Schaefer facing charges of fraud

WAYNE - John E. Schaefer, Wayne, was charged Dec. 21 in U.S. District Court in Omaha with obtaining overpayments from the Veteran's Administration with intent to defraud the federal government.

Schaefer, 44, allegedly received total overpayments of \$19,529 between January 1986 and October 1987, according to a complaint filed by Assistant U.S. Attorney Robert Kokrda.

KOKRDA SAID although he can't discuss the background of the case, he said Schaefer was receiving approximately \$1,000 in overpayments for the 21 months in question.

According to the U.S. Attorney's office in Omaha, the case is scheduled for arraignment Feb. 5, 1991 in Omaha.

"I think the charges reflect a profound misunderstanding reflected by the Veteran's Administration and the U.S. Attorney's office," said David Domina, a Norfolk attorney, who is representing Schaefer.

WAYNE - The Wayne Herald will not be publishing a Thursday, Jan. 3 edition due to the New Years holiday.

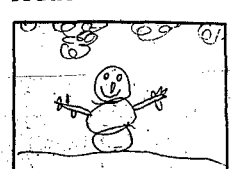
Following the holiday season, The Wayne Herald will resume its normal publication schedule.

Winside youth doing well

"After seeing your child go what he's gone through, it's a miracle. When you see your child in pain and you see how far he's come, it's like God has been with us the whole time," says Patty Deck, the mother of Bryan Deck, who was critically injured in an accident, Nov. 17.

The 11-year-old youngster from Winside is in Mercy Medical Center in Sioux City for Christmas, but his spirits are high.

Deck was injured Nov. 17 when the four-wheeler he was riding was struck by a pickup near the family home, while he was en route to pick up the day's mail. Following attention from the Winside Rescue Unit, he was transported via helicopter to the Mercy Medical Trauma Center, where he was admitted with a number of injuries to the intensive care unit.

A little over a week ago, his parents received the best news of the holiday season — that Bryan was being transferred from ICU to the hospital's pediatrics unit.

TO LIFT BRYAN'S spirits for Christmas, his father Rod brought many of his presents the Saturday before the holiday. Bryan said

the gifts, combined with thoughtful cards from home, have made his stay that much easier.

"It makes me feel good to think that people at home are thinking about me," he says. "It makes me feel popular. There's some people who write me cards that I don't even know."

"I want everyone to know that I'll be coming home soon. I want to thank them for the Christmas program video they sent me."

Bryan added that he's anxious to see all the boys in his class but he jokes that he's a little unsure if he wants to see any of the girls.

THROUGHOUT BRYAN'S stay, his parents have become close to others whose children are staying in the hospital. One example was that of a young girl's parents. The youngster had been struck by a car the day before Bryan's accident.

The Decks also relate a number of other feelings about their stay at the hospital.

"Everyone here has been great," Patty says. "The ICU nurses and doctors took care of you like your mother. They made sure you ate and slept so you could stay strong for the patient. If you had questions about anything, they were quick to explain everything."

The Decks are also quick to recognize the supportive care of the Winside Rescue Unit. They said if it hadn't been for them, Bryan might not have made it.

"Even up here, they said the rescue unit is one of the top notch units in the area," Rod says.

SINCE THE ACCIDENT, Patty has not been home. She says she has spent all of her time at the hospital with Bryan. The Decks admit that the ordeal has been difficult but it's an experience that's taught them a lot — about life, love and the support and the caring of the community.

"It's been tough but the neighborhood has been so supportive," Rod says. "They've given us more help than we've been able to use. We want to thank them for their support."

Part of the help the community has offered has been to take care of the families' livestock. In addition to helping with the chores, the community has taken care of their twin 3-year-old daughters, Michelle and Mellyssa.

"You can't imagine how many people have kept us in their prayers," Rod says.

"If it wasn't for their prayers, we might not have made it. This is really the Christmas miracle of miracles," adds Patty.

Herald recaps top news stories of the year

Events in 1989 seemed to set the stage for what happened in 1990. Issues in the world have even had their affect upon people in Wayne. Additionally, issues statewide and locally blossomed in 1990 which called for the top 15 news stories of the year.

For various reasons, this year's top news story for *The Wayne Herald* is the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait on Aug. 3. Our second top news story is the 1990 election, which saw Democratic challenger Ben Nelson squeak out a victory over incumbent Republican Gov. Kay Orr. Our third top news story, which consumed the lives of many people in the area, was the findings and progress made by the Wayne START committee.

Kuwait invaded; war may occur Aug. 3 to present

A number of families from the Wayne area have been affected by Iraq's invasion of Kuwait. In all, according to information from the Wayne County Veteran's Office, there are over 20 servicemen representing families from the area.

Despite the international military buildup, which has occurred in two phases, one following Iraq's invasion of Kuwait and another following Nov. 6 elections, Iraqi President Saddam Hussein has refused to withdraw his nation's troops from Kuwait.

As a result, the United Nations passed a resolution in late November which calls for the use of military force to get Iraq from Kuwait on Jan. 15 if Iraq has not withdrawn its forces.

Nelson defeats Orr; Carhart in as mayor Nov. 6, 1990

Despite what analysts called the dirtiest and most expensive election in Nebraska politics, challenger Ben Nelson, D-Omaha, defeated incumbent Republican Gov. Kay Orr for the gubernatorial seat in Nebraska.

In ballot measures, voters showed support for LB 1059, the school finance measure, passed earlier in the year by the Nebraska Unicameral. The bill resulted in an increase in income and sales taxes while lowering property taxes as much as 40 percent for some areas of the state. Voters shot down an effort to limit state and local governing bodies budgets to a 2 percent annual increase. The Measure 405, otherwise known as the 2 percent lid, lost when 69 percent of the voters cast their ballot against it.

In the U.S. Senate race Democratic incumbent J. James Exon defeated Republican challenger Hal Daub and in the House of Representatives seat for the first district, Republican incumbent Doug Bereuter defeated Larry Hall.

In local elections, Robert Carhart defeated Larry Johnson for Wayne's mayoral seat, Pat Prather defeated incumbent councilwoman Carolyn Filter and Patty Wieland outdistanced Gary VanMeter for the seat vacated by Johnson's bid for mayor.

START a success for many in Wayne Feb. 26 to present

The Strategic Planning and Resource Targeting team (START) released its findings following a survey conducted in Wayne with findings reviewed by a three day meeting of the 40-member committee.

The START survey findings targeted five areas of concern among a 30 percent sample of Wayne residents. The five areas include: Day Care, Housing, Public Facilities, Community Attitudes, Image and Communication and Expanding and Attracting Businesses.

As a result of the survey, a second survey is planned for 1991 which will involve many of the rural areas and communities to Wayne.

Kloster resigns; Salitros named city administrator Jan. 11, 1990; April 16, 1990

With two separate press conferences, Wayne found itself in a transition stage in 1990 as former

City Administrator Phil Kloster announced his resignation Jan. 11 to become the city manager in Newton, Kan., while the selection of present City Administrator Joe Salitros was announced April 16.

Salitros, 40, officially began his duties May 17. He came to Wayne from his post as a broker with Edward D. Jones and Company of Litchfield, Minn.

Kloster stepped down as Wayne's city administrator March 3.

Smith resigns; Roeber named Chamber director May 4, 1990 Sept. 5, 1990

On May 4, Linda Smith announced that she would be leaving Wayne to assume duties as the president of the Beatrice Chamber of Commerce and Gage County Industrial Development Corporation.

It was four months later, on Sept. 5, that the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce board of directors announced that Colleen Roeber would replace Smith as interim director of the chamber for six months. It was later announced that Roeber would hold the position indefinitely.

City audit finds \$121,000 error Oct. 9, 1990

During a routine audit conducted by the City of Wayne, a mistake in the electrical billing process found the city short of almost \$121,000 in its books.

As a result of what the city referred to as a computer error, one business received just over \$7,400 in overpayment refunds, while other businesses and residential customers were required to pay the money they owed.

The largest payback was charged to Pac 'N' Save grocery store, which was required to pay almost \$108,000 in back utility charges.

Wayne State boasts enrollment record May, 3, 1990 Nov. 29, 1990

On two separate occasions, Wayne State College registered its greatest number of students in the school's history.

On May 3, Wayne State registers showed that the college had a 26 percent increase in enrollment, which resulted in the most students enrolled in the college's history and on Nov. 29, the tally turned up 3,615 students, the largest ever for the northeast Nebraska college.

As a result of the increased number of students, the college was forced to increase tuition requirements by 5.2 percent on May 3.

New business creates controversy Oct. 1990 to Nov. 1990

First Step, Inc., a new business looking to locate a facility for the mentally ill in Wayne, created widespread concerns among residents near the planned setting.

The business, which will care for those who have been displaced from retirement homes by the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1988, will assist those who suffer from mild mental illness to live in society.

Occidental sold to West Point bank Nov. 19, 1990

As Savings and Loan institutions nationwide were running into problems during the late 1980s and early 1990s, what was Occidental Savings Bank was sold over the summer and Farmer's and Merchants State Bank was officially opened Nov. 19.

Bancorp, Inc. of West Point purchased the Wayne location of the former savings and loan institution. The new Wayne bank is located at 321 Main St.

Morris retiring after selling business

After 42 years of owning and operating a business in Wayne, Stanley Morris decided it was time to let someone else take the helm.

Morris, owner of Morris Machine Shop, sold his business Thursday to Dave Nielsen of Orchard. Along with owning Morris Machine Shop, Nielsen owns Dave's Equipment of Wayne and two businesses in Pierce.

Morris opened his machine shop in 1948 with his wife Beth. He said the time was ripe to make the move into retirement.

"I'll be 75 in the spring, so I decided it was time to cool it," he said Thursday. "We've had two guys retire in the last five years, so we decided it was time for us."

ACCORDING TO Nielsen, the shop will continue providing the same service it has since 1948 with the addition of stainless steel fabrication and welding. Nielsen said although he is the owner of the business, an associate will oversee its operation.

Keith Langenfeld, who currently resides in Orchard, will move to Wayne sometime in the next few months to take over as manager of the shop, Nielsen said.

"It (Morris Machine Shop) fits well with Dave's (Equipment)," Nielsen said. "This will provide us a place to fabricate materials rather than having to buy materials elsewhere."

UPON ENTERING retirement, Morris said he plans to stay with the business as long as he's needed and then he and Beth plan to do some traveling. He added that they plan to continue living in Wayne.

"They all know their jobs are secure," he said. "They're happy for me and for themselves."

Can middle-aged men take steps to reduce heart attack risk? A research project involved 12,000 men. Half got routine medical care, but the others also were given strong advice and support to stop smoking, lower blood pressure, lose weight and avoid foods that raise blood cholesterol. After five years, there wasn't much difference in how the two groups fared. But after 10 years, a distinct pattern evolved. The Journal of the American Medical Association reported that the heart-attack death rate was 24 percent lower for those specially coached to modify their health habits. In this group, 50 percent had stopped smoking, compared with 29 percent in the other group.

The trend by older Americans to keep fit and active has extended to the ski slopes, where it's not uncommon to find men and women in their 60s and 70s making downhill runs. Their numbers have grown to thousands since 1977 when a few individuals formed two organizations for senior skiers — The 70-Plus Ski Club, 104 East Side Drive, Ballston Lake, NY 12019, and The Over the Hill Gang, 13791 East Rice Place, Aurora, CO 80015. Minimum age for the "Gang" is 50. People in their 60s who want to join 70-Plus are told "they have to grow up."

Joint venture extends season

ASCS, LENRD expands plan

AREA - In order to extend the season for terrace construction in northeast Nebraska, the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resource District is expanding their lands for Conservation Program.

Favorable weather in the spring (before crops are planted) and in the fall (after crops have been harvested) for constructing terraces is sometimes in shortly supply.

The lands for Conservation Program in an agreement between the landuser and the LENRD that allows for terrace construction to be completed during the summer, June 1 to Sept. 30. The field to be terraced must be available by Aug. 1 and may be planted to cover crops (hay) or small grain (oats, barley, wheat and others).

Harvesting or grazing is permitted during the contract period. In addition to any harvest, a \$40 per

acre payment for loss of income due to the construction taking place is available. The LENRD Conservation Cost Share Program and the USDA's Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) help share the high cost of the actual terrace construction and can contribute to 75 percent of the average cost of the project.

Applications for the 1991 Lands for Conservation Program will be accepted at the Soil Conservation Service office at 709 Providence Road in Wayne beginning Jan. 2, 1991. Sixty-thousand dollars has been budgeted for 1991 and approval of the L for C contracts will be on Feb. 15 on a rotating basis — one per county for the January sign-up period.

Remaining funds will be approved on a first come, first served basis. The ending deadline is April 1, 1991. Early application for L for

C funds and any other conservation cost share is encouraged and makes for easier planting for the landuser.

Cost share funds are available for a variety of conservation practices including but not limited to: terraces, grassed waterways, terrace tile outlets, field and farmstead windbreaks, structures for ponds and stabilizing grades, agricultural waste holding structures, critical area seedings and wildlife habitat areas.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by the USDA is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, national origin or handicap.

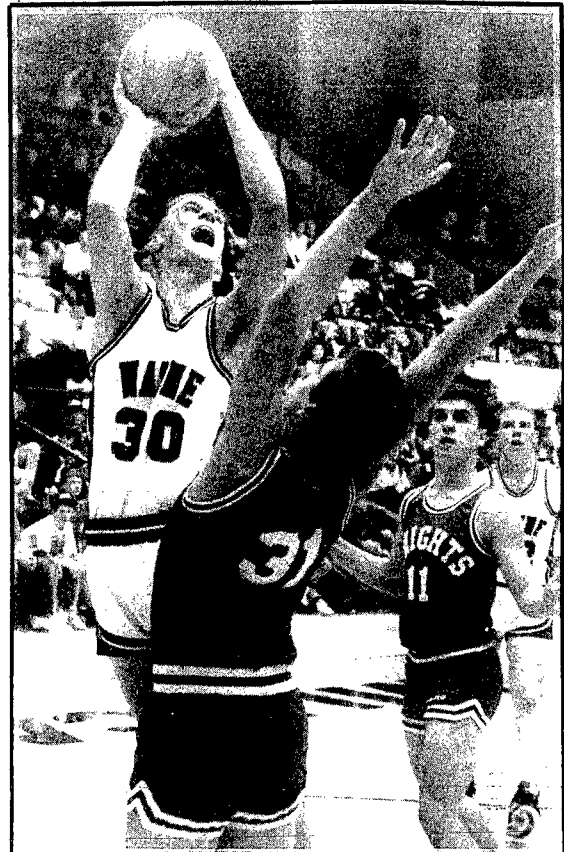

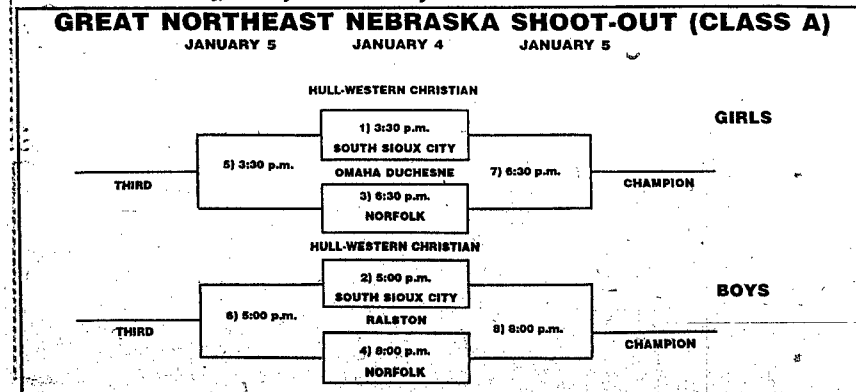
REGG CARNES GETS hacked on a shot attempt during Wayne's game with Norfolk Catholic. No foul was called.

LENRD board approves funding for two projects

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District board of directors approved funding for two proposed surface water projects at the December board meeting held in Norfolk, Dec. 20.

The board voted to apply for funding from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for the Taylor Creek Nonpoint Source Management Project. Taylor Creek is a 5.8 mile stream located in southeastern Madison County. The creek is unique to the area because it is classified as a coldwater stream which has the potential to support coldwater aquatic life, such as trout. Since 1977, the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission has stocked trout periodically in Taylor Creek.

The Lower Elkhorn NRD Board will provide \$25,000 a year over a first year period to encourage landowners to use Best Management Practices (BMPs) in order to prevent sediment and chemicals present in the soil from entering the creek. The request for funding from the EPA is for \$187,500 or 60 percent of the cost of the project. Along with the \$125,000 approved by the LENRD board, the total cost of the project will be \$312,500. The USDA Soil Conservation Service will be conducting a study of the watershed to target

the areas of greatest need for land treatment.

The board took another step in the feasibility study of a dam on Butterfly Creek in Stanton County. The proposed dam site is five miles south of Stanton, and would be built for flood protection and fishing recreation. The board approved funding for surveying, mapping and aerial photographing of the site and authorized contracting with a drilling firm for geologic exploration of the project site. Earlier this year, the board targeted the 12,000 acre Butterfly Creek Watershed by increasing the district's land treatment cost-share percentage in that area to 90 percent.

In other action:

The board voted to provide \$500 per year for three years for the Nebraska Leafy Spurge Working Task Force to fund a graduate level position to study control methods for leafy spurge.

An informational meeting to update the public on the Logan East Rural Water System will be held in Oakland at the city auditorium on Thursday, Jan. 10, 1991. Bids were recently awarded to contractors who will construct Phase I of the system that will serve 110 users in Burt County.

GOLDEN YEARS, OR TARNISHED DREAMS? Be prepared for a new campaign being orchestrated out of Washington to justify a continuing attack on entitlement programs for the elderly including Medicare, housing programs and other services, in next year's budget. This is also intended to avoid being put on the spot to enact a surcharge on the super rich which will come up again in the 1992 Fiscal Year budget meetings. The campaign, basically, is to portray this generation of older folks as the richest to ever grace our country's history. The rationale behind this is an attempt to stress that while the rest of the country is having its reverses, seniors are still collecting Social Security benefits (for which they paid, by the way!!!), and still taking advantage of Medicare services (for which they're paying more and getting less, don't forget), and living on investment income (a relatively small number do, and many of them are collecting fixed amounts that don't rise with the cost of living). The irony is the social programs Washington credits for keeping seniors out of abject poverty, namely Social Security, subsidized housing, and Medicare are the ones they want cut. If they're trying to say the senior years really are golden, well, maybe for some. For most, it's all they can do to keep the gold-plating from tarnishing. Even the most thrifty who managed to save or invest in hopes of drawing income upon retirement have had to deal with crooked savings and loan institutions which betrayed their trust, as well as flattened real estate prices and uncertain stock markets. Most seniors come out of the middle or lower income strata and had all they could do to raise their families and pay their bills; many never had anything left over that could have gone into income-producing investments. As regards the current situation, the American Geriatrics Society, which has been among the groups fighting the Medicare cuts and suggesting ways in which the program's integrity can be saved while expenses are met, will issue an updated policy statement which I'll report on shortly.
