Several Wayne State students will be featured as soloists during the concert. Selections will be from the Mozart Requiem, the Solemn Vespers and a mass setting.

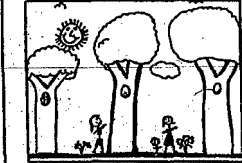
Winside round-up

Support network in full swing

Benefit helps local family

Above the couch in Bill and Sharon Corbit's living room are six simple words their family has grown to know all too well: "Life is fragile, handle with care."

In November, the Corbits were whacked with the knowledge that Bill's body had become riddled with cancer; meanwhile, Sharon was in an Omaha hospital having back surgery for the eighth time in a decade.

"He's always been my rock," Sharon will say, crying. "Now, it's my turn to be his."

Since learning of the devastating news of Bill's bout with cancer, a support system has grown from almost every angle imaginable. Since his diagnosis, just a week after Thanksgiving 1990, the Corbits' story has given the adult Sunday school class at the Wayne United Methodist Church a mission — a story of love.

IN AN EFFORT to provide monetary assistance, the United Methodist adult fellowship has organized a benefit for the Corbit family scheduled for Thursday, April 4 from 4-8 p.m. at the

Wayne City Auditorium.

In the beginning of their mission, the benefit was going to be held in the church's fellowship hall, but they soon learned that there was more interest than at first believed as groups from around the area noted a sincere desire to help.

Today, the benefit includes: the Milton G. Waldbaum Company of Wakefield, TVJ Farms of Carroll, the chapter of the Aid Association for Lutherans in Wayne, the Lutheran Brotherhood chapter in Wayne, the Concord Evangelical Free Church, State National Bank and Trust Company, Columbus Federal, First National Bank, Farmers and Merchants Bank, all of Wayne, and the Wakefield National Bank, just to name a few.

"I've had some beautiful cooperation and rides to Sioux City provided by neighbors and fellow farmers," Bill says. "If I start naming names, I'll be here forever."

THE STORY behind the tragedy of the Corbit family began when Sharon was 16 and was struck by a drunk driver, causing severe damage to her back that has required numerous surgeries.

In 1983, she again experienced physical problems with pain so severe it required several surgeries to alleviate. Then, again in 1987, she went through another series of surgeries to correct the problems but none of them took and she found herself in the hospital again in late 1990. Today, she has a morphine pump which directly injects doses into her spinal fluid.

"I woke up one morning and found Bill sitting at the dinner table having some eggs for breakfast. Usually by the time I get the kids ready for school, he is already gone for work," she explains. "I asked him if he felt OK and he didn't respond the first few times I asked him. Then he replied that he didn't feel well and he was eating to try to feel better. So I called Dr. Lindau to see if we could get him in because he wasn't acting like himself."

"... That day I was scheduled to have a pre-operation physical and I asked them to cancel that appointment to get Bill in. I wasn't sure what was wrong with him but I thought he had had a stroke or something."

THE WEDNESDAY after

Thanksgiving, Sharon went to Omaha to have back surgery and the day after her Thursday surgery, Bill traveled to Norfolk to have a Catscan done. On Saturday, Sharon called her husband to find out the results.

"I asked him what it showed and he replied that it was the worst news of all," she says, breaking into tears recalling the conversation. "He told me that he had tumors on his liver, one kidney, the base of his lungs, his hips and his brain."

On Dec. 10, 1990, Bill entered St. Luke's hospital in Sioux City to have the tumors removed from his brain. Despite having surgery and subsequent chemotherapy, the tumors are starting to return.

ALTHOUGH BATTLING the bad news that tumors are returning, the Corbits are holding strong. The support which they have received from the community — Wakefield, Wayne, Concord and Carroll — have helped them in more ways than they can explain.

"We've been awestruck," Bill says. "I couldn't believe this has

Lamb has first hearing in Ponca

Tracy Lamb, 22, of Concord, was given her first felony hearing in the Ponca County Court Friday morning. Her preliminary hearing, has been scheduled for April 19.

The preliminary hearing April 19 serves two reasons: to determine that a crime has been committed, and to determine if Lamb committed the crime.

According to Dixon Deputy Sheriff Don Taylor, Lamb will be provided with the opportunity to enter a plea April 19 at her preliminary hearing.

Lamb is charged with two felonies from a shooting incident Saturday, March 23 in Concord where Joseph Michael Crawford, 31, of Concord, was allegedly shot by Lamb with a .410 gauge shotgun. Lamb faces felony charges on first degree assault and the use of a firearm to commit a felony.

ALTHOUGH A \$40,000 bond was set Monday, Lamb is still in the custody of the Dixon County Sheriff's office.

According to Taylor, Crawford's condition has improved from guarded critical condition to stable but critical condition at St. Luke's Hospital in Sioux City. Taylor said Crawford is still being closely monitored and he is still in intensive care.

Taylor added that the investigation in the matter is now complete.

Wakefield man remakes 'Lord's Supper' Artist sees work as tribute to God's glory

If you haven't seen the wood-carved "Last Supper" display in the Mines Jewelers' window, you might want to stop in Wayne and take a peek.

The work, created by Wakefield wood carver Bud Erlandson, is a duplicate of the Leonardo daVinci depiction of Christ's last supper with his disciples. It represents somewhere around 600 hours of work by the retired Wakefield farmer-turned-artist.

"I'm far from a professional — I'm far from it — I'm an amateur," Erlandson says with a sense of hidden pride. "I just hope this carving serves glory to God."

THE PROJECT found its roots three years ago when Erlandson and his wife of 12 years, Lola, moved his father, Warner, who turned 99 on Friday, from his Wakefield home into an apartment. He says while they were moving his father, he came across some old duplicate paintings of daVinci's "Last Supper" and they

intrigued him.

The actual process of making the wood carving began two years ago when Ponca lumber yard owner Wes Schram found some pieces of bass wood which he thought would serve Erlandson's cause well. Erlandson says Schram contacted him about the wood and upon receiving it, Erlandson let it dry out for seven months before carving into it.

Over the course of working on the project, Erlandson says he used a number of different carving tools and small chisels to create detail in

the work. He says the finishing touches were put on within the last six months.

ERLANDSON IS quick to recognize the assistance he received in the project. He says upon the carving's completion, Wayne wood carver Bob Dolata helped him finish the wood.

In all, the "Last Supper" has two coats of stain control finish on it, two coats of sanding sealer, four coats of spar varnish and four coats

The Nebraska Organ Retrieval System, Inc. and the Lion's Eye Bank of Nebraska will present a program, "Legal and Other Aspects of Human Organ and Tissue Donating," on Monday, April 8 at 1:30 p.m. at the Northeast Research and Extension Center near Concord.

The program is free and is being offered by the University of Nebraska Extension-Dixon County. The public is encouraged to attend.

"More and more people are interested in donating their organs or tissue so that another's life can be saved," said Karen Wermers, extension agent-home economics/family finances. "Approximately 1,500 heart transplants are performed each year, but that leaves 1,200 other people still waiting for other organs such as lungs, kidneys, pancreas, bones, corneas, skin and bodies."

of finishing wax. "And a lot of elbow grease," Erlandson jokes.

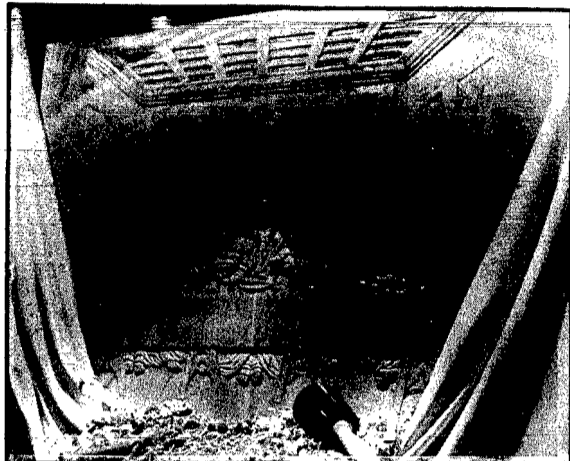

"Something like that should be shared," VanMeter says. "Bud's a fairly humble fellow and I don't think he knows how good he is. He brings joy to people in a quiet,

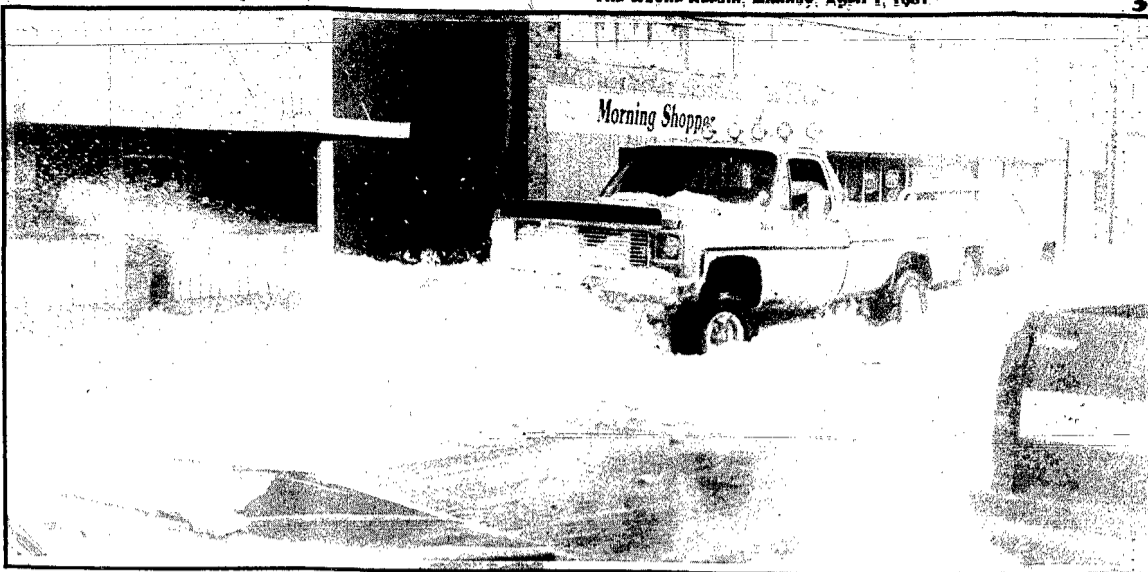
unassuming way."

Nebraska lawmaker to discuss bill requiring handgun controls

WAYNE - Nebraska State Sen. Brad Ashford of Omaha will be speaking about gun control legislation which is currently before the state legislature on Wednesday, April 3 at 7 p.m. in the Nebraska Room of the Wayne State Student Center.

The focus of Ashford's discussion will be LB 355, a measure which has been debated in the legislature and requires any person who wants to purchase a handgun to obtain an annual certificate allowing an individual to buy any number of handguns during the year. It offers a one-time background check with no registration.

THE PURPOSE of his visit is to inform the public about the bill, he says.

"I am certainly looking forward to visiting Wayne State," Ashford says. "It is my hope and intention to visit with the people of Wayne about my bill and inform them of what exactly it does. ... I sincerely believe the measure is needed. If it will save one life it deserves consideration — that is my message."

The event, which is free and open to the public, has been discussed at length in recent days during legislative action in Lincoln.

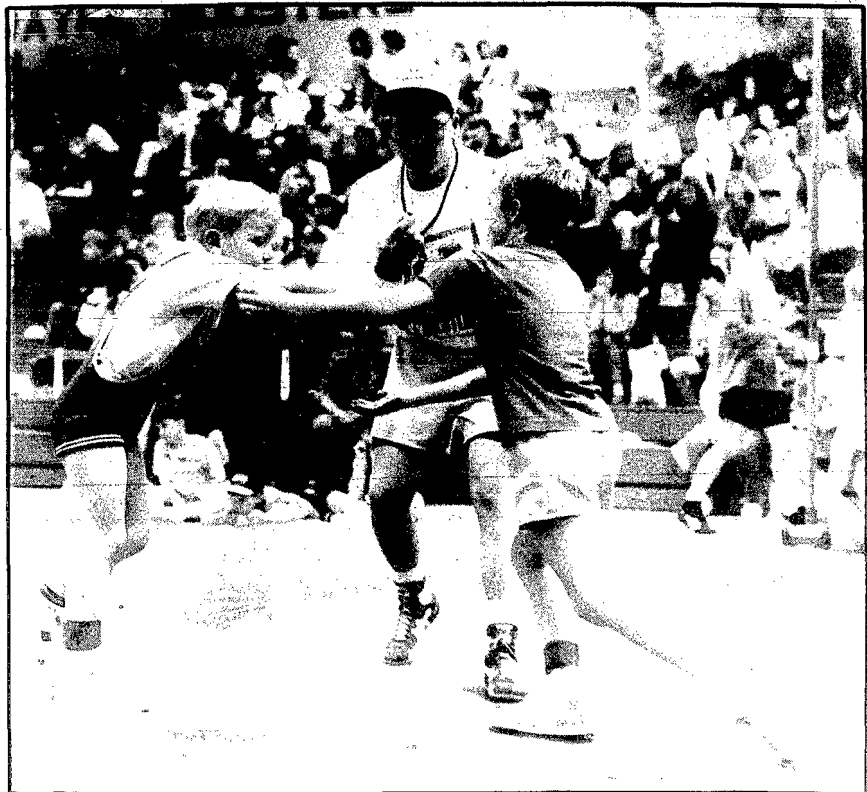

NPPD releases funds


AREA - Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD) is distributing in-lieu-of-tax payments totaling more than \$4.8 million to cities, towns, counties and school districts in the NPPD service area, according to James L. Mond, NPPD regional manager at Norfolk.

A total of \$4,750,722.34, based on gross retail revenue, is being distributed to treasurers of 63 Nebraska counties where there are municipalities served at retail by NPPD.

Counties and the amounts they receive from this area include: Cedar, \$2,814.61; Dixon, \$1,265.94; Wayne, \$29.90.

In addition, county treasurers in 70 Nebraska counties which NPPD has property will receive payments totaling \$104,995.72. The money represents the second half of 1990 payments that NPPD is obligated to pay. The first half of the payment was made in October 1990.

Last month, NPPD distributed nearly \$6.8 million to more than 200 towns as a result of agreements leasing electric distribution systems to NPPD. The money was half of the annual payments made by NPPD under the agreements.


