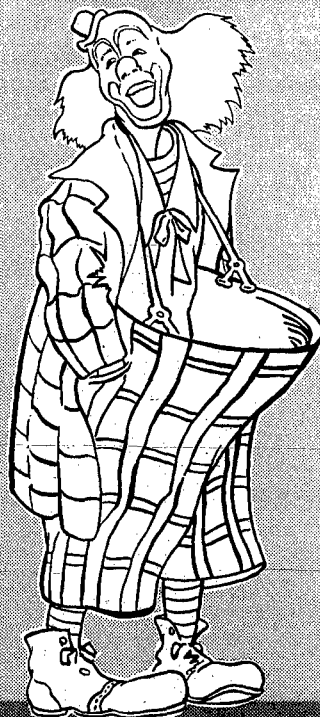

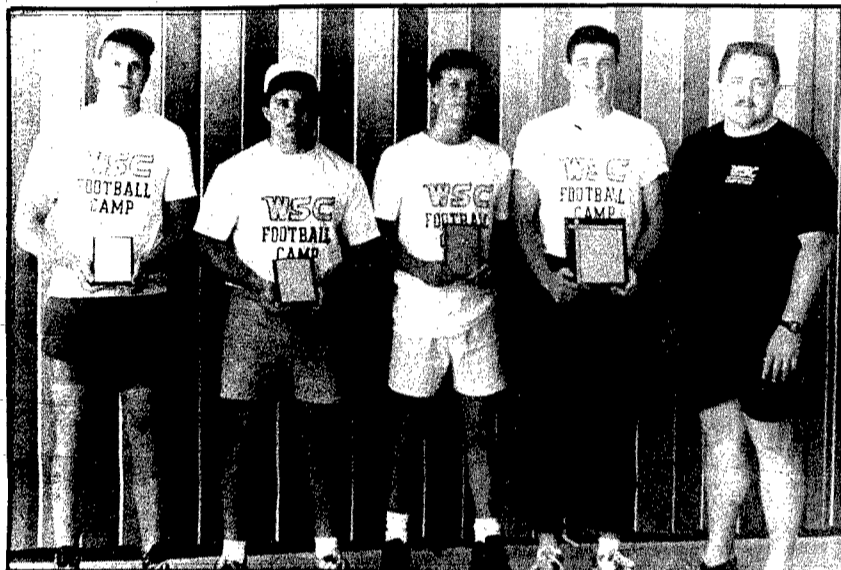

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NITROGEN DEMONSTRATIONS ENTER FIFTH YEAR

The water sampling project implemented by the Lower Elkhorn NRD Board of Directors identified areas around Osmond and Wee Town as having high groundwater nitrate levels. Widespread evidence pointed to fertilizer nitrogen as the main source of nitrates in groundwater. In 1986, the Board funded a Nitrogen and Irrigation Management Project led by Charles Shapiro and Bill Kranz with UNL Cooperative Extension. At the March 1990 board meeting the Directors voted to continue funding the project. The 1990 project will involve two demonstration sites near Osmond and one demonstration site near Wee Town.

The objective of the project is to demonstrate that deep soil sampling for residual nitrogen and irrigation scheduling are cost effective and environmentally sound practices. Management practices being demonstrated involve the following steps:

- 1) Determine 5-year average yield plus 5%,
- 2) Take deep soil samples to four feet to determine residual nitrate in the soil profile,
- 3) Sample irrigation water for nitrates,
- 4) Adjust applied fertilizer N to account for nitrates contained in the soil and irrigation water, and
- 5) Apply irrigation water using irrigation scheduling techniques.

The goal of these practices is to limit nitrogen leaching by entering the off-season with low soil nitrate and soil water levels. These practices help maintain yield while limiting groundwater contamination.

At each demonstration site, three rates of nitrogen fertilizer are applied using the farmer's equipment. Based upon UNL fertilizer recommendations and the five step process listed above, nitrogen rates equivalent to -50 lbs, recommended and +50 lbs are applied. Yields are determined with a weigh wagon and the cooperators combine. Demonstrations have been located on irrigated and dryland fields with silty and sandy soils. The results have been consistent.

After 4 years, yield from the -50, recommended and +50 pound nitrogen rates have averaged 143, 152 and 155 bushels per acre, respectively (Table 1). Thus the extra nitrogen netted only 11 bushels per acre. Much of the extra nitrogen applied in the +50 lbs strips remained in the soil in the fall but in some years 40-50 lbs/acre have been lost. Similar losses between harvest and next year's spring sampling were not identified for the -50 lbs/acre treatment.


Economically, the application rate at which nitrogen application becomes profitable depends on the price of corn in comparison to the price of nitrogen. For example, an eight bushel increase due to 100 lbs of additional nitrogen is profitable only if nitrogen is priced less than \$0.20 per pound and corn is priced greater than \$2.50 per bushel. This comparison does not include potential costs of groundwater cleanup.

In summary, the demonstration project has shown that applying nitrogen in excess of UNL recommendations has marginal economic return and can contribute to groundwater contamination. According to Janssen, the program is important since the facility has seen an increase in the average length of stays from five to seven days. He said even though a student cannot get a GED in that period of time, some youth are being housed for six months to a year at a time. He said the GED program is important for those youth.

Additionally, the GED program doesn't cost Wayne County tax-

payers, per se, anything. Janssen said the program is federally funded, so it is not money coming from the county's budget.

"I think anytime you see a child develop their educational skills, it's great," Janssen said. "Although they may not finish the GED program here, it gives them that opportunity to know it is available in the outside world. Maybe some of them will go out and finish the GED and continue on with a college education."

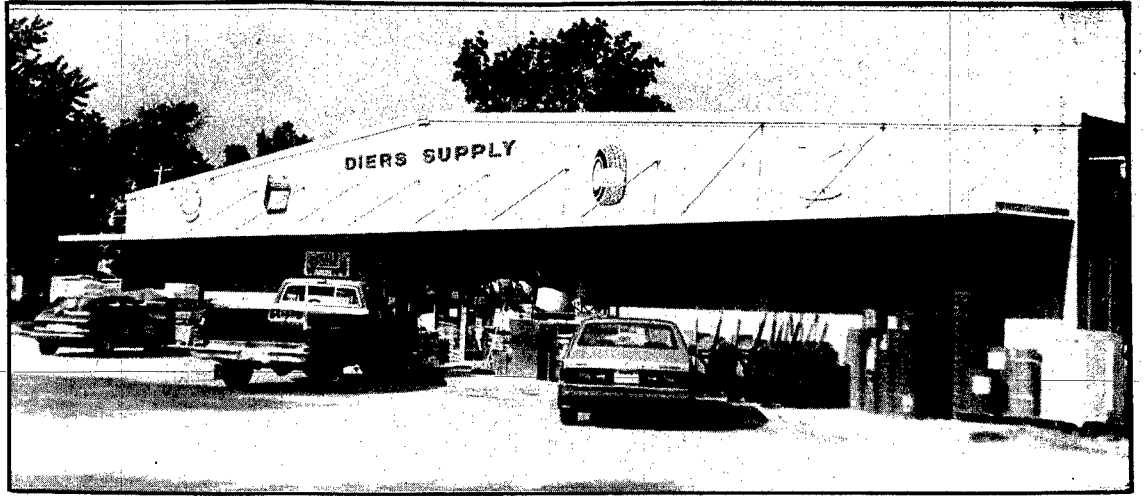
"If someone's looking for something, chances are we have it," he said. "We always try to keep a good stock of everything. If we don't have what people are looking for, we can get it."
