

Hoppner wins Wayne County; voter turnout low

AREA - Despite a close count among the candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor in the state, Bill Hoppner was the clear-cut choice among people from Wayne County.

Hoppner collected 206 of the ballots compared with Ben Nelson, who gathered 99 votes and Bill Harris with 65. Mike Boyle, was in fourth with 59 votes while Robert Prokop had seven and Robb Nimic collected two. The only other Democratic candidate was Don Eret, who gathered no support.

On the Republican ticket, Gov. Kay Orr outdistanced candidate Mort Sullivan 589-289. Orr, however, lost in some of the precincts in Wayne County.

According to Wayne County Clerk Orgrretta Morris, the low number of voters resulted in only 24 percent of those registered in Wayne County showing up at the booths. She said that was the lowest voter turnout in Wayne County since before her election to office in 1979.

IN THE LIEUTENANT Governor's race, Democratic candidate Maxine Moul gathered the most support as 152 voters supported her ticket. Second place went to

Gary Rogge with 70 votes while Ken Michaelis collected 66 and Steve Wiitala had 38. Keith Edquist received 27 votes for last place.

On the Republican ticket for lieutenant governor, Jack Maddux collected 443 votes while opponent Roy Brettman had 282.

On the Secretary of State ticket, Democrat Nancy Hansen received 350 votes. On the GOP ticket, Allen Beerman received 817 votes. Each candidate ran unopposed in the primary.

In the Attorney General's race, Gene Crump outdistanced Allan Eurek in the Democratic nomination 183-148.

On the Republican ticket for Attorney General, Mike Heavican received 376 ballots to Don Stenberg's 263. In third place was John DeCamp with 206 votes.

In the race for the U.S. Senate, Sen. J. James Exon, who ran unopposed, received 432 votes for the Democratic nomination. Republican candidate Hal Daub outdistanced opponent Otis Glebe 773-84, to win the nomination in the Republican ticket for U.S. Senate.

In the Democratic campaign for the U.S. House of representatives in District 1, Larry Hall ran away

with the nomination over Marlin Pals 239-94. Representative Doug Bereuter, who ran unopposed, collected 852 ballots.

LOCALLY, SEVERAL elections were also held. In the run for the Village of Carroll board of trustees, three candidates were elected with three running. Leading the pack was Kevin Harth with 49 votes followed by Virginia Rethwisch with 34. Clifford Bethune received 27 votes.

In Hoskins, five candidates vied for three positions on the board of trustees. The top vote winner was David Thurstenson with 51 votes. Darrell Maier came in second with 41 and John Scheurich received support from 39 voters. James Miller came in fourth with 37 votes and Russell Doffin collected support from 32 voters.

In Winside, three candidates appeared on the ticket and three positions were to be filled. Frederick A. Weible and Warren Gallop each collected support from 83 voters while Marvin Cherry gathered support from 75.

In Sholes, where there were two vacancies for the board of trustees, John Hansen was the leading vote winner with three

while Don Bauer and Marvin Beardshear each collected two. Tom Bauer and Dwayne Schutt each had one apiece.

In the Wakefield campaign for the Board of Education 60R, Jim Clark led the field with 290 votes while James Stout placed second with 264 votes. In third place, Larry Clay received 248 votes. Other candidates, who will not advance to the primary, include: Nancy Schulz, 224 votes; Marsha Kratke, 160; Richard Puls, 143; and Randall Jensen with 88. With six candidates in the field, three advance to the primary, according to Dixon County officials.

In Allen, the top three vote

winners advance to the village board. Leading the pack was Jacqueline Mitchell with 137 votes and Robert Bock with 131. Dale Strivens earned 126 votes to round out the top three candidates. Richard Dupp received 51 votes and Tonia Smith got 36 of the ballots.

For the Dixon village board, Lawrence Fox received 32 votes and John Young earned 30. Both men will join the village board.

In the Concord bid for village board, Scott Huetig earned 43 votes to lead the pack. Ronald Harder collected 39 and Robert Clarkson had 35.

In Laurel, no city or school pri-

mary elections were held, according to the Cedar County Clerk's office.

In the Dixon County campaign for Republican nomination to County Treasurer, Weldon Schwarten outdistanced John Buhr 919-312.

In the bid for Dixon County Clerk of the District Court, Jackie King won the nomination with 816 votes. Lynn Fleury gathered support from 240 voters while Beverly Nelson had 164 ballots cast for her. In the Democratic nomination for Clerk of the District Court, Patricia Sullivan won a close bid with 338 votes. Mary Kneiff had 260 supporters while Jolane Armstrong finished with 246 votes.

Wayne Senior Center to experience face lift

Shortage of space may no longer be as big a problem for the people at the Wayne Senior Center, according to Georgia Janssen, director of the Senior Center.

The facility has found a temporary answer to its space shortage as some minor renovation is scheduled to be done in the next few weeks. The renovation will allow the Senior Center to seat 70 rather than the 45 it seats now in the basement of City Hall.

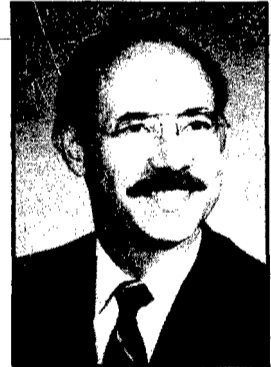
According to Janssen, the renovation is costing the City of Wayne just under \$2,000. She said the money, which is coming from the general fund, has been compiled over a number of years. She said the city is also looking into the possibility of other grant money, which requires five percent in matching funds if attained.

"First of all, this is a small Senior Center for the size of town," Janssen said. "We're serving our feeding capacity but when we

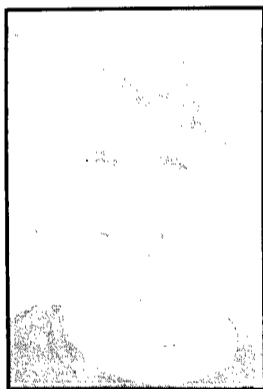
Brent Oetken will also be com-

have pot lucks, we have to cram 60 people into a space built for 45. When we add this L-shaped room, we should be able to seat everyone with a little more comfort."

June 1 deadline set Office must receive applications for 4-H competition

AREA - June 1 is the deadline for receiving entries on a number of 4-H horse-related events this summer, a University of Nebraska, extension horse specialist said.

R.B. Warren said entries for eight district 4-H shows to be held in June around the state must be received at the UNL Animal Science Department in Lincoln by 4 p.m. on June 1. The district shows serve as elimination events for the State 4-H Horse Exposition to be held at Grand Island's Fonner Park July 16-19, except for 4-H'ers in Level III (advanced proficiency classes) which enter state competition directly, Warren said.

The district show schedule: June 19 — Minden; 20 — Lincoln; 21 — David City; 22 — Wayne; 25 — Kimball; 26 — Ogallala; 27 —

Thedford; 28 — Broken Bow.

Those Level III horse club members specializing in calf roping, dally roping-headers and heelers, hunter hack, dressage, advanced English and western pleasure and horsemanship, trail horse — a new event last year, and 2-year-old snaffle bit western pleasure who plan to compete at Grand Island also must submit entries by June 1, Warren emphasized.

There were more than 3,700 4-H'ers enrolled in 4-H light horse projects in 1989, the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources specialist noted.

In addition to events involving horses and riders, the state exposition also will include a Horse Bowl, Horse Public Speaking Con-

test, individual and team demonstrations and awarding of the R.B. Warren and Grand Island Saddle Club 4-H Horse Scholarships. The competitive events' entry deadline is June 1; the scholarships' nomination deadline is June 15.

As a "warm-up" for district and state 4-H horse shows and other horse breed competition, a calf roping school and team roping school for 4-H members and non-member high-school students will be offered at Fonner Park, Warren said.

The enrollment deadline for both schools — the calf roping school June 11-12 and the team roping school June 13-14 — is also June 1, he stressed. A minimum of 15 calf ropers and 15 roping teams is required for the schools to proceed, Warren said. Maximum enrollments are 30 for individual ropers and 25 two-person teams.

Individual roping instructors are Clark Brown and Billy Brown, North Platte ranchers, and Warren. Team roping school instructors are Ed Minor of Gordon, a rancher; and Jim Brinkman, Ericson rancher and Quarter Horse breeder, along with Warren.

All Cooperative Extension offices in Nebraska have entry forms for the district and state 4-H shows and for the roping schools, Warren said. Enrollment forms must be sent by the entrants in the various competitions to R.B. Warren, C-204, Animal Science Department, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, NE 68583-0908.

Almost even as we spoke, before we prayed, it rained! An inch and a half of gentle, soaking wet stuff. Not a drought buster, but certainly a help. In fact, as I stepped out of the house on Saturday morning, it felt exactly like a tropical rain forest.

The lilacs are blooming at exactly the right time, Mother's Day. And we've had our first rhubarb pie.

Little Westmar College, in LeMars, Iowa, is celebrating a centennial also this year. And the Big Farmer's cousin, Bill Melton, was yesterday's Commencement speaker. He even received an honorary doctorate. Amazing as it may seem, it has become a Japanese university, and is now known officially as Teikyo Westmar.

Our church has three organists, two who really know what they are doing, and one keyboard player, your's truly. I also sing in the choir, one accompanies the choir and the third accompanies other groups.

We began having two services on the first of May, and the first one begins at 8:00 a.m. Whoever plays, plays for both. Today, the choir sang for both, too. This calls for planning on my part. (Like getting my dinner prepared on Saturday.)

The baptism finished, the proud parents headed for their pews, and the pastor announced we would sing number 141. This had been the opening hymn for the first service! Now I was a long way from the organ, so I just grabbed a hymnbook and headed for the piano. Full of surprises today.

Our organ at church is a lot more organ than I'll ever use. Mine at home has two manuals, and half the foot pedals. I use pedals on my preludes and postludes, and on most of my wedding music, and always chicken out on the hymns. When people are singing aloud, it's important to maintain rhythm. I can't stop to locate a lost pedal.

We've been getting our choir directors from Wayne College the past few years. We've enjoyed these students, and they've acquired some realistic experience in conducting.

While we were singing today's anthem, I suddenly realized that this particular new graduate had been a long-time school friend of our Kay. How could she now be directing our choir? These kids continue to grow up, and when I'm not looking.

Anyway, we got the baby baptized, the songs sung, the organ played, and dinner on the table. After that, it was a relaxing Mother's Day!

The most unusual gift I saw was a new bicycle seat for one very energetic grandmother. I received half an old whiskey barrel to place under the old pump in the yard, and a book on operating a bed and breakfast. I see a whole new career beginning!

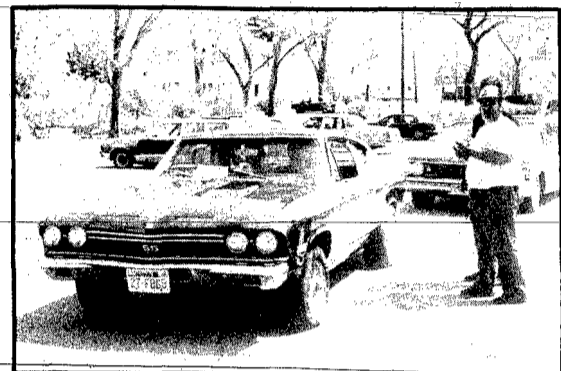
