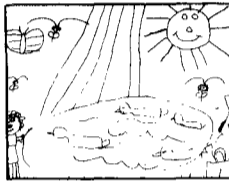
Screenings

Fees for the testing are \$5 for cholesterol, \$19.50 for lipid, and \$4 for glucose.

Fasting is not required for the cholesterol screening or the glucose test. However, a 12 hour fast is required for the lipid screening.

At Winside school Hearing set on budget

The proposed budget for Winside Public School for the 1989-90 year shows an increase of approximately \$71,081 — from the present \$1,052,273 to \$1,123,354, according to Winside Superintendent Donavon Leighton.

Leighton said included in the increase are payment on a new school bus, funds to pay the LB 89 teacher-pay bill, increased salaries and salary related items such as social security, retirement and health insurance.

A BREAKDOWN of the budget by category is as follows: instructional services, \$682,460; support services — pupils, \$18,993; instructional staff, \$19,842; general administration, \$76,507; school administration, \$44,076;

business, \$51,281; operation of plant, \$85,406; maintenance of plant, \$21,150; and pupil transportation, \$48,160; federal programs, \$33,046; LB 89 Fund, \$19,933; transfers to other funds, \$22,500.

Leighton said the tax request increase will be approximately \$95,212. He added that reasons necessitating the tax increase include lease bus payment, non-tax revenue reduction, cash balance down, salary and salary related items.

A COMPLETE copy of the budget will be available during a budget hearing scheduled Thursday, Aug. 17 at 8 p.m. in library of the elementary school building.

ESU lowers levy, approves budget

The Educational Service Unit One tax levy for the 1989-90 fiscal year has been set at 3.4 cents per \$100 of actual valuation in the six-county area the system serves, including Cedar, Dakota, Dixon, Knox, Thurston and Wayne.

Board members unanimously approved the levy during a public hearing last Tuesday night at ESU 1 headquarters in Wakefield.

The 1989-90 tax levy is an approximate four percent reduction from last year's tax levy of 3.5 cents per \$100 of actual valuation.

The levy is expected to generate about \$519,105 of the \$3,247,240 budget unanimously adopted by the ESU 1 board of directors.

The new budget shows an increase of \$386,637 over last year's budget of \$2,860,603.

ALTHOUGH TOTAL estimated valuation figures were not available for the coming fiscal year for 10 counties, including Cedar, Dakota, Dixon, Knox, Thurston, Wayne, Antelope, Pierce, Stanton and Cuming, ESU 1 Administrator Rod Garwood said the 1989-90 valuation is expected to show an increase over last year's figure of \$1,462,571,428.

Programs funded by the county levy include health services, administration and administrative supervision, business, maintenance and operation of plant, and media center.

A COMPLETE breakdown of 1989-90 ESU 1 budget expenditures includes \$1,633,135 in special education services; \$691,105 in general levy services; \$44,000 in LB 89 funds; and \$429,000 in transfers, for total budget expenditures of \$2,797,240.

The budget also calls for \$450,000 in cash reserves, bringing the total to \$3,247,240.

Estimated revenues during 1989-90 include \$650,000 in estimated cash carry-over; \$1,633,135 in special education contracts; \$519,105 in total taxes; \$32,000 in nursing contracts; \$44,000 in LB 89 funds; and \$369,000 in transfers, for a total of \$3,247,240.

MEMBERS OF THE ESU 1 board of directors held their regular monthly meeting following Tuesday night's budget hearing.

Board Chairman Ken Lahrs requested that Garwood provide the board with more information when making future requests for new computer equipment.

—Voted unanimously to approve new contracts for Shelly Wiese and Mary Koenigsfeld, aides at the South Sioux City Bryan program, and Tana Conneally, speech therapist serving Coleridge and the Wayne behaviorally impaired program, and to accept the resignation of Mrs. Linda Keeler, speech therapist.

—Voted unanimously to approve the verification of teaching experience for former ESU 1 employee Kim Calvillo.

NEXT MEETING of the ESU 1 board of directors will be Sept. 12 at 8 p.m. at headquarters in Wakefield.

IN OTHER BUSINESS Tuesday night, ESU board members:

—Gave unanimous approval on a motion by Marvin Borg, a member of the building and grounds committee, to re-roof the garage and media department at ESU 1 headquarters at a cost of \$1,265 and \$475 respectively;

—Turned down a request by Administrator Garwood to sell one computer at ESU 1 headquarters

A SPOKESMAN for the chamber said the meeting is being held to assist in gaining the necessary knowledge on all of the alternatives available so that a decision can be made for the best overall plan for Northeast Nebraska.

Among those attending the meeting to provide information will be R. Charles Waymire of Omaha.

Waymire, a graduate of the University of Nebraska College of Engineering, has a bachelor's degree in architectural engineering, a master's degree in engineering with a major in structural design, and a minor in architectural design from the University of Illinois, where he also studied city planning.

THE MEETING with Waymire will include looking into the future and visualizing what Nebraska's transportation needs will be by the year 2020, and discussing how those needs can best be met.

Haven House receives grant to expand services

Governor Kay Orr announced recently that \$1,311,708.73 in block grant funds have been awarded to local units of government and non-profit agencies and \$605,208.81 to state agencies.

Among those chosen to receive block grant funds in the amount of \$10,107.78 was Haven House Family Services Center, headquartered in Wayne.

Director Sara Campbell said the money will be used for program enhancement and for services to native Americans.

In addition to hiring a volunteer coordinator for the Wayne office, Campbell said Haven House will expand its outreach to the native American populations in Macy and Winnebago, including forming support groups for native American women and conducting a public awareness campaign to let them know of the services available through the agency.

"The reservations are just not receiving adequate services," said Campbell. "We have been providing a service but I think now we can do a lot more. We just never had the resources before."

Haven House provides services to victims of domestic violence in Wayne, Thurston, Dixon, Cedar and Dakota counties.

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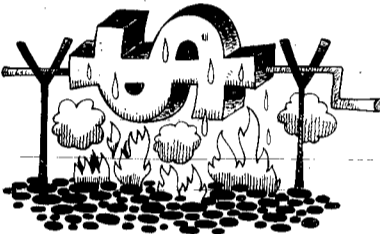
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Wakefield notches runner-up finish in State Class C action

Wakefield suffered a power shortage on offense Thursday night and as a result, lost a 5-2 decision to Creighton in the State Class C Championship American Legion Baseball Tournament held in Wymore.

Wakefield, normally a high powered offensive team, managed only five hits as Creighton pitchers Tom Ulrich and Troy Schwanaback baffled them at the plate. The loss was Wakefield's second in three nights to the same team. On Tuesday, Creighton handed

Wakefield a 7-6 loss before defeating Yutan on Wednesday night by a 10-6 count before advancing into the championship game on Thursday.

Wakefield jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the championship bout and forced Creighton to rally for the victory. In the top half of the first inning Wakefield mounted a 2-out rally. Mike Mogus drew a walk with two out and Matt Tappe singled. Both runners advanced on a wild pitch and Mogus scored on an error that allowed Mark Johnson to

advance to first base.

In the top of the third inning with Wakefield still clinging to a 1-0 lead, a balk on Creighton pitcher Tom Ulrich advanced Andy McQuistan to home plate and a 2-0 lead. McQuistan had reached base on a single.

Creighton knotted the game up at two each in the bottom of the fourth inning and took the lead for good in the bottom of the fifth inning on a 3-run home run.

Steve Loofoe was given the loss on the mound and Troy Schwanaback was credited with the pitching victory for Creighton. Wakefield finished the season with a 38-18 record.

Tuesday's contest

The contest on Tuesday between the same two clubs started out completely different than the championship contest. Creighton, the visiting team got off to a quick start in the top half of the first inning with three runs, aided by a couple Wakefield errors.

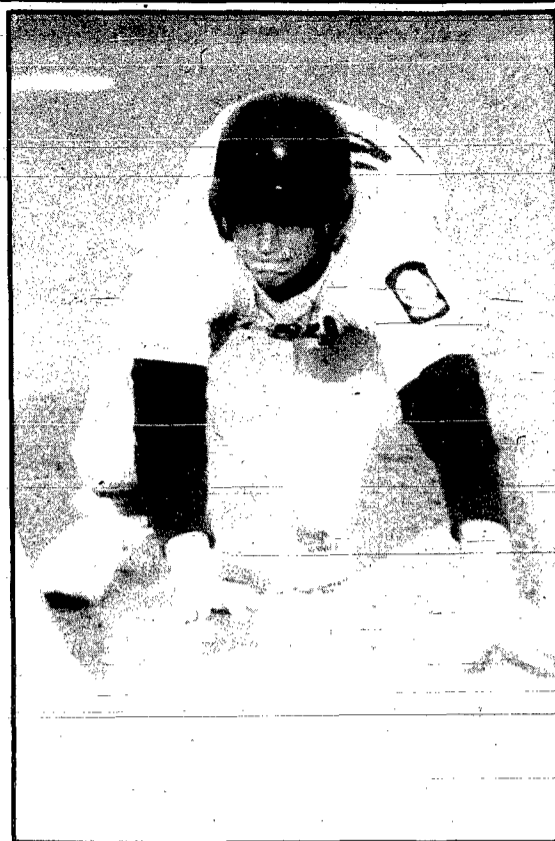
Creighton advanced its lead to 4-0 in the top half of the third inning before Wakefield mounted a

comeback in the bottom half of the third inning which tied the score at four apiece.

Troy Twohig led off the inning by reaching on an error by the Creighton third baseman. Darren Martinson then drew a walk and with one out Troy Lee drew a walk to load the bases. Andy McQuistan then singled and Mike Mogus followed suit with a 2-run single to tie the score at 4-4. McQuistan's single only advanced one runner to home but an error on Creighton allowed Darren Martinson to cross home plate as well.

In the bottom of the fourth inning Wakefield took a 5-4 lead as Chris Loofoe reached base on a single and Doug Manz later doubled him in. Creighton however, managed to come back and tie the game at 5-5 in the top half of the fifth inning.

The score remained tied until the top of the seventh inning when Creighton scored two runs. In the bottom of the seventh inning Wakefield mounted a threat but could only score one run. Troy Twohig was credited with the loss from the mound.

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

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LADIES AID AND LWML

Students grades 9-12 should review the following guidelines concerning the hot lunch program at Wayne High School.

- They are as follows:
1. All lunch tickets must be purchased before school each day (8:15). No tickets will be sold in the lunch line.
2. All lunch must be eaten in the lunchroom area. No food may be taken out of the lunchroom. (Includes lunch brought from home.)
3. No outside food or drinks brought into school during the hours of 12:00 a.m. - 1:30 p.m.
4. Lunch hour: 11:55 - 12:51.
5. Lunch ticket Prices: daily - \$1.20, weekly - \$5.75.

Parents and students should be aware of the latest policies regarding school lunch programs and the competition with that program from outside sources.

The Competitive Foods Policy reads as follows: "Foods sold in competition with National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs are subject to all federal regulations. Such foods shall not be sold on school premises during the period for breakfast and/or lunch and lasting until one-half hour after the serving of breakfast and/or lunch. State and Federal reimbursements may be withheld from schools found in violation of this policy."

This policy does prohibit foods such as pizza, hamburgers, etc. from being brought to school during meal service times. (11:30 to 1:30 at Wayne High School.)

In effect this policy prohibits any food or drinks brought to school from outside sources during the hours of 12:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. each school day or use of pop machines at school during these hours.

Students or parents may bring a sack lunch from home. Contact the high school principal's office for additional information.

University responds to Bereuter request for assistance on insurance

The University of Nebraska Co-operative Extension Service has informed Representative Doug Bereuter that final plans are being made for the Co-operative Extension Service in Nebraska to provide assistance to Medicare recipients seeking information about Medicare supplemental policies.

On July 11 Bereuter wrote to Dr. Leo Lucas, Director of the Nebraska Co-operative Extension Service to express his concern about the number of Nebraskans who have inadequate information about Medicare supplemental policies. Bereuter suggested that the Co-operative Extension Service put into place an outreach program to provide information and counseling about specific privately available Medicare supplemental policies.

In a July 26 letter to Bereuter, Lucas outlines plans for a Medicare/Medicaid Assistance Program which would train local volunteers who could work directly with people needing assistance. Volunteers would be prepared to assist in the processing and filing of Medicare Part A and B claims, in sharing Medicaid eligibility information and

in providing information on how to analyze private health insurance options.

THE COOPERATIVE Extension Service will work with the American Association of Retired Persons, which will train the volunteers. The program will begin in at least two as yet undesignated areas of the state during 1990. Family Economic and Management Specialist Kathy Prochaska-Cue will be in charge of the effort.

Lucas told Bereuter that the program is expected to reach a minimum of 2,000 Nebraskans during its first year, and that, if it is successful, it should expand into other parts of the state as resources permit.

"Current information and technical assistance on Medicare supplemental policies is very inadequate," Bereuter said. My staff and I have handled hundreds of health insurance cases where it is evident that there is a need for additional information. Nebraskans who can least afford it are inadvertently laying out their limited resources for policies that are very poor buys."

By the dawn's early light
By the dawn's early light
Morning is the best time to water most lawn areas. And before 10 a.m. is best of all because rising heat later on tends to steal a lot of water by evaporation. There's another good thing about early morning watering, the grass leaves have a chance to dry off quickly. Evening or nighttime waterings leave the grass wet under the cool, moist conditions that help lawn diseases develop.
Most other plants benefit from early-hour watering, too. Scald or "burn" damage can result from hot sunlight hitting water droplets left on the leaves. They act just like little magnifying glasses. Early or late, try to give the lawn a good deep soaking when you water, not a light sprinkling. Light waterings are actually least effective and can even be harmful to your plants. The water doesn't penetrate the soil deeply enough to encourage plant roots to grow firm and solid. Your lawn will be less drought resistant in summer and more prone to winter kill later.
How do you know how long to water? Let the sprinkler soak an area for about a half hour, then dig a spade into the ground and see for yourself whether the water is getting down deep. If it isn't, try another half hour. Once you've established how long it takes you can do it without checking in the future. One last point... don't think you have to water on a set schedule. If the weather gets cool and moist, cut down. The simplest test is to step on a patch of lawn briefly and see if the grass blades spring back up (no water necessary) or tend to stay flat (time to sprinkle deeply again).

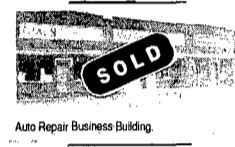

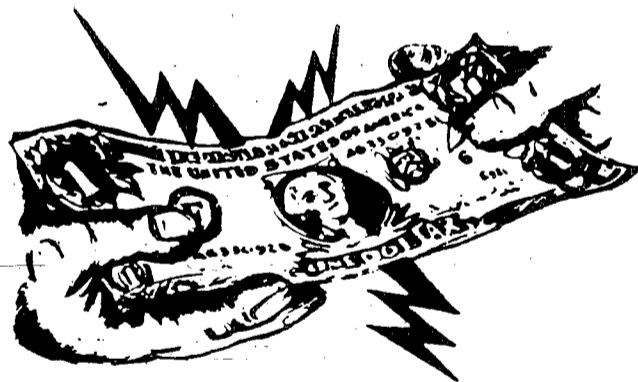

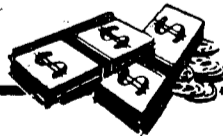
