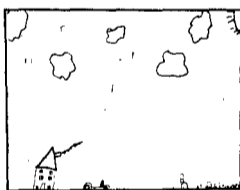
The royalty were selected by members of the Best Ever Club, sponsors of the centennial king and queen event.

Dixon's grand centennial celebration will take place on Sunday, Aug. 12 and includes a parade at 1:30 p.m.

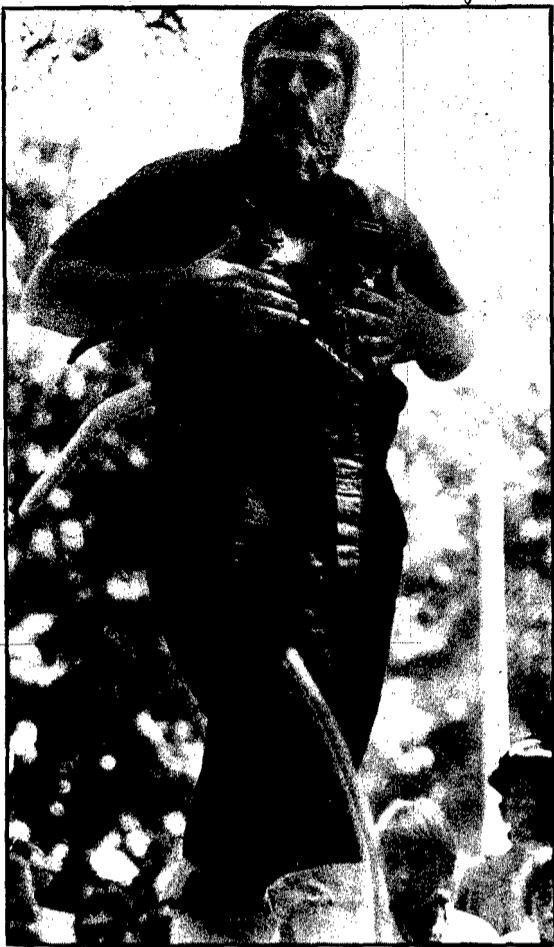
Blood bank

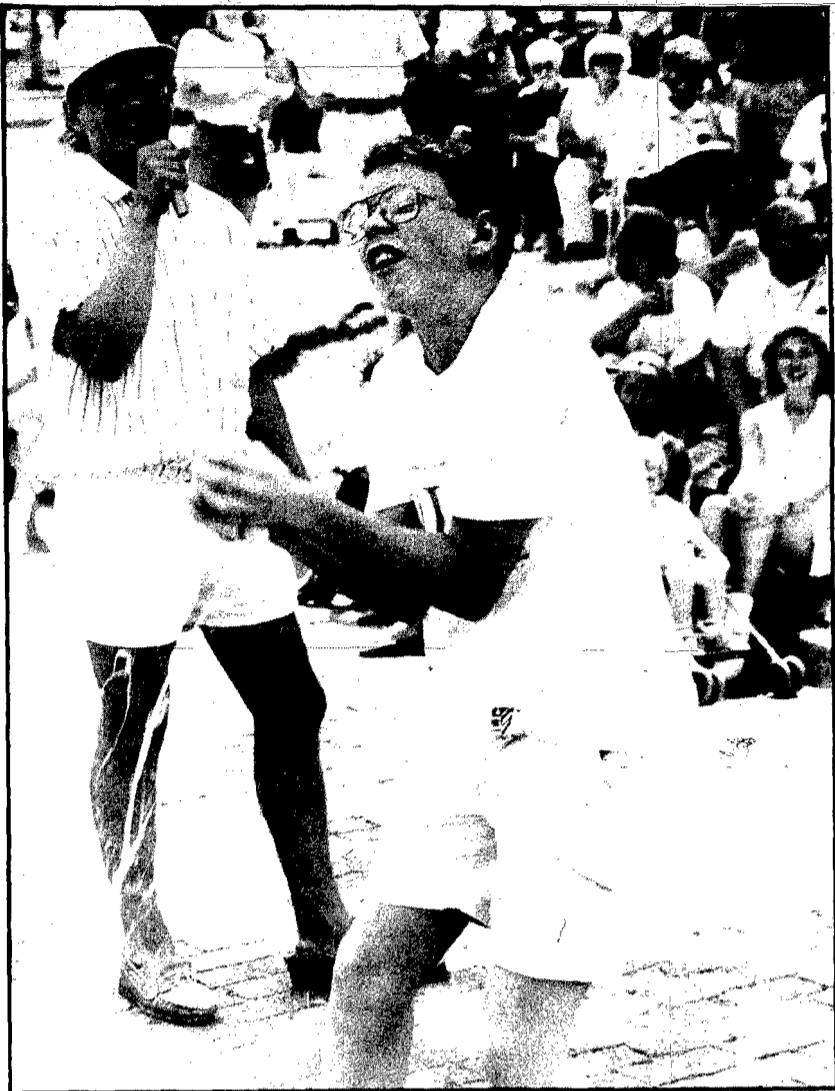

Chicken Show draws 5,000

Annual event tickles fancy of chicken lovers, imitators, fans

WAYNE - As the dust settled Saturday, people could say the Wayne Chicken Show was something to crow about.

According to Chicken Show officials, over 5,000 people attended the tenth annual Wayne Chicken Show.

As always, the annual event came up with winners in several categories.

For the fourth year in a row, Joel Vavra of Crete was crowned the winner of the annual cluck off.

Winner of the \$60 award in the Eggsposition/Rocketry was Mike Fluent. Winner in the rooster crowing contest was Andrew Jensen's bird, crowing 74 times. Matt Jensen took second place when his rooster registered 50 crows on the Rooster Crowing Scale.

Parade winners included: Best Commercial — Pac 'N' Save; Best Organization — Swimming Pool Life Guards; Individual Child — Mike Dolata; Group, Children — Right to Life; Best Overall Chicken Through History — Eagle's of

Wayne; Best Chicken Related (overall) — Chick 'N' Dale dancers; and Best Overall Float — Scott and Terry Kumm (McClain). For their efforts the Kumms received a \$100 prize.

In the Chicken Flying Meet, Matthew Clemen's heavyweight bird (4 lbs. and over) won the competition with a flight of 34 feet. Angela Ranken's bird took top honors in the middleweight category (3 to 4 lbs.) with a flight of 25 feet, 7 inches. Bev Hansen's bird won the bantam weight (2 to 3 lbs.) competition, flying 17 feet, 8 inches and Matt Jensen's bird won the featherweight (1 to 2 lbs.) competition with a distance of 26 feet.

CROWNED AS THE Chicken Ala King was Clyde Flowers and Chicken Ala Queen was Jan Gamble.

Bon Ami Paneting winners included: Children under 7 — First, Ron Ley; Second, Monica Boehle; Children age 8-12 — First, Jeremy Hansen; Second, David Boehle;

Children age 13-18 — First, John Hansen; Second, Tim Renken and adult winners were: First Chris Pignotti, Randolph; and Kackle Ley, Wayne.

The winner of the biggest egg was Kayla Schmale at 107.8 grams and the winner of the littlest egg was Mrs. Munson with a weight of 3.7 grams. The prettiest egg winner was Mary Muhs and the oddest egg was won by Mike Damme.

The best decorated egg for adults was done by Jolene Luet, while the children's category was won by Matt Renken.

IN THE CLUCK-OFF competition, the best hen for ages 13 and over was won by Calvin Hoegh, Treynor, Iowa. Second went to Kim Linton, Eugene, Ohio; and third re-

sulted in a tie between Elaine Vavra, Crete; and Chad Evans, Winside.

In the 12 and under category, Grace Vavra, Crete, placed first. Second went to Chris Culver, Omaha and third went to Michelle Murray, Wayne.

In the 13 and over rooster competition, Joel Vavra, Crete placed first. Second went to Elton Jones of Alexandria, N.C. and third went to Matt Bucher, Vermillion, S.D. In the 12 and under category, Brandon Ehlers, Lyman, Wyo, placed first. Second went to Matt Meyer, Wayne, and third was awarded to Janna Vavra, Crete.

Family roots in Winside

Reichert's proud of ties to village

WINSIDE - Even though Winside found its roots before Willis and Gladys Reichert were born, their family history ties into that of the 100-year-old village.

The siblings — who have lived together most of their lives — proudly express their feelings about the town, its survival and its history.

The Reichert family arrived in Winside March 8, 1888 by train from Ohio. Their mother's family arrived by covered wagon to Wayne County in the spring of 1897, according to family records. Their parents Samuel Reichert and Ada Rose were joined in marriage Jan. 12, 1910.

Three years after the marriage, Gladys was born. Two years later, Willis made the scene.

ACCORDING TO family history, the Reichert family was in favor of relocating Northside to Winside's current location. Willis said his father and his uncle helped move the shed which began the trend toward placing Winside in its current location.

After the small village — which now is home to approximately 500 people — was relocated, it became a hub for area farmers to come and trade dairy products for produce.

"On Saturdays, people would come from all around by wagon,

Combined effort nets championship

Wayne-Wakefield sluggers win tourney

A combined Wayne-Wakefield baseball team traveled to Pierre, South Dakota over the weekend to take part in a round robin tournament and the local team waltzed away with the top prize as they went undefeated in the format setting. The tournament was set up by former Wayne State football quarterback Scott Raue—the coach of Pierre.

Last month the South Dakota team traveled to Northeast Nebraska and played several area teams but it was the Wayne-Wakefield team called "Waynefield" and Norfolk who made the return trip to Pierre for the four team round robin.

Wayne's first game was against Norfolk and the locals came out on top of a 1-0 score as Ben Jackson of Wakefield got the pitching victory. Both teams could muster just four hits as Waynefield was led by Chris Loofe with a 2-4 outing which consisted of two singles. Matt Tappe of Wakefield also hit a single but it was Russ Hamer's seventh inning single that brought in the game winning run.

Waynefield then played Northern Hills—a team from Sturgis, S.D. and made up of players from that surrounding area. Wayne won the game 6-5 behind the pitching arm

of Jeff Lutt who struck out six along the way. Wayne pounded out eight hits in the game while Northern Hills was held to just four.

The game went extra innings as the score was knotted at five apiece after seven innings of play. Wayne scored the winning run in the bottom of the eighth inning with one out. Matt Peterson reached base on a single and scored on Brian Lentz's double.

Jeff Lutt cranked a home run in the sixth inning to aid his pitching cause while Chris Loofe, Russ Hamer, and Brian Lentz all doubled. Matt Tappe, Mike Mogus, Matt Bruggeman and Matt Peterson all singled.

Waynefield played its third and final game of the round robin tournament against the host team in Pierre. Ben Jackson earned his second victory of the weekend as he came in to earn the win in relief of Matt Tappe and Brian Lentz in a 14-12 decision.

Wayne pounded out 11 hits in the game and Pierre managed to hit safely 12 times. Matt Peterson provided some fire power early as he belted a 2-run home run in the second inning. Brian Lentz went 3-3 in the game with three singles and three rbi's while Matt Tappe hit a single and a double and also notched three rbi's. Jeff Griesch hit

Wayne scored all six of its runs in the second inning with two outs. The first two batters of the second inning were retired by Wisner

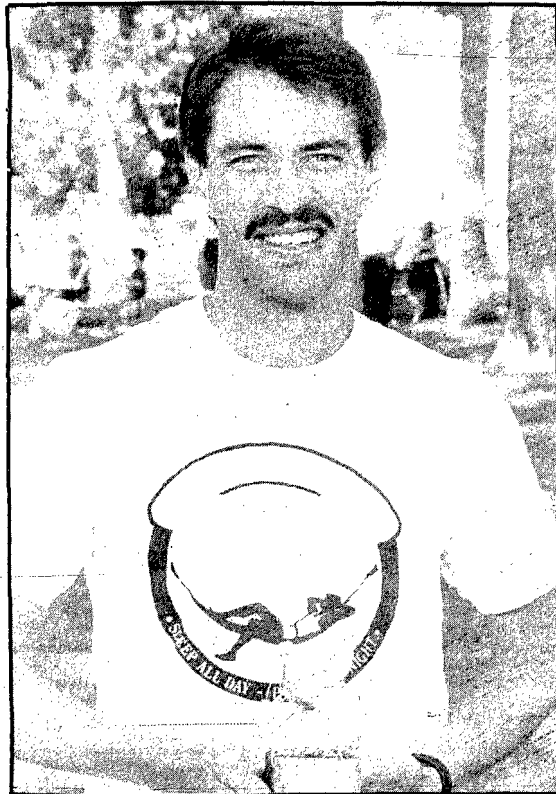
pitcher Cory Weber but then Jeff Griesch singled, followed by a Matt Bruggeman walk and an error which put Jim Hoffman on base.

Wayne girls lose at state tourney

The Wayne girls 18 and under and 15 and under fast pitch softball teams took part in the Nebraska Class B State Tournament over the weekend in North Platte.

In girls 18 and under action the locals lost to Olympia Village of Grand Island, 17-2 as Wayne failed to get a hit. "We got a good pitching performance from Teresa Ellis," Wayne coach Doug Sturm said. "She had never pitched before and she walked just three batters and gave up two hits."

Scoring Wayne's two runs were Tara Erxleben and Angela Schnier. Wayne's first game took place at 8 a.m. on Saturday morning.

The double elimination format had Wayne playing Lincoln Express at 1 p.m. on Saturday and Wayne exited the tournament following a 20-10 loss. "Teresa Ellis pitched another good game giving up two walks and striking out three," Sturm said. "We finally got over the nervousness of playing in the state tournament and we played much better as every player scored a run."

Ellis doubled and Leslie Spethman got two hits to lead the team. Deanna Schluns got a single while Tara Erxleben and Shannon Holdorf reached base three times each.

Sturm noted that the defensive play of Kristin Frevert and Holly Nichols was solid.

In the girls 16 and under portion of the state tournament Wayne played the Barends Blasters out of North Platte in the opener at 9:45

a.m. Wayne was shut out by a 13-0 score. Kari Lutt and Wendy Beiermann combined on a two hit performance from the mound but too many walks eventually led to Wayne's demise.

Holly Holdorf recorded Wayne's only hit of the game.

Wayne's second game of the double elimination tournament pitted them against the Arden Hornets of Kearney and Wayne was thus ousted from the state tournament following an 18-9 set back.

"We had a 7-5 lead after two innings of play," Sturm said. "We just couldn't keep things going our way." Tami Schluns, Kari Lutt, Holly Holdorf, Lisa Casey, Lana Casey and Jenny Thompson all reached base via a hit.

Sturm said that Shawn Schroeder, Kari Lutt, Holly Holdorf and Kristine Swanson played good defense throughout the tournament. "Summing up our tournament performance we are a very young team that loses just three players next season in Teresa Ellis, Kristin Frevert and Holly Nichols," Sturm said. "The girls gained valuable experience for next year."

Wayne should be strong in the future with over 25 girls returning next season. "Speaking for the coaches and the players we would like to thank the Recreation Board, fans, and parents for their support all year," Sturm said. "We also want Hank Overlin and Jere Morris to know we appreciated their efforts in getting the fields ready for our girls."
