Uses of reserve money varies for area towns

People in West Point were recently given an early Christmas present from their city council when the council last week announced it would pay for their December electric bill.

According to an article in the West Point News, a reserve balance had accumulated to about \$2 million, which is almost the maximum it can hold.

According to West Point City Administrator Ed Booth, the reasons West Point was able to provide its customers with a month's free electricity is because the West Point power plant is debt free, West Point has reduced its power plant operation costs and in 1990, the city was paid \$266,000 for having a power plant capable of generating about 8,000 kilowatts per hour.

Although West Point residents are being given a one-month free usage of electricity, no recommendations are being made to lower their rates. Booth added that the city takes in an extra \$50,000 a month in money generated from various revenues which make it possible.

The bottom line is that it will cost the city's reserve fund approximately \$150,000.

BUT SUCH IS NOT the case for many area towns. In Wakefield, Wayne and Laurel, and for the Wayne County Public Power District, the budgeting structure is different and therefore money cannot be allocated in the same fashion as West Point has with its reserve.

According to Wayne City Administrator Joe Salitros, any excess money taken in is used in the form of delaying rate increases and for

the replacement of depreciated parts.

Since money from the reserve fund has been used to defray rate increases, Wayne is losing approximately \$40,000 a year on its electrical usage but due to a recent audit the city had performed, that figure is likely to change in fiscal year 1991.

According to the audit, revenue from electrical charges in fiscal year 1990 was about \$2.1 million. In spite of that figure, the city still found itself in the red due to the covering of costs, the depreciation of old equipment and the cost for replacing it.

UNLIKE WAYNE, Laurel takes its surplus and directs it back into the general fund for park projects and other projects which have a positive impact on the public.

"In the past, we have used it for general fund expenditures in lieu of raising taxes," said L.J. Mallett, Laurel's former city administrator. "At one time we tried to return money by doing it through the churches but we found that some people disagreed with that since they weren't church-goers. Because of that, we didn't want to find ourselves in the middle of a lawsuit so we stopped doing that."

The last time Laurel returned money was in the early 1980s.

One recent improvement which took money from the electrical excess was the renovation of Laurel's electric plant. The accumulated surplus, which runs approximately \$50,000 a year, was placed in CDs and returned to the city with a more efficient plant, according to Laurel City Administrator Harley Reinohl.

IN WAKEFIELD, rates are scheduled to go up in January, according to Wakefield City Adminis-

trator Lowell Johnson. Part of the reason for the rate hike is due to increased insurance needs.

"We have a self-insurance fund set aside for emergencies and for years that fund has been too low," he said. "Really, you're supposed to make some profit and we only made \$11,000 profit last year. We recently had a survey done and it found that our switching system is outdated and in an emergency we would need \$350,000 to replace it."

Johnson added that the City of Wakefield tries to maintain a minimum of \$800,000 in insurance reserves in the event of a natural disaster.

"We were faced with a situation of raising rates or eating into the self-insurance fund," he said.

A SITUATION SIMILAR to those described by Wayne, Wakefield and Laurel was noted by Sam Schroeder at Wayne County Public Power.

Schroeder said any reserve is used for capital improvement projects. He said due to the conditions this year, however, that the Wayne County Public Power District has not been able to put money into reserves.

"We like to have 5-8 percent of our budget as a margin," he said. "If we can't do that, we can't afford system improvements and if we have to have a system improvement we have to borrow money to pay for it, so in the long run it's better to build up those reserves."

While none of the local situations were similar to West Point's, all four institutions contacted said they expect a rate increase in 1991 or 1992. They all noted that while they are unsure how much the rate increase will be, they said it will be used to cover costs.

After serving 12 years as the Wayne County Clerk, Gretta Morris has decided to call it quits.

With her retirement, Morris will not only be leaving more than a decade of work but what has amounted to her career in the office. She started working in the county clerk's office in 1961.

"I couldn't have thought of anything that would've been more challenging or interesting," she says. "As I look back on my career, I still feel the same way. I've enjoyed the variety of tasks we've done around here."

In addition to her duties as county clerk, Morris also serves as register of deeds and election commissioner.

DURING THE YEARS she has worked in the office, she has seen

numerous changes in the way it's run. She says the most noticeable change is in the amount of paperwork the office files through as opposed to the 1960s and 1970s.

"The reports we used to do quarterly are now done monthly and some are done semi-monthly," she says. "Everything has become much more detailed, even the elections, which used to be fairly simple."

That's part of the reason she has decided to get away from the office. She says while she enjoys working with the public and listening to their concerns, the volume of paperwork and state and government mandates have gotten old.

"Really, there are two major reasons for my retirement," she says. "I've always wondered when it was time to retire and after looking

Youth opens shop

Interest grows into sports card business

Two years ago Joey Bartholomaus developed an interest in sports cards thanks, in part, to his father's interest in the hobby.

Today, the two have opened their own store at the corner of 5th and Main St.

The young entrepreneur opened his business because he saw the need to sell, trade and buy cards. The variety their store offers might surprise even the most knowledgeable card trader.

"There's a lot of people I know who collect cards," the 15-year-old said. "I'm thinking we'll do pretty good. Most people I talk to are excited about us opening."

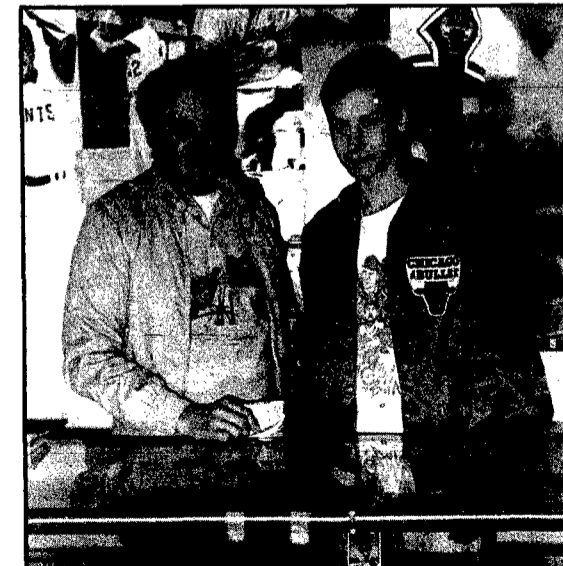
Along with selling nickel cards, similar to cards you might find on the shelves in any convenience store or grocery aisle, The Card Shop have cards in stock which date back to 1956. The card is a Robert Clemente rookie card, which sells for \$300.

The oldest one they can get is a Topps 1952 rookie card for baseball great Mickey Mantle.

ACCORDING TO Joey's dad, Arnie Bartholomaus, the business can offer specific sets to customers, provided they can find the right cards.

"If someone's looking for a set, we have commons which enable us to complete the set," he said. "If someone wants a team set made up, we can make it up for them."

Currently the business has an inventory of approximately 250,000 cards ranging from baseball to football and basketball and even a few hockey cards. Eventually they

will sell sports posters as well.

"I think what we're doing is fun because it's fun to go through the cards and keep track of the players stats," Joey said.

AS THE BUSINESS has just opened, they currently are having a number of potential customers coming through and looking the store-over.

Joey said eventually, they will

expand the business beyond its current space and fill the entire building. Right now, they house about a third of the building, he said.

"We've had people coming in to see what we have and most of them tell us they're going home to see what they can bring back and trade," Joey said. "It's been fun to see the interests people have in the store."

Boy in critical condition after Saturday accident

WINSIDE - An 11-year-old Winside youth was listed in critical condition Tuesday following an accident Saturday when the 4-wheel all-terrain vehicle he was riding collided with a pickup three miles north and 1 1/2 miles west of Winside.

Bryan Deck, son of Rod and Patty Deck of Winside, was injured when his 4-wheel all-terrain vehicle came out of a private driveway onto a county road and into the path of a pickup driven by 47-year-old Vernon Bauermeister of rural

Wayne about 12:30 p.m. Saturday. Following the accident, Deck was taken to Providence Medical Center where he was air-lifted to Marian Health Center in Sioux City. As of Tuesday, Deck was in the intensive care unit at Marian Health Center.

The family is not releasing any information about the extent of the 11-year-old's injuries at this time.

According to the Nebraska State Patrol, Bauermeister was not injured in the accident.

Final preparations being made for new business

WAYNE - It appears that final preparations are being made for First Step, Inc. to move into property at 514 E. 6th St. effective Jan. 1, 1991.

According to information from the Wayne County Clerk's office, First Step, Inc. closed on its purchase Tuesday, Nov. 13, of property formerly owned by Howard R. and Carole W. Schmidt.

First Step, Inc. is a for-profit organization serving as a provider for people with severe or persistent mental illness who have been housed in nursing homes in the past. The clients First Step, Inc. serves have been displaced by the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act and, for the first time, are being mainstreamed slowly back into the public.

THE PROPERTY purchase fell under public criticism in late October when residents raised concerns for the safety of children and potential threats to businesses in the area. At the Wayne City Council meeting Oct. 30, many of those concerns were addressed by Jeannia Bottger, director of First Step, Inc.

With the loan closing, tenants currently living in the four-plex were sent a letter last week informing them that the property has been sold and they have until midnight Dec. 31 to move out.

According to Bottger, tenants have also been given the opportunity to have their rent pro-rated, in the event they wish to move out sooner. Bottger added that she is willing to work with tenants in almost any way she can provided they vacate the property by Dec. 31.

WHEN THE CURRENT residents have vacated the building, Bottger said First Step will immediately begin work inside. She said they have already purchased new carpet and work is proceeding to begin housing tenants as early as mid-January but much of that depends on the approval of the fire alarm system by the state fire marshal.

"We hope to have the whole operation up and going by Feb. 1," she said. "I don't think it will be a problem to be ready by then but we won't be running at full capacity

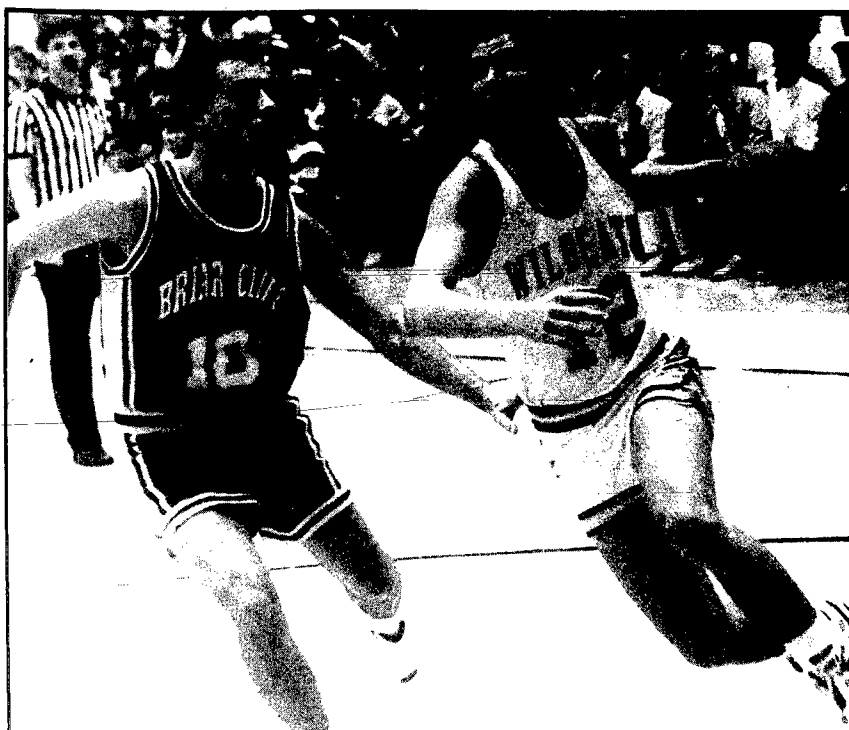

The Cats came into the season opener without two of the best athletes on the team in Steve Dunbar and Keith Whitfield as both are red-shirted after Dunbar under went shoulder surgery and after Whitfield broke his shooting hand during the first day of practice.

Brewen, who coached at UNO before coming to Wayne State, feels that the Chargers are just as good as any North Central Conference team. "They have a real nice team," Brewen said. "I'd say that they would definitely fare well against the caliber of the North Central Conference in comparison."

Brewen felt one of the advantages Briar Cliff had was the fact they had the athletes who could play above the rim. "We don't have anyone on the team who can really play above the rim," Brewen said. "Briar Cliff had several of those and it hurt us."

Michael Parks is considered by Brewen to be WSC's quickest athlete right now and he ended up scoring 17 points to lead the Wildcats in scoring. "Michael plays great defense and he has good quickness," Brewen said. Parks is a freshman from Papillion, Neb.

from his junior college players following Saturday's performance. "I was hoping to get more out of our juno players but I guess in some ways they are just as new to our program as our freshman."

Wayne State was out rebounded by a 42-37 margin with Dusenberry pulling down seven caroms from his point guard spot to offset Gates' 14. "Our point

guards totalled five assists and 10 turnovers," Brewen said. "That has to be completely reversed for us to be successful."

Wayne State had 26 turnovers in the game which translated into a turnover for every four possessions. Seventeen of the turnovers came in a ragged first half.

"One positive note about the game was that we established an inside game against a real physical

team like Briar Cliff," Brewen said. "They can only help us down the road."

Wayne State will play in the Southwest State Tournament in Marshall, Minnesota this Friday and Saturday. The Cats play Huron, S.D. on Friday. The championship and consolation games will be played Saturday with the Cats playing either Southwest State or Mayville State.

Norfolk Social Service office ready to distribute food

AREA - The Norfolk office of the Nebraska Department of Social Services is planning the November distribution of U.S. Department of Agriculture food commodities, including flour, butter, cornmeal, honey and peanut butter.

Eligibility will be determined by the applicants' declaration of current gross income for the year. The income must be equal or below the specified low income guidelines. All signatures of income statement are subject to investigation by the USDA.

Each eligible household may receive 2 pound stick of butter, one 5 pound bag of flour, one 5 pound bag of cornmeal, one 24 ounce jar of honey and one 2 pound can of peanut butter.

To obtain commodities, these rules must be followed:

- Present your social security card.
- Present proof of residence (latest phone bill, rent receipt, utility bill, etc. proof must contain current address and name on the bill.)

- If picking up commodities for another household, you must present a statement signed by them authorizing you to do so, plus the previous two items mentioned.

The distribution of commodities is set for Tuesday, Dec. 4 in several area communities. On Dec. 5, commodities will be distributed at the Norfolk National Guard Armory from 8:30 a.m. to noon.



PRISONER OF TERROR: A woman who won't give her name or even where she lives because of fear of being identified says she and other older people in a municipal housing project are victims of ongoing juvenile crime. Years earlier, she, her late husband, and most of the other seniors moved into the project. "We were happy to have nice places to live that we could afford ... (and) we had nice neighbors ..." She says the makeup of the complex began to change. "We got more people with kids, and soon, we were being robbed in the elevators ... My friend had her place broken into, and they took everything ..." At first, the police came around. Now, she says, "They say to get the housing guards to do it ... Only they (the guards) don't bother much because if they pull in the kids, they get let out anyway ... We're scared to go out alone even to buy food. It's a shame when you become a prisoner when you've done nothing bad, and those who rob come and go as they please. People say it's drugs or bad homes that's the cause ... I asked the manager why we can't be moved somewhere without kids, but she says they can't do that, so we've got to live like this at our age."

OLDER PARENTS: I received letters on both sides of the question regarding the woman who wrote that although she loves her elderly and ailing father, she is forced to have him cared for in a facility rather than in her home. Most writers pointed out that parents can care for many children, but grown children seem unwilling to care for one or two parents. However, on the other side, defenders of this woman's position note that today most women work, and since it was traditionally the daughter or daughter-in-law who provided that home care, that person is no longer available. Also, it was pointed out, some physical or mental conditions require expert care and constant observation, which the home caregiver can't always offer. One reader made a telling point: if there's more than one child in the family, why should just one be responsible for care of the parent or parents? Let everyone contribute, perhaps even pool their funds and hire a home nursing service. Finally, a man wrote to say his wife took her father in ... "and the funny thing is, he left his family when she was a kid and came back when he was old and sick ... I admire her for what she's doing, (but) I can tell you, I wouldn't have done it if he was my father."
