

# Orr designates Wayne as site for Field Office the state in the communities of on the move and getting stronger.

Wavne will become an even greater hub of economic devel-opment activity throughout northeast Nebraska as the city will be the host for a Department of Eco-nomic Development Field Office and also a Bureau for Community and Economic Development — both based on the Wayne State

College campus.
The Field Office and Bureau announcement came Friday from Nebraska Governor Kay Orr and Wayne State College President Dr. Donald Mash during a press conference in Lincoln.

GOVERNOR Orr set the stage for the announcement by commenting on the "good news about the state's economy" and she talked about significance of the state's low 2.5 percent unemployment rate.

Because of such a low unemployment rate, over 800,000 people are working. That increases our

ple are working. That increases our receipts and revenues to the state significantly," Orr said.

"We have ended this past year and will begin this year in a very strong financial position. Our end of the year balance will be around \$290 million. We are pleased to face the year in such a strong position," Orr said.

This comes at a time when na.

This comes at a time when na-tional economic forecasters are saying that a slowdown is coming and there will be some recession-

ary conditions in some states.

There are still programs that the state is obligated to begin which-will go against the sizeable end of the year balance, such as the \$100 million property tax relief and the commitment to teacher spending packages, Orr mentioned.

ORR THEN announced the Field Office final selections that will "help with the economic development efforts in the state's rural re-

vitalization program."
"We will be placing people (in the field offices) to work with community leaders, business leaders, education leaders throughout Kearney, Beatrice, North Platte and Wayne," she continued. The legislature was approached

this year for the funding of the four field offices. In the discussion of the appropriation measure, the legislature decided that one of those field offices should be a community of around 5,000 peo-

ple.
"It only seemed appropriate when we were searching for a community that size — to connect it with one of our state institutions

of higher learning. And that is Wayne State College," Orr said during the press conference.

The Field Office, she said, will be centrally located between Norfolk and South Sioux City. "I think that it is a good choice," she said.

THE FOUR field service representatives at each of the commu-nity sites will be responsible for identifying local leadership, pro-viding information about available resources, assisting with the delivery of Department of Economic Development Programs, and, where appropriate, coordinating development activities with other

development activities with other agencies or organizations.
At the same time, Gov. Orr and Dr. Donald Mash announced the establishment of a Bureau for Community and Economic Development. "This will be a public and private partnership that will aid us in our effort for rural revitalization," Orr said "And under the leader. in our effort for rural revitalization,"
Orr said. "And under the leadership and guidance of Dr. Donald
Mash, Wayne State is beginning an
outreach program that will act as a
catalyst for economic development
in the northeast sector of the
state."

The Bureau, she said, will prone bureau, see said, will pro-vide a focal point for the coopera-tion and coordination of programs in this part of the state. This Bu-reau will be funded primarily by a grant from U S West Communica-tions.

KEN POWER, vice president and chief executive officer of U S West Communications in Ne-braska, said he agreed with Governor Orr about the economy. "The state of Nebraska is definitely

We are for economic development in the state and we want to do whatever we can to contribute to that," Power said at the press

that," Power said at the press conference.

He said the company has established a grant of up to \$45,000 to Wayne State College — just to do the things that Governor Orrhad indicated would be done. "It's a partnership of all of us. We're looking forward to some great results," said Power.

### Tax relief alternatives, deadlines explained

The recent legislative session resulted in the passage of Legislative Bill 84 which provides approximately \$98.1 million for

direct property tax relief.

The new law, which is effective for tax year 1989 only, provides two methods to reduce property

All real and personal property (with the exception of motor vehicles) is eligible for, and will receive a reduction of 8.5 percent

receive a reduction of s.5. percent of the taxable value of the property. This reduction will be given automatically. "There is no action required for those to receive this relief," according to Joyce Reeg, Wayne County Assessor.

HOMEOWNERS could elect to receive their relief through an alternative plan which allows for a

homestead exemption of the first \$5,400 of the actual value of the

order to qualify for this "In order to quality for this exemption, you must own and occupy your home from Jan. 1, 1989 through Aug. 15, 1989. You must also file an application with your county assessor on or before Sept. 1 of this year," according to

Reeg.
"If your home is is valued for tax purposes at less than \$63,530, the \$5,400 exemption provides a larger benefit than does the 8.5 percent reduction, but you must apply to receive the homestead exemption." Reeg mentioned.

exemption, Reeg mentioned.

"If you do not know the tax value of your home, be sure to flie the application because the assessor will then be able to apply the greater of the benefits. If you do not file with the assessor, you

will automatically receive the 8.5 percent."

if they own two or more types of property, such as residential and agricultural, or residential and commercial, they will be eligible for the exemption on their home and the 8.5 percent reduction on the other property.

THEY should also note that this property tax relief does not affect a taxpayer's eligibility for the existing elderly or disabled homestead exemption. "However, if you are denied for one of those exemptions, your application will automatically be considered for the \$5,400 exemption," mentioned Reeg.

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

Forgetfulness, confusion and certain other behavior changes used to be widely accepted as incurable effects of aging. A minor head injury, a high fever, poor nutrition or adverse drug reaction can tempo-rarily upset normal activity of sensitive brain cells. Rather than dismissing mental confusion as "just old age," a complete medical examination is in order to determine the cause.

Of the 38 million people who reeive monthly Social Security benefits, 61 percent are retired workers. Seven percent are disabled workers, many of them under age 60. Thirty-two percent are families, including 3.3 million children, of retired, disabled or deceased workers.





### For Your Information

Question: A. Does Wayne State College attempt to do as much business as possible with local Wayne firms? Is WSC required by law to bid every purchase — and accept only the lowest bid regardless of location — or does WSC consider local firms first because of convenience and other factors?

### Answer:

A. Purchasing at Wayne State college is done under Nebraska Statute (Sections 81-145 to 81-163 and 81-1118 to 81-1118.03) and procedures specified by the Department of Administrative Services (DAS). These procedures require that all purchases above specified dollar levels be bid. Consistent with DAS procedures and recommendation of the public accounting firm which annually audits College operations, the bid limit has been set at \$300. That is, all purchases of \$300 or more must be by a competitive bid.

The College is not required to accept the lowest bid price. Other factors considered are the ability of the bidder to perform Other factors considered are the ability of the bidder to perform the contract acceptably and on time; quality of performance of the bidder on previous contracts; life cycle costs and predicted performance of the article in relation to purchase price; and other information having a bearing on the purchase decision. These factors allow WSC to consider more than price alone, including any advantages local firms may offer over other competitive bidders.

Although factors other than price may be considered, the Although factors other than price may be considered, the WSC administration takes seriously its stewardship of public funds. Every purchase by the College represents an expenditure of either student or taxpayer dollars. The guiding principle followed in making purchasing decisions is that public funds entrusted to the College must be used prudently.

Within these laws, procedures and principles, the College attempts to do business locally whenever possible by routinely including Wayne firms when requesting price quotations. All other things being equal, bids are awarded locally. Service and supportafter purchase are definite considerations.

This response is offered to a question which suggest the Col-

after purchase are definite considerations.

This response is offered to a question which suggest the College should purchase locally. To the extent taxpayer dollars can be spent wisely, that is done. However, the greater impact of the College on the community of Wayne occurs in ways other than College purchasing. The greatest impact is the jobs provided, the salaries paid to Wayne residents, and the services and support offered through the College's many educational and public service outreach programs.

More than 75 percent of WSC's 10.6 million budget goes to payroll. Only a small portion of the remainder is left for discretionary purchases after paying for uncontrollable or sole-source expenses such as utilities, postage, telephones, insurance, library

tionary purchases after paying for uncontrollable or sole-source expenses such as utilities, postage, telephones, insurance, library materials and the like. The \$8 million earned by the College's hundreds of employees, however, ciruclated through the Wayne economy in the form of taxes, home purchases and improvements, consumer spending and the like. It is typical for economic-impact studies to determine the value of the payroll an industry brings to a community by multiplying by six. If that were done in the case of the College, the impact on the Wayne community would be nearly \$50 million.

would be nearly \$50 million. In addition, the College provides the community with vital facilities, resources, activities and support not otherwise available. Without the College there would be no collegiate athletic events; no Black and Gold Series; no plays, concerts, art exhibits, lectures or other activities produced by the College. The Nebras-ka Business Development Center, the Small Business Institute and the the Microcomputer Assistance Center, would not be available. the the Microcomputer Assistance Center would not be available to assist Wayne area businesses to achieve their full potential.





## CRP sign-up slated

The ninth sign-up for the Conservation Reserve Program, which will be July 17 - Aug. 4, has two unique factors, according to Dick Clark, University of Nebraska farm management specialist.

The most critical factor, Clark he most critical factor, claims said, is that the ninth sign-up will be the last opportunity for farmers with highly erodible land to use the CRP to help meet Conservation Compliance Plan requirements. Those plans must be present and accented by lan 1. pared and accepted by Jan. 1, 1990, or producers on highly prodible land will not be eligible for most U.S. Department of Agricul-

ture commodity benefits.

Also worth noting, he said, is that probably only one more CRP sign-up will be offered after Aug.

"Rules and regulations for the ninth sign-up appear to be the same as they've been for the last several sign-ups," said Clark, a specialist at the institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources' West Central Research and Extension Center here.

Producers participating in CRP bidding at Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices July 17 - Aug. 4 can designate their bids for either the 1989 or 1990 crop, he said.

Acres designated for the 1989 CRP cannot be harvested. The 1990 CRP contracts are effective beginning the latest of either Oct. 1, 1989, the date the 1989 crop is harvested, or the date that ASCS signs the CRP contract.
Land eligible for Conservation

Reserve includes wetland that was farmed at least two years of the years 1981-1985. Producers with eligible wetland will be encouraged to plant trees on that land if it will support them. Native grasses, permanent wildlife habitat, field windbreaks, shallow water areas for wildlife and wildlife food plots will be considered it trees cannot be established. Lands subject to scour

established. Lands subject to scour erosion also can be entered into the CRP, Clark explained.

More than 30.5 million acres have been accepted into the CRP nationwide. That is 10-15 million acres short of the national goal. Through the previous eight signups, Nebraska has had more than 1.2 million acres accepted, making it 10th among the states in the number of CRP acres, he said.

### On Kearney State issue College board takes no action

The Nebraska State College Board of Trustees voted unanimously today to take no action to implement Sections 6 to 11 of LB 247 (placing Kearney State College under the responsibility of the University Board of Regents) until the constitutionality of the act is

finally determined by the courts.

Taken in emergency telephone conference, the decision was in response to an attorney general's June 29 opinion that determined as unconstitutional certain sections

The College Board emphasized their action was taken for the purpose of expediting a decision on the bill by the Nebraska Supreme Court, and not to obstruct getting answers to questions raised by the legislation. LB 247 was passed during the first session of Nebraska's Ninety-First Legislature.



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
