

# Vision 20/20 plan promoted by Waymire

Businessmen and concerned

Businessmen and concerned citizens of Wayne were given a "20/20" insight into future plans for highway transportation throughout Nebraska. Charles Waymire, president of Transceiver Mid-America which is an Omaha communications firm, addressed the group about Vision 20/20 — a look ahead to what Nebraska's transportation needs will be in the year 2020. The will be in the year 2020. The informational meeting took place Monday at the Black Knight in

Wayne.
According to Waymire, the Vision 20/20 plan will bring commerce and increased tourism through Nebraska because it addresses the need for tying

Nebraska's road system to connecting points or major markets of Minneapolis, Kansas City, Denver and beyond from north to south, east to west

east to west.

Waymire said by 2020
Nebraska will have a minimum of
10 major locations where interstates and freeways will enter the
state. Some of these include 1-29
from Winnipeg, Canada; U.S. 20
across northern lowa; U.S. 34
across southern lowa; U.S. 36
across southern lowa; U.S. 36 across northern libray, U.S. 35 from tulsa, Oklahoma and Topeka, Kansas; U.S. 26 connecting to I-25 at Casper, Wyoming and I-90 from Seattle, Washington.

"Of Nebraska's 10 largest cities, five are not served by interstates," Waymire told the group. "These are Norfoik, Hastings, Columbus, Fremont and Scottsbluff."

THREE OF the next 10 largest cities are also not served by interstate [Alliance, McCook and Beatrice]\* he added.
Few highways go across the entire state of Nebraska. \*Much of the interstate traffic is bypassing Nebraska,\* mentioned Waymire.

In 1988, the Nebraska Legislature called for a highway "Needs Study" — a 20-year road plan proposed by the Nebraska Department of Roads. Basic plans are to widen existing roads that were established long ago through pioneer trails along the streams, according to Waymire.

The Needs Study will not address what transportation needs must be fulfilled for the future of Nebraska in drawing commerce

Nebraska in drawing commerce and tourism to the state, he

mentioned. "The pieces of the puzzle do not fit together in the

overall state transportation system," Waymire said. "Adding shoulders to the highways would not boost economic development in the state," he said.

Vision 20/20 addresses issues that will build the missing links in the state's ground transportation system along with marking the routes on signs and showing the routes on maps, creating highway construction zoning and allowing for building routes at the state

MAJOR HIGHWAYS would be connected and traffic would run through Nebraska communities. For instance in this area a major corridor would connect corridor

Minneapolis to Denver by running through South Sioux City, Wakefield, Wayne, --Norfolk, Columbus, Grand Island to Interstate 80.
"Vision 20/20 is not a massive

"Vision 20/20 is not a massive interstate proposal. It is a master plan for highways," Waymire said.
"It redesignated which highways should be designated as major highways in Nebraska to best serve the state for the next 30 years."
"Planning is important for smaller communities and smaller counties in this state. They will become the future population centers of Nebraska," he said.

Waymire said the Needs Study of the Nebraska Department of

of the Nebraska Department of Roads indicates spending \$0.8 billion for 500 miles of expressway.

# Fiscal '90 highway projects listed

Highway construction and improvement for Wayne and surrounding communities were announced Wednesday by Nebraska Department of Roads Director-State Engineer G.C. Strobel. Strobel.

Some of the major projects planned-for fiscal 1990 in District Ill, which encompasses the counties of Dixon, Cedar and Wayne, include the following: Highway 15 North which would be the Laurel-Concord Junction calling for 4.5 miles of grading, culverts and resurfacing estimated at \$1.541 million; and a lighting project, estimated to cost \$9,000, on Highway 35 at the Junction of Highway 35 and Highway 98 west of Wayne.

of Wayne.

The fiscal 1990 program calls for the expenditure of

\$218,140,000 on the state highway system and \$26,341 on local systems, including \$4,000,000 on recreation road projects.

STATEWIDE, improvements are scheduled on 633 miles of state highways for fiscal 1990. Included highways for fiscal 1990. Included in that mileage are: nine miles of Interstate reconstruction and 15 miles of rehabilitation; 12 miles of expressway; five miles of urban construction; 95 miles of reconstruction on major arterials; 490 miles of resurfacing; and seven miles of gravel elimination.

Included in the total are 151 miles of surfaced shoulders and a total of 87 bridges are slated for reconstruction or rehabilitation in the fiscal 1990 program. ALSO LISTED in the District

Three five year program are the following local projects:

— Highway 9, a seven mile stretch of grading, structures and resurfacing from Wakefield to Fmerson.

— Highway 15, a 5.9 mile stretch of shoulder surfacing and







The federal definitions of homelessness are being studied by staff members of Goldenrod Hills Community Action Agency and the Nebraska Department of Social Services. This is in preparation for the second annual Nebraska Census of homeless Children and Youth, scheduled for Oct. 18.

Youth, scheduled for Oct. 18.
The design of the count calls for the data gathering in the 12 counties of Antelope, Burt, Cedar, Cuming, Dakota, Dixon, Knox, Madison, Pierce, Stanton, Thurston, and Wayne to be coordinated by Pam Bergmann, Administrative As-

sistant for Goldenrod Hills Community Action Agency whose headquarters is in Wisner.

Also participating in the census will be the local school districts, county superintendents of schools, and the local offices of the Nebraska Department of Social Services. Workers will do a case-by-case evaluation to make a professional judgement as the whether a particular child or youth fits the federal definition of homelessness. The definitions are included in the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act of 1987 (Public Law

100-77).

The federal law, which is intended to assure that homeless youngsters are not denied the porivliege of attending public school, sets up several categories in which children and youth may be considered homeless. For ex-ample, children who have run away or have been sent away from their family homes may be considered homeless, depending upon the circumstances.

Agricultural migrants, under some conditions, may be classified

as homeless. Children in foster homes, however, are not. And, whether living with or without their families, school-age youngsters will be counted as homeless if they are staying in temporary or inadequate

The general public can be help-The general public can be helpful in bringing homeless children and youth to the attention of Goldenrod Hills Community Action Agency and the Department of Social Services during the 1989 homeless youngsters census on Wednesday, Oct. 18.

TO SCHOOL AND BACK: HOW TO MAKE EVERY TRIP A SAFE ONE

With the fast approaching "first day of school" in Wayne, some 800 ildren will travel to and from school. Almost every day, all those children children will travel to make the trip safely.

To make that happen, your public schools have taken a number of steps to keep our children safe, on their way to and from school, as well as in school buildings and on school buses.

\* Children learn basic rules of safety from kindergarten on.

\* Playgrounds and buildings are monitored to prevent accidents and litudes.

School bus drivers are trained, and buses are carefully maintained to make school-provided transportation as safe as possible.

But the schools can't do it alone. We all share in the responsibility for keeping our children safe. Here are some ways you can do your part:

Be alert for children at all times, but especially during the hours when they are likely to be traveling to and from school -- that is, between 8:00 a.m. and 4:15 p.m.

\* Obey school speed zones.

\* Stop when you approach, from either direction, a school bus that has stopped to take on or drop off passengers. It is illegal to pass a stopped school bus that has its red lights flashing and/or its stop arm extended. The reason this is so important is that most children who are injured or killed in school bus-related accidents are struck within an area extending for about ten feet on all sides of the bus. In this area, sometimes called the "death zone," children cannot be seen by the bus driver, and they are often hidden from approaching drivers as well. Never take a chance on passing a stopped school bus.

\* Even after a bus has started moving, be cautious -- children might linger in the area.

linger in the area.

\* Naturally, you obey all traffic laws -- speed limits, warning signs, stop-lights -- but don't assume children will. Expect the unexpected -- a child running out into the street from between parked cars, for example, or dashing across an intersection in a misguided attempt to beat a red light.

AS A PARENT or guardian, make sure children in your care understand basic rules of safety. Although they learn these rules in school, the learning needs to be reinforced at home. Emphasize such rules as:

\* Newer cross the street without leaking both ways. The old rule leak

\* Never cross the street without looking both ways. The old rule, look right, then left, then right again, is worth repeating. And never go into the street except at a marked intersection.

\* If children must walk where there are no sidewalks, teach them to stay well of the road and always walk feeing treffice to the well.

stay well off the road and always walk facing traffic, so they will see and

Be seen by oncoming vehicles.

Be sure children know the basic rules of school bus safety, especially those for getting on and off the bus safely. One of the most important is to walk 'ten giant steps' in front of the bus before crossing in front of it. This keeps the child in sight of the driver, who can signal when it is safe to

\* Teach children to answer with a firm NO if a stranger offers to give them a ride (and never ask anyone to pick up your children who is not well known to them).

\* Have rules about when children will get home from school. If they have permission to go to a friend's house, or some other place after school, you may want to have them call you when they get there and

school, you may want to have them call you when they get there and when they leave.

\* Be sure children who ride bicycles know the traffic laws and safety rules for safe riding, and that bikes are properly equipped with lights and other safety features.

To help you work with your child on learning the rules of safety, the Wayne Public Schools is offering two free brochures: "To school and back: Have a safe trip," which gives safety rules for walking or riding bicycles to school; and "To school and back: Have a safe ride," which gives safety rules for school bus riders. Brochures may be obtained at the elementary, middle school and high school principal's offices.

It was a bad year for crambe, but it could be a good year for milkweed. While yields from these alternative crops are not likely to be discussed in rural coffee shops, they are compared in agronomy staff rooms at the University of

UNL researchers and extension specialists plant crambe, milkweed, amaranth and mung beans statewide to study which varieties grow best in Nebraska and the cul-tural practices necessary to obtain a high yield.

The crambe and milkweed crops are in their second year of study. Last year's milkweed harvest was poor, but the outlook for August's harvest on the 200 test acres looks good, said Lenis Nelson, a crop variety and seed production specialist in the UNL Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources. and Natural Resources.

Crambe performed just the op-posite, with 1988-being the high-yielding year. Winterkill and low precipitation hurt the crambe fields this year. Nelson said the precipitation hurt the crambe fields this year, Nelson said. He said the 1988 crambe harvest was enough to provide for the foundation seed supply. There would be crambe seed available if the market increases and farmers want to plant crambe, he said.

These alternative crops may sound exotic, but they all have their potential markets.

Crambe's high erucic acid oil is Crambes nign erruce actu on is used in industry because it can perform at extremely high temperatures. It also is used as a slipping agent in plastics -- it keeps plastic bags from sticking together. The high erucic acid is imported from eastern Europe. Milkweed is harvested for its flow and is just starting to find a market as a clothing insulator.

Unlike crambe, milkweed, already has a Nebraska processor, Natural Fibers in Ogallala. Natural Fibers is developing a prototype product mixing goosedown with milkweed floss and has contact with commercial buyers. A team of UNL scientists are working on milk-weed to study its qualities as a clothing insulator, the diseases that plague the plant, and the planting dates suitable across Nebraska.



Antihistamines: POPULAR ALLERGY MEDICINES

Although antihistamines seldom make newspaper headlines, these versatile agents are helping many persons cope with symp-toms that occur with allergic reactions.

The first effective antihistamines were developed in France in 1945. A year later, diphenhydramine and tripelennamine were introduced as the first anti-histamines approved for use in the United States Both are still in use today.

Antihistamines block the action of naturally ocurring histamine. During an allergic reaction, histamine is released and caus es swelling and redness of the eyes, nose, and in other tissues. According to many allergy experts, an-tihistamines work best when taken before allergic symptoms are fully established. Most antihistamines, including those available without pre-scription, tend to cause
