### Water testing

WAYNE-Private well water will be tested for nitrate-nitrogen level at the Wayne County Fair.

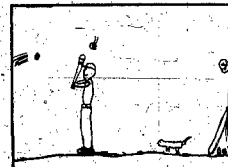
The Wayne County Farm Bureau in cooperation with the Lower Elkhorn Resources District and the Cooperative Extension Service will provide the service to the public free of charge.

Water samples should be collected the day of testing. Eight-ounce samples (one cup) should be collected in a clean, well-rinsed glass or plastic container.

Water quality tests will be conducted from 2 to 8 p.m. Friday, Aug. 4 and from noon to 6 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 5 at the Farm Bureau booth at the Wayne County Fair.

The testing is a water quality screening that is just an indicator of the nitrate-nitrogen level in the water samples. The public is encouraged to have another sample tested at a public health laboratory to verify abnormal results.

The Wayne County Farm Bureau office will close on Friday afternoon, Aug. 4 when all the office personnel will be at the fair.

## Ash Fall Park plans given

Rex Amack, director of the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, was the guest speaker Monday in Wayne and he commented on the state's park system and this area's most recent find — Ash Fall State Historical Park located near Orchard.

Amack spoke at Monday's Kiwanis Club meeting at the Black Knight. He was introduced to the audience by Al Cramer of Wayne, presently a member of the Game and Parks Commission.

The Game and Parks Commission was established in 1929, created by the then "two house" legislature.

Amack said the state's game and parks system presently provides for the maximum use of the state's resources, keeping the best interest of the state and the resource in mind.

HE TALKED about Ash Fall in Antelope County, purchased by the Nebraska Game and Parks Foundation and later conveyed to the Game and Parks Commission. Ash Fall is a 10 million year old find, found in the early 1970's by Dr. Michael Voorhies who is curator of paleontology at the University of Nebraska State Museum in Lincoln.

It was speculated that in that era millions of years ago, animals standing in a water hole at the Orchard site had died from suffoca-

tion as their lungs had filled with volcanic ash — brought forth from a far away explosion of great proportion.

Ten million years later, Voorhies happened to see a skull of a baby rhinoceros. As he investigated further, he found the whole skeleton of the animal. Further digging revealed more rhinos, three-toed horses, camels, tiny saber-toothed deer, birds and other inhabitants of the water hole.

"This is an enormous find in terms of education," Amack said. There have been times when fragments of skeletons have been found at various sites. But seldom has there been a find with well-preserved skulls and skeletons.

Newborn rhinos, and unborn

rhinos inside their mother, were found. Seeds were found in the birds, which will give botanists some idea of what type of vegetation was growing 10 million years ago.

AMACK said the commission has entered an agreement with the University of Nebraska to allow the historical site to be used for research. Students from Japan and Russia have already worked at the site. "This will be a learning center of international significance," Amack said.

Structures planned for Ash Fall, he said, will be a visitors center and a large outdoor enclosure where

## City Council approves 1989-90 budget

A budget of \$1.78 million was approved unanimously Tuesday evening by members of the Wayne City Council.

That amount reflects a 23.4 percent increase over the \$1.41 million budgeted for last fiscal year.

In the budget is a proposal to spend \$300,000 toward rehabilitating the Wayne Municipal Swimming Pool. Doing so would increase the life of the pool another 20 to

25 years or more, according to city officials.

Bruce Gilmore and Associates engineering firm is reviewing the 35-year-old pool's condition and they will report to the city council in August their recommendations on what to do with the swimming pool.

Without the pool rehabilitation entered in the 1989-90 budget, the total budget would have been down approximately 2.2 percent.

Property tax askings will remain the same as the last two fiscal

years at \$352,650.

INCREASES in the budget were in wage adjustments (at about 6 percent); the police department, up \$43,000 with most of the money to be used toward enhancing the present 911 emergency call system; parks department, up \$10,000 with much of that allocated toward work to be done at the newer Sunnyview park; senior citizens center, up by nearly \$19,000 to compensate for increased numbers participating in

the congregate meal program and for mini-bus replacement; city library up \$6,000 primarily toward improvements of the city library structure; city transfer station, up considerably with \$100,000 set aside for the project of rehabilitating the transfer station.

Decreases compared to the previous fiscal year's budget fall in the street department and public building areas.

Utility rates are not expected

## Helping those with dyslexia

# Teachers attend workshop on language learning topic

Twenty-one teachers from different states gathered recently at Wayne State College to participate in an approximate two-week workshop aimed at teaching alternative methods in working with students facing language learning disabilities.

Nine of those teachers were from the Wayne-Carroll Public School. Others were from throughout Nebraska, Arkansas and Iowa.

Conducting the courses are C. Wilson Anderson of Minneapolis and Joan C. Stoner of Lincoln.

Anderson said one course is titled "Introduction to Multi-Sensory Teaching".

"THIS IS an introduction to two reading methods that can be used by those not learning by the traditional methods," he said. The first method is the Fernald Approach, where students learn on a "whole word" basis. The second method deals with the Orton Gillingham Approach as students listen to the

sounds of the word and then are taught to trace the word.

Dorothy Ley had introduced the Orton Gillingham Approach to the Wayne-Carroll Public School during the late 1960's. She trained many teachers who in turn recognized and taught children with the learning disability called dyslexia. Funds from Dorothy Ley's Trust have made the Wayne State College workshop possible.

The second course deals with curriculum adaptations. Anderson said teachers attending the workshop are taught how to question and write a study guide or test for those students that have language learning disabilities. "So students who cannot read can still learn the subject matter," he said.

This could be done using the same textbooks used by students who do not have the language learning disability.

DURING THE workshop, the teachers practice their skills on volunteer students of all grade levels. Some 15 percent of the those attending school cannot learn the

language arts through the traditional teaching methods.

Stoner said the Wayne-Carroll School District, because of the involvement of Dorothy Ley, has become a strong advocate of the language learning disability workshop. "This is not typical for a school district to be able to put the money [for financing the workshop] where their mouth is," she said.

"The program is certainly not dormant in Wayne," she added, "and that can be attributed to the well trained people that are here."

Education, for many years, emphasized that there was just one method to teach all students. Now there are different teaching methods for those students who learn differently. And it is important to work with these students early.

"It is better, and cheaper, to teach the children than it is to repair adults," said Anderson.

MARY-LOU George was the coordinator of the workshop for

## Region answers the call for help

The crash last Wednesday of United Airlines Flight 232 at Sioux City's Gateway Airport brought a heartwarming response from scores of volunteers across Siouxland — offering to volunteer their services in a variety of areas.

There were approximately 185 people on the plane who survived the tumbling crash of the DC-10 that was from Denver en route to Philadelphia via Chicago. At least 111 people had perished, according to the latest count.

Distance was no factor for those from this region who volunteered their time and effort in answering the call for help.

Marci Thomas, administrator at Providence Medical Center, said a call was placed to Sioux City emergency authorities to see if more rescue unit assistance was needed. No additional rescue units were needed, the hospital was told.

HOWEVER, the Wayne rescue unit later transferred a patient at one of the Sioux City hospitals to Providence Medical Center. The patient was moved from the Sioux City hospital to allow more area for the victims in the plane crash.

Louise Jenness, director of nursing at Providence Medical Center, said several nurses from the Wayne hospital volunteered their services at Marian Health Center days after the disaster. Sister Monica and Verlyn Anderson worked most of Saturday at the hospital, Jenness said.

Carol Nixon of Wakefield, a nurse from Wakefield, also worked a shift at St. Luke's Hospital in Sioux City and Pat Meierhenry of rural Hoskins also volunteered her services [see related column in this issue], according to information received by the Wayne Herald.

Several individuals from the area were on hand to provide counseling to the rescue workers and families who were touched by the disaster.

Jan Stalling of Wayne, director of counseling at Wayne State College, said she answered the call that went out for mental health professionals. She was in Sioux City last Thursday, the day after the crash. Initially, she was to work with the families of the survivors. She said she is also planning this week to offer help to those who were on the disaster emergency teams. Kathy Conway also assisted in the efforts.

LOWELL Johnson of Wakefield, a member of the Critical Incident Stress Debriefing Team, also provided some counseling to those involved in the rescue operations. The regional team, consisting of

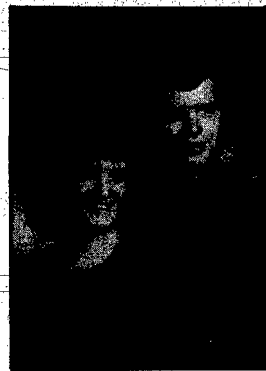

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## Wayne raps at the door of being the best in 'B'

An old adage says that no one ever remembers who got second. The win advanced Wayne into the quarterfinals of the winners bracket against Nebraska City, a team which defeated them by a 5-0 count in last year's state tournament.

The 4:30 p.m. Saturday contest began with Wayne as the home team and in the top half of the first inning, Robin Lutt made it known early that her pitching would be the difference. Lutt struck out two of the first three batters and finished with a game high eight strike outs in leading Wayne to a 9-4 victory.

Wayne had just seven hits in the contest but was aided by 13 walks. Traci Gamble led the locals with three singles while Marnie Bruggeman had two singles. Tonya

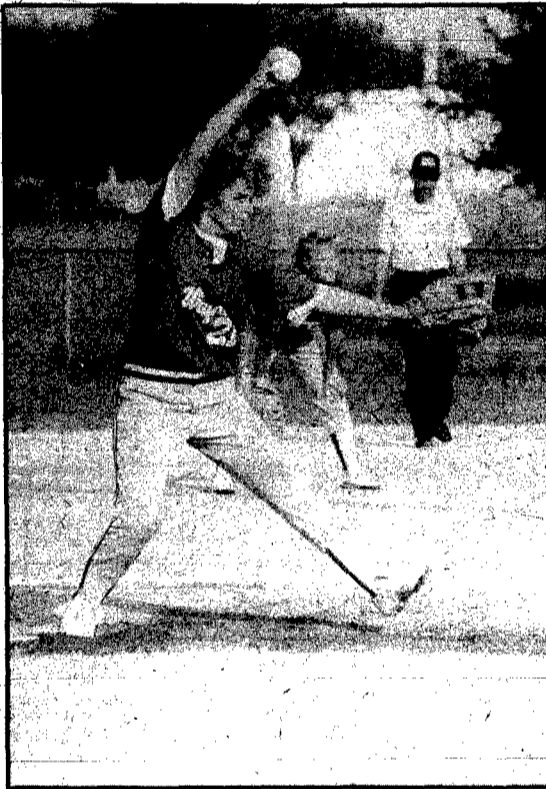

The Wayne girls took it to the limit over the weekend, they left everything they had on the field for they knew it was their final time this season and it was the last time they would be coached by the Bailey's.

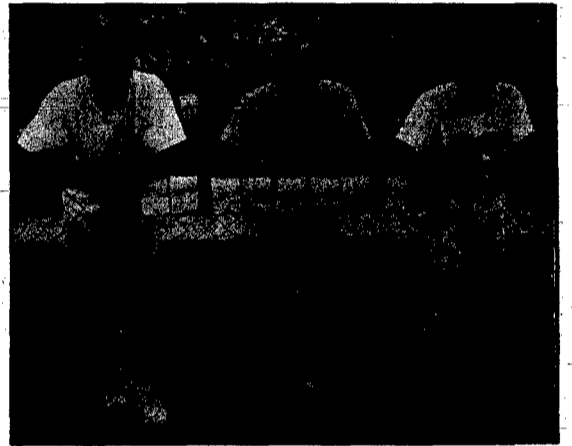

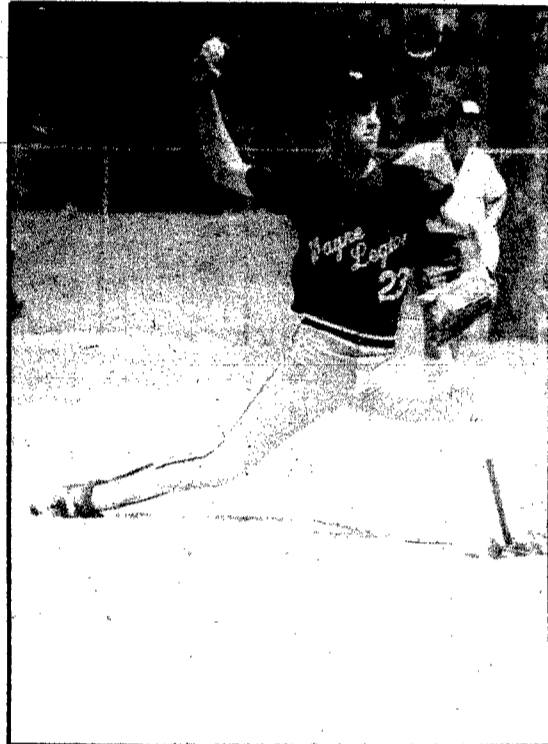

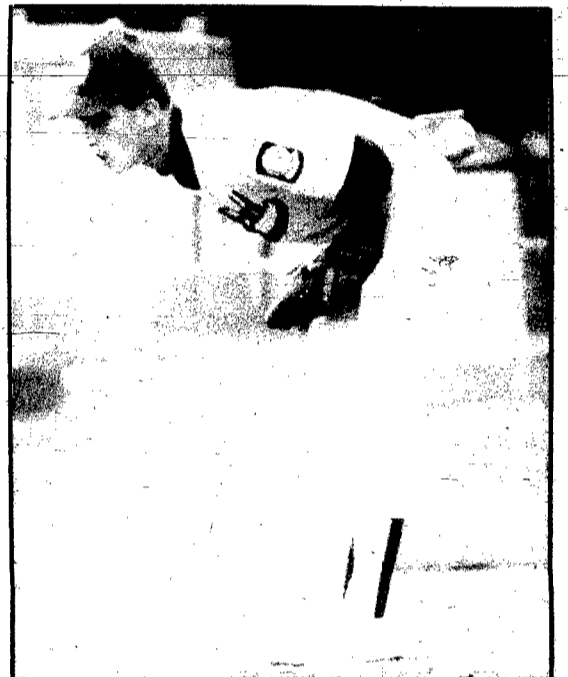

In what may be an unprecedented move, Allen will once again get out the clipboard and blow the practice whistle for two weeks this August as he returns to Morningside College, an NCAA Division II school in Sioux City, Iowa.

It was 41 years ago that Morningside hired Allen, out of the University of Michigan, to direct the school's football program. Allen spent three successful years (1948-50) at Morningside, moved through the coaching ranks and eventually became one of the NFL's greats—as coach of the Los Angeles Rams and Washington Redskins.

Allen's 116-47-5 NFL record remains the highest winning percentage (70.5) in league history among coaches with 10 or more years experience. He's returning to Morningside to help revive the school's football program, lending his name, expertise and talent—both on the practice field and in the community.

Allen's work at Morningside starts August 21 and concludes with school's season opener against Northwestern College on September 2. Allen will assist new Coach Dave Dolch with two-a-day practices, focusing primarily on the defense and special teams, where he earned the reputation of one of the NFL's best in those areas. Allen will also be on the sidelines for the 4:30 p.m. opener at Roberts Stadium in Sioux City. He is also scheduled to make numerous community appearances, seeking to rally support for the program.

"Morningside College lost all eleven of its games last season, and I want to help them turn the program around, beginning with a victory in the first game. I've been lucky in my career that we won 13 out of 14 years in the NFL—and seven out of nine in college," Allen said, who incidentally, won his Morningside debut 41 years ago, 33-0 against Midland (NE) College.

A small, private college of 1200 students, Morningside's football program has fallen on hard times lately. A 15 game losing streak follows the Maroon Chiefs into the 1989 season, and the school has registered just two winning seasons since 1971. Morningside competes in the rugged North Central Conference, one of the best NCAA Division II leagues in the country.

Allen has never had a losing season in 14 years of professional coaching, and is the only coach to have such a record over that span. He would like to see his old school get its football program back on track. In 88 seasons of football, only five Morningside teams have won seven or more games in a season, and Allen coached two of those squads in 1949 and 1950.

He was named NFL's Coach of the Year three times, won five divisional championships, coached seven squads into the playoffs, and led the Washington Redskins into the 1972 Super Bowl. His teams never finished lower than third place in conference standings with seven first, five seconds and two thirds.

Currently, Allen serves as chairman of the National Fitness Foundation and is a former chairman of the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports. Allen keeps fit by running five- and ten-kilometer races, mini triathlons, bike-a-thons, marathons, weightlifting and swimming. He is the originator and founder of the First World Congress on Fitness, Nutrition and Sports for All in America, to be held May 13-18, 1990 in Chicago. Over 90 nations will be in attendance.

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
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

## More applicants needed for commodities food program

The Commodities Supplemental Food Program is seeking more seniors, pregnant women and mothers of children under one year of age to apply for food, according to a state health official.

At the end of March the waiting list for the commodity food program had almost 5,000 names on it, said Sue Medinger, director of nutrition for the state Department of Health.

Most of the people on the list have been contacted, Medinger said. Some were found ineligible while others have gone into nursing homes, died or moved elsewhere since applying for the program. Those who were determined to be eligible are now receiving commodities.

The state is seeking applicants to add to its caseload because the U.S. Department of Agriculture

gave the Health Department \$59,226 this summer to serve more people.

However, if the Health Department doesn't find enough eligible applicants to meet 90 percent of the U.S.D.A. authorized level, the program will be frozen at this year's September level. That would prohibit any further growth in caseload in the coming year, said Medinger.

In May over 5,500 elderly persons received food, along with 5,100 pregnant women and mothers. The department's goal is to add 4,500 seniors and 2,600 pregnant women and mothers. These increases will bring the programs caseloads to the levels currently authorized by the U.S.D.A.

 fire fighters, rescue unit personnel and mental health professionals, is on call in the case of exceptional or out-of-the-ordinary situations where counseling or debriefing is in demand — such as the Wednesday DC-10 crash in Sioux City.

As the rescue workers perform their duties, they cannot allow their feelings to interfere until their task is accomplished. The Critical Incident Stress-Debriefing Team then begins their work — to help relieve the responders of the guilt or anxiety feelings that might later occur.

"We encourage them to begin discussing what they did and how they felt about it — to talk about it among themselves," Johnson said.

Johnson, a training officer with the Wakefield Rescue Unit and also a fire department member, said he was impressed with the organization and the skill displayed by those involved in the disaster operation.

Steve Schumacher of Wayne, funeral director of Schumacher Funeral Home, was called upon this past Saturday and part of Sunday to assist in preparing the bodies for transport to locations where funeral arrangements were being made. Denny Spangler of Wayne assisted in the operation.

He said funeral directors from at least 250 miles away also volunteered to come and assist in the procedure.

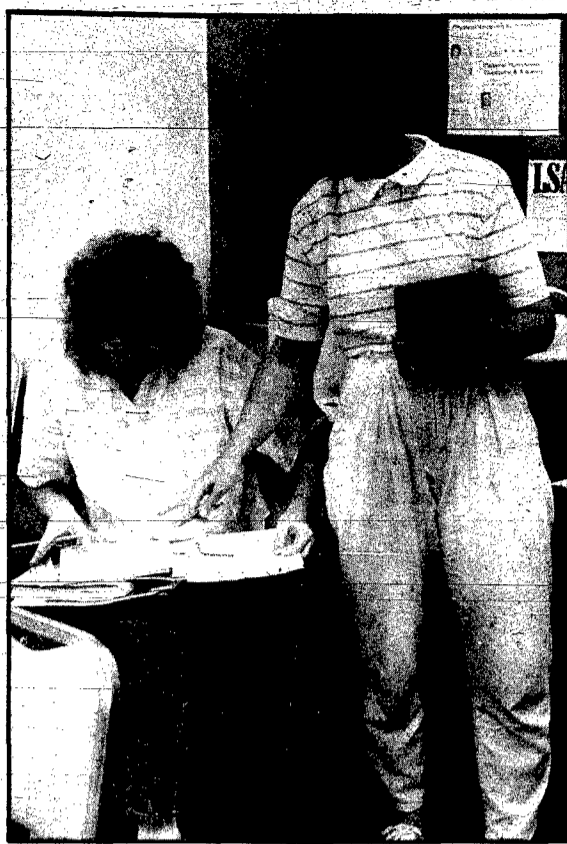
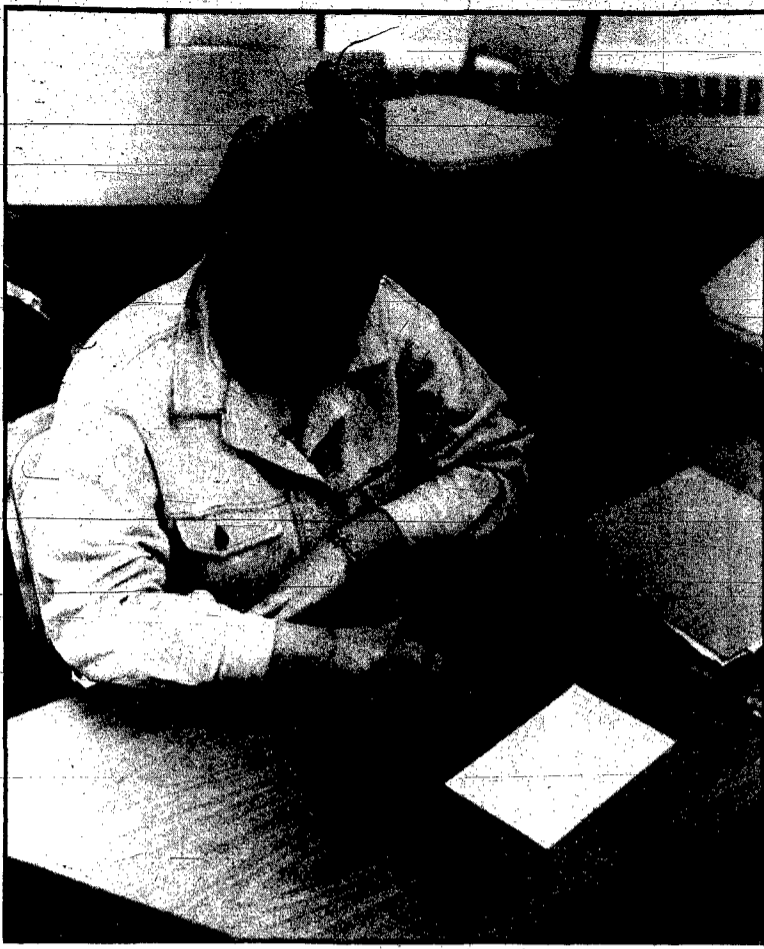

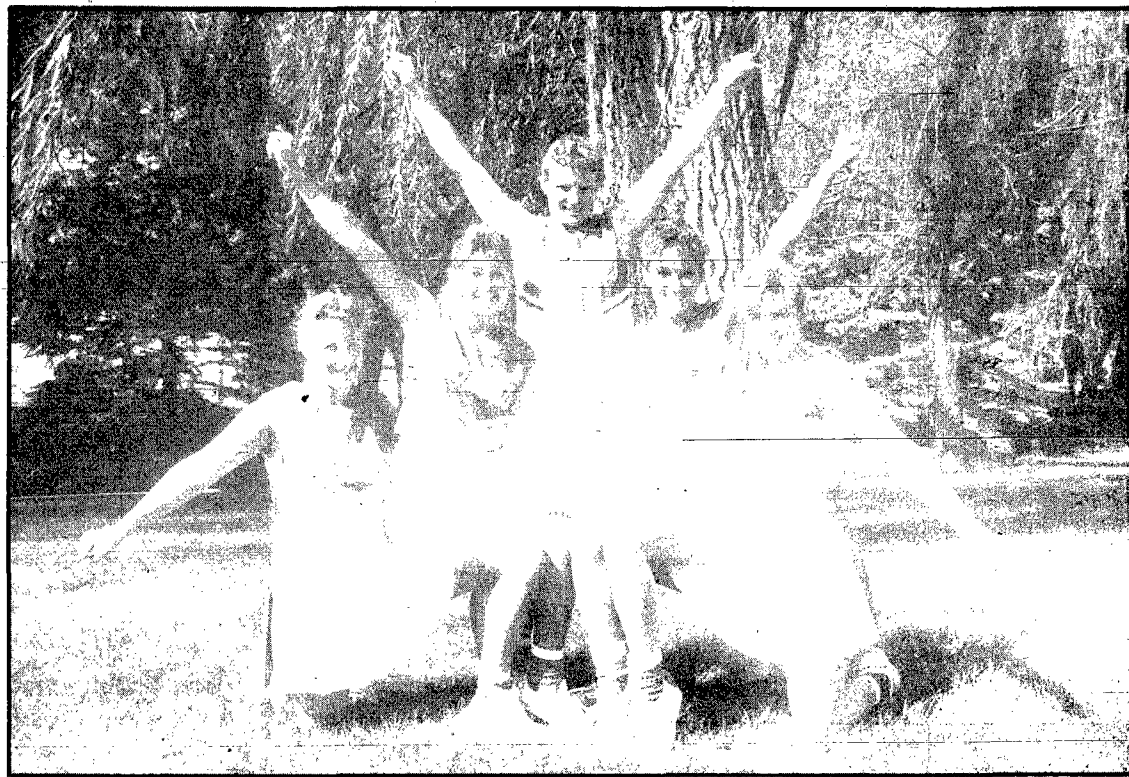

Thanks to rain

Crops improve

Corn, sorghum and third cutting of hay crops improved with last week's rainfall in the eastern two-thirds of Nebraska, noted members of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Agricultural Climate and Situation Committee and the Nebraska Drought Assessment Response Team. The groups met jointly at the UNL East Campus Monday, July 24.

"The change in moisture for crops is better than it has been all season," said Ken Hubbard, UNL climatologist and committee chair. The winter wheat crop particularly benefitted from the late precipitation.

Participation has been isolated, due to the convective nature of the storms, said UNL climatologist Al Weiss. He said Nebraska has had

few fronts which spread moisture over a 500-mile region.

Crops will continue to need an average of two-tenths of an inch a day, Hubbard said.

Recent cool temperatures may have delayed the crop growth, but helped in soil water use, said Ed Penas, UNL agronomist. Subsoil moisture levels are still low statewide, with most sites reporting below 75 percent of normal from Sept. 1.

Western Nebraska is facing a decrease in water supplies as closings of surface irrigation canals were announced due to increased use this year. Beef producers in the Sandhills are considering their options for winter feed and some are selling cattle now, reported Doyle Wolverton, UNL animal scientist.

Dairy group meets

Nebraska Farm Bureau's Dairy Advisory Committee met in Lincoln July 18 to discuss current dairy issues and recommend issues for study at the national level. Five producers from locations across the state participated.

Committee members said hay is short and pasture is not good because of the drought in the areas they represent. They discussed national dairy issues, including Bovine Somatotropin, a hormone

said to increase milk production by 15 percent. Members questioned whether dairy producers would use the hormone without knowing more about its long-term effects and recommended the American Farm Bureau study the issue.

Attending the meeting from this area was John Anderson, Wayne County Farm Bureau, chairman of the committee and a member of the Nebraska Farm Bureau Board of Directors.
