can use these food safety reminders.
Pack your picnic lunch with one important principle in mind, "Keep hot Pack your picnic lunch with one important principle in mind, "Keep hot
foods hot and cold foods cold." Below 40 degrees food poisoning bacte
ia are relatively inactive. At summer temperatures of 80 degres above bacteria are relatively inactive. At summer temperatures of 80 degrees and above, bacteria multiply very quickly and can cause food-
borne illnesses. Keeping foods hot at 140 degrees will also prevent food Pack cold foods with penty $\qquad$
$\qquad$ The second rule of food safety is "keep everything that touches food
clean." Use disposable hand wipes if soap and water are unavailable for hand washing. Wash after handling raw meat or poultry when barbe-
quing. Use clean serving utensils for cooked meat.
After everyone has had seconds, put perishable foods back in the only take a minute the get food back out for a snack later.
Taking a casserole to the picnic? A thoroughly cooked casserole will usually stay warm and safe to eat in insulated well. Wrap the casserole in
layers of aluminum foil and newspaper. Put the wrapped casserole in a What to do with picnic leftovers is a common problem. If you were
gone no more than four or five hours and your perishables were on ice except when cooked and served, you should be able to save the left-
overs. When in doubt, throw it out. It's better not to spoil picnic memories

Question: A. Why does the city of Wayne give free second water meters to some consumers so they can avoid paying sewer rates on the water used to ire does each of these free meters cost the other taxpayers? C. Why isn't the water rate further reduced to allow all consumers to irrigate at the same rate?

## Answer:

 A.The City of Wayne instituted a program of providing free $5 / 8$by $3 / 4$ inch water'meters to ALL water customers in lanuary 1981. Any customer requiring a larger meter must pay the differ, ence between the cost of the $5 / 8$ by $3 / 4$ meter and the cost of The United State
The United States Environmental Protection Agency, as part of
their grant requirements, requires the City to meter all water
that enters the sanitary ser that enters the sanitary. sewer system to determine the source of entry as well as a correlating number for comparison with what both a total consumption meter and one that meters special use All water customers are eligible to apply for the special water
rate for irrigating and B. The unit cost of the most recent purchase of water meters is $\$ 45.22$ each with a 11 year warranty. Water customers (and not
necessarily taxpayers) do not have to pay for their water meters. The meter is required to keep a record of water consumed and water treated by the City.
C.As was stated before, the City is required to meter all water
consumed and treated by the City of Wayne. If a customer cannot identify or meter the water used for irrigation or cooling purposes, it is assumed that the customer discharged used water into the wastewater system and the Environmental Protection Agency requires the metering of that water. The City stands ready and willing to assist any and all water cus-
