The concert will be held in the Val Peterson Fine Arts Building's Ramsey Theatre at 8 p.m.

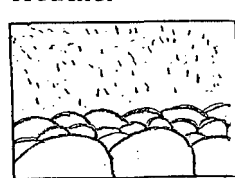

## Residents question role in gulf

# Forum allows people to voice concerns

A gulf crisis forum held at Wayne State College Thursday provided instructors Kent Blaser and Sayre Anderson with a pleasant surprise.

Much to their dismay, 65 students, faculty and concerned citizens of the Wayne community showed up to air their concerns from issues ranging from the United States' mission in the gulf region to comparisons to Vietnam and a possible draft. Following the meeting, Anderson said the turnout for the noon meeting was a pleasant surprise.

But the Persian Gulf issue has carved some deep concerns among those in attendance. Blaser and Anderson took an informal poll of those in attendance to find out what their beliefs were about the gulf crisis and many questioned U.S. policy in the region.

OF THE PERSIAN Gulf crisis, the consensus of those in attendance indicated:

- Most don't understand the United States' role in the region.
- Most believed that if war is to be declared it should be initiated by Congress, rather than the president.

• And most said sanctions should be given a chance to work before military options are exercised.

## Forum officials provide addresses for people to voice gulf concerns

WAYNE - In addition to holding a public forum for discussion about the Persian Gulf crisis, history professor Kent Blaser and English professor Sayre Anderson provided those in attendance with addresses of Nebraska senators and congressmen to allow people to voice their views one way or another. According to the two Wayne State professors, one positive action people can take is to write to congressional representatives and to the president expressing their concerns.

They added that the rule of thumb with a congressional office is that one letter represents 500 voters who don't take the time to write.

and that troubles us."

Many of those in attendance said it bothers them that the U.S. role in the gulf region has apparently changed.

THE GROUP consensus indicated confusion about the role in the region. Some said U.S. forces are there for cheap oil while others said troops are there to support big business dollars in the United States. On either account, the consensus disagreed with the government's reasons for being there.

"It's difficult for me because this thing has me emotionally involved," said Joyce Niemann, whose son is stationed in Saudi Arabia. "I want the politicians to know that I support our boys but I don't support these politics."

TO BEGIN THE meeting, Anderson, a WSC English teacher, outlined his observation of the crisis.

"First, we have not given the economic sanctions enough time to work. ...I have serious questions about whether American lives are more valuable than time."

"Second, the government has been unwilling to compromise. While I disagree with Iraq's takeover of Kuwait, I seriously question the president's stance on

no compromises.

"Third, is it worth it for us to fight for the price of oil to reinstate a shaky regime?"

"Fourth, we've been barraged by the rhetoric of politics. President Bush started out comparing (Iraqi President Saddam) Hussein to Hitler and now he's changed it to a nuclear issue."

"Fifth, do we really want to fight another undeclared war? We've had two since World War II and neither have been popular."

"Sixth, what will be the long-term effects? We have a dominantly white, western force over there and how will that look to the rest of the gulf region?"

"And seventh, is a personal reason but I don't want my son going to the gulf. If necessary, I sadly admit, I will have him leave this nation," Anderson concluded.

THE PROFESSORS agreed that if a war does develop with Iraq, it may result in a reinstatement of the draft.

"Whether the draft develops or not, we're dealing with a relatively dangerous issue at hand now," said Blaser, a history professor. "When the current people volunteered for the military, they never considered that this situation might develop."

Wilson, who oversees the Toys for Tots program, said she expects every needy child who would probably have gone without a gift at Christmas will now be able to receive one. She said if it weren't for the generosity of the community, some might have gone without Christmas this year.

"This whole program makes me feel like I've accomplished by goal in life," she said Friday while separating toys. "It's good to share during the year but it's especially nice at Christmas. It's through the efforts of people in the community that the Christmas spirit lives on."

Approximately 90 children will benefit from this year's program. Wilson said she expects that every

## Presidential Award

# Laurel teen receives nation's top 4-H honor

Tragedies in her hometown have turned making the world a safer place into one of Betsy Adkins' major goals.

Her safety campaigns are just one reason the 17-year-old resident of Laurel has earned the Presidential Award — the highest honor a member of 4-H can achieve.

Betsy was one of 12 4-H'ers in the nation selected for the award, which is sponsored by Reader's Digest Foundation.

She received a \$1,500 educational scholarship and a silver tray presented on behalf of the President of the United States during the 69th national 4-H Congress in Chicago on Dec. 5.

Betsy, daughter of Richard and Joan Adkins of Laurel, also received a \$1,000 scholarship from the GMC Truck Division of General Motors for her work in the national 4-H Safety Program.

VICKIE Genoff, University of Nebraska 4-H youth specialist at the Northeast Research and Extension Center near Concord, says all of Betsy's projects have been treated as major efforts during her 4-H career.

"Betsy approaches life with drive, zeal and enthusiasm," said Genoff. "She is an exceptionally

talented young lady and will always bring a sense of focus and desire for achievement to whatever she is involved in."

SAFETY became a major emphasis for Betsy when fires destroyed two major businesses and two homes in Laurel, taking the life of a teenager, and farm accidents cost a limb each for two of her classmates.

Her primary goal is to develop safety awareness attitudes within her family, club, community, county and state.

Betsy has given fire prevention programs to schools, youth groups, camping program participants and community organizations throughout the state. She has logged many hours in a Smokey Bear costume, and, for Smokey's 45th birthday, developed a video presentation on exit drills in the home and fire prevention procedures.

Working with the National Safety Council, she developed a safety hazard hunt program which is in use statewide.

IN ADDITION, Betsy has conducted a series of workshops on assembling first aid kits for home, farm, travel and recreation.

While in Mexico on an exchange program, she led a project

to assemble 250 first aid kits for residents of a girls' home.

She also has assembled blizzard kits and distributed them along with copies of a winter storm survival pamphlet that she produced.

Certified in Red Cross basic rescue and cardiopulmonary resuscitation, Betsy has promoted water safety activities, safe boating procedures and flotation device use.

In the Laurel school system she has promoted bicycle and traffic safety, stranger danger, fire safety,

poison prevention and equipment safety. She also assisted with the local Meals on Wheels program.

BETSY IS proud of Operation Lifesaver, designed to alert citizens of all ages to dangers at the two railroad crossings in Laurel. Another is implementation of the McGruff Safe House program which grew out of part of her safety efforts.

Betsy tries to incorporate safety into all her 4-H project areas, whether it is in livestock or home economics.

She has exhibited champion lambs and steers in local and state shows. She also makes many of her own clothes and finds time for sports and music — all while maintaining a perfect 4.0 grade point average as a junior at Laurel-Concord High School.

BETSY considers herself an environmentalist, and a project in which she analyzed water near cattle lots for bacterial content was a Junior Academy of Science winner at Wayne State College.

"I've seen some changes that need to be made, and I'm going to make them," she pledges.

Following high school, Betsy plans a career in biological sciences and health care.

from Mary Schnitzler and Lisa Chamberlin and the brilliant ball handling of Dana Olmsted.

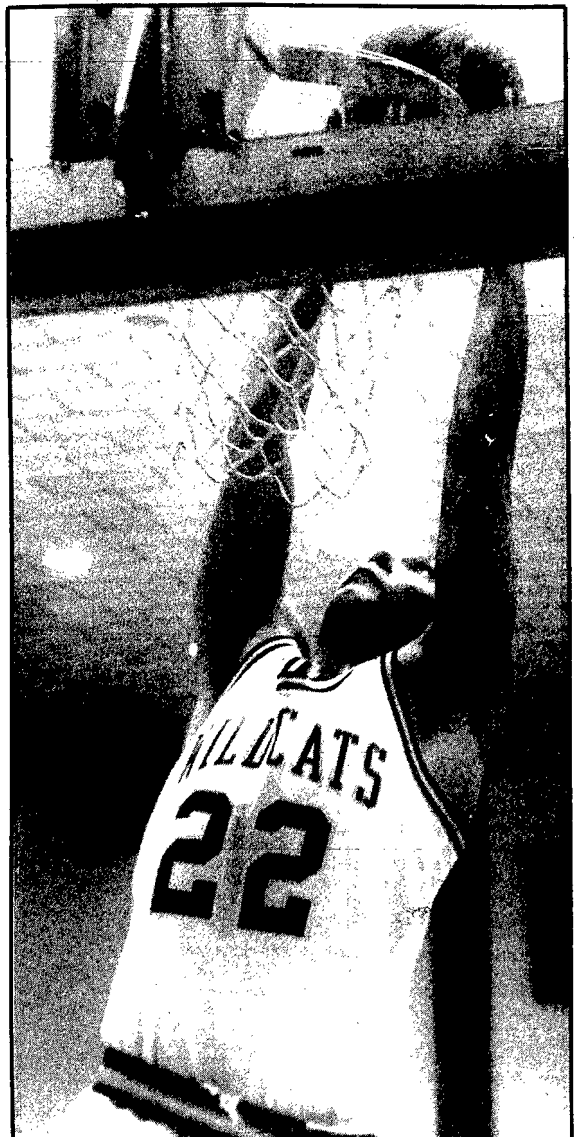

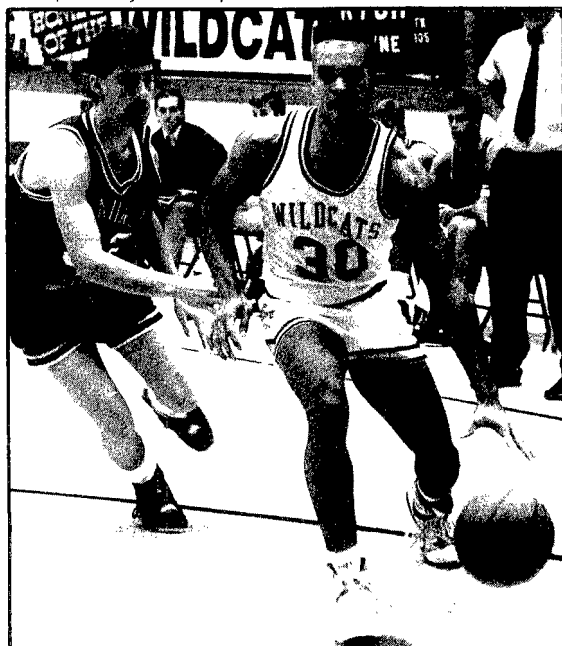
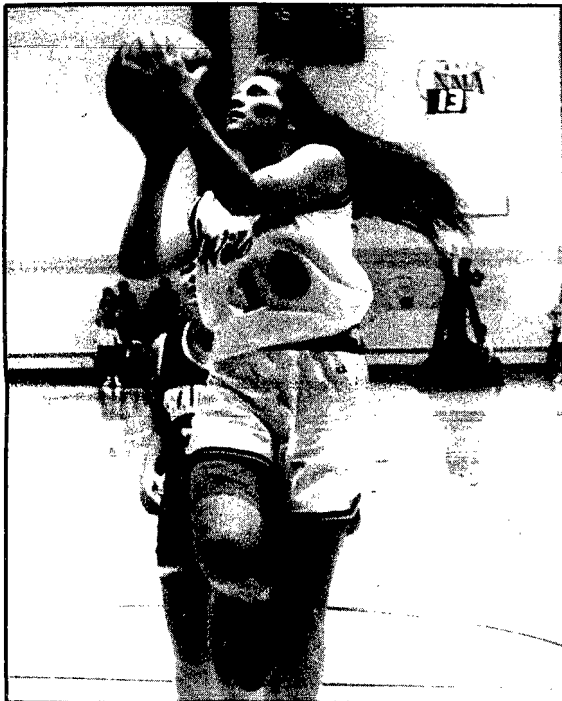

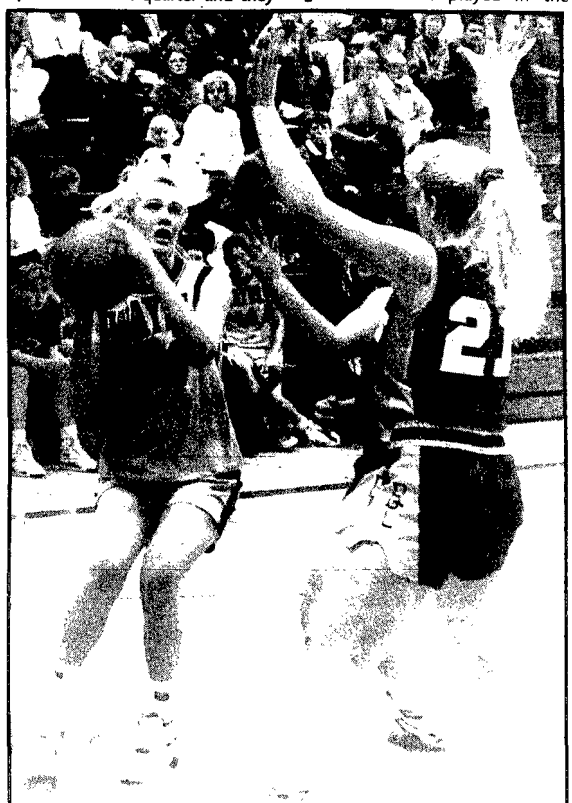

**Dog's return home brings newfound joy to family**

Gypsie, a 5-year-old black labrador, last week found herself aimlessly wandering around the busy streets of Omaha, 100-plus miles from her quiet country home.

Today, Gypsie is back with her owner where she belongs.

Gypsie's master, the late Jim Melcher, died Nov. 6 in a traffic accident near Stanton and Gypsie found comfort only with Jim's widow Mary and other family members.

Mary Melcher, Stanton, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gotthilf Jaeger of Winside.

**THE STORY BEGAN** the day after Thanksgiving, 13 days after Jim's funeral, someone removed Gypsie from her surroundings, apparently coaxing her into their vehicle. It is the family's theory that a hunter probably thought Gypsie looked like a good hunting dog, took her and upon finding out that the dog had never been used for

hunting, dumped her in Omaha or the dog was able to escape from her captors.

Following a family search for Gypsie through corn fields near their farm, the family was unable to locate the lost dog. Heartbroken, Jim's wife wrote a letter to several area newspapers, including the Omaha World-Herald asking for someone to help find the lost dog.

**A WEEK LATER**, the telephone rang.

Apparently, a man from Omaha had found the lost dog wandering around the Omaha Civic Auditorium. He asked Mrs. Melcher to describe the lab and to her surprise, her description fit the dog.

Melcher said she described the dog's mannerisms, such as drinking beer from a can and liking to sleep in bed, along with showing her teeth when she smiles.

Sunday, when the Melchers went to Omaha to retrieve their lost dog, it became obvious that Gypsie was the family dog, people close to the family said.

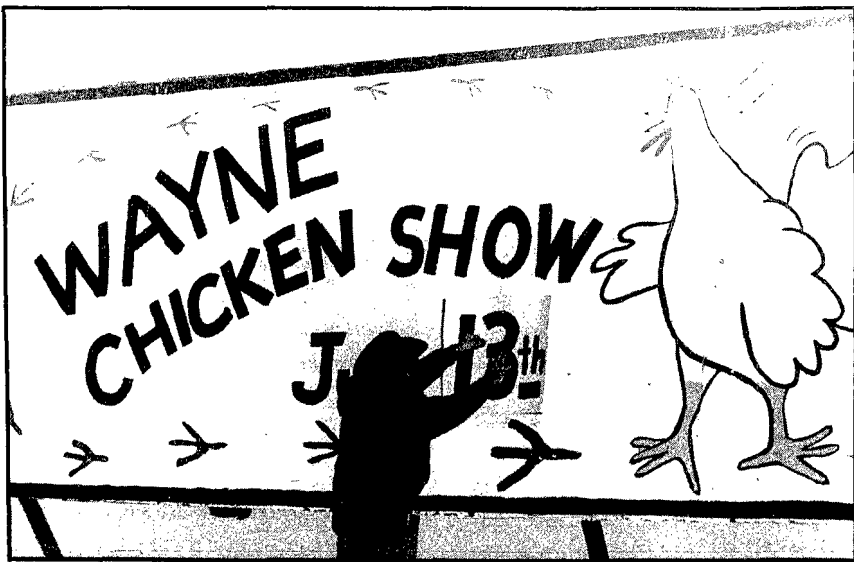

Each sophomore student enrolled in English at Wayne High School must complete a career education unit. The unit is three weeks in duration and consists of three parts.

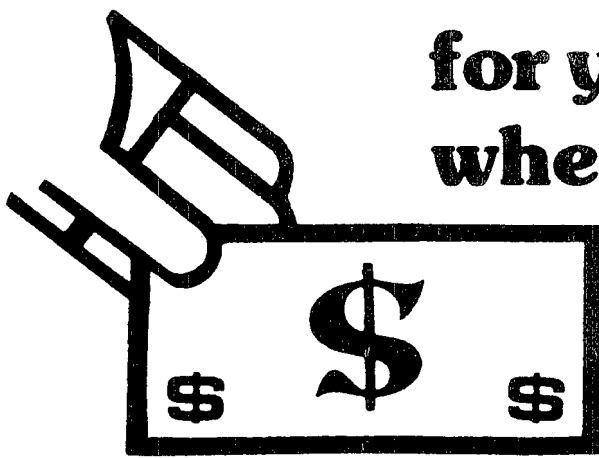
