

## Reicherts proud of ties to village

WINSIDE - Even though Winside found its roots before Willis and Gladys Reichert were born, their family history ties into that of the 100-year-old village.

The siblings — who have lived together most of their lives — proudly express their feelings about the town, its survival and its history.

The Reichert family arrived in Winside March 8, 1888 by train from Ohio. Their mother's family arrived by covered wagon to. Wayne County in the spring of 1897, according to family records. Their parents Samuel Reichert and Ada Pose were beined in mariana. Ada Rose were joined in marriage

Jan. 12, 1910.

Three years after the marriage, Gladys was born. Two years later, Willis made the scene.

ACCORDING TO family history, the Reichert family was in favor of relocating Northside to Winside's current location. Willis said his father and his uncle helped move the shed which began the trend toward placing Winside in its cur-rent location.

rent location.

After the small village — which now is home to approximately 500 people — was relocated, it became a hub for area farmers to come and trade dairy products for specifical. produce.

"On Saturdays, people would come from all around by wagon,

horse or buggy to buy produce in trade for eggs or milk," Gladys said. "They would also trade for flour and sugar; things people thought were essential items."

were essential items."

"If you weren't early, you wouldn't be able to find a place to hitch up your teams," Willis added. In addition to going to Winside via dirt roads, rural travelers would stay in town until mid-afternoon: that is for most people.

"They'd leave early so they could get home by dark," Willis said. "Of course, there was the exception of a few men who had horses who would know the way home. If they had a well-trained horse, the horse would direct them."

them."

Often times, the evening travelers would leave after stopping by Winside saloons, Willis said.

BUT THE TIME for dirt roads was short-lived during Willis' and Gladys' lifetimes. From 1925-27, the city undertook two of its major projects by building a sewer system and paving the town's streets. Also, the state began to establish high-way paths as automobiles became

Winside also has strong ties to

the history of the railroad.

The town began because the railroad wanted to locate towns approximately eight miles apart but when passenger trains ceased travel in the mid-1940s, Winside found its influx of people slowed and that hurt the town's economy. Through perseverance, however, the town has survived.

"Businesses have depleted," Gladys said. "We don't have the businesses like we had in the early years, but the churches and the years, but the churches and the school have kept the town alive. ...People seem to save their money and continue to live here."

GLADYS, WHO worked for the funct Winside Tribune, has

also worked for the Sioux City Tribune (now the Sioux City Journal), the Norfolk Daily News and The Wayne Herald. She was one of the authors of Winside's first history book, published in 1941 by the Winside Tribune.

The experience as a newspaper reporter, as well as a teacher for 30 years, allowed her to develop a long-term interest in the commu-

long-term interest in the community, she said.

"The thing I like about Winside is that everyone will help everyone else," she said. "This community has a purpose. If there's a problem, businesses and towns people work together to help out. You won't find that in many places any more."

Of her experiences in researching for the first Winside his-tory book, she said she found many people are related. She said the most difficult task she took on in her duties was interviewing German immigrants who spoke little man im English.

had quite a time understanding some of them," she said.

WILLIS, FOLLOWING his return from Europe after World War II, said he has developed a number of friendships through the number of places he's worked. He said he has done work from being a farm hand

to working for the Wayne County roads department, among others. Winside's a nice place to be, he said. "Once you establish your friendships, you want to stay. Many people will head south for the winter, but I've never wanted to do that. Living in Winside is important to me."

Despite the decline of the small

town throughout the United States, neither Willis, nor Gladys said they think Winside is on the

decline.

"Everybody works together to keep Winside going," Gladys said.
"That's what makes it a special place to live."

#### Joke almost turns to tragedy for juvenile in detention center

WAYNE - According to Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen, what started out as a joke by one in-mate at the Juvenile Detention Facility almost turned to tragedy Saturday, July 7.

At 9:58 p.m. Wayne Police responded to a call of an attempted suicide at the Wayne County Detention Facility, as a 16-year-old male from the Winnebago Indian Reservation was found by jailers hanging from a sheet in his cell.

The incident occurred just after jailers had made their final evening rounds, Janssen said.

"After returning up front, one of the kids came up front to alert us to another who had tied a sheet to the bars and had slipped,"

Janssen said. "It appears the whole thing was a joke gone bad."

IANSSEN SAID the three jailers on duty responded by cutting the inmate from the bars with a pair of scissors, while one secured the other inmates in their cells and the other inmates in their cells and the third called police. He said before police arrived, officials made sure the youth was breathing properly. "After checking out OK, he was put in solltary where he could not do it again," Janssen said.
The next day, the youth was sent to Marian Health Center in Sioux City, lowa for psychiatric observation.

At the time of the incident, the facility was at 50 percent capacity, Janssen said.

help them learn about themselves and their future.






