### Early results

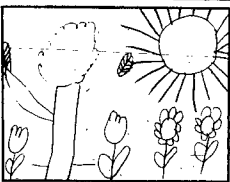

## Variety of exhibits, awards

### Heritage program at County Fair

Pride in America and in the forefathers who helped shaped the country was displayed Thursday during Heritage Day at the Wayne County Fairgrounds.

In addition to a variety of 4-H heritage and ethnic exhibits, the Wayne County Fair Board took time out Thursday evening to honor several persons, including 4-H leaders of 50 years ago, during a Heritage Day program at the grandstand.

Receiving special recognition was Walt Moller of Wayne, who served as Wayne County Extension Agent from 1935 to 1939.

Other area residents who were present to accept recognition for their work as 4-H leaders 50 years ago were George Owens of Norfolk, Mrs. George Langenberg Sr. of Hoskins, Mrs. Guy Anderson of Randolph, Mrs. Virgil Moseman of Emerson, Marvin Muller of Wakefield, Dr. N. L. Ditman of Winside, and Don Lutt, Norris Weible and Mary Roberts, all of Wayne.

Mrs. Roberts, at age 92, was the oldest person to be recognized. She was leader of a rural Carroll club for more than 15 years during the 1930's and 40's.

Four-H leaders of 50 years ago listed in the program but unable to be present included Mrs. Joe Corbit and Mrs. Mildred West, both of Wayne, Charles Pierson of Wakefield, Mrs. Caroline Livingstone of Norfolk, Mrs. Edward (Lozeen Baird) Forsberg of Colorado, and Mrs. Bob (Edna Siefken) Adamson of Gallup, N. M.

THURSDAY EVENING'S program began with a special flag ceremony and the national anthem, led by representatives of Wayne County home extension clubs.

Several families were on hand to accept Ak-Sar-Ben Pioneer Farm Family Awards from Area Amba-

sador Grant Ellingson. The award is presented to farms that have been in the same family for 100 years or more.

Receiving special plaques from Ellingson were Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wittler, Mr. and Mrs. Willis Nelson, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Koepke, and Mr. and Mrs. Les Youngmeyer (heirs of John Rinehart).

ALSO HONORED Thursday night was Marty Willers of Wayne, who is retiring this year after serving the longest term as a director in the history of the Wayne County Agricultural Society — 40 years, including 35 years as vice president.

In introducing Willers, 1989 Fair Board President Mick Topp pointed out that Willers was one of the promoters of the first fair barbecue 35 years ago and has always been active in 4-H beef projects.

Topp also praised Willers, along with the late Bill Fredrickson, for taking over the job of finishing the fairground's grandstand following the death of Al Bahe in 1972.

"For years," said Topp, "Marty always saw to it that the fairground cleanup crews had plenty of food and refreshments, and he still helps out."

SPECIAL SURPRISE recognition Thursday night went to 85-year-old Gotthilf Jaeger of Winside, Wayne County's oldest active farmer.

Jaeger was presented a clock plaque with a photo of him and one of his tractors from Dorine Liedman of the Wayne County Farm Bureau Women's Committee.

Jaeger came to Winside from Germany in 1923 at the age of 19. He worked for a number of Wayne County farmers and also farmed with his brothers prior to his marriage to Elta Herbolzheimer in 1936.

In 1936, Jaeger and his wife purchased their first farm two and

three-quarter miles south of Winside. They raised seven children and today own numerous acres of Wayne County farm land.

At age 85, Jaeger still buys, feeds and sells cattle and raises crops for their feed. He still uses two 1952 tractors to do his work.

ALSO SURPRISED with a special community service award was Wayne resident Harvey Brasch.

Brasch, who was escorted from the audience to the grandstand stage by Trooper Dave Headley, received a plaque presented by emcee Grover Ruwe, who entertained the audience later in the evening with his ventriloquist act.

The plaque was made from a cedar tree planted by Brasch's father and was inscribed with a "Harvey Was Here" poem which Ruwe read. The poem outlined the various volunteer contributions Brasch has made to his church and community, including assisting with special projects at the Wayne County Fairgrounds.

ENTERTAINMENT Thursday evening included a performance by the Oakland Swedish Dancers and the singing of German ballads by Winside brothers Gotthilf Jaeger, 85, Herman Jaeger, 84, and Albert Jaeger, 88.

A "Bit of Welsh Heritage" was presented by Carroll residents Ruth Kerstine, Joyce Sandahl and Etta Fisher. Attired in native Welsh costumes, the women shared Welsh customs with the audience.

THE PROGRAM also included a talk by Jock Beeson, representing Wayne County 4-H.

The heritage exhibits will remain on display in the Agricultural Hall on the fairgrounds through Sunday.

## Commissioners approve insurance package

The Wayne County Commissioners approved a county employee health insurance package Friday morning, switching from its present insurance provider.

This year the county commissioners decided to solicit proposals from various insurance companies. The commissioners were not obligated by statute to seek bids on the insurance and have no restrictions on what they can accept or reject.

Wayne County county attorney Bob Ensz had reviewed the proposals submitted to the county commissioners to answer some

concerns on the impact each proposal would have on the employees of the county offices.

In his correspondence to the county officials, he said the county commissioners had already stated their intentions to provide insurance comparable to their current health insurance provider — Central Life which is provided by the Keith Jech Agency of Wayne.

HE SAID that of all the health insurance proposals submitted, only three met what would be considered as comparable to the present policy.

Those health insurance

companies included Central Life, a Travelers policy presented by First National Agency of Wayne; and a Blue Cross/Blue Shield plan offered through the Nebraska Association of County Officials (NACO).

The projected approximate annual cost to the county of each of the three proposals, based on 43 employees having dependent coverage and eight employees having single coverage, was as follows according to Ensz: Central Life, \$243,250 annually; Travelers, \$207,836.04 annually; and the NACO Blue Cross/Blue Shield plan at \$166,753.20.

AFTER considering the

comparison of benefits and coverages, the county commissioners unanimously voted for the Travelers policy. There was a 5-percent decrease in premium costs for areas of coverage that was originally projected in the Travelers policy, according to the commissioners.

There was no representative of the NACO Blue Cross/Blue Shield to appear before the county commissioners to present the lower costing plan, they said.

And the NACO insurance proposal was submitted after July 3, the date when the notice of hearing the proposal was

published, according to Commissioner Merlin Beiermann.

"I think it is best when we stay with a local agency," said Commissioner Gerald Pospisil.

Ensz said in his letter to county officials that the commissioners were free to "accept any or none of the proposals submitted thus far, and any proposals that may be submitted up to the time that the board makes its decision."

The county commissioners also met Friday with county elected officials to review budget proposals for 1989-90. The hearing for the budget has been scheduled for 9 a.m. on Monday, Aug. 21.

# Walk-a-thon proceeds will go toward scholarships

A unique approach to aiding the women's athletic program is being organized at Wayne State College.

Called "Women Helping Women" the fundraiser is a walk-a-thon with proceeds going toward athletic scholarships for women's athletics. "Women Helping Women" is unique in two ways: the people involved in the project are all women and the structure of the project involves a 39-county area served by Wayne State College.

"Women Helping Women" is, at the simplest level, a walk-a-thon to raise money for athletic scholarships. Participants will walk for a half-hour on Saturday, Sept. 9 after receiving donations, and pledges for their efforts. But on a different level, the fundraiser's

uniqueness sets it apart from other efforts by the athletic department.

"There's really nothing unique about having a walk-a-thon to raise money for an organization," athletic director Pete Chapman said. "And the idea for a walk-a-thon is not new; UNO has had a very successful program in place since 1986. But we've done it take that idea a step further and incorporate the Northeast Nebraska area Wayne State College serves.

"We're asking women in this area to help women. They don't have to have an interest in athletics; they don't have to be alumni or former athletes. All we're asking the participants to do is help other women have the

chance to develop a talent and get an education."

"Women Helping Women" relies on a pyramid structure of organization. Three co-chairs for the project are responsible for securing county chairs in the 39 designated counties. Those 39 chairs are then in charge of lining up 10 team leaders from their counties. The 10 team leaders in turn get the actual walkers for the event.

Wayne State athletes will also be walking on September 9, and will spend the summer collecting pledges for their efforts. In addition, former women athletes are being contacted for their participation and a reunion of teammates from some of Wayne

State's most successful teams will be held.

The three co-chairs for "Women Helping Women" are Alice Mahood of Hartington, Julie Mash of Wayne and Marcia Chapman of Wayne.

"The concept behind "Women

Helping Women" really has tremendous potential for other programs besides athletics at Wayne State," Chapman said. "Once you have a proven structure and have identified those people in your service area who have an interest in the college and it's programs, the opportunities to

serve them and the ways they can support you are endless."

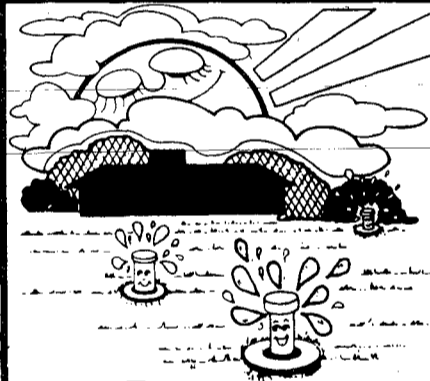

# By the dawn's early light

## By the dawn's early light

Morning is the best time to water most lawn areas. And before 10 a.m. is best of all because rising heat later on tends to steal a lot of water by evaporation. There's another good thing about early morning watering, the grass leaves have a chance to dry off quickly. Evening or nighttime waterings leave the grass wet under the cool, moist conditions that help lawn diseases develop.

## Early Morning Watering Also Reduces Electrical Costs of Water Pumping

Water pumping, treatment and distribution is one of the largest electrical costs that the city has the ability to control. If water pumping can be reduced during peak hours (usually between 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. during the summer) electrical demand costs can be dramatically reduced.

So be a good "Peak Shaver" and join in the effort to control your electrical costs. For more information on how you can be a "Peak Shaver" call 375-2866.

Most other plants benefit from early-hour watering, too. Scald or "burn" damage can result from hot sunlight hitting water droplets left on the leaves. They act just like little magnifying glasses. Early or late, try to give the lawn a good deep soaking when you water, not a light sprinkling. Light waterings are actually least effective and can even be harmful to your plants. The water doesn't penetrate the soil deeply enough to encourage plant roots to grow firm and solid. Your lawn will be less drought resistant in summer and more prone to winter kill later.

**How do you know how long to water?**  
Let the sprinkler soak an area for about a half hour, then dig a spade into the ground and see for yourself whether the water is getting down deep. If it isn't, try another half hour. Once you've established how long it takes you can do it without checking in the future. One last point... don't think you have to water on a set schedule. If the weather gets cool and moist, cut down. The simplest test is to step on a patch of lawn briefly and see if the grass blades spring back up (no water necessary) or tend to stay flat (time to sprinkle deeply again).

**Water tested for nitrate-nitrogen**

Residents of Madison County and several surrounding counties brought water samples from their wells to the Madison County Fair for nitrate-nitrogen testing.

The water quality testing was sponsored by the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District, the Cooperative Extension Service in Madison and Stanton Counties and the Planning and Community Development Department of the City of Norfolk.

The federal safety standard for nitrate-nitrogen is 10 parts per million as set by the Safe Drinking Water Act. Of the 41 samples tested, two samples had nitrate-nitrogen levels of 10ppm or greater. The values ranged from greater than 36.0ppm to less than 1.0ppm. The majority of the samples were from Madison County.

The same sponsors will conduct water quality tests free of charge at the Statton County Fair from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday,

Aug. 19. Four to eight ounce water samples should be collected the day of testing and brought to the fair in well rinsed glass or plastic containers.

This testing is a water quality screening that is just an indicator of the nitrate-nitrogen level in the water samples. The public is encouraged to have another sample tested at a public health lab to verify results.
