

At Winside school Hearing set on budget

The proposed budget for Winside Public School for the 1989-90 year shows an increase of approximately \$71,081 — from the present \$1,052,273 to \$1,123,354, according to Winside Superintendent Donavon Leighton.

Leighton gaid included in the increase are payment on a new school bus, funds to pay the LB 89 teacher-pay bill, increased salaries and salary related items such as social security, retirement and health insurance.

A BREAKDOWN of the budget by category is as follows: instruc-tional services, \$682,460; support services — pupils, \$18,993, instructional staff, \$19,842, gen-eral administration, \$76,507, school administration, \$44,076,

business, \$51,281, operation of plant, \$85,406, maintenance of plant, \$21,150, and pupil transportation, \$48,160; federal programs, \$33,046; LB 89 Fund, \$19,933; transfers to other funds, \$2,500 \$22,500.

Leighton said the tax request Leighton said the tax request increase will be approximately \$95,212. He added that reasons necessitating the tax increase include lease bus payment, non-tax revenue reduction, cash balance down, salary and salary related items.

ESU lowers levy, approves budget

The Educational Service Unit One tax levy for the 1989-90 fiscal year has been set at 3.4 cents per \$100 of actual valuation in the six-

\$100 of actual valuation in the sixcounty area the system serves, including Cedar, Dakota, Dixon,
Knox, Thurston and Wayne.

Board members unanimously
approved the levy during a public
hearing last Tuesday night at ESU 1
headquarters in Wakefield.

The 1989-90 tax levy is an approximate four percent reduction
from last year's tax levy of 3.5
cents per \$100 of actual valuation.

The levy is expected to generate
about \$519,105 of the
\$3,247,240 budget unanimously
adopted by the ESU 1 board of
directors.

directors.

The new budget shows an increase of \$386,637 over last year's budget of \$2,860,603.

ALTHOUGH TOTAL estimated valuation figures were not available for the coming fiscal year for 10 counties, including Cedar, Dakota, Dixon, Knox, Thurston, Wayne, Antelope, Pierce, Stanton and Cuming, ESU 1 Administrator Rod Garwood said the 1989-90 valua-

tion is expected to show an increase over last year's figure of \$1,462,571,428.

Programs funded by the county levy include health services, administration and administrative supervision, business, maintenance and operation of plant, and media center.

A COMPLETE breakdown of 1989-90 ESU 1 budget expenditures includes \$1,633,135 in specures includes \$1,053,133 in special education services; \$691,105 in general levy services; \$44,000 in L8 89 funds; and \$429,000 in transfers, for total budget expenditures of \$2,797,240.

The budget also calls for \$450,000 in cash reserves, bringing the total to \$3,247,240.
Estimated revenues during 1989-90 include \$650,000 in estimated cash carry-over; \$1,633,135 in special education contracts; \$519,105 in total taxes; \$32,000 in pursing contracts: \$32,000 in nursing contracts; \$44,000 in LB 89 funds; and \$369,000 in transfers, for a total of \$3,247,240.

MEMBERS OF THE ESU 1 board of directors held their reg-ular monthly meeting following Tuesday night's budget hearing. to enter into a purchase agree-ment with Vern and Dolores Schulz of Wayne for a building to house the West Wayne Children's Pro-

gram.
The agreed purchase price for the building, which is located south of Otte Construction Co. on

south of Otte Construction Co. on the east edge of Wayne, is \$50,750.

Administrator Garwood said although the building is in good shape structurally, it will need some minor improvements before it can house the program.

The West Wayne Children's Program was located in the former Modern Energy Systems building on West Highway 35 until it was rented to the telephone company.

Food may be causing that headache

Food may be causing that headache
Wouldn't it be nice if you could banish headaches, forever? There's
mounting evidence that you can prevent many, maybe even most,
headaches by changing when, how and what you eat.
Food may be the culprit in some headaches. Some foods have chemicals which constrict blood vessels.
The wrong combinations, along with other factors, such as stress, hormonal fluctuations and even the time of day, can intensify these reactions.

RESEARCHERS ARE finding that migraines often disappear when their victims identify and eliminate certain foods from their diet. In a Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center study, one-third of the 43 adult migraine patients improved dramatically by avoiding suspected food al-

migrane patients improved dramatically by avoiding suspected look unlergens.

Allergy specialist Dr. James Breneman, chairman of the Allergy Committee of the American College of Allergists, believes that 70 percent of all headaches can be traced to food sensitivities.

If you suspect your headaches are caused from foods you eat, first consult a physician before starting to eliminate foods from your diet. Milk, wheat, eggs, orange juice and chocolate are the most common allergens.

Patients usually refrain from these foods, and then gradually reintroduce them one at a time to see if they produce symptoms.

SOME MIGRAINE sufferers are sensitive to nitrates, which are found in

many processed foods.

Another headache inducer is the naturally occurring chemical, tyramine. It is found in alcoholic beverages, particularly aged wines and other fermented foods such as yogurt, pickles, cheeses, caviar, pickled herring

Tyramine is a vasodilator, which means it causes blood vessels in the head to swell and produce headaches.

Salt is another common cause of headaches, although its effect on blood-vessels is less clear, says Dr. John Brainard, author of "Control of Miblood vessels is less clear, says Dr. John Brainard, author of "Control of Mi-graines." He says too much salt can make the blood vessels hypersensitive to other things we eat.

SOME FOODS DO actually help chase headaches away. That morning cup of coffee may do more than just wake you up.

Caffeine is a vasoconstrictor. It helps narrow dilated blood vessels that may be causing migraine pain. But there's a catch, too much caffeine has a rebound effect — the vessels dilate.

If you need to cut down on caffeine, don't stop cold turkey. Stopping abruptly can produce a withdrawal headache.

Another cause of weekend head pain is sleeping in late and skipping headfact. That british your blood guara level down which can also bring

breakfast. That brings your blood-sugar level down, which can also bring on a headache. You can avoid the problem by getting up and eating something light even if you aren't really hungry.



"Foods sold in competition with National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs are subject to all federal regulations. Such foods shall no be sold on school premises during the period for breakfast and/or lunch and lasting until one-half hour after the serving of breakfast and/or lunch. State and Federal reimbursements may be withheld from schools found in violation of this policy."

This policy does prohibit foods such as pizza, hamburgers, etc. from being brought to school during meal service times. (11:30 to 1:30 at Wayne High School.)

In effect this policy prohibits any food or drinks brought to school from

outside sources during the hours of 12:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. each school day or use of pop machines at school during these hours. Students or parents may bring a sack lunch from home. Contact the high school principal's office for additional information.

University responds to Bereuter request for assistance on insurance

The University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension Service has in-formed Representative Doug Bereuter that final plans are being' made for the Cooperative Exten-sion Service in Nebraska to provide. assistance to Medicare recipients seeking information about Medi-care supplemental policies.

On July 11 Bereuter wrote to Dr. Leo Lucas, Director of the Ne-braska Cooperative Extension Ser-vice to express his concern about the number of Nebraskans who have inadequate information about Medicare supplemental policies. Bereuter suggested that the Cooperative Extension Service put into place an outreach program to provide information and counseling about specific privately available Medicare supplemental polices.

In a July 26 letter to Bereuter, Lucas outlines plans for a Medi-care/Medicaid Assistance Program which would train local volunteers who could work directly with peo-ple needing assistance. Volunteers would be prepared to assist in the processing and filing of Medicare Part A and B claims, in sharing Medicaid eligibility information and in providing information on how to analyze private health insurance options.

THE COOPERATIVE Extension THE COOPERATIVE Extension Service will work with the American Association of Retired Persons, which will train the volunteers. The program will begin in at least two as yet undesignated areas of the state during 1990. Family Economic and Management Specialist Kathy Prochaska-Cue will be in charge of the effort.

Lucas told Bereuter that the program is expected to reach a minimum of 2,000 Nebraskans during its first year, and that, if it is successful, it should expand into other parts of the state as resources permit.

*Current information and technical assistance or Medicare sup-plemental policies is very inade-quate, Bereuter said. My staff and I have handled hundreds of health insurance cases where it is evident, that there is a need for additional information. Nebraskans who can least afford it are inadvertently laying out their limited resources for policies that are very poor buys."

Early Morning Watering Also Reduces Electrical Costs of Water Pumping

Water pumping, treatment and distribution is one of the largest electrical costs that the city has the ability to control. If water pumping can be reduced during peak hours (usually between 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. during the summer) electrical demand costs can be dramatically reduced.

So be a good "Peak Shaver" and join in the effort to control your electrical costs.

Most other plants benefit from early-hour watering, too. Scald or "burn" damage can result from hot sunlight hitting water droplets left on the leaves. They act just like little magnifying glasses. Early or late, try to give the lawn a good deep soaking when you water, not a light sprinkling. Light waterings are actually least effective and can even be harmful to your plants. The water doesn't penetrate the soil deeply enough to encourage plant roots to grow firm and solid. Your lawn will be less drought resistant in summer and more prone to winter kill later.

Morning is the best time to water most lawn

How do you know how long to water?

Let the sprinkler soak an area for about a half hour, then dig a spade into the ground and see for yourself whether the water is getting down deep. If it isn't, try another half hour. Once you've established how long it takes you can do it without checking in the future. One last point . . . don't think you have to water on a set schedule. If the weather gets cool and moist, cut down. The simplest test is to step on a patch of lawn briefly and see if the grass blades spring back up (no water necessary) or tend to stay flat (time to sprinkle deeply again).


