Crop report

AREA-Statistics from the Nebraska Agricultural Statistics Service show that as of last weekend, topsoil moisture in the state was 73 percent short and 27 percent adequate and subsoil moisture was 91 percent short and 9 percent adequate. Conditions at this time last year showed topsoil moisture at 75 percent poor, but subsoil at 49 percent poor, 49 percent adequate and two percent surplus. percent surplus.

percent surplus.

The corn crop, with 99 percent emerged, is rated at 1 percent very poor, 9 percent poor, 57 percent fair, 29 percent good; and 4 percent excellent. There is heavy corn borer infestation in the east central district. in the east central district.

in the east central district.
Ninety-six percent of the state's sorghum crop has been planted, with about 80 percent of the crop emerged. Seven percent of the sorghum is rated poor, 62 percent fair and 31 percent seven sev

62 percent fair and 31 percent good.

Soybean planting, after last weekend, was about 98 percent complete, with about 92 percent of the plants emerged. Conditions of the soybeans were rated as 16 percent poor, 58 percent fair, 25 percent good and 1 percent excellent. Bean leaf beetles have been reported in the east central and northeast regions of Nebraska.

With the first cutting of alfalfa 75 percent complete, yields have been well below

alfalfa 75 percent complete, yields have been well below normal. The alfalfa has been

normal. The alfalfa has been rated at 4 percent very poor; 32 percent poor; 62 percent fair; and just 2 percent good. Pasture range feed supplies were rated at 84 percent short and 16 percent adequate, according to the ag statistics service.

becomes main topic Agenda

Who determines what or what

should not be placed on the city council agenda? That question was posed by Councilman Darrel Fuelberth dur-

Councilman Darrel Fuelberth dur-ing Tuesday night's regular meet-ing of the city council. Fuelberth said he wanted to place a proposal made by Peoples Natural Gas officials, about offering PeopleService, on the agenda for the regular council meeting on May 29. But it was not on the agenda.

agenda.
"I think we have to consider a "I think we nave to consider a policy on the matter concerning if something should be placed on the agenda or not," Fuelberth said. At a council meeting in April, PeopleService representatives said.

they could provide the city of Wayne with a menu of services which would include meter reading, automated billing, cash collection/management, water ing, automated Dinning, collection/management, water utility operations, wastewater utility operations and water and water utility management.

The PeopleService representa-es mentioned at that council

meeting that they can prepare a formal proposal and bid for consideration at a future council meeting providing they had city council authority and the cooperation of the city

MAYOR Marsh said during Tuesday night's meeting that it was he who took the matter off of the agenda. He said he misunderstood what was to be discussed on the agenda topic and that he asked the agenda item of PeopleService be taken off because the council was not prepared to act on the

was not prepared to act on the proposal yet.

He said he wrote a letter, dated May 26, to the council members prior to the council meeting, explaining why the topic was not placed on the agenda and pointing out that the city had not received the formal proposal and documents from Peoples about the PeopleService program and how that service is operating in other communities.

other communities.
"There was no place written in the letter that I said we should not have the study, I think we should have the study, Marsh said. He

said the city is currently involved in other studies right now. Peoples District Manager Jim

Markham said he was unaware about the request of the city council, and that there could have been a "communication problem' about the situation.

FUELBERTH said he asked that the topic be placed on the May 29 meeting agenda for discussion purposes only, basically because it had been nearly a month since the PeopleService proposal was made and no discussion or administration input had been given in meetings. input had been given in meetings that followed.

that followed.

City Attorney Kem Swarts said the decision on who had the authority to place or not place items on the agenda could have legal ramifications. The mayor, he said, has veto power under state statute and it takes a 2/3 vote of

the council to override the veto. But it was uncertain if this would apply to establishing agenda items.

Swarts will review the agenda topic matter and report back to

This is Benthack Clinic's first venture in providing satellite clinic care in other communities, Benthack said. Wayne Family Practice, he said, offers clinic care in Laurel and Wisner.

He said the hospital has to undergo some structural changes in some areas — to remodel for a

better patient waiting area and also to remodel an office or two. Equipment at the Wakefield hospital and from the former physician's office would adequately erve the clinic and its personnel

Benthack mentioned.

If the demand is justifiable then
Benthack Clinic would consider recruiting another physician to assist in the clinic operation, Benthack added.

Review board schedules forum on local gas issue

The six member Natural Gas Study Review Board from Wayne announced Tuesday that they will schedule a public meeting next week to gain input from citizens on

week to gain input from citizens on the gas study report completed by HDR Engineering of Omaha. Purpose of the HDR report, ac-cording to the executive summary-of the draft study by HDR, was to help the city council determine if it might be feasible or advantageous (for customers within and around the city) to acquire the natural gas

the city) to acquire the natural gas system and operate it as part of the other municipal utilities.

The public meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday, June 20, 7:30 p.m. in the Wayne City Council chambers.

HDR Engineering was retained by the Nebraska Municipal Power Pool to assist several municipalities in Nebraska, including Wayne, in the evaluation process.

IN DECEMBER of last year, the city council passed an ordinance establishing the six-member Natural Gas Study Review board. Re-sponsibilities of the board included making a neutral review, study, analysis, investigation and examianalysis, investigation and exami-nation of the gas study report by IDR; and to complete the neces-sary investigations—into—the local gas distribution operation.

The review board will then be required to compile a thorough and unbiased report to the city. council on the state of the local gas distribution system. Members of this board, appointed by Mayor Wayne Marsh, are Bill Dickey, Pat-Gross, Sid Hillier, Jacque Kinnett, Gerald Schafer and Andrew Soll, all

Geraid Schalter and Andrew Soli, all of Wayne.
Hillier, chairman of the group, said Tuesday that the review board has met with a variety of groups, including HDR, Peoples, engineering firms that have been working with communities that have their own gas system and with commu-nity representatives that have municipally owned natural gas sys-

"We're entering our final stage of the review," Hillier said, adding that the meeting Tuesday will not be a "question and answer" session but more or less an opportunity for citizens to provide the review board additional input to present to the city council.

HILLIER SAID the review board has completed at least 10 meetings on the subject. "We've dedicated a lot of hours on it and read lots of material," he said.

"We've reviewed all that we canfind on the matter," he added.

He said the committee remains in a neutral position on the subject.

in a neutral position on the subject. At the time the ordinance was passed, it was stated that the re-view board was not to be influenced by the city council, city ad-ministration or other such organization, company or individual that seeks to press any type of bi-ased feelings with regard to this

Bob Carhart of Wayne approached city council members during their regular meeting Tues-day evening to ask about the progress of the review board's ac-tivities and he also asked when the board's recommendation would be made to the city council. He also questioned the city council about when the completed HDR report would be available for public in-

Carhart posed the question of

Carhart posed the question of how those attending the public input meeting next Tuesday night can provide comments without seeing the final HDR report.

Preliminary drafts of the report were seen by the public, but the final draft has been given only to the review board, city administration and several Peoples officials. The city council members have not reviewed the final report.

COUNCILMAN Darrel fuel-berth-said-he-could see no reason why the city council could not be provided a copy of the final HDR report prior to the review board presentation to the city council.

City Attorney Kem Swarts said it was clear when the ordinance was passed establishing the review board, that the review board would not be getting into public discussion on the matter. "That is not the role and mission of the review board," he said.

The review board will pass on their recommendations and suggestions to the city council. The city council members will then take into consideration the review board's report, study the HDR re-port themselves and make their own determinations, Swarts noted.

erty loss.

Of this property loss, \$50,000 was lost on a June 21, 1988 fire when a demonstrator ambulance

Eggs to be launched by rocket into space

A new event that will be tied in to the Wayne Chicken Show will be an Egg Launch Contest that will offer up to \$100 in total

The Wayne Chicken Show's main menu of activity will take place on Saturday, July 8. The rocket contest is scheduled for the following day, July 9, at 8 a.m. at the open field southwest of the

Contestants can use any rocket they prefer to carry the single

contestants can use any tocket pley present carry the single egg cargo.

Costs of a new rocket, Blomenkamp said, can reach up to \$9.29 and the set of engines (three to a set) costs around \$3.70. An Eggspress Rocket, specifically constructed to launch eggs into space, can be obtained from Harlan Glanzer of Norfolk at 2310 Belmont Drive.

These rockets have to be on order by June 25, according to Blomenkamp.

These rockets have to be on order by June 25, according to Blomenkamp.

"All rockets are required to use a C-5 engine and the rockets have to reach a height of at least 50 feet or so before they can qualify," Blomenkamp said.

To be eligible for the 160 first place, 130 second place and 110 third place, the rocket carrying the egg payload has to return the egg to earth uncreaked. If more than one egg comes down uncracked, then first place will be determined on how many eggs still have the yoke light.

The tilebreaker will be decided by judging on the rockets that land closes to the launch size.



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
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
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Senior girls softball team wins two at York



Walker singled in Barry Dahlkoetter which proved to be the game winner as Ellingson's could not muster a rally in the bot-tom half of the 11th inning.





Wayne State hosts FUN Camp


