Search for new coach begins

WAYNE-The search for a new men's basketball coach at Wayne State will begin immediately, according to athletic director Pete Chapman. Wayne State will conduct a national search to name its 19th head coach and will begin the process immediately. "We don't have a firm time set when we will name a new coach," Chapman said. "But we want to move ahead and make a decision as soon as possible." Steve Aggers resigned last week to accept a position at Pepperdine University in Malibu, Calif. Aggers had been at Wayne State five seasons.

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## **NITROGEN DEMONSTRATIONS ENTER FIFTH YEAR**

The water sampling project implemented by the Lower Elkhorn NRD Board of Directors identified areas around Osmond and Wee Town as having high groundwater nitrate levels. Widespread evidence pointed to fertilizer nitrogen as the main source of nitrates in groundwater. In 1986, the Board funded a Nitrogen and Irrigation Management Project led by Charles Shapiro and Bill Kranz with UNL Cooperative Extension. At the March 1990 board meeting the Directors voted to continue funding the project. The 1990 project will involve two demonstration sites near Osmond and one demonstration site near Wee Town.

The objective of the project is to demonstrate that deep soil sampling for residual nitrogen and irrigation scheduling are cost effective and environmentally sound practices. Management practices being demonstrated involve the following steps:

1) Determine 5-year average yield plus 5%,
2) Take deep soil samples to four feet to
determine residual nitrate in the soil profile,
3) Sample irrigation water for nitrates,
4) Adjust applied fertilizer N to account for
nitrates contained in the soil and irrigation
water, and
5) Apply irrigation water using irrigation
scheduling techniques.

The goal of these practices is to limit nitrogen leaching by entering the off-season with low soil nitrate and soil water levels. These practices help maintain yield while limiting groundwater con-

At each demonstration site, three rates of nitrogen fertilizer are applied using the farmer's endingent and the five step process listed above, nitrogen rates equivalent to -50 lbs, recommended and +50 lbs are applied. Yields are determined with a weigh wagon and the cooperator's combine. Demonstrations have been located on irrigated and dryland fields with sitly and sandy soils. The results have been consistent.

DISTRICT

After 4 years, yield from the -50, recommended and +50 pound nitrogen rates have averaged 143, 152 and 155 bushels per acre, respectively (Table 1). Thus the extra nitrogen netted only 11 bushels per acre. Much of the extra nitrogen applied in the +50, bbs strips remained in the soil in the fall but in some years 40-50 lbs/acre have been lost. Similar losses between harvest and next year's spring sampling were not identified for the -50 lbs/acre treatment.

Economically, the application rate at which nitrogen application becomes profitable depends on the price of corn in comparison to the price of nitrogen. For example, an eight bushel increase due to 100 lbs of additional nitrogen is profitable only if nitrogen is priced less than \$0.20 per pound and corn is priced greater than \$2.50 per bushel. This comparison does not include potential costs of groundwater cleanup. groundwater cleanup.

In summary, the demonstration project has shown that applying nitrogen in excess of UNL recommendations has marginal economic return and can contribute to groundwater contamination For more information about the project, contact Charles Shapiro or Bill Kranz at the Northeast Center, Concord, Nebraska.


