

No-till demo

AREA-An in-field demonstration of no-till planting of soybeans into standing corn stalks will take place on Thursday, June 8.

It will be hosted by Terry Roth, and the location of the demonstration will be five miles south and 3 1/2 miles west of Pender. Starting time is 5:30 p.m.

Besides the planter demonstration and a herbicide plot tour, there will also be a demonstration on measuring the amount of residue left after planting, and a discussion on scouting your fields for insects and other pests.

These will be lead by David Shelton, Extension Ag Engineer; and Keith Jarvi, Integrated Pest Management Assistant. Both are from the Northeast Research Extension Center in Concord. The field day will conclude with a light lunch.

Roadside haying

AREA-State Ag Director Roy Frederick said it is likely that additional roadside haying measures will be enacted within the next few weeks. For the time being, he said only the first 15 feet of each roadside may be hayed.

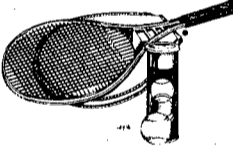
Frederick said allowing farmers to hay what was normally mowed down by the state will provide some immediate relief. He also expected additional right-of-way haying programs to be announced at a date earlier than last year.

A second round of permits will be required for farmers interested in obtaining roadside hay past the 15-foot line, he said. Farmers requesting permits or with any questions should contact their nearest Department of Roads office.

Tennis set

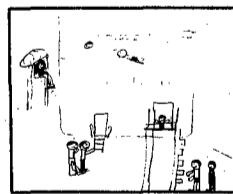
WAYNE-Classes for recreation tennis in Wayne will begin Monday, June 5 and will go through June 29.

Says Dr. Mash in address

Wayne State reaches out

Wayne State College president, Dr. Donald Mash, recently told a group of economic development specialists that colleges such as Wayne State need to develop an active role that goes beyond mere presence.

"Public colleges and universities must develop aspects of their role and mission which consciously address community and economic development," Mash said when addressing the Nebraska Industrial Development Association's spring meeting in Norfolk.

"In order to do this, they're going to have to become more strategic and entrepreneurial. This will be a distinct change for many campuses, especially those that have thought of themselves as ivory towers for a long time. A change of attitude will be required."

Mash cited Wayne State College as an example of this change. He said the northeast Nebraska college is a regional, public college that is extremely interested in contributing to its region's development.

"WE'RE AN AGENCY, an investment vehicle through which public dollars can be translated into outcomes for our citizens," he said. "We're not the end product. Our students are, the northeast Nebraska region is."

Mash said Wayne State is carrying out a "fairly simple" role and mission. It is concentrating on developing students and developing the region.

While addressing student development, Mash said in order for rural regions to be economically viable in the future, they must begin attracting service sector employers.

"It is estimated that 80 to 85 percent of the jobs in this country, by the year 2000, will be in the service sector," Mash said. "Many of these jobs require higher thinking skills."

"We're going to have to provide more education across the work force. And if this isn't challenging enough, in Nebraska the lack of population growth, the presence of out-migration and an aging population will create a human

capital shortage in numbers as well. "We've got to invest in people by providing more education. And we've got to involve as many of our citizens as possible."

IN REGARD to regional development, Mash said Wayne State is striving to become "a center, focal point, a catalyst, in northeast Nebraska — not only for education but for the arts, cultural activities and general community and economic development."

He said that Wayne State is reaching out to communities in the region, attempting to create a mindset for a broader regional perspective.

Mash also mentioned that employers may find rural American cities — especially those with colleges — very attractive in the future. He said urban/suburban living problems, high labor costs and high land costs may force employers to consider locating in dynamic rural regions like northeast Nebraska.

Top exec to return to Carroll

"You can take the boy out of Carroll, but you can't take the Carroll out of the boy."

The saying above, although somewhat taken out of context, applies to international businessman H. Bruce McEVer of Manhattan, New York. He is the son of Lucille Paulsen McEVer.

In this season that is filled with reunions of families, schools and communities, McEVer and his wife, Georgia, will return to his boyhood roots in Carroll — a community he hasn't seen for the past 25 years.

McEVer is the president of the Berkshire Capital Corporation, an investment banking group which he founded in 1983. The Berkshire Capital Corporation has become internationally known in the past six years — with such prestigious clients as the Bank of Liechtenstein, Owens-Illinois, Inc., U.S. Trust Corporation and Integrated Resources, Inc.

Though he spends his time traveling around the globe in the high-power atmosphere of multi-million dollar mergers, McEVer often thinks back to his boyhood summers at his mother's ancestral home in Carroll.

"I'VE ALWAYS felt my mother instilled in me a code of values which are inherently midwestern — plain talk, simple honesty, trust in people and perhaps a little stubbornness," McEVer said.

"These things have remained with me no matter where I am and what nationality of client I am meeting. I always have a little bit of Carroll with me to keep me steady," he said.

"For years I have wanted to show my wife where I played as a boy, what people are like here, how it is to live a country life. Things have changed a lot since I was a boy, and I want Georgia to see it before it disappears," he added.

Georgia is a professional opera singer who has performed leading roles under contract with Columbia Artists and Community Concerts and with opera companies in Manhattan and Palm Beach. She is originally from Chicago.

The couple met at her "coming out" 19 years ago and lived in California and Washington, D.C. before settling in Manhattan on the Upper East Side. They also own an estate in Connecticut.

"I've heard about Carroll all the years I've known my husband, and I

can hardly wait to see it," said Georgia. "My family has a farm in Good Hope, Georgia, but it is very different from the midwestern farms. I love the farm in Georgia, and I know I will enjoy this trip."

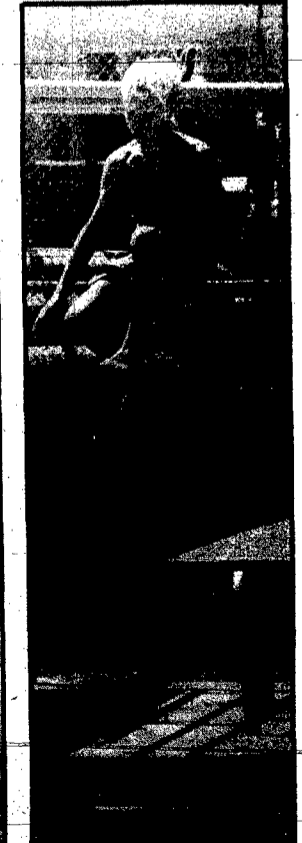
LUCILLE Paulsen, McEVer's mother, was born and reared on a farm 2 1/2 miles north of Carroll and later the family purchased a house in town.

In the early 1940's, Lucille met and married Harold McEVer, a navy pilot who served in World War II. After the war, McEVer became a pilot for Delta Airlines and the couple moved to Atlanta, Georgia.

They had two children, Bruce and Sharon. The McEVer family visited the Paulsen home in Carroll during the summer when the children were small. The senior McEVer's are now retired and still reside in Atlanta.

Said his mother: "Bruce loved to come to Carroll. I remember he used to stay outside all day with the animals who were his playmates. One time when he was four, he had to get vaccinated for kindergarten."

PICNIC SEASON SAFETY

The picnic season officially begins with the Memorial Day weekend. If your calendar seems to be filling up with picnics and family reunions, you can use these food safety reminders.

Pack your picnic lunch with one important principle in mind, "Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold." Below 40 degrees food poisoning bacteria are relatively inactive. At summer temperatures of 80 degrees and above bacteria are relatively inactive. At summer temperatures of 80 degrees and above, bacteria multiply very quickly and can cause food-borne illnesses. Keeping foods hot at 140 degrees will also prevent food bacteria from growing.

Pack cold foods with plenty of ice in a well-insulated cooler. Transporting your cooler in the passenger area of the car will help keep foods cooler longer. The trunk can reach very high temperatures on a summer day. At the picnic site, set your cooler in the shade. You can even give it extra insulation with a sleeping bag or blanket cover.

The second rule of food safety is "keep everything that touches food clean." Use disposable hand wipes if soap and water are unavailable for hand washing. Wash after handling raw meat or poultry when barbecuing. Use clean serving utensils for cooked meat.

After everyone has had seconds, put perishable foods back in the cooler. Don't leave them out while you go on to other activities. It will only take a minute to get food back out for a snack later.

Taking a casserole to the picnic? A thoroughly cooked casserole will usually stay warm and safe to eat if insulated well. Wrap the casserole in layers of aluminum foil and newspaper. Put the wrapped casserole in a hamper or box and pack other items around it for extra insulation.

What to do with picnic leftovers is a common problem. If you were gone no more than four or five hours and your perishables were on ice except when cooked and served, you should be able to save the leftovers. When in doubt, throw it out. It's better not to spoil picnic memories with a case of food poisoning.
