Gardner and his wife, Jeanne, live in Wakefield. He has managed Waldbaum's since arriving in 1952, two years after Milton Waldbaum founded it.

Waldbaum's has grown to the second largest egg processor in the country during Gardner's years. Each day, millions of eggs are processed and sold in various forms to institutional customers, supermarkets, restaurants and other distributors.

Located in Wakefield since its inception, Waldbaum's employs more than 450 persons, which ranks it among northeast Nebraska's largest employers.

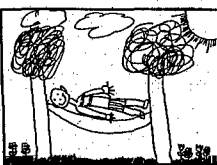

Campbell featured speaker at WSC graduation

WAYNE - Dr. Paul Campbell, the 1989-90 Blue Key Outstanding Professor, will be the featured speaker during Wayne State College's summer commencement exercises Friday, Aug. 10.

Commencement will begin at 10 a.m. in the Willow Bowl, Wayne State College's outdoor amphitheater.

It will feature 95 students receiving degrees, and a Distinguished Service Award will be presented to Dan Gardner, chief executive operator of the Milton G. Waldbaum Company in Wakefield. The award recognizes Gardner's many years of outstanding work and service, which has resulted in the betterment of northeast Nebraska.

DR. CAMPBELL, associate professor of criminal justice at Wayne State, earned his bachelor's degree from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, and his master's and Ph.D. degrees from Utah State University. He came to Wayne State in 1980.

Dixon centennial on tap for August 12

DIXON - As centennials go, it looks like the Dixon centennial committee has slated a full agenda.

Although the Dixon centennial is planned for Sunday, Aug. 12, two events are planned for Saturday, Aug. 11, according to centennial officials.

At 6 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 11, an alumni banquet is planned at the student union building on the Wayne State College campus. Classes being honored include the classes of 1929, 1940 and 1950.

The Class of 1929 is being honored since there is no class of 1930 and the class of 1940 will be celebrating 50 years.

Also on Saturday, Aug. 11, an evening beach party is being sponsored by Euni's Place with music by the Cadillac Cowboys.

WITH THE pre-centennial festivities past, the Dixon centennial celebration will be underway with a community church service at the Dixon United Methodist Church with Rev. T.J. Frazier and Father Michael Grewe in charge.

Following the church service will

be a barbecue from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Main street in Dixon. There will be a minimal charge for the food.

At 1:30 p.m. a parade is planned with no pre-registration required. Following the parade will be a program in downtown Dixon which includes a flag presentation and ceremony; a reading of Legislative Resolution No. 236 and the recognition of centennial royalty, who will have been announced Sunday, Aug. 5 during the "Beauty of Yesteryear" style show which was held in the Dixon auditorium.

Raffle drawings will also be held after the parade with the raffling of a centennial quilt, a centennial rifle, a quilted wall-hanging, an oil painting and 50 lbs. of packaged beef. There will also be a memories of stories presentation.

From 8 p.m. to 10:30 p.m., there will be a square dance in the Dixon auditorium with Ron Schroeder the caller.

OTHER MISCELLANEOUS afternoon activities are planned for Sunday, Aug. 12. Included in those

activities will be a Nebraska Cold Air Balloon, an antique display in the auditorium, a quilt show at the United Methodist Church basement, a church history display at St. Ann's parish hall and a pie and ice cream social by the United Methodist Women, to be held in the auditorium.

Also, bingo, drawings and tavern sandwiches will be served by St. Ann's altar society in the Roeders building. Concession stands will be available to the public with dunking tanks and other games available. A special stamp cancellation will be available in the Dixon auditorium Aug. 13-15 at the centennial station in the main post office lobby.

OF COURSE, NO centennial would be complete without the variety of memorabilia items available. These items will be available from Dixon businesses before the celebration and on Sunday, Aug. 12.

Memorabilia will also be available at the alumni reunion Saturday, Aug. 11.

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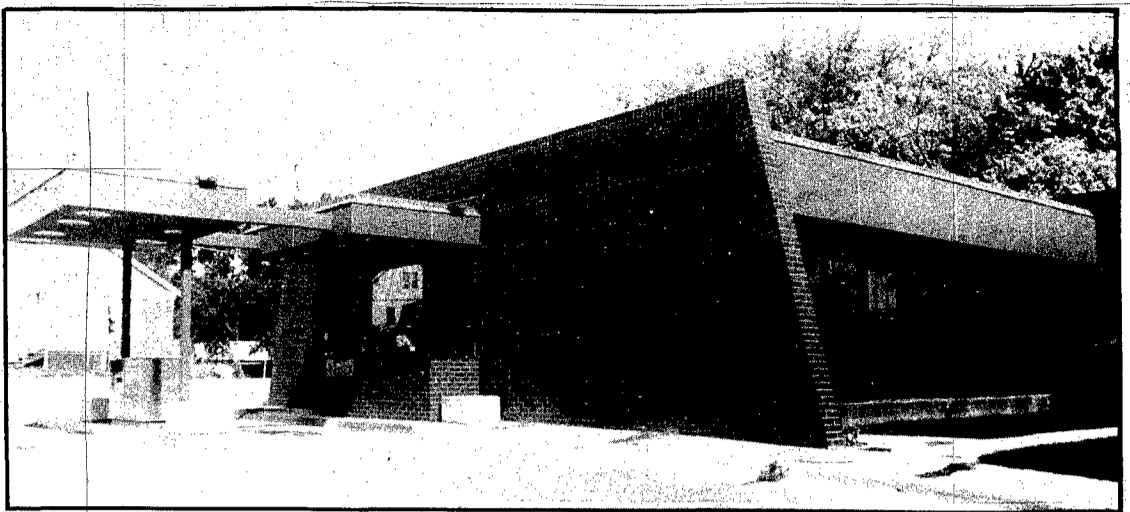
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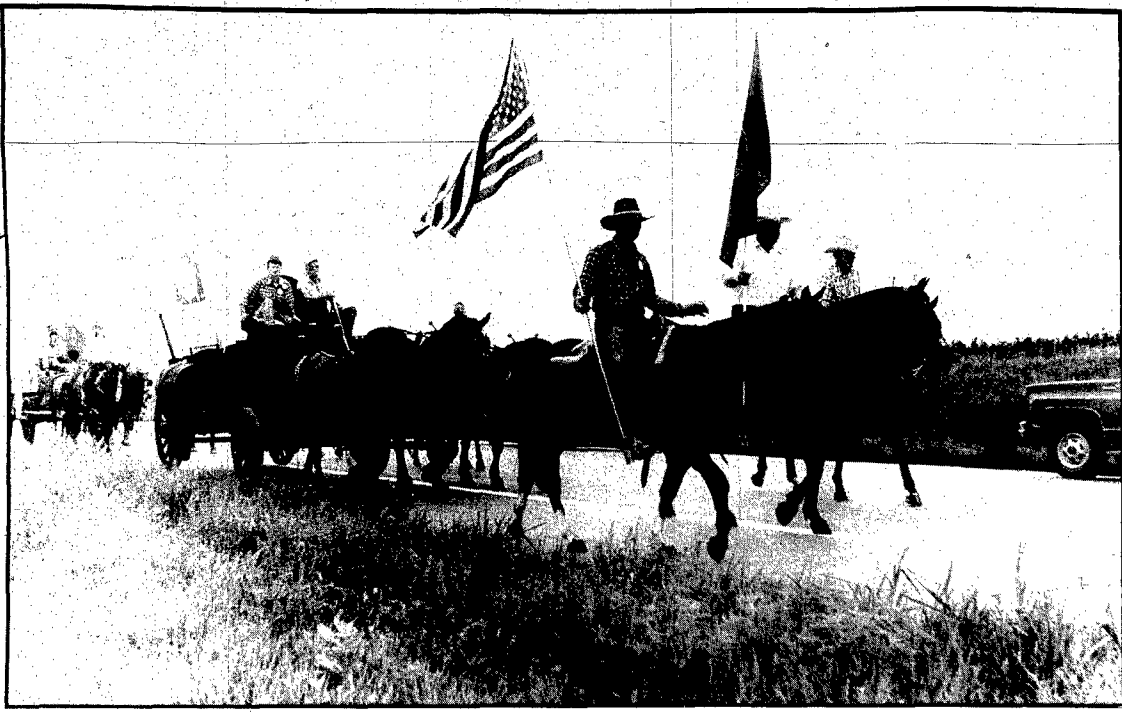

Getting ready for sports with proper eating

AREA - It won't be long until athletes hit the football practice field. And it is important for players to be aware of the best types of food to eat before competition.

Good nutrition is essential for optimal athletic performance, according to University of Nebraska Extension Nutrition Specialist Darlene Martin.

For athletes the best diet is one that will meet individual requirements for energy, water, carbohydrates, protein, fats, vitamins and minerals, she said. The primary objective is to adjust dietary intakes to the energy requirements of the sport to maintain an ideal body weight.

Physical fitness is not generic, but varies from person to person. Body composition is a more reliable indicator of fitness than body weight, said Martin, a Northeast Research and Extension Center staff member. Muscular athletes who are "overweight" according to weight-for-height charts are lean when percentage of body fat is considered, Martin pointed out. Body fat for athletes ranges from 4 to 12 percent for men and 10 to 20 percent for women.

Athletes engaged in vigorous training may need 3,000 to 6,000

calories or more per day. The athlete's diet should be high in complex carbohydrates such as whole grain breads, cereals, pasta, grains, starchy vegetables and dried beans and peas according to Martin.

"Carbohydrate is the body's choice of fuel for physical activities such as football and other stop-and-start sports," she advised.

During strict training or just before competition, complex carbohydrates should supply 60 to 65 percent of the calories of the daily diet. The meal eaten just before competition should be on the lighter side and filled with complex carbohydrates. "Athletes should select foods they normally consume. Just before an event is no

time to try new foods. Diets that are rich in meat and simple sweets are not recommended just before the game," Martin said.

Fluid intake should increase during and right after sport activities. "Thirst is not a reliable indicator of fluid need," the specialist said. An athlete should follow a plan for periodic fluid replacement. Athletes need to drink plenty of water or diluted juices to replenish sweat losses. "Fluid replacement is crucial for optimal athletic performance. Some individuals may sweat as much as four to eight-pounds per hour during prolonged exertion. Lack of fluids may lead to cramps, fatigue, poor performance, nausea and heat exhaustion. A child's body is less efficient

than an adult's body at regulating body temperature, so children are at an increased risk for heat exhaustion, Martin cautioned.

"After the game, take time to relax and enjoy a meal high in complex carbohydrates to start rebuilding your spent energy stores. Be moderate on fat consumption," the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources specialist said. "Keeping physically fit requires discipline, commitment of time and effort and elimination of behaviors that conflict with physical fitness readiness."

Additional information is available from University of Nebraska home economists in local Cooperative Extension offices or from a registered dietician.

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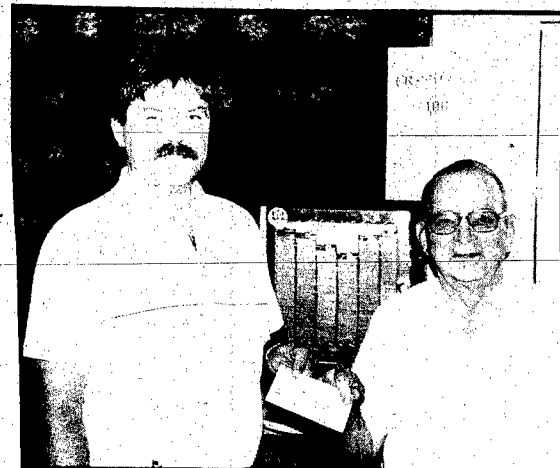
Waldbaum egg facility construction underway

AREA - Construction of the Milton G. Waldbaum Company's new egg processing facility in Bloomfield is well underway. Construction began in early July with Schmidt Construction moving earth.

The entire complex is projected for completion on or before July, 1992. The complex will include 16 houses, each holding approximately 120,000 laying hens, for a total of 1.9 million birds. A feedmill with the capacity to produce 400 tons per day and eventually two grading machines producing 600

cases of eggs per hour will also be on site. According to Don Paulsen, vice president of construction, the complex will eventually employ 65-70 fulltime employees. There will also be a need for several part-time employees, particularly on weekends. "We'll start taking applications in late fall, and our ads will list jobs with a short description of duties," said Paulsen. Most employees will come from a 20-25 mile radius of Bloomfield. An open house will, be held at a later date where the

public will be invited. Dave Morton has been selected as the Bloomfield Farm Manager. Morton has been employed with Waldbaum's since 1985 and will have responsibility for the management of the entire complex. Previously, Morton was in charge of Waldbaum's Westbrook, Minn. fresh shell egg grading and shipping operations. He and his wife, Pat, have already relocated to Bloomfield and will be living on site of the complex. "I'm really looking forward to living and working in Bloomfield," said Morton. "The people here have been very supportive, and I'm excited about our growth opportunities." Waldbaum's will be purchasing corn from area farmers after completion of the milling operation. The complex will produce over 4,000 case of packaged eggs daily which will be shipped directly to supermarkets or institutions across the country. AREA - The Nebraska Department of Social Services has clarified information previously provided regarding the federal child care tax credit. The child care tax credit can be claimed whether or not a day care provider is licensed through the Nebraska Department of Social Services.

According to Chris Hanus, a Social Services administration, Nebraska law for early childhood programs requires anyone providing care to four or more children from different families to be licensed through the Nebraska Department of Social Services. "The minimum standards for family day care identify possible risks to children in care. Knowing a provider has a license tells a parent basic health and safety standards have been met," said Hanus.

ORDINANCE NO. 90-19
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND PROVISIONS RELATING TO GARBAGE REMOVAL AND FEES; TO CHANGE REMOVAL PROVISIONS; TO AUTHORIZE THE SETTING OF FEES; BY RESOLUTION AND TO PROHIBIT THE DEPOSIT OF CERTAIN SOLID WASTE AT THE TRANSFER STATION.
BE IT ORDAINED BY the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section 4-404 of the Wayne Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

GARBAGE, TRASH, AND WASTE. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep, on, or about any dwelling, building, or premise, or any other place in the Municipality, decayed vegetable or animal substance, garbage, or refuse matter of any kind that may be injurious to the public health or offensive to the residents of the Municipality unless the same is kept in receptacles not exceeding a thirty-five (35) gallon capacity and as nearly airtight as may be practical. It shall be unlawful to throw or sweep into the streets, alleys, parks, or other public grounds any dirt, paper, nails, pieces of glass, refuse, waste, or rubbish of any kind. No person may permit garbage, rubbish, waste, or refuse to collect and all persons shall remove the same from their property within twenty-four (24) hours after being notified to do so by the Municipal Police Clerk who shall represent the Board of Health. Any person having garbage, rubbish, waste, or refuse that is subject to decay or fermentation within a short period of time shall be required to place the same in a standard garbage can with a tight cover, or a durable plastic container that is securely tied at its opening. All persons shall have the contents of their garbage cans removed at least once per week. Provided, garbage shall be removed more often at such times as the governing body or the Board of Health shall determine. (Ref. 19-2106 RS Neb.)

Section 2. That Sections 4-405 of the Wayne Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

GARBAGE CONTAINERS. Every householder or occupant of any dwelling, house or other building used for the housing of persons, and the owner, keeper or manager of every hotel, restaurant, store, wholesale business and retail business, or other place where garbage accumulates in the City, shall provide one or more suitable plastic or metal garbage containers which shall have a close fitting lid and which shall be placed on the premise owned or occupied by said person or persons at a place that can be easily reached by the garbage collector. Provided, that where possible, the garbage container shall be delivered to the curb nearest the front of the premises, but never upon the street or sidewalk, and in any event, all such containers shall be delivered promptly to the collector when called for. The same shall not be used for the reception of garbage by more than one family, household, hotel, restaurant, store, wholesale or retail business. All garbage created by or upon the premise occupied by said persons shall be deposited in garbage cans which shall be kept tightly covered at all times. Garbage shall be removed under such rules and regulations as provided in this Code.

Section 3. That Section 4-408 of the Wayne Municipal Code shall be amended to read as follows:

(Publ. Aug. 6)

SOLID WASTE TRANSFER, DISPOSAL HOURS OF OPERATION. All solid waste generated within the corporate limits of the City shall be deposited at the solid waste transfer station, or as otherwise designated by the governing body, provided that lawn, yard and garden waste, including, but not limited to, grass, leaves, weeds, plants, and tree branches, shall be prohibited from delivery at the solid waste transfer station.

The hours of operation of the solid waste transfer station shall be determined by the City Administrator and a current schedule of the same shall be posted conspicuously at the transfer station.

In the event that any solid waste is deposited at the solid waste transfer station at times other than those designated by the City Administrator, including Sundays and City holidays, the fees charged for receiving such solid waste shall be one and one-half (1 1/2) times the fees prescribed in Section 4-409, except that no additional fees shall be charged Class A collectors for solid waste delivered to the solid waste transfer station during normal City business hours. (Amended by Ord. Nos. 985, 10/6/80; 82-18, 9/28/82)

Section 4. That Section 4-409 of the Wayne Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

WASTE DISPOSAL FEES. Fees to be charged for the receiving of solid waste at the solid waste transfer station shall be established by a resolution of the governing body.

Section 5. Original Sections 4-404, 4-405, 4-408, 4-409, and any other sections in conflict with this ordinance, are repealed.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force on September 1, 1990, from and after its passage, approval, and publication or posting, as required by law.
