

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

Early Morning Watering **Also Reduces Electrical** Costs of Water Pumping

By the dawn's early light Morning is the best time to water most lawn areas. And before 10 a.m. is best of all because rising heat later on tends to steal a lot of water by evaporation. There's another good thing about early morning watering, the grass leaves have a chance to dry off quickly. Evening or nighttime waterings leave the grass wet under the cool, moist conditions that help lawn diseases develop.

Most other plants benefit from early-hour watering, too. Scald or "burn" damage can result from hot sunlight hitting water droplets left on the leaves. They act just like little magnifying glasses. Early or late, try to give the lawn a good deep soaking when you water, not a light sprinkling. Light waterings are actually least effective and can even be harmful to your plants. The water doesn't penetrate the soil deeply enough to encourage plant roots to grow firm and solid. Your lawn will be less drought resistant in summer and more prone to winter kill later.

How do you know how long to water? Let the sprinkler soak an area for about a half hour, then dig a spade into the ground and see for yourself whether the water is getting down deep. If it isn't, try another half hour. Once you've established how long it takes you can do it without checking in the future. One last point ... don't think you have to water on a set schedule. If the weather gets cool and moist, cut down. The simplest test is to step on a patch of lawn briefly and see if the grass blades spring back up (no water necessary) or tend to stay flat (time to sprinkle deeply again).

Water tested for nitrate-nitrogen

Residents of Madison County and several surrounding counties brought water samples from their wells to the Madison County Fair for nitrate-nitrogen testing.

The water quality testing was sponsored by the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District, the Co-operative Extension Service in Madison and Stanton Counties and the Planning and Community Development Department of the City The federal safety standard for nitrate-nitrogen is 10 parts per nmillion as set by the Safe Drinking Water Act. Of the 41 samples tested, two samples had nitrate-nitrogen levels of 10ppm or greater.
The values ranged from greater than 36.0ppm to less than 1.0ppm. The majority of the samples were from Madison County.

The same sponsors will conduct water quality tests free of charge at the Stathton County Fair from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 19: Four to eight ounce water samples should be collected the day of testing and brought to the fair in well rinsed glass or plastic containers.

This testing is a water quality screening that is just an indicator of the nitrate-nitrogen level in the water samples. The public is en-couraged to have another sample tested at a public health lab to verify results.
