

Budget talks focus on benefits of LB 1059

The message at Tuesday's Wayne Community School board meeting didn't focus on the \$469,330 increase in the budget, but rather the effects of LB 1059.

In 1989, local taxes through levies and tuition composed 70.89 percent of the budget with \$2.2 million. After the passage of LB 1059 by the Nebraska legislature last spring, those numbers have changed to \$1.9 million needed through local taxes and tuition, which composes 51.70 percent of the budget.

In addition, state aid in 1989 was \$467,558 for 14.84 percent of the budget and in 1990 those figures changed to \$1.2 million and 32.92 percent of the budget:

DESPITE STRUGGLING to have e budget prepared by Tuesday's

board meeting, Dra Francis Haun Wayne school superintendent, said the budget numbers he has in place now are based upon current available data and is "pure speculation" if LB 1059 is repealed by Nebraska voters in the November general election.

Additionally, the budget does not include tax appropriations since they have not yet been set by the state. He added that the board would also have to come back and set salaries when negotiations are completed. ations are completed.

"In the 35 years of superintending, this is the hardest budget I've ever worked out," Haun told the board. "I think the state is taking out its frustrations on the districts by making the budget process so darn hard."

IN DR. HAUN'S ANNUAL State of the District report, the Wayne

erate on a sound fiscal basis. In his report, Haun writes: "The board of education is constantly attempting to improve efficiency as well as effectiveness of the educational program provided to students of the Wayne school district."

In his report, Haun also solicited public input to the schools about potential improvements which can be made so students of the district may benefit.

According to data compiled in the State of the District report, the total expenditures for the 1990-91 school year are expected to be at \$3.6 million. Regular instruction costs compose 56.4 percent of the budget with \$2.04 million being spent. The next highest compospent. The next highest compo-nent of the budget is the bus support and maintenance, which creates 10.4 percent of the budget.

IN ADDITION TO unanimously approving the budget with a 5-0



WAYNE - Students will find a small increase in school lunches when school begins this fall.

Weekly meal tickets at the high school and middle school will increase from \$5.75 during the 1989-90 school year to \$6.25 a week in the 1990-91 school year. Prices at the elementary school will rise from \$5.25 a week to \$5.75 a week

With crochet hook in hand

Hoskins woman content to be at home

"You've got to do something. You've got to make use of your time somehow."

step inside the living room in the home that Mrs. Rose Puls owns on the east edge of Hoskins and its evident that the 76-year-old isn't content to count the days from her rocking chair — unless she has a crochet hook in her hand.

Mrs. Puls, a widow since 1984 following the death of her husband Reuben, loves to make afghans, so much so that she has taken on the project of making afghans for all of her four sons, their children and their children's children.

Total them all up - four sons, 14 grandchildren and seven great grandchildren — and Mrs. Puls has t about furnishing her family with

set about furnishing her family with 25 afghans.
"And," she smiles, "there's three more great grandchildren on the way."

ALTHOUGH many family members have already received their afghans, Mrs. Puls displays 12 more which she plans to present to others in the family when they

come to attend the wedding of grandson Russel Puls to Tracy Otradovsky on Aug. 11 in Norfolk.

"Giving them away, that's what "means the most to me," smiles Rose. "I wouldn't want to make them to sell. Then I would be pressured."

Although Rose's quilts have gone to family members in Ne-braska, Georgia, New Jersey and Illinois, one afghan has made its

Illinois, one afghan has made its way as far as India.

"An aunt of our former minister's wife, Eva David, came to visit last winter from India. Her luggage was lost and she asked me if I has something warm."

Mrs. Puls is proud of the fact that when the Indian visitor returned to her country she took back with her a "warm" afghan made in Hoskins. Nebr.

ROSE BEGAN crocheting afghans in 1964 and still owns her first creation, a ripple patterned afghan which drapes the back of a chair in her living room.

bought the yarn and started figur-ing out how to do it," smiles Rose,

adding that the alghan was com-pleted with the help of friends. "And, of course," laughs Rose, "I picked a hard one to do first — the ripple pattern. But once I got

the hang of it, it was easy."

Rose says most of the afghans have been made since 1980 when she and her husband retired from farming one and a half miles east of Hoskins and built their home in town.

Since then, she estimates that she has completed approximately 30 afghans and has given away 14 of them, not counting the 12 she plans to present to other members of the family in August.

And Rose knows what afghan went to which family member. "When you spend so much time at something you remember it."

IN ADDITION to all the afghans, Rose has crocheted stool covers, lap robes, doilies, shawls, Christmas tree skirts and pillow

tops.
"Pillow tops — that's what I was really into at first," chuckles Rose. "Every home I went to in my family got pillows."

Rose says she "copies" a lot and gets many of her ideas and color combination suggestions from various needle catalogues. Her fa-vorite pattern is a straight double

She estimates that she works on her afghans about an hour every day — sometimes more during

the cold winter months or on rainy

days.
"Instead of taking a nap I cro-chet. That's how I relax."

ROSE HAS also taught several family members to crochet, including a grandson when he was about four years old and confined to an oxygen tent because of asthma.

"I better not give you his name," laughs Rose. "That grand-son, who embarrasses easily, is 14 years old now and about six feet tall." Before her interest in afghans,

Before her interest in afghans, Rose did ceramics. She remains an avid bird watcher and attended a bird class for two years. "At one time I had over 100 birds in my house," smiles Rose.
"Oh dear no," clarifies Rose.
"They weren't live birds. They were ceramic birds or towels and pillow cases decorated with birds."
Rose says she'll never quit making afghans, even after she's presented one to every last member

"Oh no, no, no, I'll never quit.
I've got to keep doing something.

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



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One game away from Class C's best

since Wakefield was the host of the state tournament, Arlington, who finished runner-up in the area, qualified for state as well.





his staff members to Nebraska to see what rural life is like.

The main thing that's surprised ne hain thing that's surprised me is how much everything costs," she said. "In the city you don't tend to think about how much it teosts to produce the food you eatbut it's really an expensive process when you take into account the cost of the machinery and the expenses it takes to produce the penses it takes to produce the food.

"The amount of farmland has also been surprising. I'm used to patches here and there but out here there's so much that's cultivated, It's really pretty," she

BARNETT SAID THE experience will allow her to better inform Rep. Barnard about the issues farmers face. She said although the farm bill has been decided, the trip to Nebraska was not for lobbying purposes but rather to educate assistants about the issues

farmers face.

Commonly hearing animal rights issues in Georgia and problems with the environment allegedly caused by chemical appli-cations for agriculture, Barnett said it's nice to hear comments from the other side of the fence.

"Our constituents at the University of Georgia are from the other side — the animal rights activists," she said. "All I hear from them is how unhealthy the animals how they're mistreated. But after visiting an egg processing facility near Wayne, I didn't see the chamber of horrors those people describe."

BARNETT, WHO earned her bachelor's degree from Southern Georgia University and her master's from the University of South Carolina, said although her degrees were in journalism, she takes a special interest in agriculture, education, environment and judiciary issues.

She said her stay with Merle and Donna Ring, on their farm east of Wayne, served three of those issues: agriculture, education and the environment.

"Just as the animal rights people are voicing their side, we have a lot of constituents who are upset with groundwater contamination," she said. "After visiting, I realize that farmers aren't putting excessive amounts of chemicals on the ground but I really don't want to say much further than that for fear I might upset some of our constituents.

Barnett's visit was one of about 10 sponsored by the Nebraska Farm Bureau. It was done to inform urban congressional members about the way agriculture works as well as how farmers lives are led.

Farmers need to keep an accurate ACR records file

AREA - One of the requirements to qualify for 1990 farm program benefits is acreage conservation reserve (ACR) maintenance. ACR is cropland removed from production to meet acreage reduction re-

Melvin Wilson, Chairman of the Wayne County Agricultural Stabi-lization and Conservation Service, said program participants must follow their contract regarding maintenance of ACR land to be eligible for full program benefits.

"Once producers have estab-Once producers have estab-lished adequate conservation pro-tection on these acres to prevent wind and water erosion, mainte-nance procedures must begin," Wilson said.

Producers cannot neglect ACR land and allow it to grow into weeds or to become a harboring place for insects and rodents, he added.

Approximately 8,612 acres of Wayne County cropland were diverted from crop production under the 1990 farm programs. "We are checking to see that these acres are properly maintained," Wilson said

He pointed out that weed control is a very important program requirement and farmers who fail to do so will be out of compliance

to do so will be out of compliance and could lose program benefits.

The acreage reduction program contract also prohibits harvesting ACR land. Grazing is not authorized between April 1 and Aug. 31.

"It would be unfortunate at this point for a producer to be found out of compliance because of failing to maintain ACR land." The TASCS official said most farmers want to do what is best for their land, and have made conservation practices an integral part of their practices an integral part of their farming operations.

Report: Home important to diet AREA - One of the most important lessons a child learns at home is healthy eating habits, -Dr. Dariene Martin, University of Nebraska extension nutritionist at the Northeast Research and Extension

Nutrition important

The best way for parents to foster a child's healthy attitude toward eating is to start when they are infants, Martin said.

"Infants have individual patterns of hunger, so flexible meal schedules are best," she said.

Food once refused may be reintroduced successfully at another time. Food is for nourishment and enjoyment and should not be used as a pacifier or reward. Nor should food be withheld as a punishment. "When parents teach infants and children to expect food as a com-fort for unhappiness, it can create an inability to separate physical hunger from emotional needs. This can result in overeating and over-weight in later years," Martin said.

Low-fat diets can be particularly harmful for infants. "Advice given for adults is not necessarily appro-priate for babies," the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources specialist said. Well-meaning but specialist said. Well-inleading out misinformed parents may severely restrict the fat and calories in their infants' diet and retard growth, she added. Rapid growth demands an adequate supply of nutrients.

Summer is an excellent time to use fresh vegetables, to keep fresh fruits and raw vegetable pieces on hand for children and teenagers. "When possible, allow children to help with the selection and preparation of foods," the specialist rec-

ration of foods," the specialist recommended.

"Usually, a child will taste a food more readily if involved in the preparation. If children won't eat vegetables, conceal them in casseroles or salads," Martin said.

Teenagers can provide real assistance in shopping and meal

leenagers can provide real assistance in shopping and meal preparation with proper guidance. Teenagers can have a good learning experience reading labels and planning meals using the basic four

food groups.

Martin advised not forcing children to eat everything on their plates. Research shows that children who are allowed to eat as dren who are allowed to eat as much or as little as they want are less likely to become overweight or develop eating problems. Children may need to snack between meals. In proportion to their weight, growing children need a larger number of calories than adults because they are growing at a because they are growing at a rapid rate. Parents should en-courage healthy snack foods and not high-fat of "junk" foods. "But don't go everboard as a forbidden food may become very appealing," Martin said.

In no other area are family in-fluences stronger than in food preferences, Martin noted. Pleas-ant associations with food are fos-

tered if meals can be eaten in a positive environment. "Talk to your positive environment. 'Talk to your children as you eat. Discuss the importance of good nutrition and how food can contribute to a healthy body. Providing good nutrition can be fun and challenging for a family. And each family member can play an important role in making meal time meaningful,"

Old age alone isn't to blame for loss of mental ability; the cul-prits are health disorders. That is the conclusion of Dr. Lissy Jarvik, who studied the aging of 134 pairs of twins over a perof 134 pairs of twins over a period of four decades. Dr. Jarvik is a psychiatry professor and chief of neuropsychogeriatrics at the University of California, Los Angeles. She began studying th twins in 1946, when they were in their 50s and 60s. They were given intelligence tests at intervals of about this vesses. intervals of about five years until 1986, when the last of the twins died. Among her findings: As the twins' average age in-creased from 64 to 73, their intelligence test scores improved except for those tests that foon speed.

leave policy. He works as an editor in Engineering Extension, at Kansas State University in Manhattan. As he had in Panama, Dorcey

found Costa Rica to be full of sur-prises. He discovered he could drink the water anywhere in Costa

Rica. "And there are no mosquitoes or flies there. All the hotels and

restaurants are open-air, in both countries, but I was never bothered by mosquitoes. And I can count on one hand the number of flies I

remember seeing. It blew away all my ideas about life in the tropics. While Panama's weather had lived up to its tropical location, the

climate in Costa Rica was another

pleasant surprise, Dorcey said.
"The cities along either coast

have a tropical climate with plenty

Dorcey's career takes him many miles joys an average daytime tempera-

ture of 75 degrees year around.

"Costa Rica is a beautiful country," Dorcey said. "it has pictry," Dorcey said. "it has picturesque mountains, high valleys and coastal plains and everything is a vibrant shade of green. A variety of shades of green, actually." Because of the unusual location

of their annual training this year, band members were not tasked with their normal combat role in the field providing security to the division's tactical operations center in a combat situation. "They jump at the chance to practice their English with you. They'll tell you right out that it's important for them to be conversant in English in today's economic and political environment. And they're serious when they say it."

Dorcey said he enjoys studying foreign languages himself and found that the effort he made to learn some Spanish before going to Panama paid off. "The people of Central America always appreciated any effort to speak Spanish and were really tolerant of the most humble attempts at their language." wed any effort to speak Spanish de were really tolerant of the ost humble attempts at their nguage."

Costa Rica that music is an international language that spontaneously dissolved linguistic and cultural bar-

riers.
"I've always loved music, but as someone who has been involved and interested in communication through_languages, writing and photography since high school. If found it amazing how easily these musicians could communicate their love of their own culture to the Costa Ricans and how freely the Costa Ricans could show their Costa Ricans could show their ap-preciation for the music and the mericans love of their culture

*And after the concerts the Costa Ricans would come right up and mingle with the band and, using broken English and broken Spanish, talk about the instruments, the music, Kansas and the United States. And the Costa Ricans would always ask for the musicians' autographs. That was a first for the guys in the band, to be treated like celebrities. The Costa Ricans had them in the palm of their hands."

And where will his travel agency in-uniform send Dorcey next?

"It depends on what happens in Europe yet this fall, but the 105th is scheduled to go back to Germany as part of REFORGER (Return of Forces to Germany) in 1990. If the unit goes, I plan to be there.

"But I'm hooked on Central America," he said. "And I haven't seen anything of South America yet. The way the international situ-ation is shaping up, there might be more opportunities to get back down there."






Experts suggest that back-to-chool shopping and allowances school shopping and allowances are two of the best means of

are two of the best means of teaching your school-age kids how to handle money.

Begin shopping with a list of needed items. Have your child help make up the list with you. Then set priorities by ranking the items in groups by importance, from the most to the least necessary. Should you wait until later to get some items--say, until they are requested from school?

Explain that you must plan carefully-or else you might run out of money before you have bought all that you need. Go into details about all the alternatives. Is it wise to purchase several dozen pencils, folders, and rulers because they are folders, and rulers because they are cheap, or to buy fewer things in variety, some of which are more expensive--like a ring binder, filler paper, scissors, and a pen? Will buying one thing keep you from buying something else?

When shopping you might let your child handle money long enough to give it to the sales clerk. This builds a little self-confidence.

This builds a little self-confidence.

After you get home, ask you child to evaluate the purchases. For instance, you mights say, "Would you buy that large box of crayons again? Do those scissors work as

again: Do those scissors work as well as you thought they would?" Allowances work much the same way, showing kids how to plan their spending with care, and to spend within limits. Yet younger children-

should not be rushed: "Until she's five or six, a child is unable to understand concepts relating to understand concepts relating to money," says Eugene Kornhaber, M.D., a child psychologist. Kornhaber says the younger kids can be paid smaller sums-like a dime-- for special tasks, such as cleaning their room or watering plants. Unless the concept is well understood however experts say

understood, however, experts say it's best to start providing an allowance no earlier than age 6 to 8. How much should you give them? It depends upon the family's needs and the child's. Openly discuss the size of the allowance. discuss the size of the allowance, and clearly explain that there are limitations within all families. Talk about how the allowance money should be used.

Should you ever give an advance on an allowance? Experts say no. Your firm refusal shows that the limitations are real, and that the child must live within her means. Furthermore, children allowances should not be rewarded extra for doing routine, household chores, like cleaning their room.

chores, like cleaning their room. This, after all, is just a part of family membership, and the family is more important than money.

Along those same lines, it is not wise in the long-run to withhold an allowance for specific misdeeds or failures. Economists say this teaches that money is a weapon-a lesson that too many people carry. lesson that too many people carry into marriages, with unhappy re-




