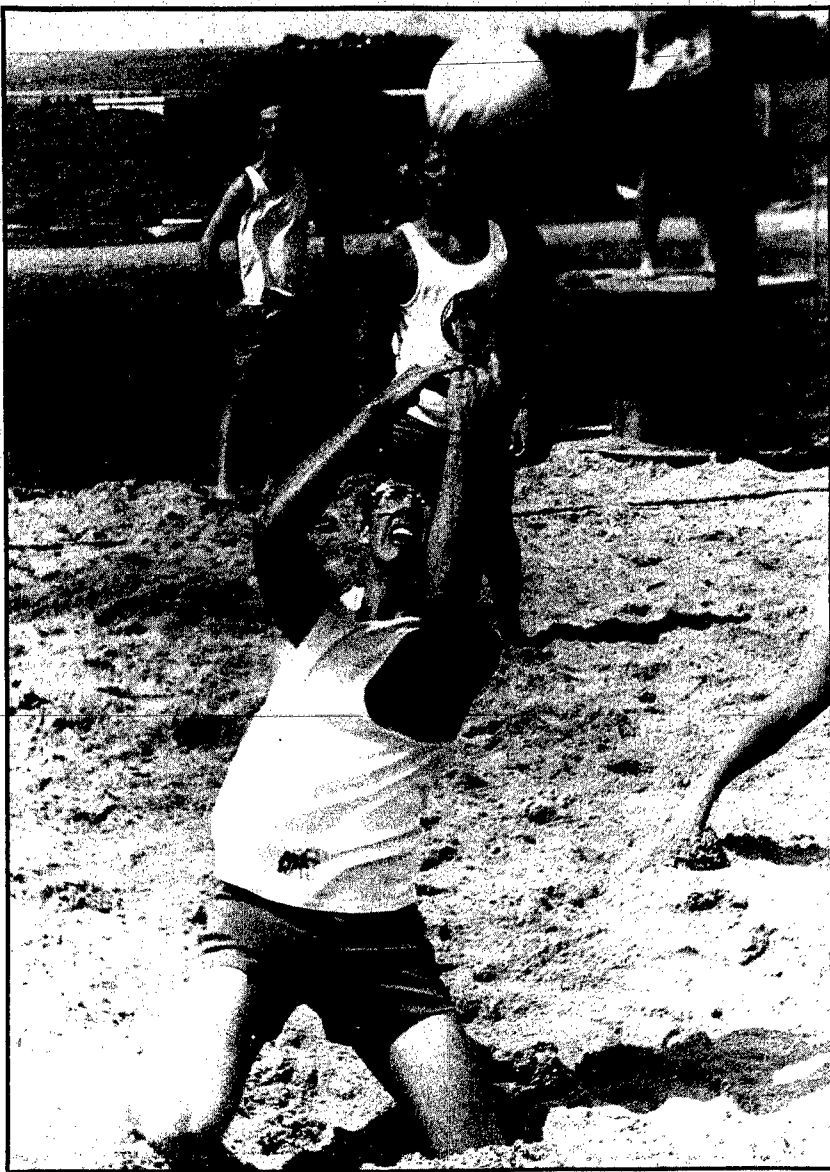

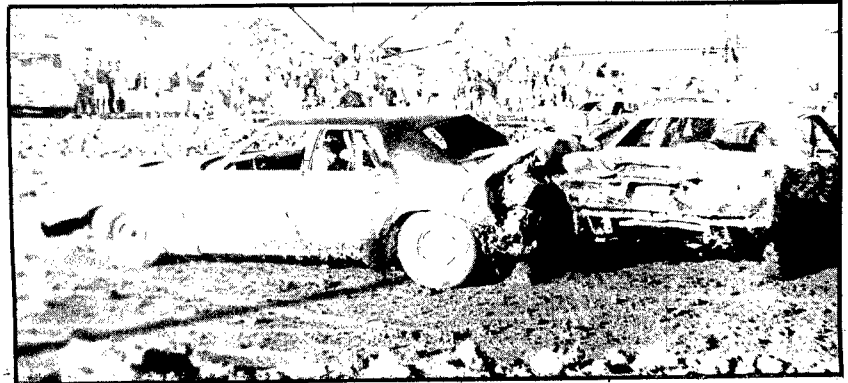
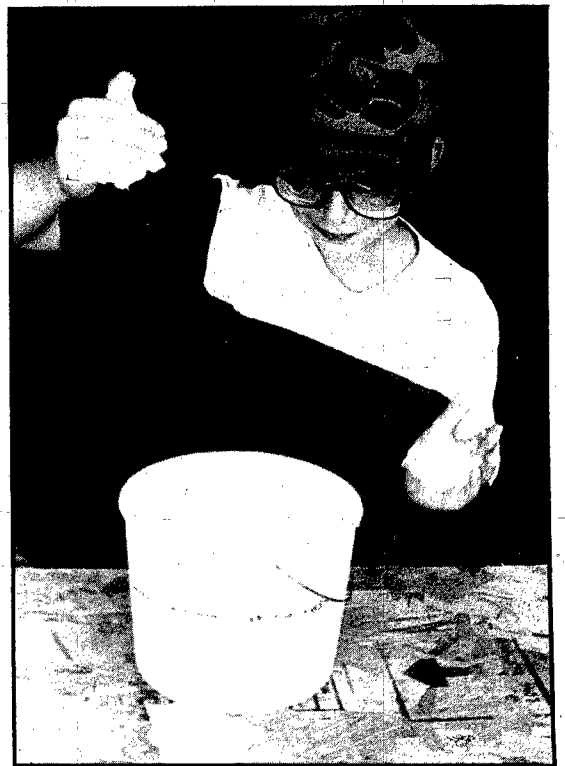

## Budget talks focus on benefits of LB 1059

The message at Tuesday's Wayne Community School board meeting didn't focus on the \$469,330 increase in the budget, but rather the effects of LB 1059.

In 1989, local taxes through levies and tuition composed 70.89 percent of the budget with \$2.2 million. After the passage of LB 1059 by the Nebraska legislature last spring, those numbers have changed to \$1.9 million needed through local taxes and tuition, which composes 51.70 percent of the budget.

In addition, state aid in 1989 was \$467,558 for 14.84 percent of the budget and in 1990 those figures changed to \$1.2 million and 32.92 percent of the budget.

DESPITE STRUGGLING to have the budget prepared by Tuesday's

board meeting, Dr. Francis Haun, Wayne school superintendent, said the budget numbers he has in place now are based upon current available data and is "pure speculation" if LB 1059 is repealed by Nebraska voters in the November general election.

Additionally, the budget does not include tax appropriations since they have not yet been set by the state. He added that the board would also have to come back and set salaries when negotiations are completed.

"In the 35 years of superintending, this is the hardest budget I've ever worked out," Haun told the board. "I think the state is taking out its frustrations on the districts by making the budget process so darn hard."

IN DR. HAUN'S ANNUAL State of the District report, the Wayne District 17 schools continue to op-

erate on a sound fiscal basis. In his report, Haun writes: "The board of education is constantly attempting to improve efficiency as well as effectiveness of the educational program provided to students of the Wayne school district."

In his report, Haun also solicited public input to the schools about potential improvements which can be made so students of the district may benefit.

According to data compiled in the State of the District report, the total expenditures for the 1990-91 school year are expected to be at \$3.6 million. Regular instruction costs compose 56.4 percent of the budget with \$2.04 million being spent. The next highest component of the budget is the bus support and maintenance, which creates 10.4 percent of the budget.

IN ADDITION TO unanimously approving the budget with a 5-0

vote, the board of education agreed to make copies of the State of the District report available to the public. Haun said currently, copies are available at the hospital, local banks, doctors' offices and other heavily traveled locations. He said copies are also available at Wayne High School for those who wish a copy.

IN OTHER MATTERS the Wayne board of education:

- Approved option students in and out. Students leaving Wayne for other districts include Jeffrey and Katherine Barg, children of Gene Barg, who will attend the Westside 95R school; Darin Lubberstedt, son of Nadine Lubberstedt, who will attend the Laurel-Concord schools in the fall and John Brogie,

son of Ed Brogie, who will attend the Laurel-Concord schools in the fall. Students entering the Wayne District 17 schools include: Danielle Atkins, daughter of James Atkins; Dustin Jensen, son of Dennis Jensen; Laura Jones, daughter of Perry Jones; Carol Longe, daughter of Richard Longe; and Donald Siefken, son of Donald Siefken.

- Learned that third grade students will hold classes at the Wayne Middle School until the new addition to the West Elementary School is complete. Haun said the new addition was expected to be finished by Sept. 15 but unforeseen delays in construction have slowed progress until Oct. 15.

- Approved a 5 percent across the board increase for classified personnel.

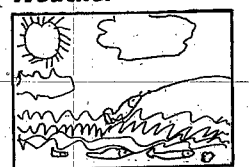

## Board OK's rise in lunch fares

WAYNE - Students will find a small increase in school lunches when school begins this fall.

Weekly meal tickets at the high school and middle school will increase from \$5.75 during the 1989-90 school year to \$6.25 a week in the 1990-91 school year. Prices at the elementary school will rise from \$5.25 a week to \$5.75 a week.

Superintendent Dr. Francis Haun said it has been three years since the last rate increase in school meals and the change for the

1990-91 school year was needed. In the hope of saving the school some money, the board of education also improved switching milk carriers to Gillette from Meadow Gold.

Daily meal tickets at both the elementary school and the high school and middle school will increase by 10 cents. The high school and middle school's rate of \$1.20 in 1989-90 a week will increase to \$1.30. Elementary school prices will rise to \$1.20 a

ticket from the 1989-90 figure of \$1.10.

Milk prices will also increase from 15 cents per carton to 20 cents per carton and milk, with a 10-punch ticket, will jump from \$1.50 to \$2.

Adult weekly tickets are also registering an increase from \$7.25 per week to \$7.50 a week.

The only meal ticket area that did not increase was the reduced tickets. Per meal, the ticket prices will remain at 40 cents.

## Wayne to be site of GREAT town meeting

WAYNE - Gov. Kay Orr announced last week that she will be holding the Wayne GREAT town meeting Tuesday, Aug. 14 from 7-9 p.m. in the Wayne High School commons.

The town meeting culminates five months of strategic planning for community development in Wayne by the START task force.

Gov. Orr and her resource team, called the governor's Rural Economic Action Team, will spend the evening in Wayne, first listening as steering committee members present their action plan for community improvement in five areas, and then they will respond to suggestions of how state resources

might be employed to assist in implementing the program.

TASK FORCES formed from the three START planning sessions in March, April and May, headed by Mary Temme, Sam Schroeder, Randy Pedersen, Wayne Wessel and Faunell Bennett, have been addressing housing, business revitalization, day care, community perceptions and public facility issues in Wayne.

Much of the work of these committees recently received local media attention, as the task forces generated community dialogue and recruited community involvement.

At the Tuesday, Aug. 14

meeting, the various task force chairmen will present specific action plans for addressing the identified issues and report on progress made by the committees.

LOCAL LEADER of the Wayne START program, Julie Mash, said she expects a large crowd for the Great Wayne town meeting.

"Our START project has been one of the most successful in the state in getting people working together," she said. "It has created a broad base of support for our projects but we want even more people to get involved. I hope we fill the house and show the governor just how serious we are about developing our community."

## With crochet hook in hand Hoskins woman content to be at home

"You've got to do something. You've got to make use of your time somehow."

Step inside the living room in the home that Mrs. Rose Puls owns on the east edge of Hoskins and its evident that the 76-year-old isn't content to count the days from her rocking chair — unless she has a crochet hook in her hand.

Mrs. Puls, a widow since 1984 following the death of her husband Reuben, loves to make afghans, so much so that she has taken on the project of making afghans for all of her four sons, their children and their children's children.

Total them all up — four sons, 14 grandchildren and seven great grandchildren — and Mrs. Puls has set about furnishing her family with 25 afghans.

"And," she smiles, "there's three more great grandchildren on the way."

ALTHOUGH many family members have already received their afghans, Mrs. Puls displays 12 more which she plans to present to others in the family when they

come to attend the wedding of grandson Russel Puls to Tracy Otradosky on Aug. 11 in Norfolk.

"Giving them away, that's what means the most to me," smiles Rose. "I wouldn't want to make them to sell. Then I would be pressured."

Although Rose's quilts have gone to family members in Nebraska, Georgia, New Jersey and Illinois, one afghan has made its way as far as India.

"An aunt of our former minister's wife, Eva David, came to visit last winter from India. Her luggage was lost and she asked me if I had something warm."

Mrs. Puls is proud of the fact that when the Indian visitor returned to her country she took back with her a "warm" afghan made in Hoskins, Nebr.

ROSE BEGAN crocheting afghans in 1964 and still owns her first creation, a ripple patterned afghan which drapes the back of a chair in her living room.

"I always wanted an afghan so I bought the yarn and started figuring out how to do it," smiles Rose, adding that the afghan was completed with the help of friends.

"And, of course," laughs Rose, "I picked a hard one to do first — the ripple pattern. But once I got

the hang of it, it was easy."

Rose says most of the afghans have been made since 1980 when she and her husband retired from farming one and a half miles east of Hoskins and built their home in town.

Since then, she estimates that she has completed approximately 30 afghans and has given away 14 of them, not counting the 12 she plans to present to other members of the family in August.

And Rose knows what afghan went to which family member. "When you spend so much time at something you remember it."

IN ADDITION to all the afghans, Rose has crocheted stool covers, lap robes, doilies, shawls, Christmas tree skirts and pillow tops.

"Pillow tops — that's what I was really into at first," chuckles Rose. "Every home I went to in my family got pillow tops."

Rose says she "copies" a lot and gets many of her ideas and color combination suggestions from various needle catalogues. Her favorite pattern is a straight double crochet.

She estimates that she works on her afghans about an hour every day — sometimes more during

the cold winter months or on rainy days.

"Instead of taking a nap I crochet. That's how I relax."

ROSE HAS also taught several family members to crochet, including a grandson when he was about four years old and confined to an oxygen tent because of asthma.

"I better not give you his name," laughs Rose. "That grandson, who embarrasses easily, is 14 years old now and about six feet tall."

Before her interest in afghans, Rose did ceramics. She remains an avid bird watcher and attended a bird class for two years. "At one time I had over 100 birds in my house," smiles Rose.

"Oh dear no," clarifies Rose. "They weren't live birds. They were ceramic birds or towels and pillow cases decorated with birds."

Rose says she'll never quit making afghans, even after she's presented one to every last member of the family.

"Oh no, no, no, I'll never quit. I've got to keep doing something. Besides, I've still got yarn so I'm gonna use it up."

"When the day is over I feel like I've gotten something done."

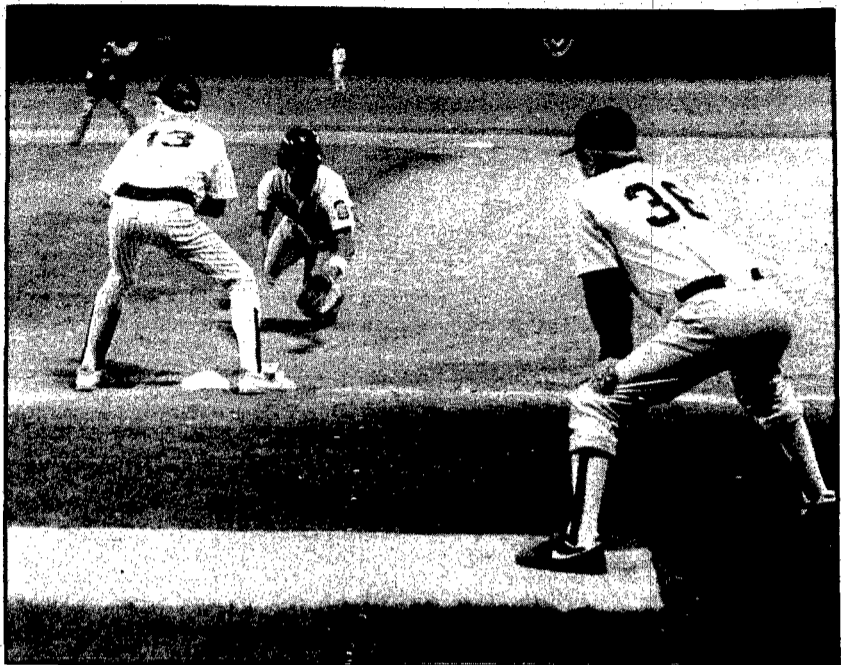

his staff members to Nebraska to see what rural life is like.

"The main thing that's surprised me is how much everything costs," she said. "In the city you don't tend to think about how much it costs to produce the food you eat but it's really an expensive process when you take into account the cost of the machinery and the expenses it takes to produce the food."

"The amount of farmland has also been surprising. I'm used to patches here and there but out here there's so much that's cultivated. It's really pretty," she added.

**BARNETT SAID** THE experience will allow her to better inform Rep. Barnard about the issues farmers face. She said although the farm bill has been decided, the trip to Nebraska was not for

lobbying purposes but rather to educate assistants about the issues farmers face.

Commonly hearing animal rights issues in Georgia and problems with the environment allegedly caused by chemical applications for agriculture, Barnett said it's nice to hear comments from the other side of the fence.

"Our constituents at the University of Georgia are from the other side — the animal rights activists," she said. "All I hear from them is how unhealthy the animals how they're mistreated. But after visiting an egg processing facility near Wayne, I didn't see the chamber of horrors those people describe."

**BARNETT, WHO** earned her bachelor's degree from Southern Georgia University and her master's from the University of South Carolina, said although her degrees

were in journalism, she takes a special interest in agriculture, education, environment and judiciary issues.

She said her stay with Merle and Donna Ring, on their farm east of Wayne, served three of those issues: agriculture, education and the environment.

"Just as the animal rights people are voicing their side, we have a lot of constituents who are upset with groundwater contamination," she said. "After visiting, I realize that farmers aren't putting excessive amounts of chemicals on the ground but I really don't want to say much further than that for fear I might upset some of our constituents."

Barnett's visit was one of about 10 sponsored by the Nebraska Farm Bureau. It was done to inform urban congressional members about the way agriculture works as well as how farmers lives are led.

## Changes at Wakefield center Director resigns from post

**WAKEFIELD** - As of Friday, Aug. 3 the old is out and the new is in: That was the word from Jean Gardner, president of the Wakefield Health Care Center board, in a telephone interview Tuesday.

She said as of last Friday, administrator Bonnie McGinnis had resigned and the board had hired managing firm Excel Health Services, Inc. of Fremont, which had appointed Betty Harmon as interim administrator until a permanent

replacement for McGinnis could be hired.

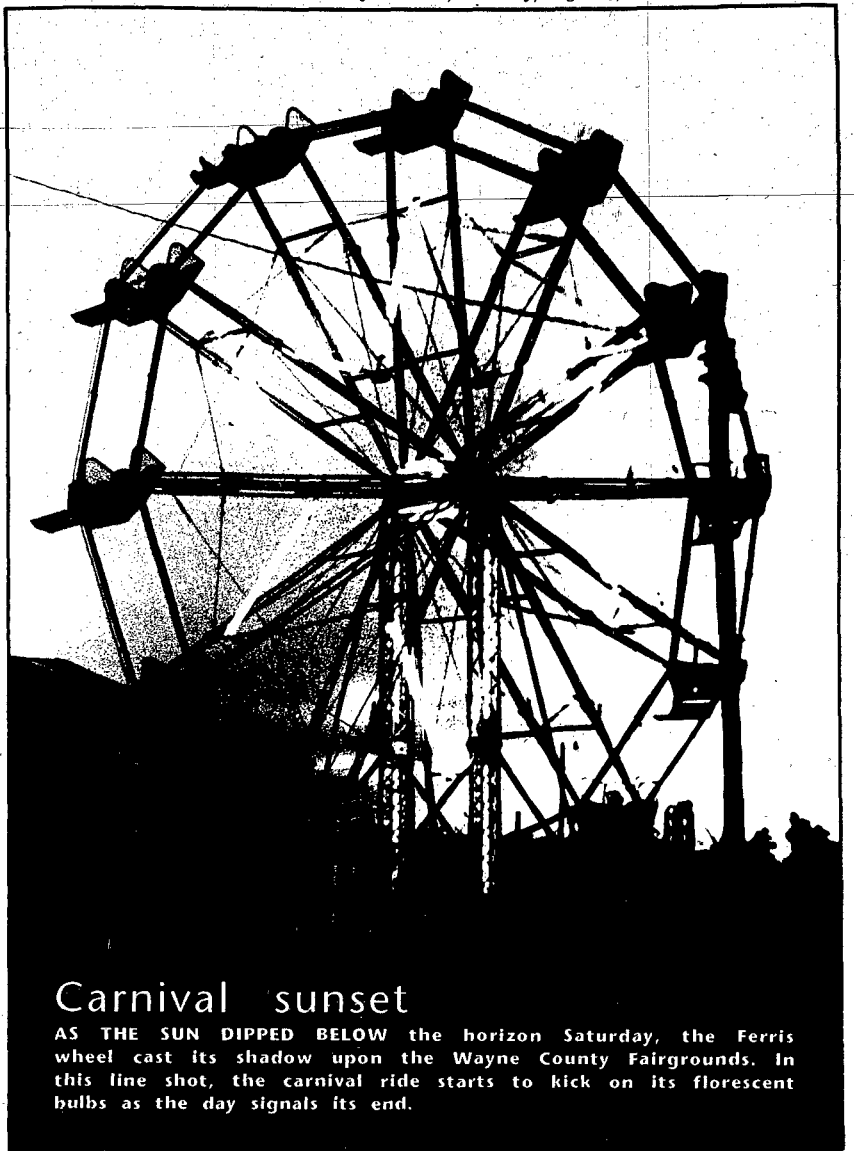

## Farmers need to keep an accurate ACR records file

**AREA** - One of the requirements to qualify for 1990 farm program benefits is acreage conservation reserve (ACR) maintenance. ACR is cropland removed from production to meet acreage reduction requirements.

Melvin Wilson, Chairman of the Wayne County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said program participants must follow their contract regarding maintenance of ACR land to be eligible for full program benefits.

"Once producers have established adequate conservation protection on these acres to prevent wind and water erosion, maintenance procedures must begin," Wilson said.

Producers cannot neglect ACR land and allow it to grow into weeds or to become a harboring place for insects and rodents, he added.

Approximately 8,612 acres of Wayne County cropland were diverted from crop production under the 1990 farm programs. "We are checking to see that these acres are properly maintained," Wilson said.

He pointed out that weed control is a very important program requirement and farmers who fail to do so will be out of compliance and could lose program benefits.

The acreage reduction program contract also prohibits harvesting ACR land. Grazing is not authorized between April 1 and Aug. 31.

"It would be unfortunate at this point for a producer to be found out of compliance because of failing to maintain ACR land." The ASCS official said most farmers want to do what is best for their land, and have made conservation practices an integral part of their farming operations.

## Nutrition important Report: Home important to diet

**AREA** - One of the most important lessons a child learns at home is healthy eating habits. Dr. Darlene Martin, University of Nebraska extension nutritionist at the Northeast Research and Extension Center.

The best way for parents to foster a child's healthy attitude toward eating is to start when they are infants, Martin said.

"Infants have individual patterns of hunger, so flexible meal schedules are best," she said.

Food once refused may be reintroduced successfully at another time. Food is for nourishment and enjoyment and should not be used as a pacifier or reward. Nor should food be withheld as a punishment. "When parents teach infants and children to expect food as a comfort for unhappiness, it can create an inability to separate physical hunger from emotional needs. This can result in overeating and overweight in later years," Martin said.

Low-fat diets can be particularly harmful for infants. "Advice given for adults is not necessarily appropriate for babies," the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources specialist said. Well-meaning but misinformed parents may severely restrict the fat and calories in their infants' diet and retard growth, she added. Rapid growth demands an adequate supply of nutrients.

Summer is an excellent time to use fresh vegetables, to keep fresh fruits and raw vegetable pieces on hand for children and teenagers. "When possible, allow children to help with the selection and preparation of foods," the specialist recommended.

"Usually, a child will taste a food more readily if involved in the preparation. If children won't eat vegetables, conceal them in casseroles or salads," Martin said.

Teenagers can provide real assistance in shopping and meal preparation with proper guidance. Teenagers can have a good learning experience reading labels and planning meals using the basic four food groups.

Martin advised not forcing children to eat everything on their plates. Research shows that children who are allowed to eat as much or as little as they want are less likely to become overweight or develop eating problems. Children may need to snack between meals. In proportion to their weight, growing children need a larger number of calories than adults because they are growing at a rapid rate. Parents should encourage healthy snack foods and not high-fat of "junk" foods. "But don't go overboard as a forbidden food may become very appealing," Martin said.

In no other area are family influences stronger than in food preferences, Martin noted. Pleasant associations with food are fos-

tered if meals can be eaten in a positive environment. "Talk to your children as you eat. Discuss the importance of good nutrition and how food can contribute to a healthy body. Providing good nutrition can be fun and challenging for a family. And each family member can play an important role in making meal time meaningful," she concluded.



The GOLDEN YEARS

Old age alone isn't to blame for loss of mental ability; the culprits are health disorders. That is the conclusion of Dr. Lissy Jarvik, who studied the aging of 134 pairs of twins over a period of four decades. Dr. Jarvik is a psychiatry professor and chief of neuropsychogeriatrics at the University of California, Los Angeles. She began studying the twins in 1946, when they were in their 50s and 60s. They were given intelligence tests at intervals of about five years until 1986, when the last of the twins died. Among her findings: As the twins' average age increased from 64 to 73, their intelligence test scores improved except for those tests that focused on speed.

Alton Collins, 72, a retired dairy farmer, keeps the phones ringing in Lake County, Florida. Every day, starting before 8 a.m., he phones 119 elderly men and women — most of them disabled and housebound. His cheery, volunteer calls are part of the county's Senior Watch Program. Says one man who is immobilized by a spine condition, "Alton's calls are a real Godsend...my contact with the outside world."

Creams, powders, and sprays that contain either miconazole or tolnaftate are generally recognized as among the most effective nonprescription agents for fighting fungal infections. Antiseptics or antibiotics are of limited value in fungal infections.

Wayne native enjoys Guard duty

Dorcey's career takes him many miles

 Most recruits would hardly think of the National Guard as a travel agency, but Mike Dorcey's career with the Kansas National Guard may well change some minds.  
 Dorcey, a photojournalist with the Kansas Army National Guard, has traveled to Colorado, Minnesota, Texas, Virginia, Wyoming, and twice to Germany since joining the Guard in 1984. He previously served six years on active duty with Army that took him to California, Hawaii, Japan, Taiwan and Vietnam.  
 "These are hardly vacations," he said. "The travel arrangements and accommodations have never been first class, and we earn our keep. But we always get some time to see the locale, mix with the people and sample the culture in foreign countries. Those are opportunities I wouldn't otherwise have."  
 "Traveling with the military has its challenges, but many benefits, too," Dorcey said. "Sometimes you have to overcome people's stereotype about the Americans, the Army, or GIs — to get them to accept you as an individual. It can be disappointing, but is often quite rewarding."  
 "But traveling as a soldier has often given me opportunities to go places and have experiences most tourists don't have," he said. "Sometimes the uniform takes you places you wouldn't think to go as a tourist and, unlike around tourist attractions, that's where you meet real people. And sometimes the uniform gives you an immediate acceptance tourists never enjoy."  
 This summer, in addition to his usual two weeks, Dorcey gambled vacation time to take a second two-week training session with the National Guard for what he hoped would be a rare opportunity this year — another chance to travel abroad.

Dorcey joined the Kansas Guard's 35th Infantry Division Band to travel to Costa Rica for eight days. The band toured the Central American country to play concerts as a goodwill gesture from the people of Kansas and the United States.  
 "It was too good to pass up," Dorcey said. "It was a chance to see someplace I would never have thought about traveling to on my own — and get paid for it."  
 The Costa Rican tour was actually Dorcey's second two-week stint with the National Guard this summer. In June he spent two weeks in Panama with his own unit, the 105th Public Affairs Detachment, covering the activities of National Guard engineer units from Arkansas, Kentucky and Wisconsin.  
 Dorcey credits his freedom to travel to his employer's military leave policy. He works as an editor in Engineering Extension, at Kansas State University in Manhattan.  
 As he had in Panama, Dorcey found Costa Rica to be full of surprises. He discovered he could drink the water anywhere in Costa Rica. "And there are no mosquitoes or flies there. All the hotels and restaurants are open-air, in both countries, but I was never bothered by mosquitoes. And I can count on one hand the number of flies I remember seeing. It blew away all my ideas about life in the tropics."  
 While Panama's weather had lived up to its tropical location, the climate in Costa Rica was another pleasant surprise, Dorcey said.  
 "The cities along either coast have a tropical climate with plenty of rainfall — Limon, on the Caribbean coast, averages over 300 inches a year," he said, "but San Jose, the capital city, is located in a high valley at an altitude of 3,500 feet, receives about 100 inches of rainfall annually and en-

joys an average daytime temperature of 75 degrees year around.  
 "Costa Rica is a beautiful country," Dorcey said. "It has picturesque mountains, high valleys and coastal plains and everything is a vibrant shade of green. A variety of shades of green, actually."  
 Because of the unusual location of their annual training this year, band members were not tasked with their normal combat role in the field providing security to the division's tactical operations center in a combat situation. This allowed time, when not rehearsing or playing concerts, for band members to see some of Costa Rica and experience its culture and people.  
 "Costa Ricans are the best thing about Costa Rica," Dorcey said. "They are open, warm, friendly — they just make you feel welcome."  
 Though language is always a problem in foreign countries, it is less so in Costa Rica because English is the second language. Costa Ricans must study it for several years while in school. Costa Rica also enjoys a literacy rate of 92 percent.  
 "They jump at the chance to practice their English with you. They'll tell you right out that it's important for them to be conversant in English in today's economic and political environment. And they're serious when they say it."  
 Dorcey said he enjoys studying foreign languages himself and found that the effort he made to learn some Spanish before going to Panama paid off. "The people of Central America always appreciated any effort to speak Spanish and were really tolerant of their language."  
 But Dorcey said he saw clearly in

Costa Rica that music is an international language that spontaneously dissolved linguistic and cultural barriers.  
 "I've always loved music, but as someone who has been involved and interested in communication through languages, writing and photography since high school. I found it amazing how easily these musicians could communicate their love of their own culture to the Costa Ricans and how freely the Costa Ricans could show their appreciation for the music and the Americans love of their culture."  
 "And after the concerts the Costa Ricans would come right up and mingle with the band and, using broken English and broken Spanish, talk about the instruments, the music, Kansas and the United States. And the Costa Ricans would always ask for the musicians' autographs. That was a first for the guys in the band, to be treated like celebrities. The Costa Ricans had them in the palm of their hands."  
 And where will his travel agency-uniform send Dorcey next?  
 "It depends on what happens in Europe yet this fall, but the 105th is scheduled to go back to Germany as part of REFORGER (Return of Forces to Germany) in 1990. If the unit goes, I plan to be there."  
 "But I'm hooked on Central America," he said. "And I haven't seen anything of South America yet. The way the international situation is shaping up, there might be more opportunities to get back down there."  
 Pausing, he smiled, then added, "I'm still practicing my Spanish."  
 Dorcey is a native of Wayne, where his parents, Joseph and Patricia Dorcey, still make their home.

The bean buggies have been busy. There is water in some of the dams that had been dry.



## Record price when ring of bologna sold for \$415 at fair

A record price may have been set at the Wayne County fairgrounds Monday night when a ring of bologna was sold for \$415. Although it was dubbed the Maggie Stuffle Ring of Bologna, the story goes deep in the history of the Wayne County Fair and 4-H work. Back in the early 20's, Dr. Bill Hawkins, a veterinarian, organized the first 4-H

club in Wayne County. The first year or two the calves were housed in a tent, but as 4-H grew, it soon became evident that a better facility was needed. The fair board challenged the 4-H by offering to erect a building if they would raise part of the money. The 4-H responded by holding an auction of donated items, perhaps the most un-

usual item, was a ring of bologna. This bologna was sold and resold many times and by the end of the sale, became a very valuable piece of meat.

That ring of bologna became a symbol Monday night when the fair board and the 4-H teamed up with mer-

chants throughout the county and friends in Wayne County and surrounding counties to help one of their own. Sacks of feed, baked goods and fancy work, fresh dressed chickens and donated items from merchants. The 4-H council became the final proud owners of this valuable piece of meat. A grand total of \$3,400 was raised.

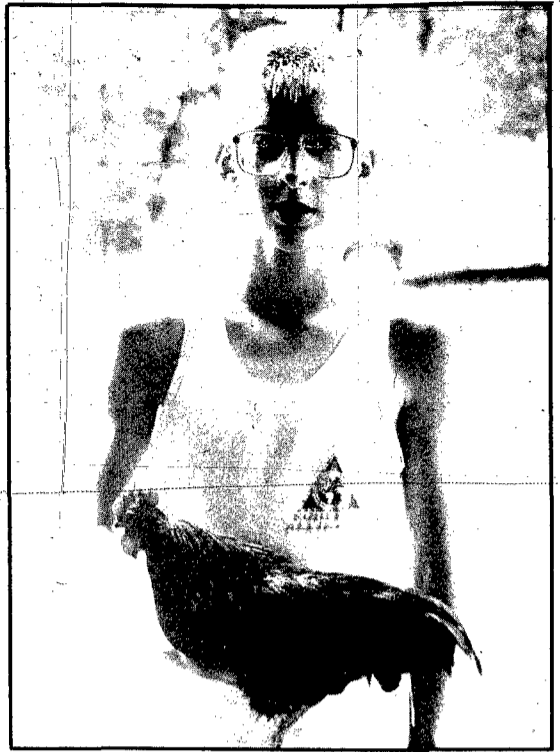

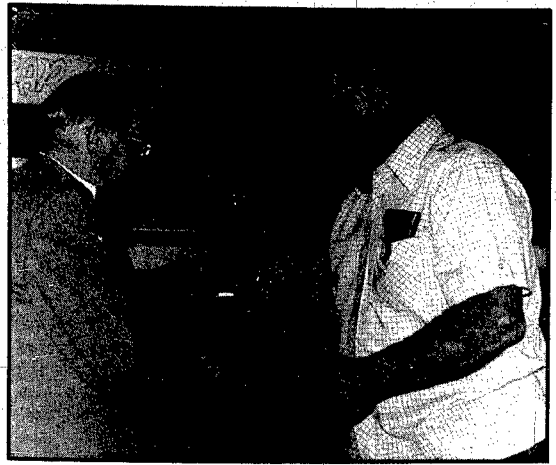


# Edwards to do show in Norfolk
