

Ash Fall Park plans given

Rex Amack, director of the Ne-braska Game and Parks Commis-sion, was the guest speaker Mon-day in Wayne and he commented on the state's park system and this area's most recent find — Ash Fall State Historical Park located near Orchard Orchard.

Orchard. Amack spoke at Monday's Ki-wanis Club meeting at the Black Knight. He was introduced to the audience by Al Cramer of Wayne, presently a member of the Game

and Parks Commission. The Games and Parks Commis-sion was established in 1929, cre-ated by the then "two house" legislature

and parks system presently pro-vides for the maximum use of the state's resources, keeping the best interest of the state and the resource in mind.

Amack said the state's game

HE TALKED about Ash Fall in HE TALKED about Ash Fall in Antelope 'County, purchased by the Nebraska Games and Parks Foundation and later conveyed to the Game and Parks Commission. Ash Fall is a 10 million year old find, found in the early 1970's by Dr. Michael Voorhies who is curator of paleontology at the University of paleontology at the University of Nebraska State Museum in Lincoln. It was speculated that in that era millions of years ago, animals standing in a water hole at the Or-chard site had died from suffocation as their lungs had filled with volcanic ash — brought forth from a far away explosion of great proportion

Ten million years later, Voorhies happened to see a skull of a baby rhinoceros. As he investigated fur-ther, he found the whole skeleton of the animal. Further digging re-vealed more rhinos, three-toed horses, camels, tiny saber-toothed deer, birds and other inhabitants

deer, birds and other inhabitants of the water hole. "This is an enormous find in terms of education," Amack said. There have been times when fragments of skeletons have been found at various sites. But seldom has there been a find with well-preserved skulls and skeletons. Newhore rhipos and upborn

Newborn rhinos, and unborn

rhinos inside their mother, were found. Seeds were found in the birds, which will give botanists some idea of what type of vegetation was growing 10 million veget and years ago.

Managing editor <u>The crash last Wednesday of</u> United Airlines Flight 232 at Sloux-City's Gateway Airport brought a heartwarming—response—from-scores of volunteers across Sloux-land — offering to volunteer their servicës in a variety of areas. There were approximately 185 people on the plane who survived that was from Denver en route to Philadelphia via Chicago. At least 111 people had perished, accord-ing to the latest count. Distance was no factor for those

Distance was no factor for those from this region who volunteered their time and effort in answering the call for help.

Marci Thomas, administrator at Providence Medical Center, said a call was placed to Sioux City emergency, authorities to see if more rescue unit assistance was needed. No additional rescue units were needed, the hospital was told.

HOWEVER, the Wayne rescue unit later transferred a patient at one of the Sioux City hospitals to Providence Medical Center. The patient was moved from the Sioux City hospital to allow more area for

Living and anow more area for the victims in the plane crash. Louise Jenness, director of nursing at Providence Medical Center, said several nurses from the Wayne hospital volunteered their convidence of Marian Health their services at Marian Health Center days after the disaster. Sis-ter Monica and Verlyn Anderson worked most of Saturday at the

worked most of Saturday at the hospital, Jenness said. Carol Nixon of Wakefield, a nurse from Wakefield, also worked a shift at St. Luke's Hospital in Sioux City and Pat Meierhenry of rural Hoskins also volunteered her services [see related column in this issue], according to information re-ceived by the Wayne Herald. Several individuals from the area

Several individuals from the area were on hand to provide counsel-ing to the rescue workers and fam-ilies who were touched by the

ilies who were touched by the disaster. Jan Stalling of Wayne, director of counseling at Wayne State Col-lege, said she answered the call that went out for mental health professionals. She was in Sioux City last Thursday, the day after the crash. Initially, she was to work with the families of the survivors. She said she is also planning this week to offer help to those who were on the disaster emergency teams. the disaster emergency teams. Kathy Conway also assisted in the efforts

Teachers attend workshop on language learning topic

Twenty-one teachers from different states gathered recently at Wayne State College to partici-pate in an approximate two-week workshop aimed at teaching alterstudents facing language learning disabilities.

Nine of those teachers were from the Wayne-Carroll, Public School. Others were from throughout Nebraska, Arkansas and lowa:

and lowa. Conducting the courses are C. Wilson Anderson of Minneapolis and Joan C. Stoner of Lincoln. Anderson said one course is ti-difference on the course of the second said one course is ti-d "Introduction to Multi-Sensory

tled Teaching". "THIS IS an introduction to two ading methods that can be used

by those not learning by the tradi-tional methods," he said. The first method is the Fernald Approach, where students learn on a "whole word basis, The second method deals with the Orton Gillingham Approach as students listen to the sounds of the word and then are

taught to trace the word. Dorothy Ley had introduced the Orton Gillingham Approach to the Wayne-Carroll Public School during the late 1960's. She trained many teachers who in turn recog-nized and taught children with the hearing disability colled durlation learning disability called dyslexia. Funds from Dorothy Ley's Trust have made the Wayne State Col-lege workshop possible.

The second course deals with curriculum adaptations. Anderson said teachers attending the work-shop are taught how to question and write a study guide or-test-for those students that have language learning disabilities. "So students who cannot read can-still learn the

subject matter," he said. This could be done using the same textbooks used by students who do not have the language learning disability.

DURING THE workshop, the teachers practice their skills on volunteer students of all grade levels. Some 15 percent of the those attending school cannot learn the

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language arts through the tradi-

tional teaching methods. Stoner said the Wayne-Carroll School District, because of the in-volvement of Dorothy Ley, has become a strong advocate of the language learning disability work-shop. "This is not typical for a school district to be able to put the money [for financing the workshop] where their mouth is,*

dormant in Wayne," she added, dormant in Wayne," she added, "and that can be attributed to the well trained people that are here." Education, for many years, em-phasized that there was just one method to teach all students. Now there are different teaching methods for those students who learn-differently. And it is impor-tant to work with these students

early. "It is better, and cheaper, to teach the children than it is to re-pair adults," said Anderson.





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

NFL coach returns to Morningside for football practices

George Allen, one of the win-ningest coaches in National Foot-ball teague history, will be return-ing to active coaching—back at the place that gave him his start in college football In what may be an unprece-dented move, Allen will once again out out the cliphocet and blocut

dented move, Allen will once again get out the clipboard and blow the practice whistle for two weeks this August as he returns to Morning-side Collège, an NCAA Division II school in Sioux City, Iowa. It was 41 years ago that Morn-ingside hired Allen, out of the Uni-versity of Michigan, to direct the school's football program. Allen spent three successful years (1948-50) at Morning side, moved through the coaching ranks and eventually became one of the NFL's greats-as coach of the Los Angeles Rams and Washington Redskins. Redskins

Allen's 116-47-5 NFL record Atten's 116-47-5 NFL record remains the highest winning-per-centage (70.5) in league history among coaches-with 10 or more years experience. He's returning to Morningside to help revive the school's football program, lending his name, expertise and talent--both on the practice field and in the computation

Allen's work at Morningside starts August 21 and concludes with school's season opener against Northwestern College on September 2. Allen will assist new Coach Dave Dolch with two-a-day Coach Dave Dolch with two-a-day practices, focusing primarily on the defense and special teams, where he earned the reputation of one of the NFL's best in those areas. Allen will also be on the sidelines for the 4:30 p.m. opener at Roberts Stadium in Sioux City. He is also scheduled to make purpose also scheduled to make numerous community appearances, seeking to rally support for the program. "Morningside College lost all eleven of its games last season, and I want to help them turn the program around, beginning with a victory in the first game. I've been lucky in my career that we won 13 out of 14 years-in the NFL-and seven out of nine in college," Allen said, who incidentally, won his Morningside debut 41 years ago, 33-0 against Midland (NE) College. A small, private college of 1200 students, Morningside's football program has fallen on hard times also scheduled to make numerous

students, Morningside's football program has fallen on hard times lately. A 15 game losing streak follows the Maroon Chiefs into the 1989 season, and the school has registered just two winning seasons since 1971. Morningside competes in the rugged North Central Con-ference, one of the best NCAA Di-vision II leagues in the country. Allen has never had a losing season in 14 years of professional coaching, and is the only coach to have such a record over that span. He would like to see his old school get its football program back on track. In 88 seasons of football, only five Morningside teams have

only five Morningside teams have won seven or more games in a season, and Allen coached two of those squads in 1949 and 1950.

He was named NFL's Coach of He was named NFL's Coach of the Year three times, won five divisional championships, coached seven-squads-into the playoffs, and led the Washington Redskins into the 1972 Super Bowl. His teams never finished lower than third place in conference standings with seven first, five seconds and two thirds thirds.

Currently, Allen serves as chair-man of the National Fitness-Foun-dation and is a former chairman of the President's Council on Physical the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports. Allen keeps fit by running five and ten kilometer races, mini triathlons, bike-a-thons, marathons, weightlifting and swimming. He is the originator and founder of the First World-Congress on Fitness, Nutrition and Sports for All in America, to be held May 13-18, 1990 in Chicago. Over 90 nations will be in atten-dance. dance



I enjoyed reading the heart-warming stories of volunteers which always come out of tragedy. Like all the food that was provided for the firefighters.

THEN, ON Wednesday after-noon, I stopped at a local drug-store after work. The TV showed a map of the Sioux City airport, and Dave Nixon was talking about a plane crash.

All through the evening, we watched as the story unfolded. I could only imagine the work for rescue unit personnel, and at the hospitals.

The next day, we talked of the The next day, we talked or trie numbers, the types of injuries, and the immensity of the task. Finally, I called both hospitals and volun-teered. I couldn't stand it anymore.

Marian called back at 3:00. They had just gotten that shift covered, and were working on 11

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to 7.1 told them I'd be there the next morning.

That evening, I attended a reg-ular meeting of the CISD team. Nine members were missing. They were in South Sioux and Dakota City and Fremont, helping to de-brief fire and rescue personnel. (Fremont had a bad fire on Tuesday.)

I was so proud of these people, for being available, and for being willing to put their training to use.

At Marian on Friday, I found "business as usual." They were tak-ing care of the normal load, and the crash victims, too

At least a dozen nurses from Sioux Valley Hospital in Sioux Falls had helped, two on nights in criti-cal care, some in ER, and two on the orthopedic floor that I was as-signed to. One gal on the after-noon shift runs the Diet Center and has not worked at Marian for a long time.

THE REGULAR staff was so happy to see us, they didn't mind all the questions we asked.

I could figure out how to use their IV pumps, but the simple things like getting the beds to go up and down stumped me. J_

The head nurse, a smilling lady who everyone called Eddy, han-dled all the interruptions, the phone calls, the TV cameras, the guard at the door of one of the pilots, with complete good nature and professionalism.

The parents of a young man from Denver told me their experi-ences had all been positive, since the phone call at 4:15 on Wednesday that their son had sur-

vived the crash. I haven't worked so hard in a long time. I loved it. I'm going back tomorrow!
