People in West Point were re-cently given an early Christmas present from their city council when the council last week an-

when the council last week an-nounced it would pay for their De-cember electric bill. According to an article in the West Point News, a reserve bal-ance had accumulated to about \$2 million, which is almost the maximum it can hold.

According to West Point City Administrator Ed Booth, the rea-sons West Point was able to provide its customers with a month's free electricity is because the West Point power plant is debt free, West Point has reduced its power plant operation costs and in 1990, the city was paid \$266,000 for having a power plant capable of generating about 8,000 kilowatts per hour.

per hour. Although West Point residents are being given a one-month free usage of electricity, no recom-mendations are being made to lower their rates. Booth added that the city takes in an extra \$50,000 a month in money generated from various revenues which make it possible.

generated from various revenues which make it possible. The bottom line is that it will cost the city's reserve fund ap-proximately \$150,000.

BUT SUCH IS NOT the case for many area towns. In Wakefield, Wayne and Laurel, and for the Wayne County Public Power Dis-trict, the budgeting structure is different and therefore money can-not be allocated in the same fashon as West Point has with its reserve.

parts parts. Since money from the reserve fund has been used to defray rate increases, Wayne is losing ap-proximately \$40,000 a year on its electrical usage but due to a re-cent audit the city had performed, that figure is likely to change in fis-cal year 1991 cal year 1991.

cal year 1991. According to the audit, revenue from electrical charges in fiscal year 1990 was about \$2.1 million. In spite of that figure, the city still found itself in the red due to the covering of costs, the depreciation of old guipment and the cert for of old equipment and the cost for replacing it.

UNLIKE WAYNE, Laurel takes its surplus and directs it back into the general fund for park projects and other projects which have a positive impact on the public. "In the past, we have used it for

general fund expenditures in lieu of raising taxes," said L.J. Mallett, Laurel's former city administrator. "At one time we tried to return money by doing it through the churches but we found that some churches but we found that some people disagreed with that since they weren't church-goers. One recent improvement which took money from the electrical excess was the renovation of Laurel's electric plant. Boy in critical condition after Saturday accident

WINSIDE - An 11-year-old Winside youth was listed in critical condition Tuesday following an ac-cident Saturday when the 4-wheel all-terrain vehicle he was riding col-lided with a pickup three miles north and 1 1/2 miles west of Winside

Bryan Deck, son of Rod and Patty Deck of Winside, was injured when his 4-wheel all-terrain vehicle came out of a private driveway onto a county road and into the path of a pickup driven by 47-year-old Vernon Bauermeister of rural Wayne about 12:30 p.m. Saturday. Following the accident, Deck was taken to Providence Medical Center where he was air-lifted to Marian Health Center in Sioux City. As of Tuesday, Deck was in the in-tensive care unit at Marian Health Center

The family is not releasing any information about the extent of the 11-year-old's injuries at this

time. According to the Nebraska State Patrol, Bauermeister was not injured in the accident.

Final preparations being made for new business

WAYNE - It appears that final Produce - it appears that final preparations are being made for First Step, Inc. to move into prop-erty at 514 E. 6th St. effective Jan. 1, 1991.

According to information from the Wayne County Clerk's office, First Step, Inc. closed on its pur-chase Tuesday, Nov. 13. of prop-erty formerly owned by Howard R. and Carole W. Schmidt.

First Step, Inc. is a for-profit organization serving as a provider for people with severe or persistent mental illness who have been housed in nursing homes in the past. The clients First Step, Inc. serves have been displaced by the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act and, for the first time, are being mainstreamed slowly back into the public.

THE PROPERTY purchase fell under public criticism in late Octo-ber when residents raised concerns ber when residents raised concerns for the safety of children and po-tential threats to businesses in the area. At the Wayne City Council meeting Oct. 30, many of those concerns were addressed by Jean-nia Bottger, director of First Step, Inc.

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With the loan closing, tenants currently living in the four-plex were sent a letter last week in-forming them that the property has been sold and they have until

midnight Dec. 31 to move out. According to Bottger, tenants have also been given the opportu-nity to have their rent pro-rated, in the event they wish to move out sooner. Bottger added that she is willing to work with tenants in al-most anyway she can provided they vacate the property by Dec. 31. aht

WHEN THE CURRENT residents WHEN THE CURRENT residents have vacated the building, Bottger said First Step will immediately be-gin work inside. She said they have already purchased new carpet and work is proceeding to begin hous-ing tenants as early as mid-January but much of that depends on the approval of the fire alarm system by the state fire methal the state fire marshal.

"We hope to have the whole operation up and going by Feb. 1," she said. "I don't think it will be a problem to be ready by then but we won't be running at full capacity

The label of an eye drop container should be read each and every time the medicine is used. In a report in a recent issue of New England Journal of Medicine, three cases of eye injury were traced to a mixup in which bottles containing Hemoccult were mistaken for bottles of Timoptic eye drops. He moccult is a chemical used to test stools for blood and is used as a screen for bowel diseases. Timoptic eye drops are used in glauco ma. Both Hemoccult and Timoptic containers have yellow caps of similar size and shape. Hemoccult can cause severe pain when placed in the eyes. One mixup occurred in an indi-vidual's home; two occurred in hospital rooms where Hemoccult was left by hospital personnel. Un-fortunately, some eye drop users have visual problems — making label-reading difficult.


