market and weather data for as little as \$19.95 per month after paying a one-time fee to cover equipment and service charges.

What foods, drinks, other medicines or activities should I avoid while taking this drug? Are there any side effects, and what do I do if they occur?
