to Berlin and to the capital city, Bonn, where he will meet with German govern-





Buying a room air conditioner

If you are in the market to buy a room air conditioner, you probably have one priority now — to buy it fast and beat the heat.

The most important factor to consider when buying a room air condi-The most important factor to consider when buying a room air conditioner is the cooling capacity. Only a model with proper cooling capacity will comfortably cool and dehumidify a room. A room air conditioner with too little cooling capacity will not cool the room adequately, and one that's too large will not lower the humidity enough to prevent the cold,

clammy feeling caused by chilly, humid air.

Cooling capacity is measured in British thermal units per hour (BTU/hr.). It is the amount of heat and humidity transferred from the room to the outdoors in one hour. The large the BTU rating, the greater the unit's

THE REQUIRED capacity can be estimated by following these four

steps:
1. Find the volume of the room by multiplying the width, length and

height, in feet.

2. Multiply the volume by 10 if the roof or attic is well insulated or if

3. Multiply the answer above by 16 if the longest watt faces north; by
17 if it faces east; by 18 if it faces south; or 19 if it faces west.
4. Divide the answer above by 60 to determine an estimated BTU/hr.

needed.

Once the cooling capacity is determined, compare room air conditioners on their energy efficiency rating. Room air conditioner efficiency is expressed as EER. The higher the EER, the more energy efficient the air conditioner. A bright yellow EnergyGuide label is on every room air conditioner. It shows the model's EER, its cooling capacity, and how the unit compares in efficiency to other models of similar capacity.

While you may be tempted to get the first air conditioner you see, take the time to make sure you are spending your money wisely.

## Million fish stocked

Some 2.7 million fish of all variothe 2.7 million lish of all varieties were stocked in lakes and reservoirs across the state in May, according to a fish stocking report issued by the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission's fisheries divi-

The stocking program in the panhandle emphasized stocking of rainbow and brown trout species, although some yellow perch, tiger musky, bluegill and largemouth bass were put into panhandle waters.

Stocking activity in the north-central region was light, with the bulk of stock being catchable rain-bow and brown trout, which were put into Keller Park Lake No. 5 and Long Pine Creek, both near Long Pine. Also, 1500 northern pike were stocked in the Anderson Bridge pond near Kilgore. Bridge pond near Kilgore.

Northern pike stocking dominated the northeast region of the state, with 20,000 one-to-two inch fish going into the DeSoto Bend Wildlife Refuge Lake near Blair. Fingerling pike also were stocked in Skyview Lake in Norfolk, the Pilger

Dam, Grove Lake near Royal, Summit Lake near Tekamah, Buck-skin Hills Lake near Newcastle, Maskenthine Reservoir near Stanton, and Crystal Cove Lake near South Sioux City.

More than 34,000 catchable rainbow trout were stocked in Lake Ogallala, while another 800 of the

species were put into Rock Creek Lake near Parks. The southwest district fisheries division also re-ported stocking 100,000 tiger muskie fry in Lake McConaughy, 900,000 sauger fry in Sutherland Reservoir and more than 80,000 total northern pike in Jeffrey Lake, and Red Willow and Enders reser-



Glenn Cunningham Lake No. 11, and 2,550 two-inch northern pike in the Two Rivers State Recreation Area lakes.



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

 If you're a new camper, or an experienced camper with new equipment, test your equipment at home before you leave for your trip. Practice pitching your tent and using lanterns, axes and cooking equipment. Be sure all equipment

equipment. Be sure all equipment is in good operating order.

• Choose high ground for a campsite — a heavy rain could cause flash flooding in low-lying areas. Use a designated fireplace when possible, or remove leaves and litter to form a circle 10 feet in diameter. diameter.

 To safety extinguish your campfire, let it die down, then break up the coals or logs. Spread the partly burned pieces, soak them thoroughly with water, stir and soak them again. When the fire appears to be completely out, cover the area with dirt or sand.

### Wayne State bureau will assist Northeast Nebraska communties

Northeast Nebraska communi-ties will benefit from new outreach programs this fall when Wayne State College launches a Bureau for Community and Economic De-velopment, funded in large part by a grant from US WEST Communications.

The on-campus bureau will coordinate delivery of the College's public service outreach programs and act as an information clearinghouse for programs of other agen-

'We intend to assist the communities in our service region by helping them maximize the use of the many resources and services available to them," says Dr. Donald J. Mash, president of the college. "We will help them develop their leadership and agendas to address their issues."

The Bureau will be funded primarily by a grant from US WEST Communications, which Mash says "was crucial in getting the initiative off the ground."

KEN POWER, vice president and chief executive officer of US WEST Communications in Nebraska says, "as a corporation, US WEST is committed to bettering the well-being of our communities and the people living in them. This project will be another step along the road

toward the goal, and we are happy to be a part of this program." Governor Kay Orr also an-Governor Kay Orr also announced that a Department of Economic Development field office will be located at Wayne State College. The field office is ex-pected to complement the Col-lege's community development efforts and in turn enhance DED's ability to deliver assistance in Northeast Nebraska.

"The Bureau for Community and Economic Development was established at Wayne State Colestablished at Wayne State Col-lege through a purely cooperative effort involving the College, US WEST and the Governor's office, says Orr. "My placement of the DED field office with the Bureau further exemplifies the kind of co-operative regional service we need to be providing in rural Nebraska."

WHEN THE offices are in place this fall, Mash says they will coordinate their efforts and work cooperatively to provide assistance to Northeast Nebraska communities.

"We'll bring together the work of the College's Bureau, the DED field office and our Nebraska Busi-ness Development Center office," Mash says. "This massing of out-reach resources will enable us to effectively, coordinate and may effectively coordinate and maximize efforts to promote rural revitalization in Northeast Nebraska.

Mash believes Wayne State

College's active role in rural re-gional development is important and appropriate. "We function as a center and

"We function as a center and catalyst in our service region for education, as well as for the arts, cultural activities and community development," Mash says. "As a public agency, the College is actively pursuing a regional public service agenda to support the Governor's agenda for statewide development. Coordinating these new resources with existing efforts will enable the college to play a larger role in rural development."

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
