

Approval given to rezone several lots in Sunnyview

A resolution to rezone three lots within one block in the Sunnyview Subdivision from Residential 2 to Residential 3 was

Residential 2 to Residential 3 was approved Tuesday night by the Wayne City Council.

John Vakoc of Wayne, owner of the property, is considering the construction of rental apartments on the property. Currently, the R-2 coning allows approximately nine apartment units on the three lots. Plans call for at least 12 apartment units at the present time. units at the present time.

*The demand for new single homes seems to be stagnant right now. But there is an exceptionally strong demand for rental apartments," Vakoc told the city council during their meeting Tuesday evening.

He said a recent survey his firm

conducted had shown it would be a justified investment in adding more apartment units to the

community.

There are presently three single

family lots abutting the proposed apartment property why the zoning request was made.
"We anticipate there could be some zoning problems with that in the future," mentioned Vakoc.

COUNCILMAN Darrel Heier said he had heard concerns from individuals who reside near the proposed apartment area were worried that the apartment complexes would affect their

Aide visits Wayne County to understand the farming life

Don Liedman, president of the Wayne County Farm Bureau, had a guest at this year's Wayne County Fair who didn't seem to know a whole lot about farming.

His guest, Jon Traub, is one of 12 participants in a Nebraska program that has urban congressional aides experience firsthand the lifestyles and problems facing lifestyles and problems facing constituents in rural-oriented counties and cities. Traub is from the legislative office of Representative Curt Weldon of Pennsylvania.

The legislative assistants' visit is being sponsored by Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation with cooperation from the Liedman family and and 11 other Farm Bureau families. First District Congressman Doug Bereuter and his staff recommended the legislative assistants who were invited to participate in the

"I lived for about 10 years in "I lived for about to yours... Minnesota. But I've had no farm background to speak of," said the aide from the Philadelphia area. Traub said he was "really im-

Traub said he was "really im-pressed" with the Wayne County Fair since he has such an urban background. And he feels more informed about the farming com-munity as it now exists.

He said he now has "double the respect" for the people who work on the small farms.

"I can now appreciate all the work and effort that goes into farming. They have to battle the weeds, the worms, the weather, other producers, sometimes the banks and let's not forget the government," said Traub.

"THIS IS A lot more than just putting the seeds in the ground

and watching them grow," he

There is no farming in Weldon's legislative district. "But they all have to eat. The Congress should be aware of the people who produce the food. It is important to understand the struggles that these farm families have, just to keep their head above the water, said Traub.

Traub added that he won't go back to Washington as an expert on the nature of farming. But-he will have the necessary ammunition to understand legislation about the impact on farm programs when it comes before Congress in bill form.

"Lord knows that the govern-ment doesn't-help farmers that much," he said.

Liedman said last Friday that Liedman said last Friday that Traub-would be given tours of grain and livestock farms, hog operations, cattle feedlots and dairy farms in the Wayne County







"If we find any abnormalities, it is our policy to refer these people to physicians, optometrists or hearing specialists — whatever the case may be," said Hull.

In three days of the four day Wayne County Fair, close to 180 people participated in the health screening tests. The compact

screening tests. The computer programmed mobile screening unit can handle up to 25 people in an hours time, Hull said.

OF THOSE who had undergone the health screening process during those three days, at least 15 percent show some type of hearing problem; over 5 percent had eyesight problems; pearly 6 percent head was of nearly 6 percent became aware of problems in their blood sugar or

Hull said the mobile unit "comes totally equipped right down to the registration form." It also comes with a soundproof room that is used for the hearing



Propranolol and Smoking Propranolol is a popu-

lar and effective prescrip-tion medicine used to treat high blood pressure and several other health problems. It is used alone and with other types of blood pressure medicines - especially the diuretics. But, according to a U.S. Veterans Administration study, men who have high blood pressure and smoke cigarettes may not benefit as much from propranolol as do nonsmokers. Black men who smoke seem to obtain less benefit from propranolol as compared to white smokers.

According to the study director, smokers who received propranolol for hy-pertension did not benefit pertension did not benefit from protection against stroke, coronary events, or total cardiovascular events. However, non-smokers who took pro-pranolol significantly benefited in each of these categories.





Demand keeps growing for child-care centers as more mothers remain in the work force, but reliable people are needed to staff the centers. 
